USDA Market Facilitation Program

USDA launched the trade mitigation package aimed at assisting farmers suffering from damage due to unjustified trade retaliation by foreign nations. Producers of certain commodities can now sign up for the Market Facilitation Program (MFP).

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will administer MFP to provide payments to corn (fresh and processed), cotton, dairy, hog, sorghum, soybean (fresh and processed), wheat, shelled almond, and fresh sweet cherry producers. An announcement about further payments will be made in the coming months, if warranted.

The sign-up period for MFP runs through January 15, 2019, with information and instructions provided at www.farmers.gov/mfp. MFP provides payments to producers of eligible commodities who have been significantly impacted by actions of foreign governments resulting in the loss of traditional exports. Eligible producers should apply after harvest is complete, as payments will only be issued once production is reported.

A payment will be issued on 50 percent of the producer's total production, multiplied by the MFP rate for a specific commodity. A second payment period, if warranted, will be determined by the USDA. For a list of initial MFP payments rates, view the MFP Fact Sheet.

MFP payments are capped per person or legal entity as follows: (1) A combined \$125,000 for eligible crop commodities, (2) A combined \$125,000 for dairy production and hogs, (3) A combined \$125,000 for fresh sweet cherries and almonds. Applicants must also have an average adjusted gross income for tax years 2014, 2015, and 2016 of less than \$900,000. Applicants must also comply with the provisions of the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation regulations.

U-Haul ranks Texas No. 1 Growth State

Texas continues to be the No. 1 Growth State in America, according to U-Haul® data analyzing U.S. migration trends for 2018. Texas arrivals of one-way U-Haul trucks were up 5 percent while departures were up 6 percent compared to the state's 2017 numbers. Despite a larger year-over-year increase in departures, arrivals still accounted for 50.2 percent of all one-way U-Haul traffic in Texas to make it the top state for netting do-it-yourself movers. Growth States are calculated by the net gain of one-way U-Haul trucks entering a state versus leaving that state during a calendar year. Migration trends data is compiled from more than 2 million one-way U-Haul truck sharing transactions that occur annually.


Introducing the Mighty Writers of Friona



FRIONA FLASHBACKS

From the Friona Star Archives

January 1 2009

Larry Martin is a volunteer fireman and EMS volunteer and city of Friona Employee. About 6 a.m. Christmas morning when his fire department pager went off he didn't have to go to respond. All he had to do was walk out into his front yard. Martin's black 1990 pickup was parked behind his city pickup in front of his home on 5th St. An Amarillo man driving an F 150 pickup traveling west on 5th, first took out the mailbox at the Pope residence next door to Martin. The pick up the plowed into Martin's pickup and pushed it into the back of the city pickup. Martin's pick up was totaled. The city pickup sustained damage to the rear bumper and tailgate. Police Chief Tino Salinaz said the driver was transported to PCCH and a blood sample was taken on the suspicion that alcohol was involved. No charges have been filled as of Monday.

She sustained head and chest injuries, a broken wrist, broken hip and broken leg. According to DPS trooper Craig Hunt. Mrs. Snyder driving a Dodge pickup, was struck head-on by a pick up driven by Alfredo Chavez of Clovis, when attempted to pass another vehicle near the Frio Draw bridge. Mrs. Snyder was southwest-bound. The wreck happened about 8:15 a.m. Chavez, an employee of Excel, was treated and released from the

hospital. He was reportedly enroute to Liberal, Kansas. Hunt said no citation had been issued at the point of time.

Texas Roads Have Not Had a Fatality Free Day Since Nov. 7, 2000 What if ... We Could End the Streak!

It has been 18 years since Texas could claim a day where there were no fatalities on our roads. The fatalities add up to more than 66,000 people killed on Texas roadways over the past 18 years. According to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) the leading causes of these deadly crashes continue to be failure to stay in one lane, alcohol and speed. TxDOT is promoting the "End the Streak" campaign to help end motor vehicle fatalities in Texas.

What if we all drove like the driver we would want in front of us, beside us and in back of us. Ending this streak of needless tragedy on Texas road-

ways is a shared responsibility. What if for one day everyone took responsibility for themselves and their friends and there were no drunk drivers on our roads. And there was not one person driving somewhere to drink without a plan for a sober ride home — and no underage drunk drivers were to be found anywhere.

