Canadian is fortunate enough to be located at the intersection of two major US highways . . . US 60 and US 83 . . . and so we get a substantial share of the tourist traffic through

And not all of it just goes through . . . a lot of tourists stop to look around, to buy gasoline, to buy food, to stretch their legs, and even to do a little shopping. It's just possible that, from the standpoint of Canadian business-owners, tourists are one of our major crops. Towns which are not on major highways, at any rate, are acutely aware of their absence.

Texas Governor John Connally says that a community which can stop just twelve carloads of tourists daily, year around, has the equivalent of a \$100,000 industrial payroll. And the Governor has the fact to back up his claims. That's putting tourist development . . . something which the State has undertaken for the first time on a major scale . . . into terms everyone can understand. It takes a fairly good-sized industry to produce a \$100,000-a-year payroll.

The rural accident summary These wrecks accounted for for Parmer County from Janaccording to Sergeant W. E. sons injured and an estimated a total of 45 crashes resulting in six persons killed, 17 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$44,653.

> The Sergeant expressed serious concern over the increase in fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents and deaths throughout the state.

"For the first five months of 1964, 1025 persons have died in traffic, compared to 871 for the same period of 1963," the Sergeant stated. "This 18 percent increase is very alarming and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture. There is an increase in all types of accidents throughout the state and it is something that merits our greatest concern," he said.

"The driving public must assist in the reduction of this trend if we are to turn it downward. Otherwise our death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 2,729 deaths in Texas traffic during 1963. If you are driving, your life literally is in your own hands, so won't you help yourself and others by resolving not to become one of our statistics?" the Sergeant

# **Board Acts On Teachers**; Hears Building Report

The Friona Independent School Board of Trustees received resignations from three teachers and hired a new one during its regular meeting last Friday night. In addition, paper work was presented toward the school building program.

Teachers submitting their resignations were Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Paris and C. W. Dukes. Paris plans to attend International Business Machines (IBM) school at Oklahoma City, where his wife will teach.

Dukes has accepted a scholarship to do work toward a Master of Education degree at Louisiana State University. He taught mathematics at Friona High School in addition to coaching boys basketball.

Paris also taught math at FHS, and Mrs. Paris taught first grade.

Employed was Mrs. D. H. Stephenson, a first grade teacher with nine years experience. Mrs. Stephenson taught the past year in Vernon, Her husband is a cattle buyer at Friona Feed Yards.

Hired since the board meeting was Miss Beth Asberry of Greenville as Home Economics teacher to replace Mrs. Dave Eddington. Miss Asberry is a May graduate of East Texas State, and this will be her first teaching assignment.

Current teaching needs include a fourth grade teacher, a funior high coach, an elementary music or art teacher, a math teacher in high school and two coaches.

In other buisiness at the board meeting, Herbert Brasher, the school's architect, presented his final drawings on the school's building program. They were approved by the board.

The "working drawings" are now being prepared, to be presented to contractors for bids. It is estimated that contracts will be let sometime after August 1. This will enable the new high school building to be completed by September of 1965, according to Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr.

"We had originally had a 'target date' of July 1 for completing everything prior to bids, but this still will leave us enough





The first day of school has been set for Monday, August 31. A holiday will be recognized on Labor Day, Monday, September 7. The students also will be dismissed on Friday of that week for Maize Days. Other school holidays include November 26-27, Thanks-

The school calendar for the giving; December 23- January 3, Christmas holidays; March 12, district teachers' meeting; and April 16 and 19, Easter holidays.

As the schedule is set up, 175 teaching days have been allotted, which is the minimum required by the Texas Education Agency. Tenative graduation dates have been proposed as Saturday, May 22 for grade school and Monday, May 24, for high school.
