Terrell County is probably one of the few places in the entire state where a domino game open to the public goes on during the times the polls are open and in the room where the casting of ballots is being done and where the counting of ballots is done.

We do not question the integrity of the dominoe players or the fact that there may have been something crooked going on during, before, or after the game.

We are calling attention to the fact to try to prevent an embarrassing situation at some time in the future.

There is a law which strictly forbids loitering - among other things, within a certain distance of the polling place, and while we would recognize that a person who is playing dominoes is usually not loafing, the fact remains that this might be considered contrary to the statutes concerning the holding of elections and could possibly be an embarrassing situation under certain circumstances.

We hope that this is taken in the light intended.

The finding of the guns belonging to local people - stolen during deer season - was a job well done by all officers of this area who had anything to do with it. Lots of time and money were spent by many to recover the weapons, but it was all worth it if it brings the guilty one or ones before the courts.

Mrs. Ida Bookin ... dies at age 91

Mrs. Ida Bookin, 91, died in the Watson Nursing Home in Fort Worth early Saturday evening. Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church Wednesday afternoon with Rev. Melvin A. Walker, pastor, officiating, and interment was in Cedar Grove Cemetery. The Jane: Funeral Home of Ozona brought the body to Sanderson Tuesday and was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Bookin, the former Ida Robitsch, was born in Leipzig, Germany, June 26, 1876, and came to America with her parents when she was five years old.

On August 2, 1894, she was married to Steve C. Bookin in San Antonio. They came to Sanderson in 1908 and for 25 years, until they moved to El Paso, she was actively identified with civic, cultural, social, and religious life of the growing community as she reared her family of three daughters and a son here. She was the last surviving charter member of the local chapter of the Order of Eastern Star.

The Bookins returned to Sanderson in 1944 and on August 3 celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. He died 10 days later but she continued to make her home here until about six years ago when she was put in a nursing home on account of failing health.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Tom Bryan, of Fort Worth; the other two daughters, Mrs. H. E. Fletcher of Sanderson and Mrs. Ethel Brown of Birmingham, Ala., preceded her in death; a son, Martin Bookin of Boerne; nine grandchildren, and several great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Willis Harrell, Sam Harrell, Weldon Cox, Carlton White, Greene Cooke, W. D. O'Bryant, Martin Bookin Jr. of San Antonio, and Robert Bookin of Boerne.

Gun Theft Ring Uncovered By Area Officers

Work by Trans-Pecos lawmen over the past month has resulted in felony theft charges against four young men in connection with the theft of 24 guns during hunting season in the Big Bend region.

Charged with felony theft in Presidio, Pecos, Reeves, Brewster and Terrell counties are James C. Short, 19, of Kerrville. He posted a \$5,000 bond on each of three charges after appearing before Kerr County Peace Justice Raymond Orr.

Facing similar charges in Presidio, Terrell, Brewster and Reeves Counties is Larry Brice Tucker, 19, of Slaton. He also is free on bond.

John W. Willis, 19, of Houston, is charged in Reeves, Pecos and Presidio counties. He is free on bond.

Charlie Murdock, 21, of Jayton is charged in Terrell County for felony theft. Charges were filed with County Atty. J. M. Hayre Wednesday. Murdock has not been arrested.

Bonds on Short, Tucker and Willis range from \$1,500 to \$5,000 in five counties.

The charges stem from the thefts of guns from pickups and automobiles in the five counties. The guns were taken from about Nov. 28 and Dec. 25.

Twenty-four guns, allegedly stolen, have been located in pawn shops in Kerrville, Slaton, Midland, Odessa, Tyler and other places.

Sheriffs Carl Williams of Alpine, Bill Cooksey of Sanderson, F. P. Rooney of Marfa, Pete Ten Eyck of Fort Stockton, and Texas Rangers Arthur Hill and Ed Goodings and other officers participated in the investigation.

The case was broken open shortly before Christmas when an owner of one of the stolen guns found his weapon in a pawn shop in Odessa and notified authorities.

Three of the young men have been identified as students at Sul Ross State College in Alpine.

Low School Bid Made By Odessan

Eight bidders were present on Tuesday afternoon at the school for the opening of bids on the construction of the new junior high school and remodeling work in other buildings of the school.

Area Builders, Inc., Odessa, was the low bidder, \$358,500, and the high bid was \$439,000.

All of the work is scheduled for completion in 300 days and 195 days was allotted the work of remodeling.

Work is expected to start in the next few days.

License Renewals Available Here, Examiner States

Renewals for all classes of drivers' licenses will be available in Sanderson on the second and fourth Fridays of each month, according to word received last week from the driver's license examiner.

It had been previously erroneously reported that drivers would have to go to some other place to get their renewals with the change in the method of examinations and renewals.

Licenses are valid until the expiration date shown on the face of the license and drivers should be careful to have the examination and otherwise qualify for a renewal prior to the expiration of the license held presently. Some renewals will be issued for two years and some for four years, depending upon the applicant's birthday and the number of the current license. All licenses will bear a colored picture of the holder and the license will be laminated to prevent alteration or damage from carrying in wallets or purses.

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**Cong. White Asks For Re-Election**



Richard C. White of El Paso Wednesday announced he will seek his third term as congressman from the 16th Congressional District.

White, 43, is a native of El Paso and first gained the seat in 1964 when he defeated fellow El Pasoan Malcom McGregor Jr.

One of White's major accomplishments during his tenure of office is the creation of Guadalupe Mountains National Park, only the third new National Park authorized in the U. S. in over 16 years.

White also authored the Chamizal National Memorial bill as well as the bill to create the 12 mile memorial highway along the relocated Rio Grande.

