

The tax imposed, after deducting exemptions are: average Net profit on all pro-1 1-2 percent on next \$4000; 3 per cent on next \$4000; 5 percent on remainder. This is similar to the Federal law except that the Federal law imposes surtaxes in addition. The tax on corporations is 5 percent on net income. The individual and corporation is allowed to deduct the Federal income tax in addition to the other usual deductions, before calculating taxes under this bill.

The bill provides that the total collected thereunder shall be deducted from the sum total that the State now can levy as ad ad valorem tax for general revenues echools, and Confederate penzions; the State ad valorem tax will be reduced to the extent of the collections under this bill. It is estimated that the bill will provide a sum equal to the State ad valorem tax (64c per \$100) collected for the year 1928; and will elimate the State ad valorem tax.

This bill will reguire income reports from the identical individuals and corporations now eequired to make returns to the Federal Government, and at same period.

The tax will affect the individ uals as follows:

A married couple with one child having an income of not more than \$3900 would pay no tax; a married couple with one child having a net income of \$5000 would pay a tax of \$16.50; under like conditions with an income of \$7500, would pay a tax of \$91.50 with income \$20,000, would pay a tax of \$365; and with income of \$30,000, would pay a tax of \$865. To determine whether under this bill the tax would be increased or decreased, each can calculate what his State ad valorem tax is or would be, and compare with the tax that will be due hereunder; the tax hereunder replacing the State tax. No two cases will be exactly alike, but on the average, the taxes imposed hereunder will be practically the same as the State ad valorem.

The tax imposed on corporations under this cill, as compared with the State ad valorem tax, is as follows:

A corporation with a capital of \$100,000, earning a net profit of 8 percent before deducting Federal taxes, would pay a State income tax of \$352, and using the 1928 tax rate as a basis, would be releived of an ad valorem tax of \$384, which would have been due of property to the extent of \$100,-
