

Schedule Released For 1964 Maize Days

Schedule for the 1964 Maize Days celebration in Friona was released this week by Porter Roberts, general chairman of the celebration.

First big event in the celebration will be the Maize Days Queen contest, which will be held Thursday at 8:15 p.m. at the Friona High School Auditorium.

Admission of 50 cents and \$1 will be charged for the program, which selects the girl who will reign as "Maize Queen" over the rest of the festivities, and for the coming year.

Current Maize Queen, Sheryl Long, will be present and will crown the new queen.

Beginning Monday, the Lions Club will sponsor the Lone Star Amusement Company and its rides in the city park. Some 10 rides will be featured by the company, which has furnished rides for the annual celebration for a number of years.

On Friday, the Friona Rainbow Girls will sponsor their annual pancake breakfast from 6 to 9 a.m. at the Friona Country Club. Tickets are being sold in advance, and also may be bought at the door.

The annual Maize Days parade will be held down Main Street of Friona beginning at 10:30 a.m. Friday, September 11. Parade chairman, Charles Allen, is encouraging local businesses, organizations and school classes and groups to enter floats.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will sponsor a luncheon at the school cafeteria. Turkey and dressing will be featured on the menu. Tickets are \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for children.

Highlight of Friday afternoon will be the Kids Contests, beginning at 3 p.m. at Chieftain Field. Entrants should report to the press box at 130 p.m. that day. Spectators will witness the events from the east stands.

Contests will be offered in three divisions; boys ages 7-10; boys ages 11-14; girls ages 7-10; girls ages 11-14 and boys and girls ages 4-6.

Also beginning at 3 p.m. will be the tractor rodeo

and tube-setting contest on the vacant lots across the street west of Chieftain Field.

Concluding Friday's activities will be the Friona Chieftains' first home game of the year, against the Plains Cowboys at 8 p.m. at Chieftain Field.

A new entertainment will lead off the slate of activities for Saturday. The Harden Family will feature an archery exhibition at the City Park, beginning at 10 a.m. That will be followed by an exhibition by the McKenzie Gun Slingers Club of Lubbock.

The judging of the beard-growing contest will once again be held at 11:30 a.m. at the City Park, preceding the annual free barbecue.

Next Thursday will be the big day for the queen contestants, judging in the contest

Football Contest Starts This Week

The Friona Star's annual Cotton Bowl football contest begins this week, and Pete Mace, Star advertising manager and contest director, urges all football fans to enter the contest beginning with the very first week.

Chiefs Out To Cultivate 'Sweet Smell Of Success'

For the first time in four years, the Friona Chieftains will be hoping to begin their new football season just as they did the previous year, when they travel to Farwell for the 1964 season opener Friday night. Game time is 8 p.m.

The Chieftains, still keyed up by their 8-2 season record of 1963, tasted victory for the first time in a long time last year, and are hungry for "plenty more in '64."

Friona, which rebounded from the depths of a 27-game losing streak in last year's season opener here to brand

the Steers with a 26-13 setback, will be out to snap other streaks and begin some of their own in tomorrow's game.

With a win in the season opener, Friona can claim their first two-game winning streak over Farwell since 1957 and 1958.

Also, the Chieftains will be after their first win at Farwell since that 15-12 victory of 1958. Last time the teams met in Steer territory, 1962, found Farwell romping to a 39-0 win, and four years ago, in 1960, it was 40-6, Steers.

So, Friona still has a lot of old scores to settle, although Farwell must still be smarting from being cast as the "fall guy" in last year's record-snapping humiliation.

corners of Farmer County will be meeting in football for the 28th time since 1931. Farwell has won 15, Friona 11 and there has been one tie in that time. The game will mark the 16th consecutive season that the teams have played and the sixth straight year that the game has served as season opener for both teams.

For many years, the two old rivals were in the same district alignment, and played later in the season. However, since 1959 the game has been played the first week in September. And, ironically enough, Farwell had won each season opener up until last fall.

