

United States Representative Ed Foreman, the outspoken Republican from Odessa, told members of the West Texas Press Association last Saturday in Midland that President Johnson's announcement on national television that North Viet Nam was to be bombed was "the most grave act of irresponsibility that I ever heard of."

Foreman states that the announcement was broadcast about an hour and a half before the actual bombing was carried out.

"This was better warning to the communists than the most intricately-devised radar system could ever have brought," Foreman said.

The Saturday papers carried a story stating that Foreman was booed by his fellow congressmen on the House of Representatives floor for his criticism of the President's handling of the announcement.

"However, representatives of the Department of Defense finally admitted that I was correct in my charge," Foreman pointed out.

The dynamic young representative said that if a soldier had committed such an "act of irresponsibility," he would have been held for treason.

The Odessa lawmaker argued that the president should have waited until after the attack to announce it to the American people.

Either that, or the television networks should have known or should have been told to delay the broadcast.

Foreman stated that it was "about time" that the U. S. was standing up and defending its interests. He cited areas such as Cuba and Panama where he declared that American prestige has suffered.

"Appeasement is nothing more than surrender on an installment basis," Foreman stated.

Another speaker at the WT-PA convention was cowboy artist Ace Reid, who is famous for his "Cow Pokes" cartoons which grace farm pages in some 250 newspapers in the Southwest, and have been reproduced on calendars and by other means.

Reid's western style has always been admired by my wife Carol, and she particularly enjoyed hearing and seeing one of her "contemporaries." She was especially thrilled when Reid drew a cartoon for her and autographed it.

The famous western cartoonist reached his success plateau the hard way, as it seems many great artists have done. Reid says he got out of the service and began farming and ranching. A drought was taking the toll of his father's farm.

"I had done a little cartoon work previously, and had sold a few to newspapers. So I came up against the choice of staying in the farming-ranching business and starving to death or drawing cartoons and starving. I chose the one I could do while in the shade," Reid quipped.

Reid told of his personal experience in the newspaper business. "I decided all you people were getting rich, so I wanted to try it," he told the editors and publishers at the convention. So he bought the newspaper at Comfort, Texas, and operated it two years.

"After two years I decided I was darned-sight better cartoonist than a newspaperman," Reid confessed.

Reid referred to the recent moon shot by the U. S. which sent back outstanding pictures to the earth. "The rocket was sending back pictures all the way from the moon, and they were received on earth at practically the same time. At Comfort, we tried to get pictures back from the engravers in San Antonio, 40 miles away, and it took two weeks!" Reid exclaimed.

Star Wins Again In Press Contests

The Friona Star was a winner in the West Texas Press Association's annual contests. The awards were presented the past Saturday as a highlight of the annual convention in Midland.

Attending the convention were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Ellis. He accepted the awards on behalf of the newspaper.

The Star was awarded the first-place plaque in the "Best Editorials" division. It received the second-place award in the "General Excellence" contest.

In the latter contest, the Star won first place last year in the division for newspapers published in towns of 3,000 population or less, so was obliged to enter the higher division this year (for towns over 3,000, and came close to winning that division).

The Star won over 11 other newspapers of all sizes in the editorial contest. Entered were editorials published during the calendar year of 1963. One of

the editorials urged Friona residents to back the drive to raise money for the addition to Parmer County Community Hospital. Another urged building of apartments for Friona. Both editorials were illustrated with local cartoons drawn by Mrs. Ellis.

Judges commented that the topics were of timely local interest, and were made more vivid by the use of locally-drawn cartoons.

The first-place award was the fourth won by the Star in state and regional contests during the past year, and marked the fourth consecutive contest entered by the Star in which it won a first-place award.

Previous awards have been won for "Best Special Edition," "outstanding woman's page feature," "Best News Pictures" and general excellence.

The award won the past week was the first one in the Editorial division ever won by the Star, as far as can be determined.

Council Gives Initial Approval To '65 Budget

The Friona City Council gave preliminary approval Monday to a \$278,869 annual budget for the fiscal year beginning next October 1. The proposed budget compares to that of \$247,484 adopted for the present fiscal year.

"We are recommending that the tax rate remain the same—\$1.30 per \$100 evaluation," states City Manager A. L. (Jake) Outland.