White is a member of Two House Committees, Interior and Insular Affairs and Post Office and Civil Service. He also is a member of the Interior subcommittee on Irrigation, reclamation and national parks and recreations.

In his first year in Congress, White succeeded in getting increased facilities at Big Bend National Park and Fort Davis National Historic Site.

He also worked with other West Texas congressmen in getting a \$200,000 appropriation for initial study of the West Texas Water Supply project.

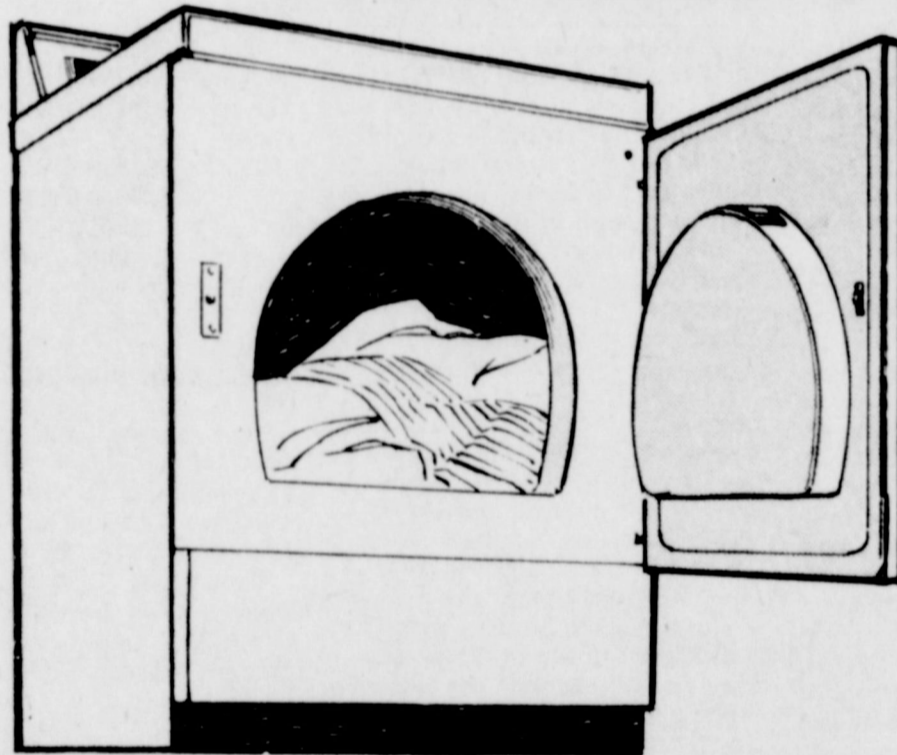

# Fighting Fatness Makes Good Sense

There's no doubt about it. Many of us are too fat.

Almost everyone who is too fat would like to slim down to average size for his height and build. Many women would like to be on the skinny side.

The American Medical Association's home health book, Today's Health Guide, points out that most physicians consider obesity an important factor in personal health for three reasons:

- It is common.
- It is associated with increased sickness and death rates, notably in respect to heart, circulatory, kidney, and metabolic disorders as well as surgical and obstetrical complications.
- It can be successfully treated to help control associated medical conditions.

Medical experience strongly suggests greater risks for overweight persons in respect to most of the major disorders besetting our population. The evidence for generally adverse effects from obesity seems too massive and too consistent to be ignored.

So we need to lose weight. It should be simple: just cut down on the calories. Unfortunately, it often isn't simple. Taking fewer calories than are needed seems to be within the theoretical capability of most of us. Yet results suggest that this is difficult and often not achieved. Long-term observations indicate poor success for most dieters.

One factor involved in overweight is psychological. Emotional factors are operative in all of us. Psychological factors may help cause overweight, or help to maintain it. Seldom is psychiatric consultation required. The general practitioner, the internist, the pediatrician usually can provide suitable guidance and support as part of the weight-reduction program, the AMA book says. The physician's aim is to prod and reinforce our will to lose weight, to help us be so determined to trim off excess pounds that we will stick to the reducing regime.

The physician may prescribe drugs at first, as a crutch to help



us get started. These can reduce appetite, promote a feeling of well-being, add bulk in the stomach, eliminate excess fluids. They can, at best, afford only temporary help. They postpone the day when facts must be faced, when we finally make up our minds that we must change our eating habits to keep our weight under control.

## School Census Now Underway

January is school census month in Texas and this year Jim Spann, Elementary School Principal, is taking the census for Terrell County. State Law requires that the census be completed in January and so it is a big job for such a short time.

The purpose of the census is to record the names of all children who will be six years of age on or before September 1, 1968, and those who will not be eighteen before September 1, 1968. The enumerator will want to know the year, month, and day of the birth of the child, how long they have lived in the school district and what county they reside in on February 1, 1967. For most residents of the Terrell County Independent School District this information will already be recorded on the form by the census enumerator thus reducing the time formerly required for a census interview.

All forms will be signed by the parent or the guardian and the census will include all persons of the above ages whether he or she is in school or not and also if married or not.

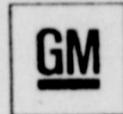

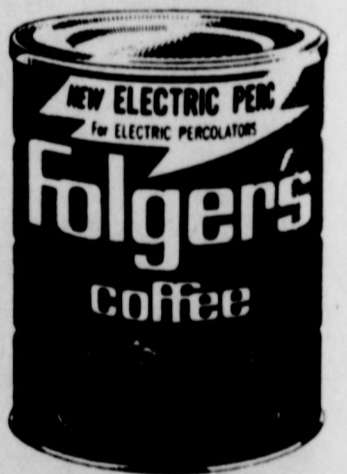