An era has passed at Farwell, as the Steers will field a team tomorrow night without a Lovelace. In the lineup for the first time in some 10 years, Leon Lovelace, last in a line of three brothers and a cousin which sparked Steer teams, graduated last spring.

And, the Steers lost their coach of the past several years, Dempsey Alexander, who moved to Spur. Now coaching the Farwell crew is Toby Booth.

A total of 57 candidates, probably most ever to come out for a Chieftain team, has been working more than two weeks now, and are "rearing to go" for tomorrow's game.

The team is in good physical shape. Biggest question mark is senior end Larry Buckley, who sprained his ankle in last Friday's scrimmage. Buckley may or may not be able to play in the opener.

Coach Don Light announced the probable starting lineup as the following: left end -- Buckley or Jesse Shirley, left tackle

First Day Enrollment Is 1209 In Friona

Enrollment in Friona Schools on Monday totalled 1209 for the first day of classes. That figure compared to exactly 1200 which enrolled on the first day last year.

Biggest increase came in high school, where the four grades expected 329 students compared to 304 last year, while the first eight grades actually showed a decline of 16 students, from 896 to 880.

However, more students are expected to enroll as school gets underway. School officials are expecting close to 1300

students by the time the "peak" enrollment is reached.

The 1209 students erased last year's record enrollment figure of 1200.

Largest class is the first grade, where 137 students enrolled. Largest class in high school is the freshman class, which has 100 members.

Complete enrollment, by grade, is as follows:

First -- 137; second -- 119; third -- 128; fourth -- 100; fifth -- 113; sixth -- 94; seventh -- 104; eighth -- 85; ninth -- 100; tenth -- 73; eleventh -- 86; twelfth -- 70.

per-carry average. The hard-running 170-pounder has been moved to fullback this season. Dodd led the team in district play last year with a 4.3-yard average.

Although he didn't carry the ball much last year (just nine times), Murphree gained 91 yards, for a 10.0 per-carry average.

Although hurt, Farwell wasn't exactly crippled by graduation. The Steers still return five offensive and six defensive starters from the team which won District 3-A with a 7-3 mark, losing to state champion Petersburg, 20-14 in bidistrict.

A sophomore, Bobby Fields, has been named quarterback to replace Lovelace, Fields, who lettered last year as a freshman, is considered one of the top sophomore prospects in the area.

Running with him in the Farwell backfield will be his older brother Jerry, a senior letterman, Jerry Childs, senior letterman, and Larry Donaldson, also a senior.

Other Steer lettermen returning include ends Butch Ford, Doyle Johnson and Richard Haseloff; tackles Charles Dannheim, Mike Camp, Gilbert Dale and Johnny Atkinson and guard Warren Gossett.

In the Sanford-Fritch scrimmage last Friday, Coach Light viewed the workout with mixed emotions.

"We felt better about it after we saw the film. Our offense looked better on film than we thought at the time," he said. Coach Light said he was especially pleased with Friona's pass defense. "We intercepted more passes than Sanford-Fritch completed," he said.

Last year in the final stages the Chiefs' pass defense was a strong point. They didn't allow a completed pass in district play until the final game against Olton.

"If we had stuck with the offense which was going well, we could've moved the ball better. But we had to continue to work on the plays which weren't going too well," Coach Light added about the scrimmage.

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No Encephalitis Cases In Friona Hospital

Dr. Paul Spring, Farmer County Health officer, stated on Tuesday that as of that date there had been no confirmed cases of Encephalitis ("Sleeping Sickness") at Farmer County Community Hospital.

However, it has been reported that at least one Friona area resident is hospitalized with the disease. Roy O'Brian, resident of Route 1, Friona, is hospitalized in Dimmitt. It is thought that he is making satisfactory progress, and will probably make a complete recovery.

