School Board calls for \$19M Bond Election

By a vote of 6-1, the Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District approved an motion calling for a \$19 million bond election. The Board also hired the Underwood Law Firm as bond counsel. The call for a bond election was a result of over a year's worth of consultation with the the architecture and engineering firm Parkhill, Smith, & Cooper; Vince Vialle of the firm Specialized Public Finance; and a local steering group of business owners, former teachers & administration staff. and community leaders.

The main priority during all of the meetings was student and teacher safety. Discussion topics included keeping kids off of Euclid Street & Highway 60, keeping students safe during bad weather, and safety issues regarding possible criminal activity near the schools. Another major concern was the aging electrical systems in each one of the schools.

The bond election approval occurred during the Board's regular session held on Monday, February 11th at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Meeting Room of the FISD

Street, Friona, Texas 79035. The meeting was called to order, an invocation was given, and a roll call was taken. The meeting began with an update from Parkhill, Smith, & Cooper concerning the proposed construction project. The final cost for the project was estimated to be \$21.47 million. The Board discussed various funding options for the project which included a \$19M or \$20M bond, using available Permanent School Funds, and using existing FISD funds. After further deliberation, the Board concluded that the best formula to fund the \$21.47 million construction project would be a \$19 million bond, plus the \$2 million from the Permanent School Fund, and \$.5 million from existing FISD funds.

Details of the bond issuance, the proposed construction project, and their effects on taxpayers will be available in upcoming editions of the Friona Star. *The goal is provide as much information* as possible so that all voters can make an informed decision on election day. Next up was the Consent Agenda

Administration Building, 909 E. 11th and it included the Minutes from the previous meeting and reports on all of the various school financial accounts. The various summary reports were approved and the payment of the monthly bills was approved. The Consent Agenda was approved by an unanimous vote. The Board also heard state and federal reports, Principals' reports and the Superintendent's report.

> In other business, the Board approved a change in allowable absences involving student extracurricular activities from 15 to 30, approved a contract extension for Superintendent Jimmy Burns, and approved the District Calendar for the 2019-2020 school year. The Board also approved the E-rate bid from WT Services for funding year 2019 and approved the Local School Wellness Policy assessment conducted by the Student Health Advisory Committee. The Board also met in Closed Session.


Deputy Sheriff Yurban Salinas and Sheriff Randy Geries

Mayor's Minutes by Ricky White

Greetings!!! I mentioned last month the city applying for grant money to assist in several different projects this year. Leander Davila, City Manager, has applied for grant money with Congressman Arrington's office. It is a congressionally mandated award of \$40,000. If the city receives the grant money, it will be used to upgrade the police departments dispatching console and radio system. The current system is 10 years old and has become obsolete. It is difficult to find vendors to work on the obsolete console during system failures, leaving our community vulnerable to crime and lowering officers response time. The city is anxiously waiting for a response from Congressman Arrington's office.

The Texas Community Development Block Grant water project is progressing very well. The project is expected to be completed before the March deadline. The grant money awarded was \$275,000. The city's matching payment is \$58,030.

Chief Jimenez and the police officers responded to 168 calls in January. There were 136 stops, 82 warnings, 54 citations and 6 arrests, (3-possession of marijuana, 2 possession of controlled substance and 1-no drivers license). The officers drove a total 2562 miles patrolling and protecting our city. Chief Jimenez has completed the Friona Police Department's Racial Profiling Report. Every year the police department provides statistical information for councils review. Here are a few stats from the report: Year ending 2018, there were 801 total stops (259 female and 542 male). There were 26 Black, 275 White, 3 Asian, 496 Hispanic and 1 American Indian. There were 10 searches conducted out of the 801 stops and contraband was detected in 8 searches (4-drugs, 2-alchohol and 2-others). Volunteer Fire Department responded to 7 calls in January. There was a tire fire controlled burn on Jan 4th. There were 4 firefighters and 2 trucks sent to location. On Jan 7th, a car accident, 6 firefighters and 2 trucks responded. On Jan 8th, car accident, 10 firefighters and 3 trucks responded. There was another car accident on Jan 17th, 6 firefighters and 3 trucks responded. Also, on Jan 17th, there was a grass fire, 6 firefighters and 3 trucks responded. On Jan 26th, gas leak, 2 firefighters and 1 truck responded. There was a grass fire on Jan 31st, 7 firefighters and 3 trucks responded. Emergency Medical Ser-

vice responded to 36 calls in January. There were 15 - 911 calls, 16 - transfers and 5 calls ended in a "no transport". Ambulance billing equaled \$42,773.58 and the City collected \$10,813.50.