Some of the major items which are included on the budget as preliminarily approved are a new pumper truck for the fire department, which will cost an estimated \$15,000; renovations and repairs to water wells, \$5,000; water and sewer meters and settings, \$4,000 and a pickup truck for the sewer department, \$2,000.

In other business, the council awarded a contract to Western Industrial Supply Company of Amarillo for fifty water meters. Two companies turned in identical bids of \$1,489.

It was voted to permanently close the alleyway in block four of the original town, where Cecil Porter is building a repair shop.

A contract was awarded to Sain Fence Company of Clovis to enclose well number six

with a fence and a 12-foot double-split gate, cost to be \$1,90 per foot, not to exceed \$740.

Recognizing a request citizens on the subject, the council voted to install two guardian-type mercury vapor lights in the city park, to aid after-dark picnickers.

The council discussed laying approximately two blocks of six-inch water main and three blocks of six-inch sewer pipe prior to paving the street adjacent to (the west side) the new school property.

Mayor J. C. Claborn, City Manager Outland and one or two councilmen are to attend a meeting of the Texas Municipal League today in Amarillo.

Mrs. Donnie Renner was employed as administrative assistant on August 1. Mrs. Hayward Vaughn had resigned on July 6. Virginia Parson worked 16 days in the interim.

In his monthly summary of activities, Outland reported that water pumpage for July was estimated at 31,912,700 gallons, or 1,029,441 gallons per day, highest monthly usage to date.

Three new services were installed and two old services reactivated to bring the total

of active services to 959 as of July 31.

Well number 5 at the west plant ceased to pump water on July 7. The well was pulled

and the pump and tubing extended 40 feet deeper. Other problems were encountered, and the well is not back to normal. (Continued on Page 2)

50 TO 60 EXPECTED

Football Workouts Set To Begin On Monday

The Friona High School Chiefs, the surprise football team on the High Plains last year with an 8-2 season record, will report for their first workout of the season Monday at 8 a. m.

Coach Don Light, who brought the team from the depths of a 27-game losing streak into the thick of the district championship battle in his very first year at FHS, says he expects between 50 and 60 candidates for the team at Monday's first meeting. Last year there were 49 candidates for the first week of practice. Last year there were 28 candidates for the first week of practice.

Boys who will be candidates for the team will need to have their physical examination by Monday. Doctors at Parmer County Community Hospital have forms available, and have requested that the players report before noon on Monday.

Freshman players will not report until Friday, August 28, which is the day they enroll for school. Coach Light says he expects about 30 freshmen on that day. They should check out their equipment between 10 a. m. and 12 noon August 28, he says.

Greeting the football candidates on Monday will be two new coaches. New to the coaching staff this fall will be Marvin Williams, who will also serve as girls basketball coach and James Anglin, who will be boys basketball coach during that season.

Also on hand will be a new junior high coach, Truitt Read, as well as Tom Jarboe and John Morrow, other junior high coaches.

Anglin, who replaced Coach C. W. Dukes, will handle the offensive ends and be in charge of the B-Team. Williams will be in charge of the freshman team.

"We feel we will be able to devote more time to more boys, especially to the freshman team this year," states Coach Light.

Light plans to play both a varsity and a "B-Team" schedule this fall, and has worked

up a nine-game B-team and freshman schedule. Last season the B-Team was organized for the first time, and due to the lateness of the year, only five games were played.

Among the returnees on Monday are expected to be some 15 lettermen and nine players who started at one time or another last season.

The returning starters include backs Doug Dodd and Milton Hargus. Linemen who started and are back this year are end Larry Buckley, tackle Dale Milner, and guard Bobby Sims.

Players who started some games last year and will be back are tackle Ray Braxton and guard George Rushing. Gene Weatherly, giant tackle who was a starter on defense a year ago, also returns, as does halfback Danny Murphree, who saw most of his action last year as defense.

Dodd, who led the team in total yardage gained as a sopho-

more and placed high last year with a 5.2 yard-per-carry average will probably move to full-back this year to replace Everett Gee. Hargus and Murphree will be top candidates for the halfback positions, although junior Larry Johnson may threaten for a starting assignment.

Probably the biggest job to be filled on the team is at quarterback. Several players will be out for the position, including senior Jim Snead, juniors Lonnie Ellis, Eldon Long and Travis Graves and sophomore Ted Renner.

