

# Callahan War Memorial Will Be Unveiled In July 25 Rites

Callahan County will honor its war dead Sunday, July 25, when a granite memorial shaft will be unveiled on the courthouse lawn in Baird, Mrs. Gilbert Hinds, has announced.

Mrs. Hinds, foremost in a campaign to raise the money for the memorial, reports the stone is now being properly graven with the names of the Callahan County soldiers who died in World Wars I and II and in the Korean conflict.

The base of the stone is 14 feet in length, the center five feet high. The names of dead will be inscribed on a 3 by 4 foot space. Letters will be black against a white background. The stone will be set up on the south courthouse lawn, facing Market Street, Baird's main business thoroughfare.

Mrs. Hinds said that the catalog of names includes 74 who died in World War II, 16 in World War I, and four in the Korean War.

Approximately \$1,500 was collected for the memorial, sponsored by the Rebekah Lodge.

The unveiling hour will be between 4 and 5 p.m., with Randall Jackson, Baird attorney, and Jack Scott, former Cross Plains newspaperman, as principal speakers, Mrs. Hinds said.

Taking upon herself the securing of the stone, Mrs. Hinds has made personal tours to every town and village in Callahan County to enlist interest and to collect funds for it. She was assisted in the enterprise by committees in various towns.

## Snyder Well Flows 1,920 Bbls.

Completion of a prolific new oil discovery eight miles north-east of Baird in Callahan County has been announced by Fain and McGaha, operating from Abilene.

The strike, producing from the lower Bend Conglomerate, is the No. 1 C. B. Snyder, Jr., et al, in Section 6, Block C. T&NO Survey.

It flowed for a calculated daily potential of 1,920 barrels of 41 gravity oil, based on an actual three-hour gauge. The well flowed 245 barrels of oil in three hours, when test was halted for lack of storage space.

Production was through a 3/4-inch choke with 590 pounds on casing pressure; and 320 pounds on tubing. Flow was from open hole 4,358-4,377 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 600-1.

Oil was encountered during a drillstem test taken from 4,338-64 feet, with tool open eight minutes. Gas surfaced in one and one-half minutes, mud in four minutes and oil in five minutes. Recovery was 240 feet of oil. Initial flowing pressure was 1,605 pounds, with final pressure of 1,535. Shutin pressure in 33 minutes was 2,045 pounds.

## Polls Announced For Wheat Referendum

On July 23, at seven different polling places wheat growers of Callahan County will vote for or against marketing quotas for the 1955 crop.

The referendum, according to B. B. McPherson, of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, will determine whether or not the quota program now in effect will continue for next year's crop.

Two-thirds of those who vote must approve quotas before they can be put into operation. The current program, which was voted on a year ago, was approved by 87 percent of the voters—390,221 to 57,536.

McPherson urges every eligible wheat grower in Callahan County to vote. A producer is eligible to vote if he will have more than 15 acres of wheat on his farm for harvest in 1955. In other words, he can vote if he would be affected directly by quotas, which apply only to farms with more than 15 acres of wheat.

If quotas are approved, there will be marketing penalties on any "excess" wheat—produced outside the acreage allotment—and the full level of price support authorized for 1955 will be available for those who comply with their allotments. If quotas are not approved, there will be no quotas or marketing penalties, and price support for those who stay within their allotments will be at 50 percent of parity.

Farm allotment notices, as well as an explanatory leaflet giving the essential facts of the 1955 program, were sent out on July 9 to Callahan County wheat growers of record. The following voting places in the county will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Friday, July 23:

## Callahan Library Adds New Books

The library acquired more than 4,000 volumes since its creation about 12 years ago. The library is sponsored by the ladies civic club of Baird. The books are free to all residents of the county. It is being well patronized.

In addition to the library, the club sponsors a museum which contains hundreds of souvenirs, mementos and heirlooms and keepsakes of an early day in Callahan County.

The library desires donations of books and the museum welcomes any old newspapers, legal instruments, souvenirs and mementos of Callahan County for preservation and display. The museum has some very old kitchen utensils, early-day school books, typewriters, including one from a donor who used it in an early day business college. An old-type, cylinder gramophone, intact, was used in early days by a ranchman who sought to learn Spanish from its records.

The library and museum maintenance is financed largely by regular appropriations of the Callahan County Commissioners Court.