Judge Campbell had 59 new cases in January. Total fines collected were \$4,545.65 and court cost totaled \$4,083.95. Judge Campbell will issue a warrant round-up which will begin on February 23, 2019

thru March 8, 2019. Friona Municipal Court amnesty period begins February 15, 2019 thru February 22, 2019. During the amnesty period, those who pay Class C Misdemeanor fines at the Friona Texas Municipal Court at 105 West 7th Street will not be arrested. Their warrants will be cleared after payment. There is approximately \$26,000 that needs collected.

Accounts Payable totaled \$196,957.94 for the month of January. All bills are paid and city is in good standings. The city purchased a Sewer Roding Machine for \$42,475. The new machine was needed to unstop major blockage in the sewer lines. In the past, the city had to borrow (rent) a machine from another city to assist in the event of a clogged sewer line. Renting was expensive.

Friona Public Library had a total of 895 patron visits in January, an average of 44 per day and was open for 20 days. There were 874 items circulated and 40 new items added to inventory.

County Commissioners approve Burn Ban

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, February 11th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Commissioners also reviewed the Treasurer's Report and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

The Commissioners discussed the Permanent School Fund Distribution Plan. This involves money from oil leases that is held by the Court and distributed to the four school districts in Parmer County. In the past, funds were allocated based on a "Fall attendance snapshot" that the State of Texas uses in some of its allocations. However, the Attorney General of Texas has determined that this method is not adequate. A more detailed census of school enrollment in the county must be taken before the money can be distributed.

Next, the Commissioners revisited a possible burn ban for Parmer County after it was tabled at the last meeting. Upon further discussion, the Court issued a burn ban effective immediately (February 11th) and lasting for ninety (90) days.

The Parmer County Sheriff's Office has a new officer. Yurban Salinas was sworn

in as the new Deputy Sheriff. Sheriff Randy Geries also reported that he was currently housing 43 inmates at the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center and that 18 of those inmates were from Castro County. Also, a \$4036.03 contract was awarded to Integrity Steel Works to clean and adjust all jail locks in the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center.

The next scheduled Commissioner's Court meeting is at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, February 25th.


Comptroller Glenn Hegar Distributes \$954 Million in Monthly Sales Tax Revenue to Local Governments

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$953.9 million in local

sales tax allocations for February, 4.6 percent more than in February 2018.

These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2018 sales by businesses that report tax annually.







Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have risen 0.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$1.97/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has increased 0.7 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.28/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 36.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 4.8 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 3.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 28.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"The national average price of gasoline barely nudged higher last week, driven primarily by stations hiking prices notably in the Great Lakes early last week, pushing the national average to \$2.30 per gallon mid-week before those states saw stations again cutting prices and chiseling away at the nation's average price over the weekend," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "With oil prices sinking last week to \$51 per barrel on concerns over a slowdown in trade talks with China, many states saw a respite in gas prices. However, as pipeline specifications begin to shift towards the first step towards summer gasoline requirements in the weeks ahead, the overhang in gasoline inventories will likely start to dry up and push gas prices higher." Sheet Pan Dinners

When it is my responsibility to cook dinner, which I admit is not often, I have two requirements: the kids will eat what I fix without much complaint, and the meal is easy to prepare and easy to clean up. Sheet pan dinners meet at least one of these requirements. Making food that kids will eat is another problem in itself.

