Lightfoot Forced To Make Second Speech

Standing before a microphone in a Galveston broadcasting station, a few nights ago, Jewel P. Lightfoot, former attorney general of Texas, soared to oratorical leights on the subject of Al Smith and Tammany Hall political designs, when all of a sudden "bam! . went the radio. The machinery was out of commission, the custodian announced, and beyond repair that night. If anyone from the enemy camp was responsible, he did not prevent the distinguish ed orator from addressing the radio audience the next night.

"Tammany Hall," said Mr. Lightfoot, "has a long record. It professes to cherish, but at heart it always intends to exploit and debauch them. The most terrific blow ever dealt to Tammany in its long and guilty history was the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act."

After picturing Tammany's regaining of strength by leading the forces for the repeal of prohibition, Mr. Lightfoot asked, "Is it any wonder that the rum fleets of the seven seas formed a ring around the port of New York and flooded the country with its booze?" and declared, "Is there any man in this country above another responsible for any breakdown in prohibition enforcement, that man is the nominee of the democratic party for president of the United States.'

The very basis of the Tammany movement to make Al Smith president, Mr. Lighfoot charged, was to bring about public contempt for the prohibition laws and a sentiment for their modification and ultimate repeal.

Many in W.C.T.U. Revolt And Work to Elect Smith

West Texas Utilities Increases Horsepower

growth.

With completion of a new 20,000 horsepower generating station at Lake Pauline, increasing the available capacity of the company to 70,000 horsepower and the building of hundreds of miles of new transmission lines over the properties, the West Texas Utilities Company has anticpated the electrical development of West Texas oil fields for several years:

The use of electric energy for drilling, pumping and operating of pipe lines has become generally accepted by the majority of oil companies as the most economical with less fire hazard, experts declare. And companies operatig in West Texas have been among the first to adopt electrical power.

Perhaps the most outstanding example of this type of power is found in the Yates field of Pecos county where provision has been made to de velop more than 200 wells by the use of electricity. Of some 500 producing wells in this field 156 are using electricity; six gathering stations are using electrical enegry and 15 pipe line stations are electrical. HOOVER BETRAYED FARMER, PEEK

Gives Proof That Candidate Was Responsible for Low Price of Wheat.

BORAH "EITHER IGNORANT OR GUILTY OF FRAUD"

CHICAGO-Senator Borah is either ignorant of Herbert Hoover's record or is "willfully guilty of fraud" in his campaign speeches to Western farmers, George N. Pesk, noted farm leader and former chairman of the Industrial Conference Board of the Department of Commerce, has charged in a telegram to Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican National

Mr. Peek, who is active in behalf of Governor Smith because of the Governor's stand on the farm relief question, directly challenged the truth of Senator Borah's statements and the claims of the Republican campaign managers. He said:

"I realize that I am insisting upon s good deal when I demand fairness and facts from the Republican National Committee and its spokesman, judging from the claims made in Mr. Hoover's behalf.

"Senator Borah in his address at Minneapolis raised a serious question of veracity as between himer'

and Ma Hoover. Hoover held up the price of wheat Moreover a large part of the Repub lican campaign among the farmers built on this claim. This is fraud.

"The records prove that if wheat had not been 'controlled' the price would have risen as did the prices of other cereal crops that were not controlled. It would have advanced as corn advanced and as oats advanced and would have sold for at

"I say that Mr. Hoover used every prices and I submit in proof of this assertion Mr. Hoover's own words.

Held Prices Down "Early in April, 1919, Mr. Hoover to me, from which I now quote.

"'If the control of wheat were removed during the next two or three months in the face of the world situation, prices in this commodity would advance materially beyond the present level. I wish to repeat that unless some superior force intervenes, we intend to hold the price of wheat to the figures it has stood at during the entire war under Con-

gressional guarantee.'
"On May first, 1918, Mr. Hoover, then Food Administrator, in a public

"'I agree with the contention of some farmers that they would be get-ting \$5 and perhaps \$10 a bushel for their wheat if it had not been for the restraint imposed by the government.

"I repeat that either Senator Borah and other Republican leaders are wholly ignorant of the 'record' which Senator Borsh so persistently quotes, or he or they are guilty of fraud

"I insist that you and other Republican leaders inform Senator Borah, other speakers and the public whether the cable from Mr. Hoover in 1919 or the claims of Republican leaders now as presented in the campaign text book and in the public statements of republican speakers are a fraud.

"Somebody is not telling the truth. The public will be interested in knowing who it is."


