## Officers Injured In Wreck Monday

Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg and Texas Highway Patrolman Malcom Bolinger escaped possible serious injury Monday morning about 10:30 when Hogg's station wagon overturned near Dryden. The car was demolished.

The two officers were going to the Dryden area to do some work on horseback and with bloodhounds. They were pulling a trailer with the animals in it at the time of the accident. The cause of the accident was not determined.

The horses were skinned and bruised and the dogs were unhurt.

The officers were taken to a Fort Stockton hospital for examination and treatment. Bolinger had abrasions and a slight neck injury and Hogg received a concussion, according to reports. Both remained in the hospital through Tuesday night.

## Priority Granted For Dam Project

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson received word Friday that priority had been granted for the field party work necessary for the progress of the construction of dams for flood control on Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile watersheds.

In a telephone call from the state office, Judge Wilkinson was told that the state group had recommended immediate approval to the U. S. Department of Agriculture who would relay the authority on to the Soil Conservation District.

A letter of the action of the state group will follow in the near future, according to the information received.

This information has been anxiously awaited by all local residents since application for the flood control project was initiated. It gives assurance of the plans of the state and federal organizations to begin work as soon as possible on the project.

From all information available to local groups who have

been working on the project, this proposal will rate a high priority because of the loss of lives and property in the flood of June 11 last year.

## April 30 Set As Date To Start Drive For Funds for Local Medical Center

April 30 is the day set for the beginning of the drive for funds for the Trans-Terrell Medical Center.

The date was set and plans to conduct the drive were set at a

meeting of the executive and fund-drive committee Monday night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Harkins.

The fund-drive committee selected territory leaders who will work in the rural area of the territory, and team captains to work in town. Each of these leaders will choose their own helpers and divide the citizens among themselves for solicitation.

There will be two meetings for instructing the solicitors; the first will be for the leaders and the second will be for the solicitors. These meetings, it is hoped, will thoroughly inform the solicitors of all of the plans of the program so that they may be able to answer almost any question put to them.

Rev. J. C. Hancock, who will be in charge of instructing the solicitors, will prepare an instruction sheet to guide the solicitors and this information will also be published in The Times.

The executive committee has asked that all rumors and information passed around thus far be regarded as unofficial until the proper information can be given out by the committees.

An office will be set up in the Turner Hotel where workers will have files and information for any who want to come there to make their contribution or loan or for information. It will serve as a headquarters for all of the workers and display a sign noting the amount collected toward the total goal.

A strong effort will be made to get most of the people contacted within the first three or four days of the drive.

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**Livestock Round-up For Boys Ranch Is Underway**

The 1966 West Texas Boys Ranch Annual Round-Up gets under way this month in all of the counties served by the ranch. With 66 boys presently in residence, approximately 20 boys in placement away from ranch supervision, and a new dormitory under construction, the ranch will be serving well over 100 boys before the 1966 Round-up is over.

1966 Round-up Chairman, Roddy Peeples, has scheduled a staggered emphasis on livestock this year in order to take advantage of seasonal movement of stock to market. The sheep and goat phase started April 18 and cattle and hogs June 1.

The West Texas Boys Ranch Round-up has become a traditional rallying point throughout West Texas for counties with boys at the ranch to get behind the ranch and raise support in their individual counties. With more and more West Texas boys seeking admittance every year, and with basic expenses for food and clothing, shelter and supervision rising, it is vitally important to the ranch this year's Round-up be a success," Peeples said.

**New Contract For SCD Written**

A new Memorandum of Understanding between the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil and Water Conservation District and the United States Department of Agriculture became effective January 24, 1966, with the signature of the Secretary of Agriculture and the District supervisors.

The new contract sets forth the intentions of the USDA and the District, to undertake the proposed cooperation. It sets forth general procedures by which both parties will act.

The District and the USDA have the common objective of helping to bring about the use of each acre of land within the limits of its capabilities and treated in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement.

The USDA makes its assistance available to district cooperators in the field of soil and water conservation through the Soil Conservation Service, which in turn works with the district in a common goal of soil and water conservation.