What if there were no dis-

tracted drivers on the road. and against the law according the trip. to the Graduated Driver License Law. What if no youth or adult was driving while using a cell phone and totally concentrating on their driving.

What if there was no driver speeding down the road and all were driving within the speed limit, including slowing down for construction and emergency vehicles, and driving more slowly and cautiously when weather conditions are bad.

What if we all took time to put on our seatbelts and make sure that all of our passengers were also buckled up. And, that all children were riding in the correct car seat for their age, weight and developmental stage. What if the car seat had been inspected by a certified child passenger safety technician to make sure it was being used correctly and installed correctly.

What if there were no drowsy

drivers on the road and every No teens were riding with driver, including commercial other teens, which is the main drivers, made sure they were source of their distractions well rested and prepared for

> What if every driver made sure their vehicle and tires were in good condition and everyone drove defensively and civilly so that every car was treated as if the lives of the people inside were important. What if all drivers were looking out for each other.

> What if all of these things could be done on the same day and Texas could once again enjoy a day where there was not one fatality on our roads? Then, we could put an end to this terrible streak of roadway deaths in Texas — and it would bear repeating!

The Commissioners reviewed the Treasurer's Report as presented by Altha Herington and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials. Budget transfers and amendments were also approved.

The Court then approved

bonds for all incoming elected officials, the Precinct #1 Commissioner, and the Parmer County District Clerk. The Court also approved CRI to conduct the outside audit for fiscal year 2018.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he was currently housing 42 inmates at the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center and that 19 of those inmates were from other counties.

The next scheduled Commissioner's Court meeting is at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, January 14th.

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 2.3 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$1.95/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 6.6 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.25/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 29.0 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 20.6 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 21.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 23.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"As the national average price of gasoline continues to test multi-year lows, U.S. motorists are keeping over \$250 million in their pocket every single day versus 80 days ago. The plunge has seen sub-\$2 gas prices show up at over a third of all gas stations in the country while eleven states have seen average prices dip under the \$2 level. The most common price at gas stations in the U.S. is now \$1.99 per gallon while the second most common price is just \$1.89," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "With the plunge perhaps continuing for another couple weeks, many motorists have been asking how long this trend will continue into 2019- and the answer is that it's complicated but possible summer gas prices won't be anywhere near this low."



Cornyn: New Criminal Justice Reform Law Brings Texas Model Nationwide

U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) released the following statement after President Trump signed the First Step Act into law, which includes Senator Cornyn's prison reform provisions:

"I've worked for years to bring the Texas model of successful prison reform nationwide, and this law will help us close the revolving door of recidivism for Americans looking for a second chance on life. This is a great example of what we can achieve when we bring ideas that work from our home states - the laboratories of democracy - to Congress."

"The First Step Act was a whole of government effort that required input from both sides of the aisle and law enforcement groups to make this bill stronger, and I'm gratified by President Trump's support."

The First Step Act includes provisions from Senator Cornyn's prison reform legislation, which was modeled after Texas' successful reforms.

Background on Senator Cornyn's

Risk Assessment: Requires the Desessment tools that will assess the re-

Reducing Prison Spending: Focuses limited Bureau of Prison resources on those most likely to commit future crimes and shifts lower-risk inmates to less restrictive conditions, reducing prison costs and freeing up resources for law enforcement.

cidivism risk of all eligible offenders.

Expanded Recidivism-Reduction Programming: Requires the Bureau of Prisons to provide evidence-based recidivism reduction programming to all eligible offenders.

Partnerships with Faith-Based and Community-Based Organizations: Promotes efficient and effective recidivism reduction programming by requiring, the Bureau of Prisons to partner with private organizations, including non-profits, to enhance existing efforts.

Credit toward Prerelease Custody: Incentivizes low-risk and non-violent inmates to reduce their risk profile by allowing eligible inmates who successfully complete recidivism reduction programs to earn credit toward time in pre-release custody.

Improving Prisoner Reentry: Requires the federal probation office to begin planning for eligible offenders' reentry at the beginning of the inmate's sentence and requires the Justice Department to implement reentry pilot projects across the country.

Good Time Credits: Increases the amount of "good time" credits for good behavior in prison.

Protecting Vulnerable Prison Populations: Limits the use of restraints on pregnant prisoners and improves audits to reduce or eliminate prison

Correctional Officer and Prison **Guard Provisions:** Requires the warden of every federal prison facility to provide a secure storage facility for guards to secure firearms. Requires prison guards to receive de-escalation training.