In a speech in New York City, on April 22, 1920, reviewing the work done by his Food Administration, Mr. Hoover said:

West Texas Utilities

AN ORDINANCE to authorize the West Texas Utilities Company to construct, maintain, and operate an electric light and power plant and distribution system in the City of Rankin, Uptor County, Texas.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rankin, Texas, that the West Texas Utilities Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Texas, its successors and assigns, is hereby granted a franchise or right of-way in, upon, across, and along the streets, alleys, and public grounds of the City of Rankin, Texas, for its, or their use, for the purpose of erecting, constructing, and maintaining all necessary needful and convenient poles, pole lines, posts wires, transformers, guy posts and guy wires, apparatus and appliances to properly and successfully locate, construct, maintain and operate an electric light and power plant and distribution evatem in the City of Rinkin, Texas, for a period of hfty (50) years from the passage of this ordinance.

Section 2. The West Texas Utilities Company, its successors and assigns, shall so set their poles and place their wires and appliances so as not to interfere with the ordinary travel and use of the streets, alleys and public grounds and shall so maintain same during the life of this franchise.

Section 3. The West Texas Unlities Company agrees to save and keep harmless the City of Rankin Texas, and the City Council of said City from the claim or claims of all persons arising out of the construction, maintenance and operation of their said electric light and power plant and distribution system.

Section 4. The West Texas

to furnish light and power, during the life of this franchise to all
public and private consumers and
shall have the right to extend its
lines upon the streets, alleys and
public grounds of any addition or
additions hereafter made to the
City,s corporate territory, and to
use the streets, alleys and public
grounds for lines to conduct light
and power to points beyond the
corporate limits of the city.

Section 5. The contracts made with and the rates charged the public and private consumers in this city by the West Texas Utilities Company, its successors and assigns, shall at all times be reasonable and just and shall not exceed the amount charged in surrounding cities who are furnished like service under like conditions.

Republican Panic

So marked is the impetus taken on by Governor Smith's campaign as election day draws near, that Republican leaders everywhere manifest signs of genuine panic.

The G. O. P. high command sees the 'writing on the wall' in the East. Their campaign managers in the Northwest, where the LaFollette Progressive vote is lined up behind the Democratic candidate, are distracted by a sense of impending disaster. Their hope of breaking the Democratic dominance of the South is vanishing. And now a threat of utter rout comes with the tremendous reaction to Governor Smith's speeches in the border States.

Not without significance in its betrayal of the extreme anxiety of the Hoover politicians, is their insistent call upon President Coolidge for advice, for help, for reassurance.

The President did not choose to give Mr. Hoover the active aid in the campaign which G. O. P. leaders had deemed so desirable. What he did offer was aloof encouragement. The Republican candidate, he told the anxtous politicians, which are to win. He advised Mr. Hoover to keep cool, not to be stampeded into any rash act, not to say too much. And Mr. Hoover, it is apparent, has been influenced by that advice in his speaking campaign.

The publication in New York newspapers of President Coolidge's optimistic statements was followed immediately by a trip to Washington by Charles D. Hilles, New York National Committeeman, and H. Edmund Machold, who recently resigned his water power associations to become the Republican State Chairman in New York.

They, too, tried desperately to dispel the defeatest atmosphere which has fallen over Republican campaign workers from Massachusetts to Montana. "The situation in New York looks very good," they assured Mr. Hoover Tark Land the assertion with figures which were far in excess of the most partisen estimate given out by anyone in close touch with conditions in that State.

conditions in that State. At the same time M. William Bray, chairman of the Democratic State Committee, was completing his annual canves of county chairmen. According to the official reports of these chairmen, Governor Smith's vote in the counties outside of New York City, will be 20 precent greater than in 1924 when the Governor was elected on the Democratic ticket although the State was carried by Coolidge. In 1924 Covernor Smith's vote in the up-State districts was 600,000; reports of the county chairmen show that this year it will approximate 1,000,000. As in the past, the Governor is sure of an overwhelming materity in New York



It was information of great consequence. Discovery followed discovery. Not only was oil discoved in a formation hitherto considered barren of cil, but it was found in amazing quantities, the initial daily production per well often running into five figures, and in one field such production is obtained at the shallow depths of 1000 to 1800 feet. Of 25 State Department heads, 14 are Protestants and 11 are Catholics. Eight are Republicans, 3 are Independents and 14 are Democrats.

Of 156 other State officials whose appointments require the approval of the Governor, there are 106 Protestants, 33 Catholics, 11 Jews and 7 undesignated.

In every case, regardless of all other considerations, Governor Smith appointed the person be thought best fitted for the office.