**10,908 Arrests By Patrol In May**

Members of the Texas Highway Patrol effected a total of 10,908 arrests during the month of May, according to a report just released by W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Patrol Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Of these, 8,516 — or 78% — were for hazardous traffic violations. As usual, however, the Patrolmen gave twice as many warnings to motorists as they did tickets — a total of 21,898.

Leading the list of both arrests and warnings was "speed". Forty-three percent of the arrests and 36% of the warnings were for violations of the speed law.

Patrolmen didn't do their work standing still. They racked up a total of 1,163,004 miles during the month while working 101,907 man hours, 37% of which was at night.

All of the patrol work wasn't just riding, either. Accident investigations required 3,431 hours; 1,396 hours were spent on safety work; and Patrolmen spent 2,994 hours on court duty.

Other arrest activities included: Driver License violations, 1,525; Drunk Driving, 596; Improper Passing, 767; and Driving on Wrong Side of Roadway, not in passing, 417.

Second greatest number of warnings, next to speeding, were made for defective lights. There were 6,008 in this category. Other warnings included: Improper Passing, 1,596; Wrong Side of Roadway, not in passing, 1,096; and Stop Sign violations, 1,726.

**1955 Wheat Allotment and Marketing Quotas**

Notices of 1955 farm wheat acreage allotments for "old grower" farms were mailed to owners and operators on July 9, 1954. Notices of allotments for "new growers" will be mailed within a few days.

In accordance with the announcement by the Secretary of Agriculture, a referendum will be held on Friday, July 23, 1954, at which eligible voters may cast their ballot on whether or not they favor marketing quotas on the 1955 crop of wheat. Two-thirds or more of the wheat growers voting in the referendum on July 23 must vote in favor of quotas before they become effective.

Persons eligible to vote in this referendum are those producers who will share in the wheat produced on a farm on which the 1955 wheat acreage for harvest as grain is more than 15 acres.

Eligible wheat growers in Callahan County may cast their ballots at the following places on July 23:

- Clyde ..... Community Center
- Baird ..... ASC Office, Courthouse
- Eula ..... Schoolhouse
- Denton ..... Methodist Church
- Oplin ..... Schoolhouse
- Putnam ..... Shackleford's Store
- Cross Plains ..... City Hall

Polls will open at 9:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

**1954 Program Funds**

At the half-way mark of the program year, Callahan County had \$32,944.90 in the budget. This money is available to farmers and ranchers who desire assistance in carrying out approved soil and water conservation practices during the remainder of the year.

Requests for Federal Cost-Sharing in carrying out practices should be filed with this office at least one week before work on the practice is to be started. All requests for cost-sharing must be approved by the County Committee before approval can be issued, and they meet only once each week—usually on Friday.

Measuring Cotton and Peanut Acreage - Reporters are now measuring the acreage planted to cotton and peanuts on each farm that has allotments for 1954. If cotton or peanuts have been planted on a farm which does not have an allotment, this office should be notified so that the acreage may be measured.

As soon as the measured acreage of cotton and peanuts has been determined by this office, a notice will be sent to the farm operator.

Disposing of Excess Cotton and

**Peanut Acreage**

A charge of \$3.00 per farm plus \$1.00 for each plot over one will be made for checking disposition of excess cotton and peanut acreage. Payment of this charge is to be made before the check is made.

Farms overplanted on cotton have 20 days from the date of the over-planted notice to dispose of the excess acreage, if they elect to do so. Farms which do not dispose of excess cotton acreage will be penalized at the rate of 17½ cents per pound on the excess.

Farms which are overplanted on peanuts and elect to dispose of the excess must do so before the nuts reach maturity. Generally, peanuts dug after nuts mature will be considered picked or threshed.

**CCC Grain Loans**

Producers who plan to place wheat, oats, barley, etc. in CCC loan program can save time in getting the loan documents completed by bringing the landowner with them to this office, in all cases where the grain was produced on rented or leased land.

