And if you don't want your right of privacy to be interrupted by the press and your face peering at folks all over the nation you just shouldn't get into politics in the first place.

After the spectacle of the last two political conventions, we've decided that selecting a presidential candidate by the convention system is about as outdated as the horse and buggy. After all, the convention system was set up when there were no such things as radio and TV or even good newspaper cov-

Since that time, the world has gotten smaller with modern streamlined methods of transportation. So electing a delegate to go to the convention to cast one vote for a group of people no longer seems practical. Each individual can be well informed and capable of making up his own mind and casting his own ballot.

We would like to see the party conventions cast aside in favor of a national primary. We know lots of folks will disagree with this stand. Party bosses will, no doubt, be horrified at the thought . . . it's a lot harder to exert influence over long distances.

In order to keep a tiny element of suspense running through the proceedings, the names of the vice presidential candidates were kept secret as

long as was possible. If everybody knows ahead of time who will be nominated, why even waste time having a convention. You could get more suspense and better televiewing out of Petticoat Junction or The Flintstones.

Let us have some opinions pro and con if you are interested in this subject. We might even strike a tiny spark in the direction of the Congress if there are many who think the nation could benefit from a new elec-

farm insect-free and ready for those soon - to - be - harvested grains?

Stored grain insects inflict enormous losses upon grain producers each year. Insects destroy an estimated two per cent of the nation's farm-stored grain each month.

Among the most destructive stored grain insects in Texas are rice or corn weevils, lesser grain borers and Angoumois grain moths.

Protection against these pests is begun by storing grain only in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned, Old grain, trash, feed sacks and other debris that furnish living quarters for insects should be removed. Cracks should be covered to prevent grain from collecting, and grain and other material beneath and near the bins should be destroyed.

After cleaning, spray the inside with either methoxyclor or malathion at the rate of about two gallons per 1,000 square feet of surface area. It should be remembered that

grain to be stored should be

clean and sound and have moisture content of 12 per cent or

Also, when filling the bin, allow adequate working space for fumigation and inspection of

Premium grade malathion may be used as a grain protectant on wheat, oats, rice, corn, rye, barley, grain sorghum, peanuts and field or garden seeds. It can be applied as a dust or spray at the time the grain is being placed in final

Several liquid fumigants are effective in killing weevils and beetles which feed below the grain surface. Some of these include ethylene dichloride, carbon tetrachloride and carbon disulphide (Hi-Life).

Before fumigation, spray the outside of the bin with a residual spray such as malathion to kill insects that may be forced out of the building by the fumigant. The bin should be made as tight as possible before fumigation and the grain surface be level to insure even penetration.

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
