#### **WTRT Annual Meeting is March 26th**

The 65th annual meeting of the membership of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is scheduled for Tuesday, March 26, at 6 p.m. at the Hereford Bull Barn.

Two directors will be elected during the 65th annual event. Three-year terms of office of directors Brent Carlson, Milo Center/Westway, and Lance McClaran, Tharp, are expiring and subject to election at this year's annual meeting.

Both are seeking re-election. No additional candidates were named by the nominating committee at its February meeting. Nominations may be made from the floor during the annual

An Xcel Energy lineman was killed while repairing power lines in Hereford last Wednesday evening.

#### **Monarch Butterfly Numbers Rise Dramatically**

After years of decline, a Texas A&M researcher and butterfly advocate says the total population of monarch butterflies appears to be increasing.

College Station, March 18, 2019 — After several years of decline, the number of monarch butterflies appears to be up dramatically - perhaps as much as much as 144 percent according to a Texas A&M University researcher and monarch butterfly advocate.

Craig Wilson, director of the USDA Future Scientists Program and senior research associate in the Center for Mathematics and Science Education at Texas A&M and a longtime butterfly enthusiast, says early figures show many more monarchs than had been expected for 2019. The figures are promising considering monarch numbers have been trending down for the past five



"Figures show the highest number of hectares covered since at least 2006," Wilson said. "Monarch numbers are usually measured in hectares, so that's means about 15 acres are being used for their breeding grounds in northern Mexico. That's a really positive sign, especially since their numbers have been down in recent years. I believe the record low was in 2013-14 when only 0.65 hectares (about 1.65 acres) were covered. So it is very promising news."

By estimating 50 million monarchs per hectare, it would mean a total population of about 300 million, said Wilson.

Wilson said that milkweed, the essential plant that monarchs rely on for food, is in fairly plentiful supply in Central Texas, noting that personnel around Easterwood Airport in College Station have agreed to delay grass mowing around areas of the airport where milkweed flourishes.

Wilson says that monarchs overwinter and breed in Mexico and then have three more generations as they travel north to Canada. "Texas is a crucial place for them - they have to pass through the state on their way north in the spring and lay eggs," he points out. It is critical that monarchs have access to milkweed, the only type of plant that monarch caterpillars will digest as the multiple generational migration heads north.

"If Texas residents want to help, they can start asking local garden centers and feed stores to get in more supplies of milkweed now and plant them," he said. He added that about 500 Texas A&M students are engaged in monarch community projects, such as planting milkweed in local parks and

The FISD's portion of the new building purchase would be approximately \$37,0000 which could be paid out over a 4-year period. The purchase of a new building would be contingent on the sale of the current building. The Board went into Closed Session to discuss this proposal and other employee and student related items. After returning to Open Session, the

Board voted not to approve the proposed purchase.

The Board approved the bid by Net Sync Company to be the vendor for the 2019-20 E-Rate RFP. The RFP is to add Wireless Access Points at the FISD campuses. The Board also approved the 2019-20 Instruction Allotment and TEKS Certification as well as the Policy Update 112 affecting (LOCAL) Policies. The Board also heard the Principals' reports, the Athletic Director's report, and the Superintendent's

## Beware of old cellphones

On Monday, March 18, 2019, the Parmer County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call from what sounded like a very young female caller. The caller stated that she heard a noise and found her mother on the floor. The caller didn't know her address and then the call was cut short for an unknown reason. Most 911 call centers will receive calls from children either playing with the phone or making an accidental call but this call seemed different.

