

Each week at the Star we receive a newsletter from our U. S. Congressman, Walter Rogers. We aren't able to print it weekly, because we tend to need all our news space for local news.

However, Mr. Rogers' contribution this week was one which we thoroughly enjoyed, and thought our readers would as well. Therefore, we're reprinting it in its entirety:

I remember quite well when I was at the University, the marathon dance fad swept the Country. A poor bedraggled couple would dance, or perhaps "stand and shake" would be a better term for it, until they dropped from utter exhaustion. The two who avoided total exhaustion longest would win the prize.

The fad caught on to the extent that there were some pretty sizable money prizes being offered to the nuts who had little enough sense to strain their mental and physical facilities in such a manner.

It was the prize money that probably appealed to most of the college students who participated, and there were a great many. Food and lodging were hard to come by in those days, and I suppose some of the folks thought that since they had no place to go and nothing to eat, they might as well dance and maybe win a prize.

A few years later it became the popular fad to eat goldfish, without benefit of the frying pan, that is, just simply reach into the fish bowl, grab one by the tail, and swallow him whole.

This practice did not last too long, probably due to the lack of participants who were willing to pay any price for a little publicity, or a shortage of goldfish that increased the price to the extent that only the well-to-do could enjoy the game. I have always suspected that it was the desire of the individual to be noticed that prompted most of these crazy ideas.

Then, along came the flag pole sitting era. Some screwball with nothing more to do would pack a light lunch, tuck a pillow under his arm, skin the nearest flag pole and perch on top of it until inclement weather or total exhaustion drove him down. I don't know who finally won the title, or who presently holds it, but I do think that the prize should have been a minimum of two years in some mental institution.

After the flag pole era came the practice of seeing how many young people could get into a telephone booth. I don't know how many finally succeeded, but I was of the firm opinion when this was going on that the best solution to that problem would be to lock the telephone booth after they were all in and disconnect the telephone.

Then came a period when Russian roulette was popular. This was discontinued, I understand, because too many were losing the game and the ranks of the "kooks" (formerly known as nuts, screwballs, and crackpots) were being thinned alarmingly. It is also pointed out that those who lost the game and received the publicity which they were seeking, were unable to enjoy it.

We are now going through another similar era in which these same type eccentrics are engaging in marching, demonstrations, and sit-ins. They daily parade in front of the White House or any place that they think they can receive attention. They pose as representing all shades of the political spectrum, the economic spectrum, and the spiritual spectrum.

They invade the halls of the Nation's Capitol and other public buildings, and engage in what they call civil disobedience. In a great many instances, this so-called civil disobedience is nothing less than a violation of criminal statutes and ordinances for which the participants should be held responsible.

Their actions and deeds encroach upon and invade the rights of honest, law-abiding citizens who are the basic strength of this Nation. The laws of this Nation and all of its States provide for proper hearing and redress of the grievances of any individual citizen or any group. It is never intended by the founders

Annual Meeting Today For Electric Co-op

Two Friona High School students will compete against each other for the right to earn an 11-day trip to Washington, D.C. at the annual meeting of the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Inc. today in Hereford.

The annual meeting gets underway with registration starting at 10:30 a.m. today. The annual free barbecue for members will be served beginning at 11:30 a.m. at the Bull Barn.

The two students competing for the Washington trip are Tommy Sherley and David Smith, who are finalists in the cooperative's first annual oratorical contest. A Bovina girl, Connie Vaughn, will compete against Maura McAndrews of

Hereford for a similar prize in the girl's division.

Competition in the "Government in Action" youth contest will begin shortly after the afternoon session is called to order at 1 p.m. Presiding at the meeting will be Sloan H. Osborn of Friona, president of the cooperative's board of directors.

Patronage checks totalling \$194,000 will be refunded to members during the meeting.

During the business session two directors are to be elected for the cooperative. Candidates are Webb Gober of Farwell and A. W. Anthony of Friona for the Farmer County position, with Raymond Higginbotham and

Robert Strain running for the Deaf Smith County spot.