Sheet pan dinners are exactly what you think. Most of the cooking is done on one

sheet pan. The best part is you line the pan with foil or parchment paper and cleanup is a breeze. A couple of the recipes require a little prep work, but cleanup will still be quick. I have not tested these recipes exactly as printed, although roasting vegetables is my favorite way to prepare them. I looked for a few different meals with easy to find ingredients that I thought everyone might enjoy.

Sheet Pan Taco Bake

Ingredients:

5 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 pound ground beef

1 teaspoon ground cumin

3 teaspoons chili powder

Kosher salt

1 tablespoon tomato paste

Nonstick cooking spray, for spraying the sheet pan

20 ounces refrigerated shredded hash browns

8 ounces Cheddar, grated (about 2 cups)

Assorted toppings, such as shredded iceberg lettuce, salsa, diced avocado, sour cream, sliced black olives, pickled jalapenos and hot sauce

Directions:

Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a medium skillet over medium heat. Add the ground beef and cook, breaking it up with a wooden spoon, until no longer pink, about 4 minutes. Add the cumin, 2 teaspoons of the chili powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt and stir to combine. Push the beef aside to make a space in the middle of the skillet and add the tomato paste. Cook, stirring, until the tomato paste darkens a shade or two, about 1 minute, then stir it into the beef. Add 1/2 cup water, bring to a rapid simmer and cook, stirring, until the water has almost completely reduced, about 2 minutes. Keep hot.

Preheat the broiler. Spray an 18-by-13-inch sheet pan with cooking spray.

Spread the hash browns on the prepared sheet pan, toss with 1 teaspoon salt and the remaining 4 tablespoons vegetable oil and 1 teaspoon chili powder and pat into an even layer. Broil until golden, 8 to 10 minutes. Toss well with a heatproof spatula, pat back into an even layer and return to the broiler until golden brown, 6 to 8 minutes more. Top with the spiced ground beef and Cheddar and broil until the cheese is melted, about 2 minutes. Add your favorite toppings, cut into pieces and serve.

Sweet & Tangy Salmon with Green Beans

Ingredients:

4 salmon fillets (6 ounces each)
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons reduced-sodium soy sauce
2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
1 tablespoon olive oil
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 pound fresh green beans, trimmed

Directions:

Preheat oven to 425°F. Place fillets in a 15x10x1-in. baking pan coated with cooking spray. In a small skillet, melt butter; stir in brown sugar, soy sauce, mustard, oil, pepper and salt. Brush half of the mixture over salmon. Place green beans in a large bowl; drizzle with remaining brown sugar mixture and toss to coat. Arrange green beans around fillets. Roast until fish just begins to flake easily with a fork and green beans are crisp-tender, 14-16 minutes.

Glazed Chicken and Broccoli

Ingredients:

4 skin-on chicken drumsticks (about 1 pound)
3/4 pound (about 3 cups) fingerling potatoes, halved lengthwise
3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 medium head broccoli, cut into small florets (about 4 cups)
2 tablespoons purchased teriyaki glaze

Directions:

1. Preheat the oven to 4500 F and line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper. Place the drumsticks on one side of the baking sheet, spacing them evenly apart. Place the potatoes on the other side of the baking sheet, leaving an empty space in the center for the broccoli. Drizzle the potatoes with 1 tablespoon of the olive oil, and sprinkle with salt and pepper, tossing to evenly coat. Bake until the potatoes begin to soften, and the drumsticks begin to cook and caramelize, 20 minutes.

2. Remove the baking sheet from the oven

and put the broccoli in the center. Drizzle the broccoli with the remaining 2 tablespoons of olive oil, and lightly sprinkle with salt and pepper, tossing with tongs to evenly coat. Brush the drumsticks with the teriyaki glaze on all sides.

3. Return the baking sheet to the oven and roast until the broccoli and potatoes are tender and charred in spots and the drumsticks are completely cooked through and read an internal temperature of 1600 F, 20 to 25 minutes more. Divide chicken and vegetables between two plates and serve.