At least one other case has been reported involving a five-year old Haseloff youngster from the Oklahoma Lane community.

Dr. Spring said that usually there are eight or ten confirmed cases of the disease recorded each year in the county, so that the Friona area was actually better off than average.

The county health officer stated that he believed the dry summer kept the number of mosquitoes down, and thus probably accounts for Friona escaping an epidemic of the disease such as has happened in places.

"We're approaching the tail end of the Encephalitis season. Sometimes there are cases reported in September, though," Dr. Spring said. He pointed out that the incubation period for the disease after a person has been bitten by the type of mosquito carrying the germ is 120 days--so that it can be contracted anytime after the bite.

The City of Friona made mosquito dusting "truns" last Tuesday and Friday, and mainly due to the threat of epidemic, has scheduled another run for Friday of this week, according to city manager A. L. (Jake) Outland.

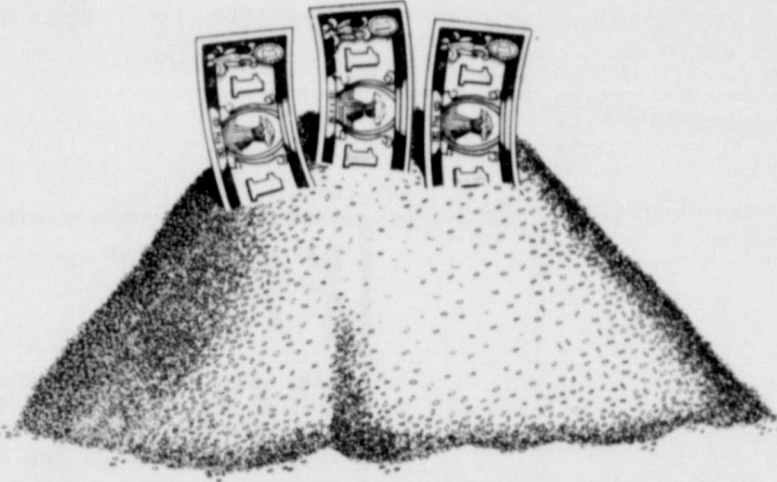

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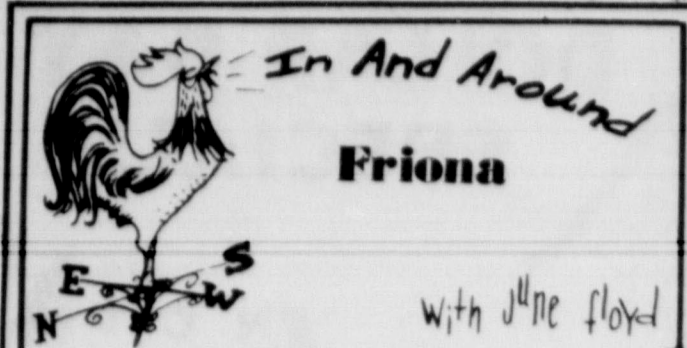

Chiefs' 1964 Schedule Has Genuine 'New Look'

Friona High School's football schedule for 1964 really has a "new look." The Chiefs dropped five of the teams which made up their 1963 schedule.

Of the five teams which were added, two teams (Abernathy and Floydada) have never been played before by Friona in football, at least as far back as interscholastic League records go, which is 1931.

The ironic thing is that both teams will be met as district opponents.

The three other new opponents have been played a total of 15 games by Friona. Dalhart, who will be met here in the third game of the year, has been met eight times.

Lockney, another district opponent, has furnished opposition for Friona only five times previously, and was last met in 1947. Hale Center, who comes here October 9 for Friona's Homecoming game, has been met only twice previously, in 1948 and 1949.

Three of the teams met in 1963 and not on the current schedule were met a total of 38 times between 1931 and 1964. Muleshoe, one of the oldest opponents, had been played 17

times. The Muleshoe moved into the class AAA bracket, and could not work the Chiefs into their schedule although Friona coaches wanted the game.