In most 911 calls, information is received which identifies the phone and the caller. Location information is also gathered, but in this case there was no location information received. The information that was received indicated that the phone was a cell phone and the number informed us that it was an inactive phone which had no service. The Sheriff's

Office was able to determine, from the 911 system and the cellular provider, the location of the cell tower where the call originated. It was this information that narrowed the search

Sheriff's officers, along with the Friona EMS, began to go house to house looking for the caller. When they considered the service area of the cell tower, the caller location could have involved many homes which included the City of Friona. It was then decided to involve the public by using social media and the 911 database to send out a message to persons in the surrounding area of Friona in which we believed the call came from. The goal was to speed the search in an attempt to locate the caller. The Friona ISD was also contacted and they assisted in seeking the

As of Tuesday, March 19, 2019, this caller has not been located and no one has been

reported injured or missing. The Parmer County Sheriff's Office would like to use this incident to remind parents that old cell phones may not be able to use high-speed data networks, take photos or play music, but they can be used to call 911 in an emergency. Federal law requires that ALL cellphones must be able to call 911 at all times. As long as an old cell phone is functional, it can be used as an emergency phone. This is true even with no SIM card or service. In these incidents, no caller identification is received. Children who are given old deactivated phones to play with or view videos can still call 911. Many accidental calls are made from these old phones.

### FRIONA FLASHBACKS

#### From the Friona Star Archives

April 2, 2015 Jacob Bautista, Friona Chieftain Boxing Club, competed in the West Texas Boxing Classic on March 30, 2015. He was the only member of the local boxing club to receive a match. He was matched with Tapia Boxing's Eladio Castillo of Albuquerque. Bautista represented the club well and easily outpointed Castillo to win a unanimous decision scoring a victory in the 85 lb. division. The Chieftains will compete on April 11 in Dodge City, Kansas or Lubbock in preparation for the West Texas Regional Junior Olympic Box-off in Midland on April 24-26. The winners of each open division will advance to the state tournament in El Paso on May 7-10.

#### March 18, 2010

Chieftain power lifter Clayton Smiley puts the muscle to this 630-pound squat lift during the regional meet Saturday M arch 13 at Sundown. Smiley broke his own school record with the lift. He had a personal best total of 1485 for 2nd place and a trip to the state meet in Abilene March 27.

#### March 25, 1995

On December 1. Stephen Wright, age 44, unloaded in Friona and was scheduled to head home to Blair. Nebraska. His father, Marvin Wright waited in Blair for his son's check-in call. Ardene Wright says her son always calls twice a day. The Wrights own a small trucking company (three trucks). Marvin has been trucking since 1957. He knew when his son had not called by the next day, something was wrong. He began calling state highway patrol headquarters along Stephen's route home, "Kansas was pretty nonchalant," reports Marvin. "Nebraska checked for accidents, etc. and found nothing. I called Dallas and there were no accidents, but they put the alert out for my boy and his 1990 Volvo conventional." Officer Steve Jones from Friona, Texas, saw the truck in the parking lot of a convenience store in Friona and notified the Wrights. Jones told them he would go out and Stephen checked into the hospital in Friona. He told them he had felt tired and laid down in the truck. He did not realize he had passed out for 48 hours. The hospital drew blood and found Stephen had an abnormal level of blood sugar and was suffering from a bad case of strep throat. They administered medication and released him three days later. Meanwhile, Stephen's faithful dog remained in the truck. On Sunday, the trucker was surprised when the Assistant Chief of Police visited him in the hospital. He was even more surprised when the assistant chief retrieved the dog and took him to a kennel until Stephen was well enough to be released. "You just don't find police departments that care enough about truckers to go out of their way like they did," Marvin told Land Line. "What they did was way beyond the call of duty and they deserve to be recognized for it. My son had gone into kind of a coma, and no telling what could have happened. And taking care of the dog was pretty incredible, too."

#### Mar. 24, 1990

It looked worse than it was Wednesday afternoon when smoke was billowing from the north side of the Excel plant. However, it was just a small fire in a trash container near the building, which Friona firemen quickly brought under control.