AccuWeather Global Weather Center – February 6, 2019 – While Punxsutawney Phil may have proclaimed the end of winter on Groundhog Day, AccuWeather forecasters say it's a bit premature for much of the country.

Spring weather will take its time to arrive in the Northeast, mid-Atlantic and Great Lakes with the chance for snow as late as mid-March.

In the Midwest and much of the Plains, prolonged warmth will arrive in mid-April, save for the earlier odd spell of springlike air.

Meanwhile, the Southeast and Gulf Coast will buck the trend, with Arctic air retreating quickly and the threat for severe weather not far off. **Quick flip to spring warmth not in the cards for Northeast, mid-Atlantic and Great Lakes**

Contrary to Punxsutawney Phil's prognostication, AccuWeather meteorologists predict spring weather will take its time arriving in the Northeast, mid-Atlantic and Great Lakes this year.

The last snowfall of the season may not be until the beginning or even middle of March, threatening to impact I-95 cities like New York, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C.

"In the Northeast, we aren't expecting an immediate flip to springlike weather on March 1," AccuWeather Long-Range Meteorologist Max Vido said. "However, once we get to the later parts of March and the beginning of April, we're expecting a faster transition to spring than last year." By late April and May, snow worries will be replaced with warm swings and the threat for some severe weather.

Despite this, it won't be a particularly wet spring for these regions.

"2018 was an extremely wet year," Vido said. "This year it could be a little drier and people who had outdoor projects delayed from the summer and fall might have an opportunity to get out there and work on them."

Arctic chill to make quick departure in Southeast, Tennessee Valley, Gulf coast

This spring, Arctic air is predicted to retreat quickly across the Southeast and Tennessee Valley.


A lower-than-normal risk for a late last frost or freeze will be good news for those hoping to get plants in the ground early.

The only hindrance to this may be the threat for abovenormal rainfall across the region, with the potential for flooding in cities such as Houston, Texas; New Orleans, Louisiana; and Tallahassee, Florida.

Severe weather will affect traditional southern areas, meaning cities like Little Rock, Arkansas; Shreveport, Louisiana; and Tulsa, Oklahoma, should be on alert.

Air to warm up quicker than last year in Ohio Valley, Midwest and majority of Plains

While winter weather lingered across the Midwest and Northern Plains into the middle of April last year, a much faster transition is in store during 2019.



Bouts of warmer weather are predicted to arrive in the beginning of April and become more consistent by the middle of the month, particularly for northern areas like Minneapolis and Bismarck.

Some cities farther south could see occasional springlike temperatures in March, however.

A few stretches of dry weather are forecast during the season and, while drought is not expected at a regional level, there could be some localized issues, Vido said.

Heavy rainfall predicted for southern Plains

A seasonable transition to spring is in store this year, meaning March could once again welcome temperatures in the 70s and 80s F. "People across the area should be able to get going on projects and planting pretty quickly," according to Vido.

As far as spring severe weather goes, forecasters say it will be a normal to slightly below-normal year, with the frequency of events set to pick up in April and May.

Heavy rainfall is forecast to target the region at times, especially later in the season, with eastern Texas and Oklahoma on alert for urban and street flooding.

The abundance of rain could spur flooded fields, leading to delays for some farmers.

Drought conditions to ease back in Southwest, California

A long-standing drought

across the Four Corners region, Arizona and Southern California will finally ease back as winter comes to a close.

According to Vido, "We're expecting a few more precipitation events through the end of winter into the beginning of spring that can improve the situation there."

Meanwhile, as spring takes hold across the Southwest, above-normal warmth is not on the cards.

"Cloudy conditions at times will hold back extreme heat, preventing a high frequency of those events this year," he said.

Dry and warm weather to dominate in the Northwest, Rockies

Spring won't be quick to dive into the central and

northern Rockies, as some late-season snow is possible for cities like Denver, Colorado, and Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Overall, however, drierand warmer-than-normal conditions are in store for the Northwest and northern Rockies this season.


These areas missed out on frequent stormy weather over the winter, so drought issues could intensify into spring.

"There may be some concerns with water restrictions," Vido said.
