Economy Boost Of \$6.8 Million By County Gas Wells

More than \$6.8 million a year of economic stimulation for Terrell County flows from its natural gas wells each year according to an annual study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association showed this week.

"As one of the 206 producing counties in Texas, Terrell County's economy is sensitive to fluctuations in the oil industry generally," commented W. A. Landreth, Fort Worth, Association president, "Long range, the demand for oil looks strong and current production rates continue to provide Texas a major source of its income. On the other hand, Texas operators are beset by competition from other oil producing areas, government ceilings on natural gas prices, heavy tax payments, and a price for crude oil that is insufficient to encourage the amount of exploratory drilling that is needed to find future reserves."

Based on the latest U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, Terrell County in 1965 produced 43.1 billion cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$6,868,000, and ranks 109th among Texas counties in production.

A major distribution of income from sales of gas went to county landowners in royalty payments totaling \$858,500.

In 1966, a year that saw drilling in Texas fall to its lowest level since 1957, oil and gas operators drilled 6 wells in Terrell County. Of these, 4 were wildcats seeking new fields.

The Association estimates that operators in the county spent \$469,938 in drilling last year, of which \$275,888 was lost in dry holes.

Sharing heavily in the county's production each year is the State Treasury, which received \$480,760 in natural gas production taxes in 1965 paid by the producers and royalty owners.

Brown-Bassett Field Extended To Crockett County

The Crockett County Ellenburger area of the Brown-Bassett multipay field gained its fourth producer and a 5/8-mile north and very slightly east extension with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 1-109 Mitchell, prospective Wolfcamp opener, 39 miles southwest of Ozona for a calculated, absolute open flow of 60 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 13,057-14,022 feet, which had been acidized with 30,000 gallons.

Total depth is 14,257 feet, with 4 1/2-inch liner run from 12,555-14,255 feet.

Wolfcamp production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the maximum rate of 3.9 million cubic feet daily on a 1-inch choke when drilling reached 10,477 feet.

Location is 6,023 feet from the east and 865 feet from the south lines of 109-1-18GN.

The Terrell portion of the field produces from the Strawn, Fusselman, Devonian and Wolfcamp, in addition to the Ellenburger.

The No. 1-109 Mitchell is 7 1/2 miles east-southeast of Wolfcamp production in the Terrell portion of the field, but separated by the four-well Hoge Ranch (Wolfcamp gas) field, producing at a much shallower depth.

The show is open to stallions, mares, and geldings and the interest indicated promises a big field of entries.