#### fol. March 22, 1981

The Friona area was still "picking up" late in the week from a severe wind and dust storm on Tuesday, March 17, which featured some of the strongest wind gusts in recent years. The area's first "duster" of 1981 brought winds which were clocked at 85 and 90 miles per hour in the area. A spray company at Bovina reported wind gusts up to 85 miles per hour that day, and a Clovis, N.M report said they had seen 90 miles per hour on a wind gauge. Rick Jennings of Benger Air Park said he had not monitored his gauge throughout the afternoon, but could verify winds of 65 and 70 miles per hour in Friona that day. This would mean winds of the hurricane-force variety, at least in the areas where the strong gusts occurred. The high wind kicked up some blowing dust, which hampered motorists, and was responsible for at least five traffic mishaps Tuesday afternoon west of Friona. According to Chief of Police Bill Denney At the height of the storm, the law officers closed down U S. Highway 60 between Friona and Bovina, due to the accidents. It was the first time, at least in recent years, for the major highway to be closed due to blowing dust. " It's a wonder we didn't have more wrecks. Several people thought they had close calls one older couple, from Ohio, who made it through before we closed the road, pulled over and asked me 'What is this? Is it the end of the world, or what?" Denney said. A spokesman at Parmer County Community Hospital said that the hospital staff had examined "eight or ten" people Tuesday afternoon. Of these, three were hospitalized, including D.E. (Buck) Bush, and a couple travelling through town, identified only as Mr. and Mrs. Fagan. Fortunately, none of the accident victims were seriously hurt. Finally, farm equipment and men had to be summoned to an area near the MBPXL plant west of town, to disc a section of ground which was responsible for one of the worst sandy spots. After the ground had been plowed, the sand hazard diminished at this spot. Among the storm losses, perhaps the greatest was at Clay's Corner, 18 miles south of Friona. Where an 80- foot 500,000 bushel elevator belonging to Farmers Cooperative Grain was collapsed by the strong wind. In Friona, a carport at the Gladys Wilson home, 302 East Seventh, collapsed, trapping a pick-up truck which was parked underneath. Home roofs, particularly shingles, were perhaps the hardest hit by the windstorm, with numerous reports of damage in this regard. Extensive damage was reported to a large center pivot sprinkler system on the Doyce Barnett's farm southeast of town.

### Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have risen 6.8 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.31/g today, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 25.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, yet stand 0.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.95/g today while the most expensive is \$3.19/g, a difference of \$1.24/g. The lowest price in the state today is \$1.95/g while the highest is \$3.19/g, a difference of \$1.24/g. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.79/g while the most expensive is \$4.59/g, a difference of \$2.80/g.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 4.3 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$2.54/g today. The national average is up 20.6 cents per gallon from a month ago, yet stands 0.3 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"March madness is already in full swing at pumps across the country as the U.S. has seen the national average rise for five straight weeks and there's no sign of a slowdown yet," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "Several perhaps major refinery issues flared up over the weekend, including fires at two facilities that could push wholesale gasoline prices up notably, mainly in the Pacific Northwest and the Gulf Coast, should the shutdowns linger. This is the time of year that energy markets are very sensitive to such unexpected outages as dozens of refineries across the country perform maintenance in a tight window ahead of the summer driving season. Any major outages can lead to tight inventory ahead of specification changes and have a severe impact on gas prices. The situation is delicate and bears further monitoring in the days ahead."







### Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 1st.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year.

#### Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty may be imposed.

#### Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value to the appraisal review board.
- · You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late
- · You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2018. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2019.

#### What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2019 renditions is April 1. You can get an automatic extension to May 1 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 1 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 1 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.



### **State Capital Highlights**

#### Supplemental funding legislation draws from 'Rainy Day Fund'

 $\operatorname{AUSTIN} - \operatorname{A}$  few of the funding priorities expressed by the executive, legislative and judicial branches are not covered in Senate Bill 2, the state's tentatively approved appropriations bill for fiscal years 2020 and 2021.