Happy, which had been met 13 times the past several years, was an old rival from the days when Friona was in class B, and Bovina, a county neighbor, was met eight times, the first game being in 1951.

Of the other teams dropped from the 1963 schedule, Morton had been played eight times since 1945, while the Chiefs' game against Memphis was the only meeting in the history of the schools. Memphis was added as a fill-in game after Portales was dropped and the other area schools had already completed their schedules.

Farwell and Dimmitt are the two teams on the current schedule which have been met most often by Chiefs teams. Both have been played 27 times since 1931. Farwell has been played 15 consecutive years beginning in 1949.

These are about the only two "rivals" on the 1964 schedule, although Sudan will be met for the ninth time and third consecutive year. Olton, although

in Friona's district for the third consecutive year, will be met for only the sixth time, and Plains, a non-conference foe, will be played for just the fourth time, and fourth straight year.

The Chiefs do not hold a series advantage over any of the eight opponents which have been met previously, but are close to even in three or four cases.

Lockney and Plains are the closest. Friona's record against Lockney is 2-3, and it's 1-2 against Plains. The Chiefs are 3-5 against Dalhart, or 4-5 if you count a forfeit win in 1941. The Chiefs hope to draw closer to their all-time record against Farwell, which is 11-15-1 counting games from 1931 to the present.

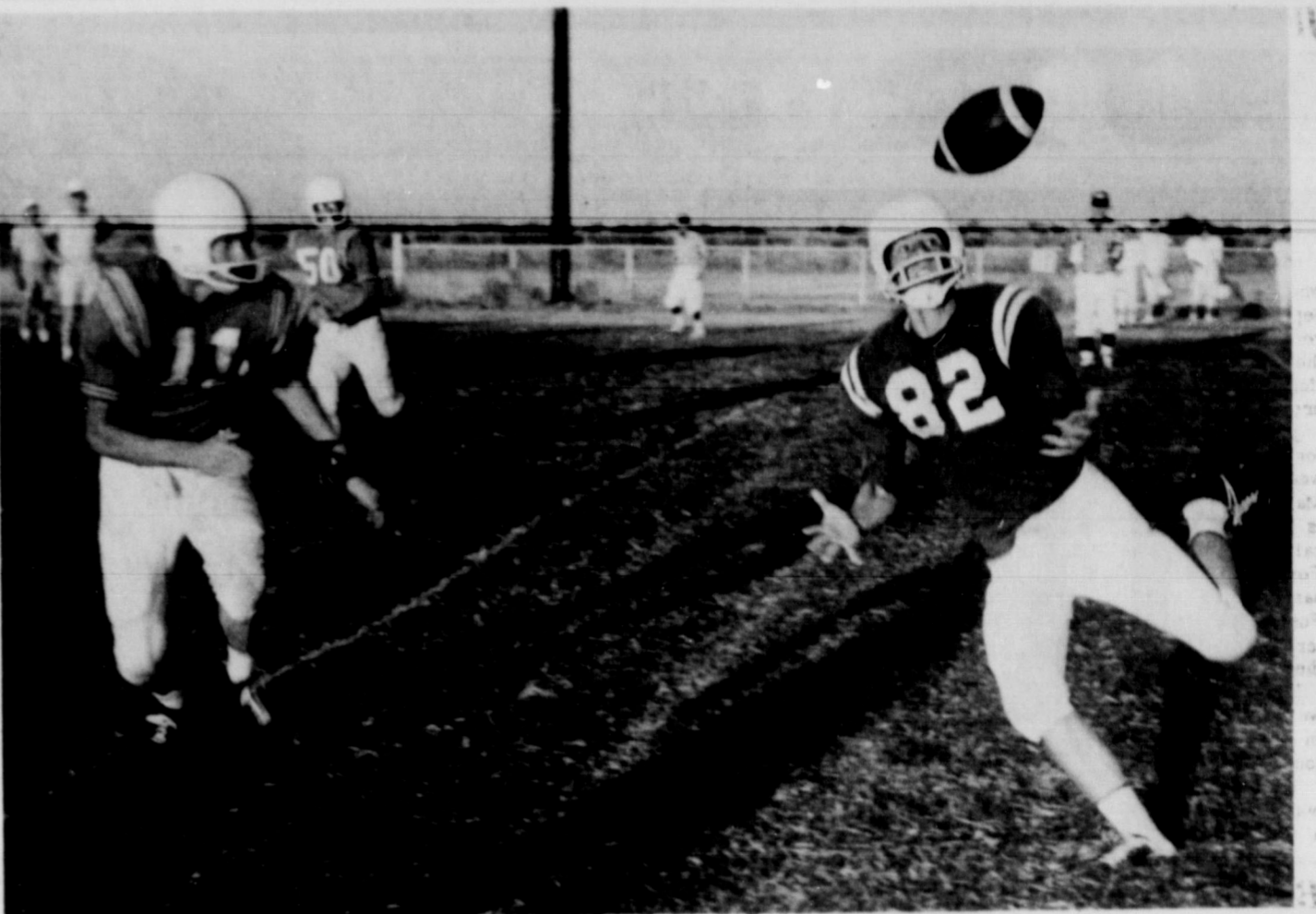
Friona's other oldest rival, Dimmitt, has the best record against the Chiefs of any team on the 1964 schedule. The Bobcats hold a commanding 21-5-1 edge over Friona in games since 1931. The Chiefs' 20-0 win at Dimmitt last fall snapped a 14-game losing streak to Dimmitt dating back all the way to 1944.