"We have several who are good ball-handlers, but we need a good passer as well," Coach Light says.

Other players who definitely fit into the team's plans will include Jerry Cass, Ronnie Brookfield and Neel Lyles. Outside of quarterback, the positions which will be "wide open" including those of lineback-

er and defensive halfback.

The Chiefs' schedule is believed to be much harder this year than last, due to dropping two class B teams and adding two new ones, including state class AA quarterfinalist, Dalhart.

Friona opens away from home against arch-rival Farwell, then comes home to face a Plains team which led Friona most of the way last year before dropping a 15-13 decision. Next on the schedule is Dalhart, giving the Chiefs three hang-up games on the top of the schedule.

Following an open date, Friona goes to Sudan on October 2, then closes out its non-conference schedule against Hale Center here the following week.

Dimmitt comes to town to open the District 3-AA schedule on October 16. Lockney, one of the new district foes, will be met on the latter's (Continued on Page 2)

Building Permits Hit \$106,500 For July

Eight building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of July, for construction valued at an estimated \$106,500.

This marked the third month of 1964 for construction to pass the \$100,000 mark. Largest single month so far has been April, which stood at \$155,350 worth of construction.

Another top month was January, which totalled \$123,000. Other totals have been February -- \$33,500; March, \$79,950; and May \$98,000.

July's construction figures brought the total for the year to \$682,734, as the figure continues to move forward at a record pace. With five calendar months remaining in the year, the total for 1964 is only \$190,000 less than last year's record total of \$873,475.

Included in the total for July were two new residences estimated at a total of \$46,500. Also, three commercial buildings valued at \$60,000.