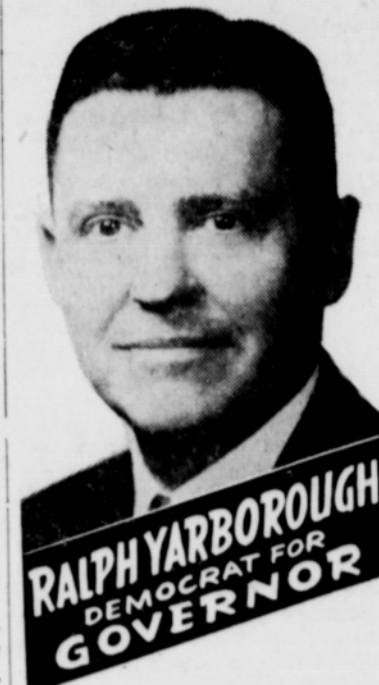

**Glenda Burlison Ivy Overcomes Two Handicaps; Polio And Auto Accident**

When she was a sophomore at Baird High School, golden-haired, light-hearted Glenda Burlison was voted the most popular girl in school by her fellow students. That was in 1949, the year she and schoolmate, Randall Ivy, started going steady.

The following September, just before she would have started her junior year, Glenda was stricken with polio and was rushed to a hospital in Abilene. The disease affected Glenda's legs from her waist down and she spent three months at the hospital. When she left she wore braces which came clear up under her arm pits.

Back home, Glenda insisted on going back to school that spring and attended classes in a wheel chair.

"The kids were wonderful," she recalls. So wonderful, in fact, that she says she almost didn't mind what had happened to her. Except for swimming and dancing she still participated in all of their parties and fun. Besides, her steady date continued to be Randall Ivy.

Life seemed wonderful again and Glenda was so determined to get well that she insisted on discarding her high braces for shorter ones. Her legs were getting stronger and she was in high spirits. Then one day fate struck another blow at this light-hearted, courageous youngster.

She and her father, Arthur Burlison, were on their way home to lunch. It was March of that year and he had picked her up at the school. Their route home crossed heavily traveled Highway 80 which runs through Baird. They were almost across when an automobile plowed into their car. Glenda wound up in the hospital again, this time with a fractured pelvic bone.

Glenda felt pretty discouraged until she began to realize that her family and friends were still there to see her through. She was back at the beginning again but she had more know-how, she could look ahead to brighter days because she had done it before.

The fracture healed and the braces became shorter again and six weeks later Glenda went back to school. That summer she spent three months at the Gonzales polio foundation hospital near San Antonio. She went into her senior year at school that fall and not only graduated with her class in May,

1952, but was selected football sweetheart. She also was able to accompany members of the senior class on their graduation trip to Galveston.

Following graduation, Glenda enrolled in business college in Abilene and took a nine months course in typing and shorthand. Then she came home to find a job.

She visited R. W. McKennon, Lone Star sub-district manager at Baird. Bob had a slight case of polio himself in 1947 while working for the company at Stamford. He spent 21 days in the Dallas hospital before being discharged with no apparent ill effects.

But Bob remembered those anxious weeks when he hadn't been sure how he would be. When Glenda brought her sunny, determined personality into the Baird office that spring of 1953 he figured something could be done about a job for her.

Glenda's mother and father had given her a car of her own. Bob arranged for her to drive up to Abilene to be interviewed by Lone Star District Manager W. M. Braymer.

It wasn't any time after that until Glenda's attractive smile and golden personality became an important part of the Baird sub-district office.

Something else pretty wonderful happened to Glenda about this time.

Randall Ivy was still her No. 1 beau. After they graduated he got a job in one of the retail stores and began to plan for their marriage. When Glenda had finished her business course and proved to herself that she could be self-supporting, she consented to set the date.

They were married June 12, 1953, just 12 days after she started working for Lone Star. They have their own small apartment and Glenda who loves to cook, does all of her own housework.

Happy? Those who would ask need only to look into the bright, eager young face which greets Lone Star customers in Baird to know the answer and to realize why her classmates voted Glenda Burlison Ivy the most popular girl and football sweetheart.

**Secure Certificates Before September**

Attention parents! Now would be a fine time to request copies of birth records for children entering school for the first time in September.

To delay is to risk being caught in the August rush. That's the word from W. D. Carroll, state registrar, who remembers with vivid clarity last year's swamped condition in the Bureau of Vital Statistics at the State Department of Health.

Many schools require certified copies of birth certificates as proof that a child is six years old before permitting the child to be enrolled, Carroll advised. But he strongly urged parents to make a personal check with school officials in their areas to determine for sure that birth records are required in those sections.

If they are, by all means make requests for copies of those records early.

"Working with limited personnel, the Bureau of Vital Statistics cannot possibly render the type service expected by those who wait until the last moment to make requests," Carroll said.