Actually, it could be said that Olton has the best percentage

against the Chiefs, since the Mustangs haven't lost in five meetings with Friona. Otherwise, Sudan holds a 6-2 edge, and Hale Center has won both previous games between the teams.

The Chiefs snapped several streaks last year, notably the 27-game losing streak, longest in the state at the time. With wins over rivals Farwell and Dimmitt this year, Friona could claim two "streaks" of their own.

By beating the Steers, Friona could claim the first back-to-back wins over Farwell since 1957 and 1958, but another win over Dimmitt would be even more rare. The Chiefs have not beaten the Bobcats two straight games in 30 years. Friona won, 12-0 in 1931 and 49-0 in 1934 after no games were played for a couple of years. The Chiefs have never beaten the Bobcats in three straight meetings.

STEERS HOLD 15-11 EDGE

Friona, Farwell Have Locked Horns 27 Times

According to University Interscholastic League (UIL) records, Friona and Farwell have met on the gridiron 27 times since 1931. League records show that the Farwell Steers have won 15 of those games, to 11 for Friona. One game, in 1941, ended in a 0-0 tie. That figures out to a .574 winning percentage for the Steers, who had won four straight games going into last year's season opener, in which Friona turned the tables for a 26-13 win.

The two teams have played every year since 1949, and Farwell is the only team to be met every year in the period.

Farwell and Friona also met 12 times between 1931 and 1941, playing twice (home and home) each year on at least four occasions, in 1935, 1936, 1938 and 1940.

Biggest margin of victory in the rivalry belongs to the Chiefs, who beat the Steers, 81-0 in the 1934 game. That also stands as the most points scored by either team against the other and most total points for both teams in the series.

Farwell's largest point-production in the rivalry came four years later (1938) in the second meeting of that year, a 72-0 win for the Steers.

Eight of Friona's 11 victories in the series have been by shut-outs. Farwell, meanwhile, has shut out Friona seven times.

And on one occasion (1941) the teams played to a nothing-to-nothing tie.

Closest game (outside of the tie) in the rivalry was in 1950, when Farwell came from behind for a 20-19 win. The Chiefs had led, 19-6 after three quarters. Again in 1953, Friona led

14-0 at halftime, only to lose, 20-14.

