Of course we felt that the Squaws could beat these teams (and as it turned out, they did), regardless of classification or school enrollment, we felt that it would be fairer to all schools concerned if the upper division divided again.

We didn't have long to wait to see our "hopes" granted. This year, the Interscholastic League set up a class AAA division for the first time, and this week there will be four champions named in girls basketball, all the way from AAA through class B.

This has doubled the number of champions from the year 1951, when the interscholastic League reorganized the girls' sport on a state level with just two divisions. There were three divisions beginning in 1955.

We'd like to see the "big school' division continue to grow. There were 40 teams in this division this year.

ORDINANCE CHANGED

Amendment Approved On Development Issue

The Friona City Council approved an amendment to City Ordinance 357 (Subdivision Regulations), favoring developers in future city developments at its regular meeting Monday

In other business, the council passed a resolution allowing city residents an extra day for payment of water bills when the 10th of the month falls on the weekend or on a holiday.

The council voted to buy an addressing machine to machine-address the city's 987 utility bills each month, and discussed participation with Friona Independent School District's in paving streets around the new high school complex. The council heard a complaint from a local citizen who paid their utility bill on January 11 many did, and was assessed a petition by property owners on penalty.

The Saturday wording was used because the city office isn't open on Saturday afternoon, and this would give residents a day's extension should the tenth fall on a Saturday, making bills due the next "business day," also protecting against a holiday which might fall on Monday.

Team "Turns Tiger" In Rockdale Game

The team nickname of Friona's opponent in the state semi-finals Friday, Rockdale, is "Tigers." Before the game was over, Rockdale probably decided that there was a "tiger" in Friona's "tank" as well.

Teto Jennings, playing only three days after a three-day hospital stay, looked as healthy as she ever has in three years of varsity play at Friona.

All "Tiger Teto" did was toss in 35 points -- equalling the highest she had scored in any single game this season, and coming very timely, in the tournament that counts the most. The output also was just three points short of the most. Teto has ever scored in one game.

Final score was Friona 60, Rockdale 44, as the Squaws roared into the state finals for the second straight year and third time in six years.

The Squaws trailed just once, at 2-0 early in the game. Linda Davis quickly tied the score at 2-all for Friona, and Miss Jennings gave Friona a lead it was never to lose by hitting her first of 13 consecutive free throws.

A jump shot by Davis gave Friona a 6-2 lead, but Rockdale pulled to within a point on free throws, 6-5 halfway through the quarter.

Janet Rushing came in to score five points in the space of two minutes, and an equal number of points by Teto gave the Squaws a quick 16-8 lead. Rockdale rallied for four points to trail at the quarter's end,

16-12.

Reserve Cindy Ingram scored a basket on a fast break early in the second quarter, and Miss Rushing's two free throws gave Friona its first 10-point lead at 22-12.

The score rocked along at about the same margin, as Teto matched baskets with Rockdale's high scoring Sue Bennett, but a last-second goal by Miss Jennings gave Friona its longest first half lead (13 points). Teto zoomed home a basket after Janet Rushing missed a free throw, one of only four such shots missed by the entire team during the game, just ahead of the halftime buzzer for a 34-21 score.

Miss Jennings, who cracked the 2,000-point mark with a vengeance, lacking only seven points going into the game, scored the team's first five points of the third quarter to give Friona a 15-point edge at 39-24.

After Linda Davis pumped in two baskets, Teto finished the third quarter with her eleventh and twelfth consecutive free throws, giving Friona a 49-30 lead after three quarters.

Teto's 13th free shot gave Friona a 20-point lead at 50-30 as the final quarter started, and at this point she finally missed a shot from the charity line. However, the Squaw high-scorer made up for it with a field goal, and Davis' jump shot with six minutes left gave Friona its longest lead at 54-30.

her two final free throws for a
56-32 score, and then after the
team experienced its only scoring "drougth" of the game and

Unbeaten Edna Outlasts Friona

An undefeated team is hard to beat in the state finals. That was true last year when the Squaws won the title, and they were reminded of the fact in a very bitter manner Saturday night at Austin, when Edna outlasted the defending champs, 60-57.

The Squaws, who staged an unbelievable rally earlier in the game to come from 13 points behind and take the lead, couldn't duplicate the feat in the closing seconds of the game, and had to settle for second place.

The "so near and yet so far" finish reminded Friona fans of the 1960 finals, when Buna edged the Tribe, 66-63. In all, it's the fourth time the team has finished in the runner-up spot in a state meet.

Edna, finishing with a spotless 29-0 record, was not to be denied after seeing their large lead vanish in the closing seconds of the first half to a spirited Friona rally.

The Cowgirls, making their first trip to the Austin meet, rode the hot free throw shooting of Jean Brown to the victory. The southeast Texas team outscored Friona, 28-15 at the free throw line, although Friona scored the most from the field, 42-32.

For a time it appeared that the Squaws would pull away in the third quarter, taking three four point leads at 31-27, 37-33 and 39-35. However, Edna caught up, and Cindy Ingram had to score three quick points to give Friona a 42-41 lead at the three-quarter mark.

Janet Rushing gave Friona a 44-41 lead early in the final quarter, but then left the game on fouls a moment later. Edna tied it at 44-all, and after the lead changed hands a couple of time the Cowgirls took a 48-47 lead with six minutes left. As it turned out, they were to keep the lead the rest of the way.