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

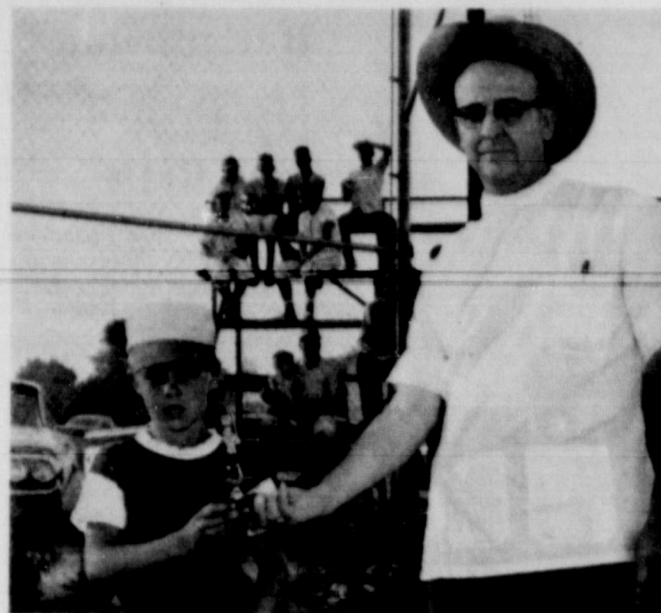

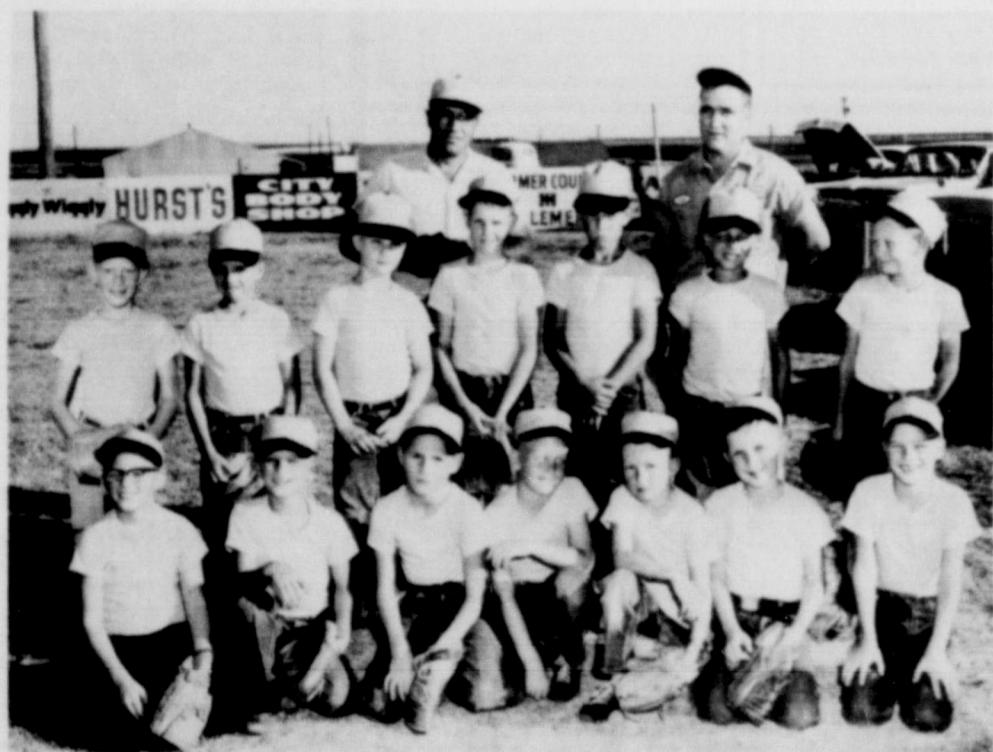

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

'(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district.'

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

'FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts.'

'AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts.'

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

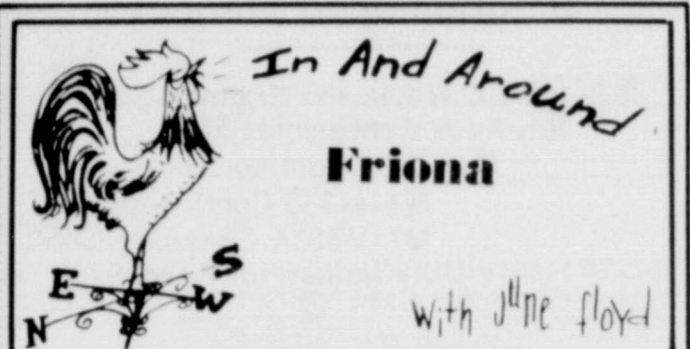

Hundreds To Attend Cooperative Meeting

Twelve hundred or more farmers and their families are expected to attend the big August 19 joint annual meeting of the three regional cooperatives

with headquarters in Lubbock. Included will be members of Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, Farmers Cooperative Compress and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association.

The meeting will be held in the air conditioned Municipal Auditorium on the Texas Tech campus. It will be called to order at 10 a.m. by Howard Alford, prominent Lubbock County farmer and president of the Compress and Marketing Association.

Headlining the fast moving program will be Horace Godfrey, Administrator of all price support and acreage allotment programs of the Department of Agriculture and Executive Vice President of Commodity Credit Corporation.

Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith will welcome the group to Lubbock and Wilmer Smith, president of the Mill, will respond. Ethel Mabry and Larry Karrh, Hale County 4-H Club members, will present their illustrated cooperative demonstration which was judged tops in Texas.

A barbecue lunch will be served at noon for members and guests. In the afternoon, each of the three cooperatives will hold its business session, reviewing financial statements, hearing reports of its officers and electing directors for the new year.

Some 20,000 cotton farmers grouped around more than 100 cooperative gins own and use the Mill, Compress and Marketing Association. Through their chosen directors they control these businesses, each of which has maintained a healthy growth. Plains Cooperative Oil Mill is completing its 28th year. The Farmers Cooperative Compress is 16 years old and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association has operated for 11 years.

The three regional associations are reporting earnings of more than \$3,500,000 to their stockholders and patrons as a result of the year's operation. Twenty thousand farm families will share in this increased purchasing power.

COUNTY BAN SOUGHT

Petition Circulated Against Use Of 2, 4-D

Several petitions have been circulated in Parmer County this week by farmers interested in prohibiting the use of herbicides containing 2, 4-D in the county.

Copies of the petition have been placed at several places throughout the county where farmers congregate.

They are located at Friona State Bank, Friona County Club, Friona Wheat Growers, Herring Implement, Parmer County Implement Company, Chester-Fleming Gin, Friona Country Club Gin, and Fleming and Son Gin.

Also at West Hub Gin, Black Grain Company, Black Mercantile, Clay's Corner Grocery, Lazbuddie Grocery, North Lazbuddie Gin, Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply, First National Bank of Bovina, Shirley-Anderson Grain of Bovina and Bovina Restaurant.