On at least three occasions the game was decided by less than a touchdown. Farwell won 13-12 in the second game of 1936; the Steers won 18-14 in 1955 and Friona took a 15-12 win in 1958.

1963's Eight Victories Stand As Season High

Last year's record of eight wins turned in by the Friona Chieftains has been verified as the most wins in any one season, for a Friona High School team, at least as far back as records have been kept by the Interscholastic League, and presumably since football has been played at FHS.

High school principal Raymond Cook coached two consecutive teams that won seven games. His 1952 eleven won seven and lost two during the regular season, and won the district crown. However, they lost to Idalou in bi-district. Cook's 1951 team compiled a similar 7-2 mark.

The 1940 team at FHS had a 7-3 record, coached by Eddie Williams.

At least four other teams won as many as six games. Two of these were coached by Colle Huffman. His 1957 team won the district championship with a 6-2-1 mark, but lost to Falls in bi-district, 21-12, to finish at 6-3-1. Huffman's 1958 team posted that same record.

The 1944 team, which lost to Hereford in a playoff for the district title, was 6-5, and ten years earlier, in 1934, that team finished with a 6-1-1 record, losing only to Hereford and being Adrain, 0-0. That team wound up the year by blasting rival Farwell, 81-0.

Complete records are not available prior to 1931, but according to records supplied by individuals most wins which have been accounted for prior to 1931 has been four.

On The Farm In Parmer County
BY JOE VAN ZANDT
County Agent

Is the storage bin on your farm insect-free and ready for those soon-to-be-harvested grains?
Stored grain insects inflict enormous losses upon grain producers each year. Insects destroy an estimated two per cent of the nation's farm-stored grain each month.
Among the most destructive stored grain insects in Texas are rice or corn weevils, lesser grain borers and Angoumois grain moths.
Protection against these pests is begun by storing grain only in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned. Old grain, trash, feed sacks and other debris that furnish living quarters for insects should be removed. Cracks should be covered to prevent grain from collecting, and grain and other material beneath and near the bins should be destroyed.
After cleaning, spray the inside with either methoxychlor or malathion at the rate of about two gallons per 1,000 square feet of surface area. It should be remembered that grain to be stored should be clean and sound and have moisture content of 12 per cent or less.
Also, when filling the bin, allow adequate working space for fumigation and inspection of grain.
Premium grade malathion may be used as a grain protectant on wheat, oats, rice, corn, rye, barley, grain sorghum, peanuts and field or garden seeds. It can be applied as a dust or spray at the time the grain is being placed in final storage.
Several liquid fumigants are effective in killing weevils and beetles which feed below the grain surface. Some of these include ethylene dichloride, carbon tetrachloride and carbon disulfide (Hi-Life).
Before fumigation, spray the outside of the bin with a residual spray such as malathion to kill insects that may be forced out of the building by the fumigant. The bin should be made as tight as possible before fumigation and the grain surface be level to insure even penetration.