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**'Miss Big Bend' Contest Slated For May 7, Alpine**

Area civic organizations and business firms are invited to enter a contestant in the "Miss Big Bend Country" beauty pageant to be held Saturday night May 7, in the Sul Ross College main auditorium and sponsored by the Alpine Jaycees.

The area winner will receive among other prizes, an expense paid trip to Odessa to compete for the Miss West Texas title July 2, 3 and 4.

The pageant is limited to 20 entries from a four county area: Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, and Terrell Counties. The entry fee is \$10 per girl, to be paid by the sponsor, plus the responsibility of providing the contestant with a one piece bathing suit if needed.

Girls, 18 to 28 years of age, and high school graduates or May 1966 graduates, are eligible to attend. She must not be or never have been married.

The pageant will follow the same rules of the Miss America pageant with each contestant being judged on beauty, talent, poise and personality. It is possible the area winner could compete for the Miss America title as the Miss West Texas winner competes for the Miss Texas title in Fort Worth.

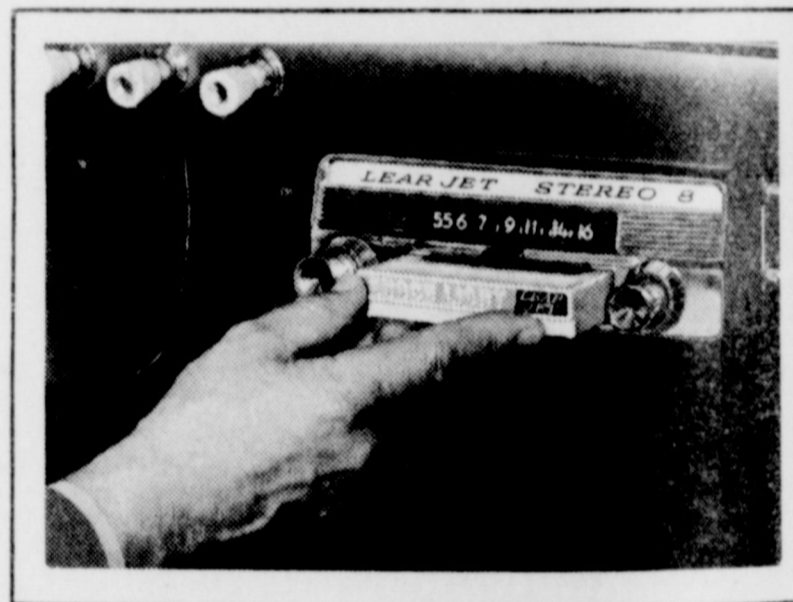

After a brief wedding trip, the couple will be at home in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where he will attend Spartan School of Aeronautics.