So, on March 13, the Senate voted unanimously in favor of SB 500, \$6 billion in supplemental funding to plug many holes. Some \$4.3 billion of the total would be taken out of the Economic Stabilization ("Rainy Day") Fund. Authored by Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, the legislation proposes the following alloca-

- \$3 billion for Hurricane Harvey recovery expenses;
- \$2.1 billion to address the Medicaid
- \$100 million for school safety, with an amendment that gives districts greater flexibility on the type of safety equipment they can buy;
- \$300 million to improve state hospital fa-
- \$542 million to address pension liabilities for the Teacher Retirement System and provide retired teachers a "13th check" up to
- \$211 million to pay obligations of the Texas Tomorrow Fund, a college tuition savings program;
- \$160 million to address the Correctional Managed Health Care shortfall; and
- \$100 million to refill the Governor's Disaster Fund to help rebuild from natural di-

"The supplemental budget provides funding for some of the Legislature's key priorities: Hurricane Harvey relief, school safety and healthcare needs. It provides significant resources to improve the state's flood control infrastructure and helps communities along the Gulf Coast rebuild," Nelson said.

Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe, said hurricane disaster recovery and flood mitigation "are exactly what the Rainy Day Fund was designed for" and added that the fund, now at a historically high balance, is projected to reach \$15 billion. The state constitution caps the maximum biennial "Rainy Day Fund" balance at an amount not to exceed 10 percent of certain general revenue deposited during the previous biennium.

#### Declaration is extended

Gov. Greg Abbott on March 15 extended the state disaster declaration he originally issued on Aug. 23, 2017, to counties affected by Hurricane Harvey.

Thirty counties were named in the original declaration. As reports revealing the extent of the disaster came in, Abbott amended the declaration on Aug. 26, 27, 28 and Sept. 14, 2017, to include 30 more counties.

Abbott has renewed the disaster declaration every month since then, saying that a state of disaster continues to exist in those same counties.

#### Panel OKs pension bill

The Senate State Affairs Committee on March 14 approved SB 12, legislation to keep the state's Teacher Retirement System fund actuarially sound by increasing teacher, school district and state contribution rates gradually over the next few years.

Last August, at the end of fiscal year 2018, the fund had \$47 billion in unmet debt obligations and a funding period of 87 years, the time it would take to pay off all of its liabilities under current revenues, according to the Senate News Service.

If nothing is done, unfunded liabilities would increase to \$124 billion by 2050, said Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, chair of the committee. Under her proposal, the active teacher contribution would rise from the present 7.7 percent to 8.25 percent in 2024; state contributions would rise from 6.8 percent of payroll to 8.25 percent over the same period, and district contributions would rise from 1.5 percent of eligible payroll to 2 percent by 2025.

SB 12 next moves to the full Senate for consideration.

#### Effort targets trafficking

The Texas Department of Transportation, in partnership with the governor's office, law enforcement and industry partners, on March 12 announced the launching of the "On the Road to End Human Trafficking"

Similar to a neighborhood watch program, the initiative encourages everyone to know, watch for and report signs of trafficking.

TxDOT said University of Texas research showed more than 300,000 people are trafficked in Texas at any given time, including 79,000 youth victims. "These innocent human beings are horrifically abused by being forced into slavery, either in the form of hard labor or sex/prostitution," TxDOT said.

TxDOT is encouraging citizens to use a toll-free, confidential phone number, (888) 373-7888, to report suspected trafficking. Victims are encouraged to call 911.

#### Report: 11 measles cases

Eleven cases of measles have been reported in the Lone Star State since Jan. 1, according to information posted by the Texas Department of State Health Services.

In all of last year, nine cases of measles were reported statewide, the agency said.

The DSHS and the Atlanta-based U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend children get a dose of measles vaccine at 12 to 15 months of age and again at 4

### Local veterinarian and playa champion Dr. Chris Grotegut headlining Playa Field Day

Hereford veterinarian, agriculture innovator and playa champion Dr. Chris Grotegut will join Don Kahl, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Region 1 Migratory Game Bird Specialist from Lubbock, in headlining presentations at an upcoming Playa Field Day to be held in Hereford.

The session, open to landowners, educators, and the interested public will be conducted Tuesday, March 26, from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Hereford Community Center, 100 Avenue C. The day's activities will also include a field tour of playas owned by Dr. Grotegut.