Also Security State Bank, Weill, the ASCS office in Farwell and Cathy's Restaurant, Farwell.

The petition reads as follows: "We, the undersigned residents and property owners of Parmer County respectfully request that the County Commissioner's Court and the State Department of Agriculture take the necessary steps to prohibit the use of herbicides contain-

ing 2, 4-D in Parmer County. "This request is made because of the thousands of dollars (worth of) damage done to cotton this year and in previous years. Very little if any weed control has been accomplished by the use of 2, 4-D.

A group of interested farmers met recently and discussed the situation. They visited some of the affected fields and decided something needed to be done.

Before the Department of Agriculture can take action, the County Commissioner's Court must ask them to.

A representative of the farmers' group stated "It's important that all who are interested in the problem sign the petition so that the commissioners will know our convictions. Husbands and wives may both sign, since the petition reads 'residents and property owners'."

A number of farmers in the Friona area have expressed the opinion that their cotton has been damaged by drifting 2, 4-D. Among these are the following:

Some fairly-large acreages are included in the above list. Some farmers average 40 to 50 acres with damage. Numerous other fields in the southwestern part of the county are said to have damage from 2, 4-D.

All products and record books must be checked in at 12:30 to 1 p. m. and judging is due to start at 1 p. m., according to Cricket B. Taylor, Parmer County HD Agent.


Only those 4-H members who took food project work in 1964 will be eligible to participate in the county bake show. Products to be entered this year are: one loaf of quick bread and eight bar cookies (without fruit).

County winners of the bake show will be eligible to participate and compete for the \$100 bond in the district bake show to be held at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo in September, says Mrs. Taylor.

On The Farm In Parmer County

WHEAT VARIETIES

As wheat planting time approaches many farmers are thinking about what variety of wheat they should plant. The following varieties are recommended for this area: Tascosa, Bison, Kaw, Aztec and Ponca. A new variety, Caddo, has been added to the recommended list this year.

The varieties on the acceptable list are: Crockett, Comanche, Concho, Improved Triumph, Warrior, Scout and Lanier. The last three varieties were developed in Nebraska and show no advantage over present varieties, but may be grown here.

Back to the new variety, Caddo. It has an excellent yield record, second only to Tascosa at most stations. The test weight has been excellent in 19 Texas trials, averaging 61.9 pounds per bushel. This was greater even than Tascosa and Crockett. Caddo is resistant to leaf rust and some races of stem rust.

Additional information on these and other varieties of small grains is available at the County Agents office.

Rotation of crops including fallow, legume crops or other non-cereal crops will aid in controlling diseases and insects. Rotation and destruction of volunteer plants plus late seeding of the crop will aid in control of fall infection of the rusts, control of wheatstreak mosaic, control of greenbugs and other aphids and in control of brown wheat, winter grain mites and the wheat curl mite which carries the wheatstreak mosaic.

SORGHUM BLASTING

Several inquiries lately have been concerning the "blasting" in some fields of sorghum. This condition is first noticed when the head emerges from the boot and areas turn dark where grain is not formed on the heads. This condition can be detected in matzle still in the boot. Apparently high temperatures when the grain sorghum is about a month old are partly responsible for this blasted condition. Research workers have been able to produce the same effect in the laboratory

Practice Begins For Boys Ranch Rodeo

The 325 boys at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch began practice this week for the biggest Labor Day event in the Texas Panhandle -- the annual Boys Ranch Rodeo that will be held Sunday, September 6th, and Monday September 7th, at 2:30 in the afternoons.

This will be the 20th year for the famed rodeo that began in 1944 with only 65 boys who were being cared for at that time. More than 7000 people are expected to be at the Ranch this year to watch a record number of contestants, and if they wish, enjoy a bar-be-que lunch before the performances. Indications are the 1964 rodeo

will be the most competitive, fastest, and thrilling the boys have ever put on. Almost 100 boys will be riding Brahma bulls, bucking broncs, and other professional rodeo animals under R. C. A. rules. The two performances do not permit all of the boys to ride who would like to, but everyone, including the Ranch's adult staff, will participate.

Boys who do not ride the bucking stock will appear in special feature acts, work the chutes, operate concessions, usher, and work at the many activities necessary for a successful rodeo production. An added feature of the rodeo