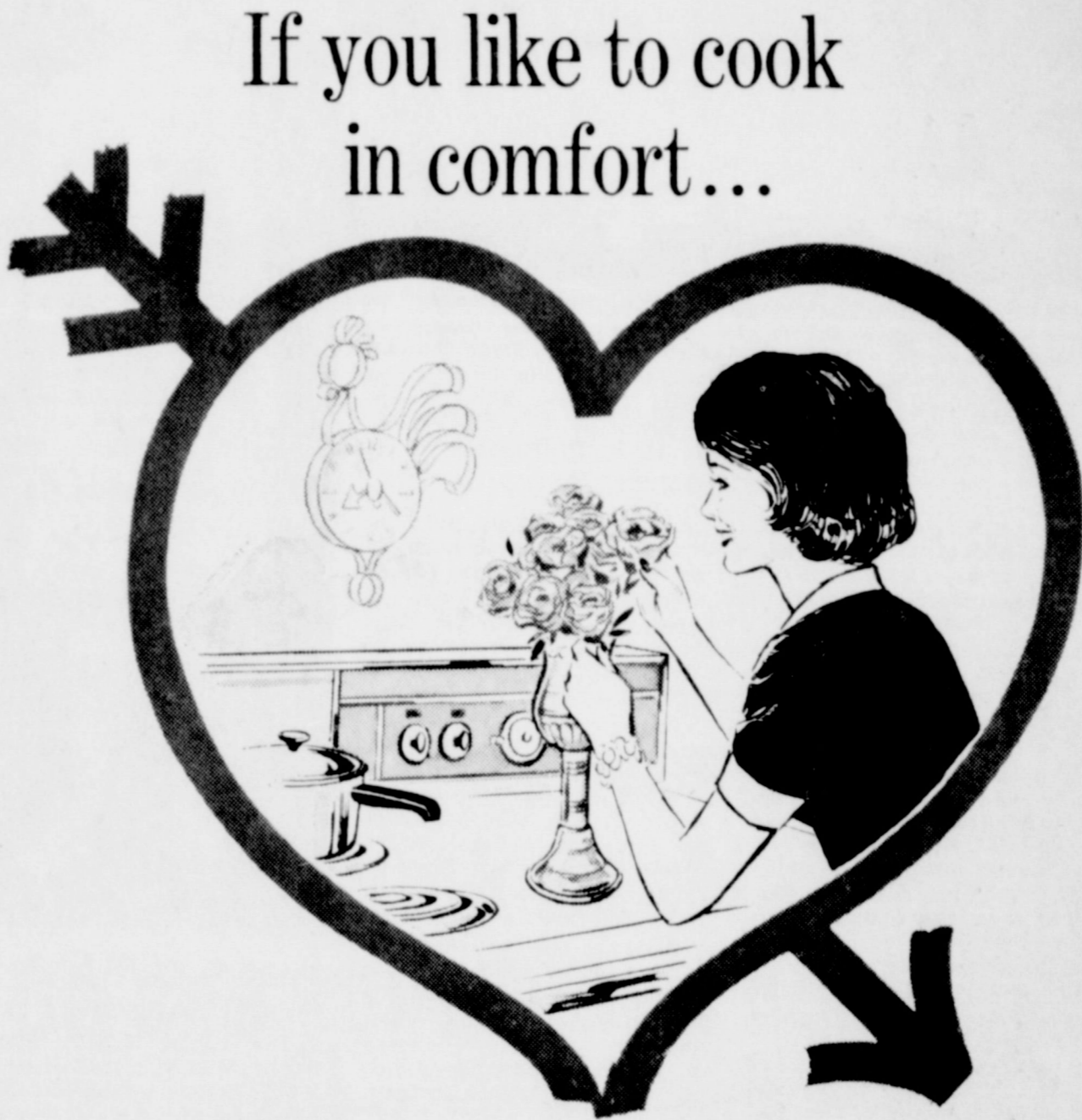

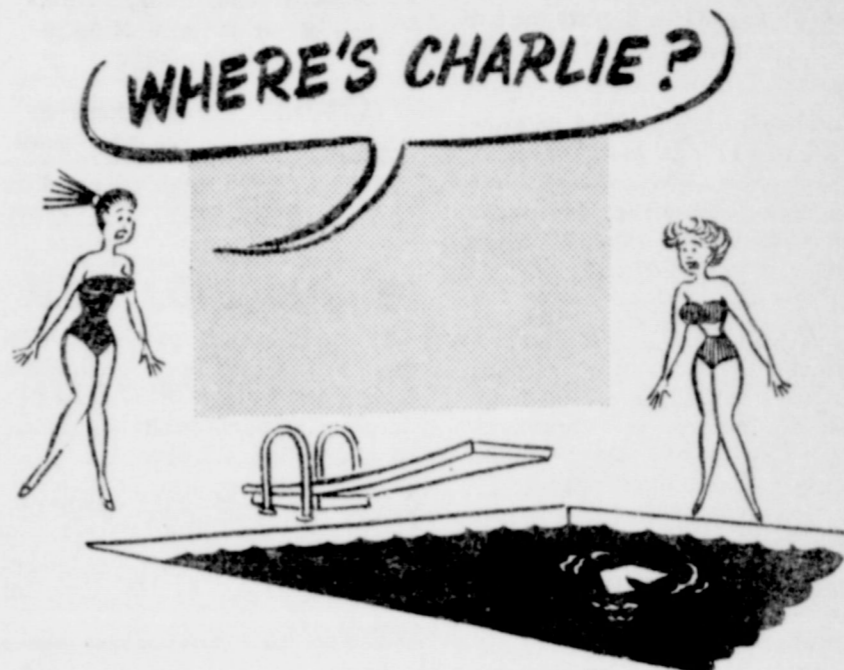
