Sander's boys first at regional, with one first breaking, is not a bad record for the tracksters.

According to information from the state legislature has been passed to put school board election on the "place" system. This means that no candidate will be running for office, but each incumbent will be assigned a "place" and each candidate running will make a bid for one of the places and will compete for votes against another candidate or candidates for a certain "place."

Then along came a story last week of the bottoms of deficits at the state had hit this year and was facing financial ruin unless some action were taken, like raising the price of a motor vehicle inspection stickers like raising the price of the cigarette tax, and some other certain money-getting devices.

Some of us, individually can go to Austin to satisfy ourselves on the financial picture of our state. We are forced to believe what information we consider to be reliable, because it's the best information available. But we would like to know the truth.

The same inconsistencies exist in our national news. We hear a limited amount of information, and it is sometimes clouded or altered for public consumption.

We read this week that Grand Shoals Lake had been renamed Lake LBJ. We wonder if name-changing included Dam No. 1 also!

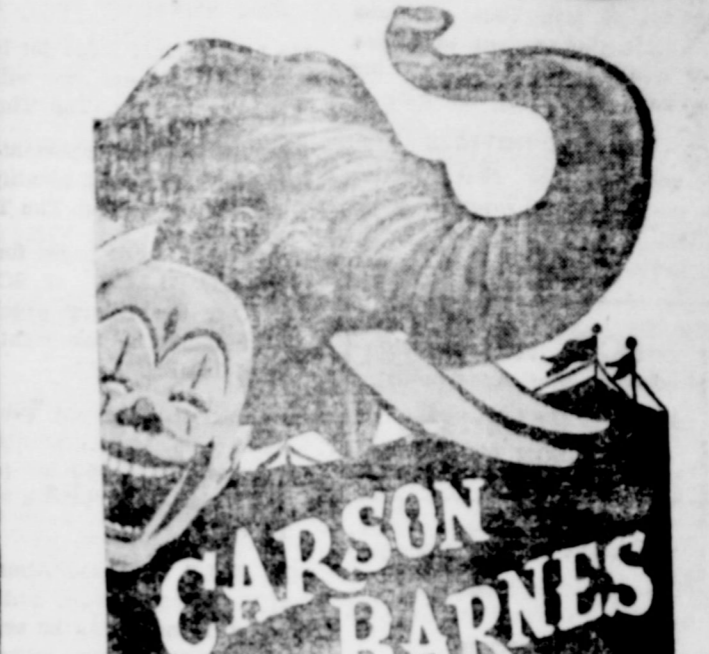

Notice to Notaries Public

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967, must qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1965, and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notary Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.