The First Step Act received endorsements from the Texas Fraternal Order of Police, the Texas Municipal Police Association, the Texas Public Policy Foundation, American Conservative Union, Prison Fellowship, the Fraternal Order of Police, the National Association of Counties, the National Conference of State Legislatures, and the Council of State Governments.

- 5. If your health care professional determines that you need antibiotics, take them exactly as prescribed. Antibiotic resistance is a serious public health problem and antibiotics will not make you feel better if you have a virus, such as a cold or flu.
- 6. If consuming alcohol, do so in moderation as defined by the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans -- up to one drink per day for women and two drinks per day for men,

and only by adults of legal drinking age.

- 7. Talk with your doctor about tobacco and nicotine use and quit. Declare your home and car smoke-free to eliminate exposure to second-hand smoke.
- 8. Pain medication is personal. If you are taking prescription opioids, follow your doctor's instructions, store them safely to prevent diversion or misuse, and properly dispose of any leftover medication.
- 9. Make sure your family is up-to-date on their vaccines, including the annual influenza vaccine for everyone age six months or older.
- 10. Manage stress. A good diet and daily exercise are key ingredients to maintaining and improving your mental health, but don't hesitate to ask for help from a friend or mental health professional when you need it.

The lifestyle choices you make now will have long-lasting impacts. So, this new year, prioritize your long-term health by forming great habits.

TxDOT Crews pretreating roadways in advance of more winter weather

Safety is a partnership between TxDOT and area motorists

Amarillo - With more than 9,000 miles of roadway in the Texas Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) Amarillo District, snow and ice removal during and after a winter storm is a major operation utilizing hundreds of employees and pieces of equipment. Each of the Amarillo District's 18 maintenance sections follows a district plan for snow and ice control, focusing on utilizing all available resources to keep roadways open and assist in the movement of traffic.

In anticipation of more winter weather in the forecast beginning late tonight in the far western Texas panhandle, TxDOT maintenance crews are already hard at work pretreating roadways with brine, which helps minimize ice from adhering to the road. Whether it is a truck spreading brine, a snowplow, or other TxDOT vehicles assisting in these efforts, motorists are reminded to give crews plenty of room to operate, and slow down when approaching them.

"Safety on our roadways is a partnership between Tx-DOT and motorists, so we ask everyone to drive responsibly, drive to conditions, heed travel warnings, and practice safe driving habits during winter weather events," says Blair Johnson, director of operations for TxDOT's Amarillo District. "You've heard us say it many times - don't crowd the plow."

Response to snow and ice is


prioritized, with high-volume roadways like interstates and state highways getting attention first. In more rural areas, crews concentrate on clearing Farm-to-Market roads connecting smaller communities with major highways and allows first responders, as well as utility companies, to react to emergencies. TxDOT's Amarillo District also communicates constantly with city and county officials during weather events to ensure state roadways in their areas are being managed.

Motorists are also reminded that winter weather can change unexpectedly so delay your travel, if possible. If you must go out, check weather forecasts first and visit DriveTexas.org for the most up-to-date road conditions. Other tips to keep in mind if you must travel in winter weather conditions:

- · Slow down. Speed limits are based on normal road and weather conditions, not winter road conditions.
- · The best way to avoid skidding on ice is to slow down decelerate around turns, avoid slamming on the brakes, or simply stay a few miles an hour under the speed limit decreasing speed decreases your chances of losing control.
- · Maintain at least three times the normal following distance in snow or icy conditions.
- · Watch carefully for snow removal equipment and stay at least 200 feet behind snow plows.
- · Use extra caution on bridges, ramps, overpasses and shaded areas as they tend to freeze first.

She is survived by her chil-



Texas Size: A Boot Story

The world's largest cowboy boot sculpture first stood in a vacant lot in Washington, D.C. Artist Bob "Daddy-O" Wade constructed the boots in the nation's capital in 1979 to emulate his Lone Star Iguana statue he built the year prior in New York City.

Neither locale worked out. Wade's 35-foottall boots, recognized by Guinness World Records, moved to San Antonio's North Star Mall in 1980. The world's largest iguana statue, nicknamed "Iggy," took longer to migrate to its Texas home, the top of the Fort Worth Zoo's Reptile House.

"There are a lot of good-looking public art structures, but they're abstract," says Wade, who notes the boots and the 40-foot-long iguana "have recognizable qualities, so you relate to them."