Edna took a commanding five-point lead, utilizing a fast break for lay-ups, with just 2:07 to play. However, a hook shot and jumper by Teto Jennings cut the margin to one, 58-57, with 40 seconds left.

Prior to the time that the UIL took the girls' sport under its wing, high school girls teams played to a state championship under the auspices of the High School Girls Basketball League of Texas, under the direction of L. C. McKamie, Because of his long-time association with the sport, his organization with the peague of the friona Squaws is divided into two "eras," that of the Mc-Kamie League, Friona sent teams to the state tourney six times under the former system, and this year marked the Squaws' fourth appearance in the UIL state championships. In spite of their consistent success and numerous appearance in state meets, the top prize — the state champion-

After losing its opening round game to Anton, the 1941 Squaw team won two consolation tournament games and then bowed in the consolation finals.

Members of the team included Wynell Thompson, who was the leading scorer, Wynona Hill, Jaquelyn Wilkinson, Edna Brown, Christene McKenzie, Lois Jean McFarland, Betty Mase Missey, Frances Buchanan, Frances Massey, Edna Hall, Mary Lee Todd, Betty Ann Taylor and June Maurer. War Interrupts

War affects everything, and basketball at FHS was no exception, With the outbreak of World War II, Coach Bates went into the service, and the state tournament was suspended for 1943. However, beginning in 1944, Friona started a string of five consecutive trips to state meets held at Hillsboro.

Maurice Norman, who had taken over as coach when Bates left for the service, guided the 1944 Squaws to the state tournament with a 32-4 record. The Squaws battled all the way to the finals of the 16-team meet, but fell to Aquilla, a school located in the same county as the state meet, by three points, 23-20.

In 1945, Norman again had the Squaws in the state tournament, This time Friona met the Aquilla team in the semi-finals, and lost, 46-26. The Squaws bounced back to take the third place trophy.

Bates returned as coach of the team at the start of the 1945-46 season. The team had a 27-2 record as it headed south for the state meet. For the third straight year, it was old nemests Aquilla which kept Friona from winning the state title, with a 29-26 decision in the state finals.

which was in the midst of one of its "peak" periods of girls basketball, compiling a three-year mark of 91 wins against 14 losses, the team had the bad luck of running up against one of the most outstanding teams of all time (Aquilla) in Texas' girls basketball history.

During this same three-year period, the tiny Central Texas school swept to three straight state championships, compiling a fantastic 92-1 record in the process, including two unbeaten seasons.

Team Rebounds

The Squaws' spirits were not broken, and they began the following season a two-year stretch which is unparalleled to the present day at Friona, despite failing to win the coveted state title. Friona's two-year won-loss record starting with the 1946-47 season was the best either team had

to show for its fabulous record, as two of the three losses came at the state tournament, Win 43 Straight

In Record Book

The 1947 Squaws ran up the most victories for a single season in the school's history, and also set a precedent by winning 43 consecutive games. Coach Bates' aggregation swept through all its regular season games unbeaten, taking three tournament crowns.

The team's closest call during the regular season was a 15-14 win over Stanton at a tournament at Ropesville. This same team turned out to be the trouble-maker for Friona at the state tournament. Stanton's revengeful 32-24 win was a bitter pill for Friona, which had advanced to the state meet with three lop-sided wins at the district tournament (similar to today's regional meet).

The loss came in the tourney The latter game put Frions in the state record book as the team scoring the highest number of points in a losing cause, and going into this year's meet, the game still held the record for most total points (129) in a girls' state tournament game.

Duggins' teams rolled up 50 wins against nine defeats the next two years, but couldn't win district. They lost out to Tulia, state runnerup, in 1962.

Third In '63

The loss came in the tourney semi-finals, and the Squaws bounced back to take third place in the state.

Leslie Hinds became coach the next year, and with a good returning necleus from the '47 team, took a Squaw team to Hillsboro with a 33-1 mark. This time the team lost in the tournament quarter-finals and failed to place.

In fairness to the Squaws of yester-year, it might be pointed on a "no-classification" basis. There was no such thing as divisions such as "B", "A" and "AA." When the team won the district tournament in this area, it had eliminated every other team in West Texas, regardless of class. There was just one state champion in those days -- this year there will be four state championship divisions. The 1963 season saw the Squaws back on the playoff trail. The team outlasted Tulia, 82-80 in a sudden-death overtime battle at regional; after spotting Post 12 points in their bi-district game and coming from behind for the win.

However, Teto Jennings received a sprained ankle in the Tulia win, and it hampered her play in the state tourney opener, which Friona lost, 57-46, to Little Cypress. The team took third place, blasting Cotulia, 64-38. Then last season, the Squaws decided they had played "second fiddle" long enough.
Taking a perfect 31-0 record to the state meet, the team realized the entire season's success lay in their final two

Title At Last

Duggins Rebuilds

After several "mediocre" seasons, Baker Duggins became coach of the Squaws, and helped build the sport back to its former level at FHS.

Duggins' teams won district crowns in 1957, 1958 and 1959, but it wasn't until 1960 that the Squaws made it to the state meet once again -- their first trip since the Ullre-organized

Mineral Wells, a class AAA school, was the first opponent, and they were handled with comparative ease, 63-49. Then on March 14, 1964, the Squaws outhustled another AAA-sized school, Clear Creek, in a pressure-packed contest that saw the team claim the long-awaited trophy. Final score, by the way, was 50-45.