Electrical appliances will be on display at the Bull Barn during the meeting.

Door prizes will be awarded throughout the meeting, with a grand prize given just prior to the close of the meeting. All members of the cooperative are urged to attend the meeting.

NEWS PICTURE DIVISION

Star Takes First Place In Newspaper Contests

The Friona Star brought home another first-place plaque from the 56th annual Panhandle Press Association convention last weekend in Amarillo.

The award, for best news pictures, was presented as a highlight of the convention. The association annually sponsors contests which member newspapers are eligible to enter.

In winning the news picture award, the Star beat out another Farmer County newspaper, the State Line Tribune of Farwell, which placed second, and another neighbor publication, the Hereford Brand, which was third.

Bill Ellis, editor and manager of the Star, accepted the award. It was the sixth first-place trophy won by the Star in the past three years, during which time Ellis has served as editor. Also, it marks the fifth straight press contest the local newspaper has entered that a first-place award has been won.

The Star had won two first-place awards in last year's Panhandle Press Association contests, having the top entries in "best woman's page feature" and "best special edition." By winning these last year, the newspaper was ineligible to enter those divisions this year. It will not be able to enter the news pictures division next year.

In two of the other three divisions the local newspaper entered, it received "honorable mention" in the "best editorials" and "general excellence" divisions.

In the judges' comments on the Star's winning entry for the news pictures division, it was stated:

"The Friona Star scores heavily both on quantity of pictures and quality of reproduction. In some cases pictures which would barely merit use in two columns are quite effective in four columns. This

is noteworthy achievement of offset printing."

"Star photographs show a degree of composition and storytelling action which goes beyond average performances on small papers. The difference may be as slight as having the subjects pay attention to the news objects rather than watching the camera, or looking in some unexplained direction.

"Cutlines are commendably brief, yet they explain what needs clarification and they give a sense of timeliness. The photographer has a grasp of the skin tones needed in the offset process. Large photos are also profitably used in advertising."

Also attending the convention from Friona were Mrs. Ellis, and Pete Mace, advertising manager of the local newspaper.

F.H.S. Announces Honor Students For '65 Class

Karen Sue Osborn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Osborn, has been named valedictorian of the 1965 graduating class at Friona High School, and Dennis Howell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Howell, is salutatorian.

Miss Osborn compiled a four-year grade average of 95.23, to edge out Howell, whose average was 94.98.

In all, there were ten students of the 65 seniors who had four-year grade averages of 90 or above, along with Brenda Hawker, exchange student whose one-year average at Friona also is above 90. Others with averages which were 90 or above were:

Nan Lillard, 93.44; Julia Dennis, 92.70; Brenda Hawker, 91.83; Sharon Dean, 91.73; Lynn Wilson, 91.61; Sheryl Long, 90.62; Carol Struve, 90.49; Robert Stewart, 90.30 and Pat Burton, 90.02.

In achieving her top average, Karen had only one semester grade under 90 in four years and that was a grade of 89.

Miss Osborn was active especially in band and homemaking during her four years in high school. She was a member

of the "all-regional" band her senior year, and served as Future Homemakers president as well as winning the state FHA degree.

Karen was a member of the

National Honor Society three years, and was a member of the Student-Faculty Congress four years, an office given her by classmates. A student member of the American Field Service committee, Karen's hobbies are reading and piano.

Chosen as a school favorite in balloting each year, Karen has been awarded titles such as "Most Admirable," "Most Courteous," and "Best Dressed" by her classmates. She plans to enroll at Cotter College in Missouri this fall.

Howell, also a three-year member of the National Honor

Society, has served as president of the organization the past year. He has been a member of the Student-Faculty Congress three years.

This year, Dennis was named "Most Likely to Succeed" in the annual school balloting. His hobbies are reading and farm-work.

Howell has been active in the Future Farmers of America chapter, where he served as vice president, and also has been active in sports. He hopes to study medicine, and plans to enter Wayland Baptist College in the fall.

