U.S. Government Pays \$12,799 For Flood Repair Aid

APRIL 6, 1967

Terrell County Judge R. S. Wilkinson received a check for \$12,799 from the U. S. Government as their share of disaster aid as promised soon after the June 11, 1965, disaster.

Sanderson was declared a national emergency area by President Lyndon B. Johnson immediately after the flood, and several days later officials from the state and federal government were here to offer their assistance to local officials. Most of the reconstruction work had been accomplished, but there remained a few costly and timeconsuming projects that were on the schedule, and some of the work that had been done was not yet paid for.

The amount submitted for payment by the federal government was \$13, 282, but auditors refused to pay some of the costs which were legitimate claims, but not covered under the program of the government's aid.

Terrell County spent about \$40,000 and had received contributed labor and materials that amounted to between \$75,000-\$100,000, Wilkinson stated.