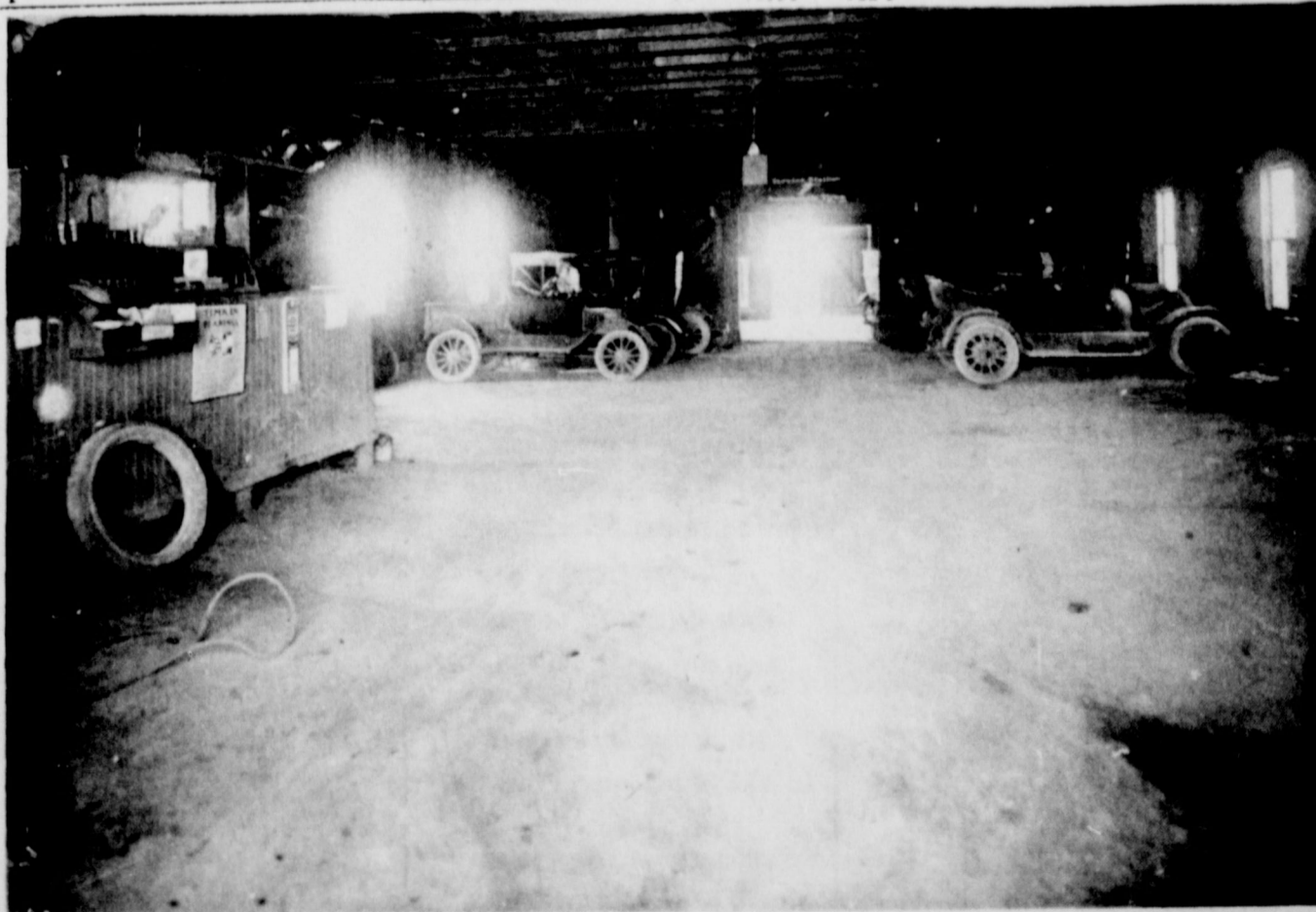

In the original picture, another automobile can be seen in the driveway behind the front portion of the garage, and another auto behind the second open door. 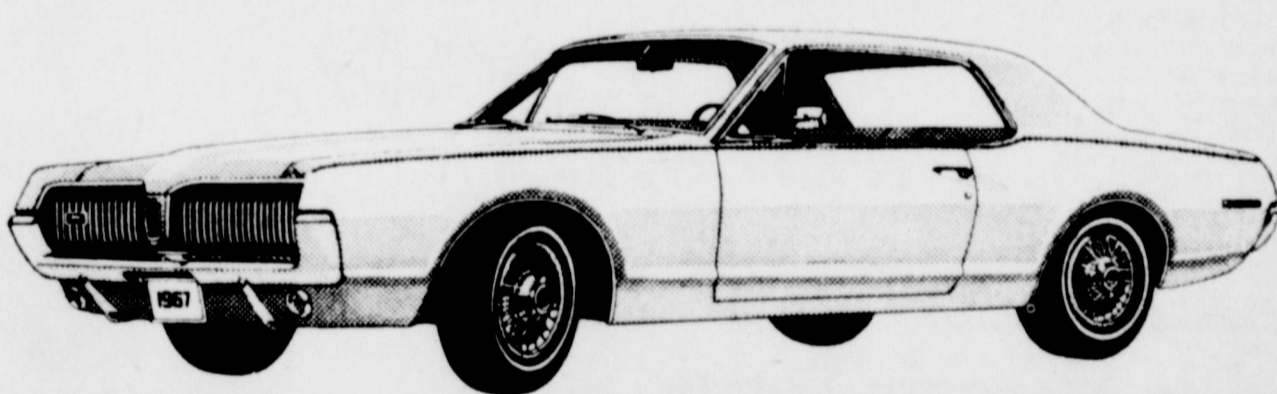

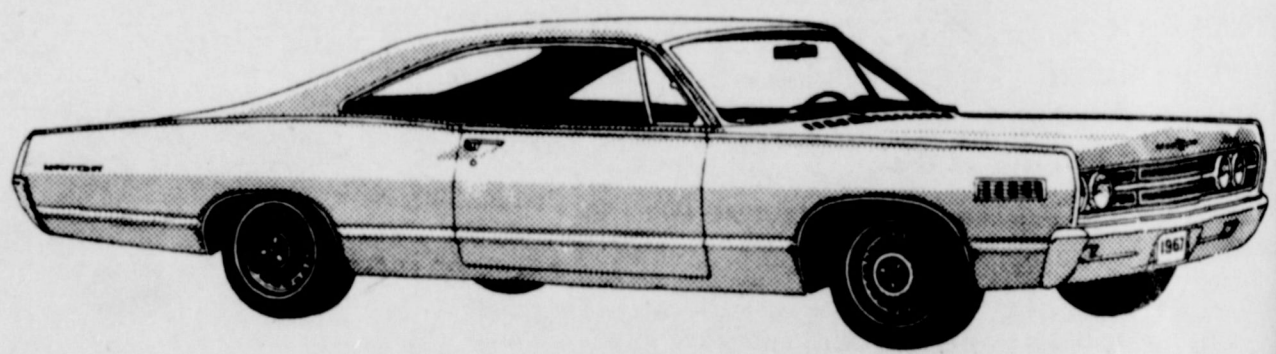