How many children will be enrolling in school for the first time this fall? Carroll can't say precisely.

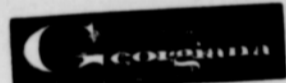

### \$8,641 Monthly Total Of Social Security

Mothers and children in Callahan County were getting 19% of the \$8,641 monthly total in social security insurance benefits being paid in the county at the end of 1953, Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene social security office, announced today. Total payments to children in this county were \$1,171 for the month of December. In the nation as a whole, over one million children were getting a total of about \$32½ million in monthly

payments at the end of 1953. Nationwide, over a quarter of a million widowed mothers were paid a total of over \$9½ million in December.

The largest group of beneficiaries under the social security insurance program, however, continues to be retired workers, Fisher said. In December 135 such beneficiaries in Callahan County were paid a total of \$5,778. This was an increase of \$1,746 over December, 1952. Nation-wide, the increase in retired-worker beneficiaries was 578,416, and the monthly payments to them increased from \$130,217,439 to \$164,659,061 in the same period.

Fisher said that many of us are inclined to think of old-age and survivors insurance under the social security system as a program for retired workers and their dependents exclusively. As the figure relating to mothers and children indicate, however, survivors benefits are an important part of the program, too.

Other beneficiaries on the

rolls in Callahan County are wives and aged dependent husbands of retired insured workers, aged widows and dependent widowers of deceased workers, and dependent parents who are receiving survivors benefits. The total of all beneficiaries in Callahan County receiving monthly benefit payments at the end of 1953 was \$230, Fisher said. The total amount being paid in the county as of December, 1953, was 35% more than a year before, and 82% more than two years before. For the sixteen-county area served by the Abilene Social Security office, the increase was 40% over a year before and 90% over two years before. Payments of \$249,107 were sent out in December 1953 to 7,055 persons in the sixteen counties. This represents an annual total of about three million dollars in the sixteen-county area.

### WTU Employees Win Court Decision

The United States Court of Appeals in New Orleans Friday, sustained the West Texas Utilities and its employees in their contention that the National Labor Relations Board had unfairly conducted a union election and had illegally prevented the Company from presenting evidence on behalf of its employees.

The NLRB's petition for enforcement of its order directing the WTU Co. to bargain with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers was denied by the Court which held the election to be illegal for the following reasons: 45 employee ballots which could have affected the outcome of the election were arbitrarily cast out by the Labor Board for reasons of its own, because Labor Board representatives questioned employees prior to voting, allowed union representatives to question voters publicly at polling places and for various other acts of misconduct and illegal procedure on the part of Labor Board representatives conducting the election.

The Court ruled that the NLRB had prevented the Company from presenting facts of evidence in behalf of its employees according to law. The election in question was conducted in December, 1951 by the Ft. Worth Regional Labor Board at the request of the union (IBEW) for the purpose of determining union representation of the 213 employees in WTU's Production Department (Power Plants).