The field day will cover playa ecosystems, as well as best management practices and playa restoration programs of interest to local farmers, ranchers and landowners.

Dr. Grotegut farms and ranches in the Dawn area in addition to operating Highway 385 Animal Hospital in Hereford. He is an agriculture representative to the Llano Estacado (Region O) Water Planning Group, as well as a member of the Deaf Smith County Committee of the High Plains Water District. He will speak on the importance of functioning playas in recharging the Ogallala aquifer. His farming methods, including protecting playas on his farmland, have been important in conserving groundwater.

Kahl stresses that by maintaining healthy playas, land-

owners perform the best possible management toward putting clean water back into the aquifer below their land for future use. He is lead man with The Texas Playa Conservation Initiative (TxPCI) that seeks to preserve abundant healthy playa wetlands to benefit current and future residents reliant on the Ogallala Aquifer. These efforts also support healthy populations of resident and migratory wildlife dependent on playa wetlands.

TxPCI works to educate Panhandle residents about playas and their link to a healthy ecosystem and to the sustainability and integrity of the Ogallala Aquifer.

Currently, TxPCI is completing projects with private landowners that restore, conserve, and protect as many fully functioning playas as possible to help sustain residents and wildlife in the High Plains of Texas. Initial work includes rehabilitating pitted playas in grassland settings by filling the pits once used for reclaiming irrigation tailwater with playa soil from the berms piled alongside the pits.

The project area encompasses the entirety of the High Plains Ecoregion of Texas, including all or parts of 46 counties in Northwest Texas. TxPCI was founded in January 2015 to address playa resource concerns for the benefit of the Ogallala Aquifer, wildlife, and residents and producers in Texas' playa region.

Playa Field Day activities will begin at the Hereford Community Center with coffee and refreshments, and an overview of the day. The opening presentation by Kahl at 9:30 will cover general information on playas, as well as information on restoration efforts and options for playa landowners through

the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative.

The second presentation of the morning by Dr. Grotegut, will focus on his own land management practices that have helped to conserve playas while improving the overall water cycle.

At 11 a.m. the group will depart for a guided field trip to visit playas owned and managed by Dr. Grotegut near the Dawn community. At 12:30 p.m. the tour will return to Hereford Community Center for a sandwich lunch.

Jim Steiert, outdoor writer, playa enthusiast, and environmental representative to the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Group from Hereford will close the event with brief remarks on the vital nature of playas after lunch until 1:30pm. His book, Playas: Jewels of the Plains (Texas Tech University Press, 1995) can be purchased at the event for \$40.

Playas are shallow, rainfed wetlands throughout the Great Plains. When containing surface water, playas provide crucial habitat for many wildlife that depend on water to survive. When dry, playas also support several other Great Plains wildlife species because they are often the only natural lands in a region dominated by agricultural production. Playas also recharge water to the underlying aquifer, filter nutrients and chemicals from the surrounding watershed, and add recreational value to the region.

The workshop is sponsored by Ogallala Commons and its partners, the High Plains Water District, the Dixon Water Foundation, and Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. Those attending are asked to wear clothing, footwear, and a hat suitable for the field tours. There is no charge for the event, though a \$10 donation for lunch is appreciated.





#### **Chicken Again**

It's chicken again this week featuring a couple of our family favorites. The first recipe is chicken marsala that Jarrett prepared for the 4-H food show this fall. The white grape juice can make this a non-alcoholic recipe. The parmesan chicken recipe tastes a lot like the recipe from Olive Garden. I found this recipe in the Perryton Methodist Church cookbook, but over the years I have improved on it a little. Hope you enjoy these go to recipes.