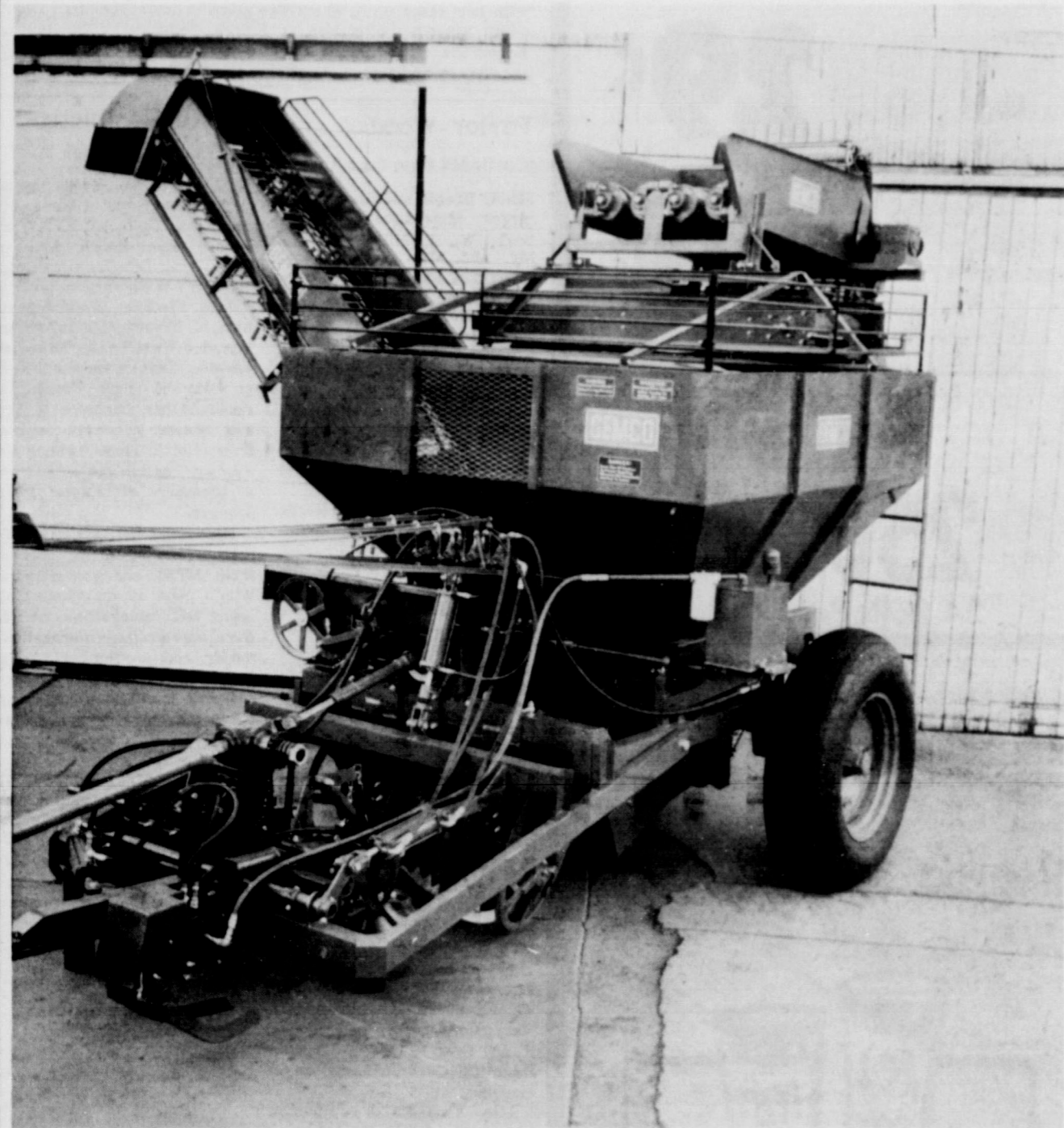

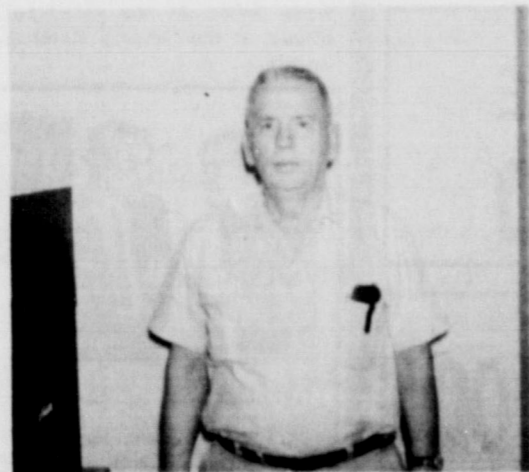