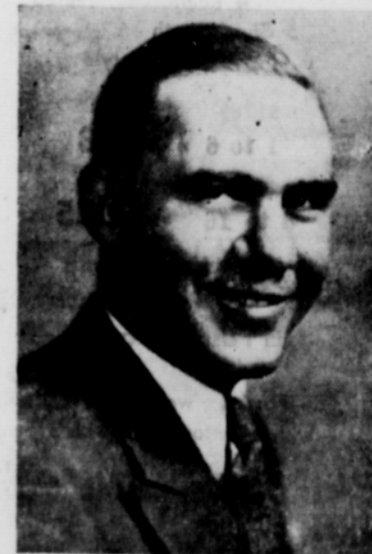

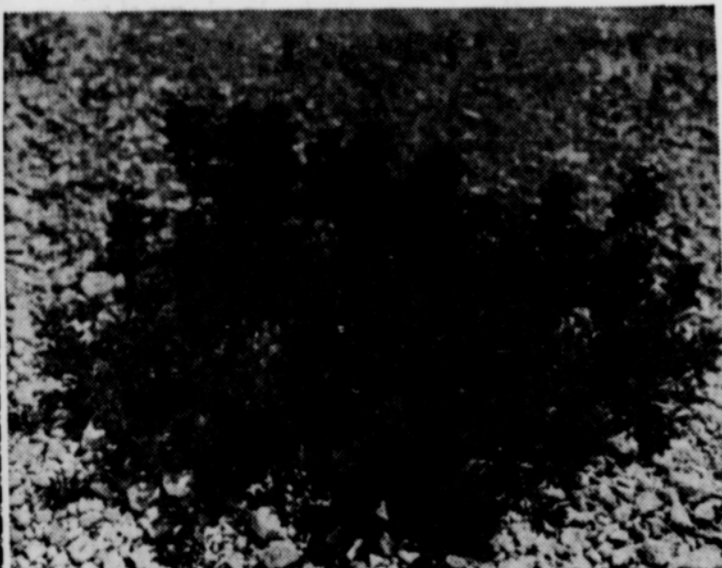

#### TEXAS BLUEBONNET

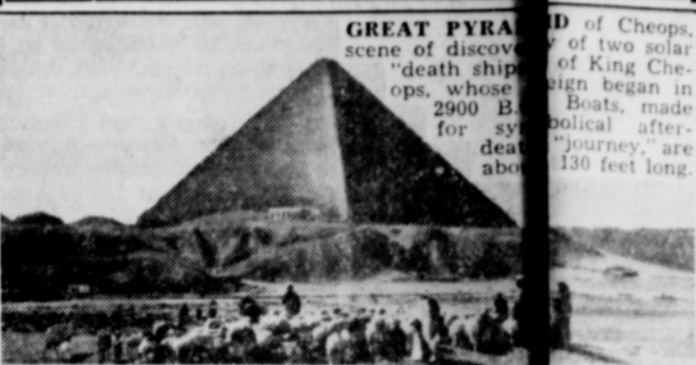

### Phosphate Insecticide Extremely Dangerous

Walk into practically any home gardening supply store in the state and ask for an organic phosphate insecticide. Chances are the clerk will sell you a bottle or package without fuss or bother.

What's wrong with that? Just that organic phosphates happen to be among the most deadly of chemical compounds, for humans as well as insects.

Last year a Texas rancher accidentally killed 48 cows by spraying them with the potent insecticide. He wanted to kill their insect parasites, and didn't realize the chemical was highly toxic for all warm-blooded animals.

A six-year old Oregon boy found a bottle of TEPP, one of the organic phosphate insecticides, in a field near his home. Workmen presumably had left it after spraying an orchard. The curious lad spilled a cupful on his pants and was dead in less than 24 hours.

Conscious of the same thing happening in Texas, State Health Officer, Henry A. Holle, would like to make it hard for part-time home gardeners to buy the compounds.

"Used as chemists intended, organic phosphates are a great help in fighting agricultural pests," says the health official. "Used indiscriminately without protective clothing, they're lethal."

Organic phosphates were developed in Germany after the last war. They are the chemists answer to demands from agricultural men for a real bug kil-

ler to combat hordes of insects which do billions of dollars of damage to crops annually.

In the hands of professionals, trained in precautions to be taken in using them, chances of accidents are slight. But in recent years, bottles and packages have appeared on retail shelves for home gardening use. Since then, incidents of human poisoning have increased.

The three most important types are tetraethylpyrophosphate (TEPP), hexaethylethylphosphate (HEPT), and parathion. All are sold under various trade names.

Most manufacturers spell out in bold black or red letters the fact that the contents are highly hazardous for humans, and recommend wearing respirators, rubber gloves, coveralls, and a rubber cap or hat when using the sprays. But warning labels don't always help.

Dr. Holle thinks legislation regulating sale of organic phosphates for home use would help. But without legislation, he says, it's up to users to read warning labels and believe what they read.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Lemon Chiffon Pie**

1 cup Pet Evaporated Milk  
1 1/4 cups fine graham cracker crumbs  
1/2 cup melted butter  
1/4 cup water

1 package lemon gelatin  
2 slightly beaten eggs  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1/4 teaspoon salt

Put milk into ice cube tray of refrigerator. Chill until ice crystals begin to form around the edges. Mix, crumbs and butter and press firmly in bottom and on sides of a 9-inch pie pan. Chill until needed. Heat water to boiling. Remove from heat and add gelatin. Stir until gelatin dissolves. Mix in a bowl the beaten eggs, sugar, lemon rind, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and the salt. Stir in gelatin mixture gradually. Chill until mixture just begins to thicken. Put ice cold milk into a cold bowl. Whip with a cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Add 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Whip until stiff. Fold into crumb mixture. Put into crumb crust. Chill until firm. Keep chilled until ready to serve.