#### **Chicken Marsala**

By Jarrett White

- 4 chicken breast, boneless and skinless
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. pepper
- 4 Tbsp. Olive oil 4 Tbsp. butter
- ½ cup finely chopped onion
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 cups fresh mushrooms
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 can low-sodium cream of mushroom soup 1 cup white wine or white grape juice
- 1. Pound chicken breasts between sheets of plastic wrap until about 1/4 inch thickness, if
- necessary. 2. Season with salt and pepper. Then brown the chicken in oil on medium high heat until

lightly browned on both sides. Pull chicken

- from pan and place aside.
- 3. Add 2 tablespoon of butter and the olive oil to pan and turn down heat. Add onions and garlic and sauté until onions are clear. Use a whisk to deglaze the pan with the butter.
- 4. When onions are clear, add mushroom and sauté until soft. Add 1 more tablespoon butter to cook mushrooms.
- 5. Then add chicken broth, cream of mushroom soup and white wine. You can use white grape juice if you want a non-alcoholic version. Use whisk to combine. Return browned chicken to pan and simmer for 20 minutes or until chicken reaches an internal temperature of 1650 F.
- 6. Remove chicken from pan to serving platter and distribute sauce over chicken. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

#### Parmesan Chicken

2/3 c. butter

½ c. fine bread crumbs

2 T. grated Parmesan Cheese

1 tsp. basil

1 tsp. oregano leaves 1/ tsp. garlic salt

½ tsp. salt

2 chicken breast, split 1/4 c. white wine or apple juice

Heat oven to 375oF. Melt butter. Combine bread crumbs, Parmesan cheese, basil, oregano, garlic salt, and salt. Dip chicken breasts in melted butter; coat with crumb mixture. Reserve remaining butter. Place chicken ungreased pan. Bake 50 to 60 minutes, or until chicken is fork-tender and has reached an internal temperature of 160oF. Meanwhile, add wine to reserved butter (about ½ cup). When chicken is golden brown, pour butter sauce over chicken. Continue baking for 3 to 5 minutes. Serve with sauce spooned over.

This recipe is easy to double to serve a larger group. If you are uncomfortable using the leftover butter, just divide the butter at the beginning of the recipe to use with the sauce. We like to serve with spaghetti and store-bought Ragu sauce.







The proposed facility will emit the following air contaminants: particulate matter including (but not limited to) aggregate, cement, road dust, and particulate matter with diameters of 10 microns or less and 2.5 microns or less.

This application was submitted to the TCEQ on February 21, 2019. The executive director has completed the administrative and technical reviews of the application and determined that the application meets all of the requirements of a standard permit authorized by 30 TAC § 116.611, which would establish the conditions under which the plant must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision to issue the registration because it meets all applicable rules. The application, executive director's preliminary decision, and standard permit will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Amarillo regional office, and the Friona Public Library, 109 West 7th Street, Friona, Parmer County, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review at the TCEQ Amarillo Regional Office, 3918 Canyon Drive, Amarillo, Texas. Visit www.tceq.texas.gov/goto/cbp to review the standard permit.

Public Comment/Public Meeting. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting. See Contacts section. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments or meeting requests is 30 days after newspaper notice is published. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to consider in the permit process.

The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application. A public meeting about the application will be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing. If a public meeting is held, the deadline to submit public comments is extended to the end of the public meeting.

Contested Case Hearing. You may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days from this notice, the executive director may approve the application.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. To request a hearing, a person must actually reside in a permanent residence within 440 yards of the proposed plant. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number; (2) applicant's name and registration number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility; and (7) a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period. If the request is made by a group or association, one or more members who have standing to request a hearing must be identified by name and physical address. The interests which the group or association seeks to protect must be identified. You may submit your proposed adjustments to the application which would satisfy your concerns. See Contacts section.

TCEQ Action. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The executive director's decision on the application, and any response to comments, will be mailed to all persons on the mailing list. If no timely contested case hearing requests are received, or if all hearing requests are withdrawn, the executive director may issue final approval of the application. If all timely hearing requests are not withdrawn, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled commission meeting. The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material air quality concerns submitted during the comment period. The winch pulls in the calves so there is no heavy back-breaking lifting involved. The tractor tire keeps the calf soft and snug so it can't jump out. The powerful electric motor makes it easy to drive it even in muddy conditions. In the lay down position, the calf can be fed colostrum easily.