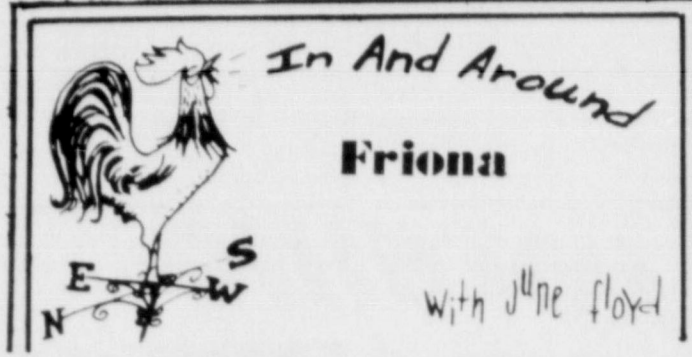
Revived by the State Tournament director and helpful Friona associates, Barbara re-

NEW 4-H CLOTHING LEADERS In Friona, Mrs. Franklin Bauer and Mrs. C. M. Phipps are Clothing group leaders. They are not new leaders, but this is their first time to work with Clothing groups.

Training for Leaders in the first year guides was given in the Home Demonstration Agent's office, last Friday with a total of five leaders attending. These leaders are now ready to start work with their groups, working with 1st. year girls. They will help 4-H girls develop

into useful citizens through the Clothing project work. The Clothing guides for 1st. year members include nine lessons. These girls will learn to select and care for sox, use the sewing machine, use sewing tools and develop good sewing habits, be well groomed and make a simple gathered skirt. LEADER TRAINING FOR 2ND. YEAR GROUP

On May 5, at 1:30 p. m. in the Oklahoma Lane Community Center adult leaders of second year Clothing groups will be held.

This group will receive instruction in the use of the Clothing guides. In this Unit, girls will learn to read instruction and use a pattern, select appropriate colors and materials, to care for their clothing and make a "shift" dress or simple blouse. Mothers of 4-H girls are urged to attend the planning meeting for these groups and give assistance and cooperate with the leaders in making the Clothing project an achievement for all girls.

On The Farm In Parmer County

This summer weather in April has really warmed things up for us in a hurry the past 10 days.

SEEDLING RATE CALIBRATION
Since planting time is here and I've had a few people ask me about calibration of planting equipment, let's discuss this subject.

First, we'll discuss grain sorghum. The number of pounds of seed per acre required to obtain a desired stand depends on the variety because of differences in seed sizes and planting conditions. About 55 to 65 per cent of the planted seed will produce seedlings; therefore, seed must be dropped closer than the desired stand.

A rule of thumb is to plant 1 pound of seed for each 700 pounds expected yield. This method applies whether single or double row planting will be used on 40 inch centers, but slightly lower rates should be used with double rowed sorghum.

Recommended seeding rates are based on average-size seed. Since seed vary in size, a check

on the planters in the row is time well spent. More pounds of large seed are required than of small seed to obtain the same stand. The following table shows the distance between seed in the row for different seeding rates of average-size seed. A desired stand can be established regardless of seed size, if the estimated seeding rate fits the expected growing conditions and the seed are dropped at the right intervals.

Now let's discuss cotton seeding rate calibration. Best results are obtained from a planting rate of 24 to 30 pounds of seed per acre. This optimum rate applies to all types of seed. Where acid-delimited seed are used, the poundage may be reduced by not more than 10 per cent. Covering to a depth of 1 1/2 to 2 inches gives best results.

The quantity of cotton seed required to give desired plant spacing in 40-inch rows assuming 60 per cent emergence and 4500 seed per pound is shown in the following table. We need to shoot for a plant spacing of 4 to 6 per foot of row.

SPARROW PROBLEMS
We have had several calls this past 10 days on sparrow control. English sparrows can be quite a nuisance around a farm or home and hard to control.

The control methods we could suggest are: 1. Eliminate Nests and Roosts, 2. Shooting, 3. Trapping, 4. Screening and 5. Poisoning.

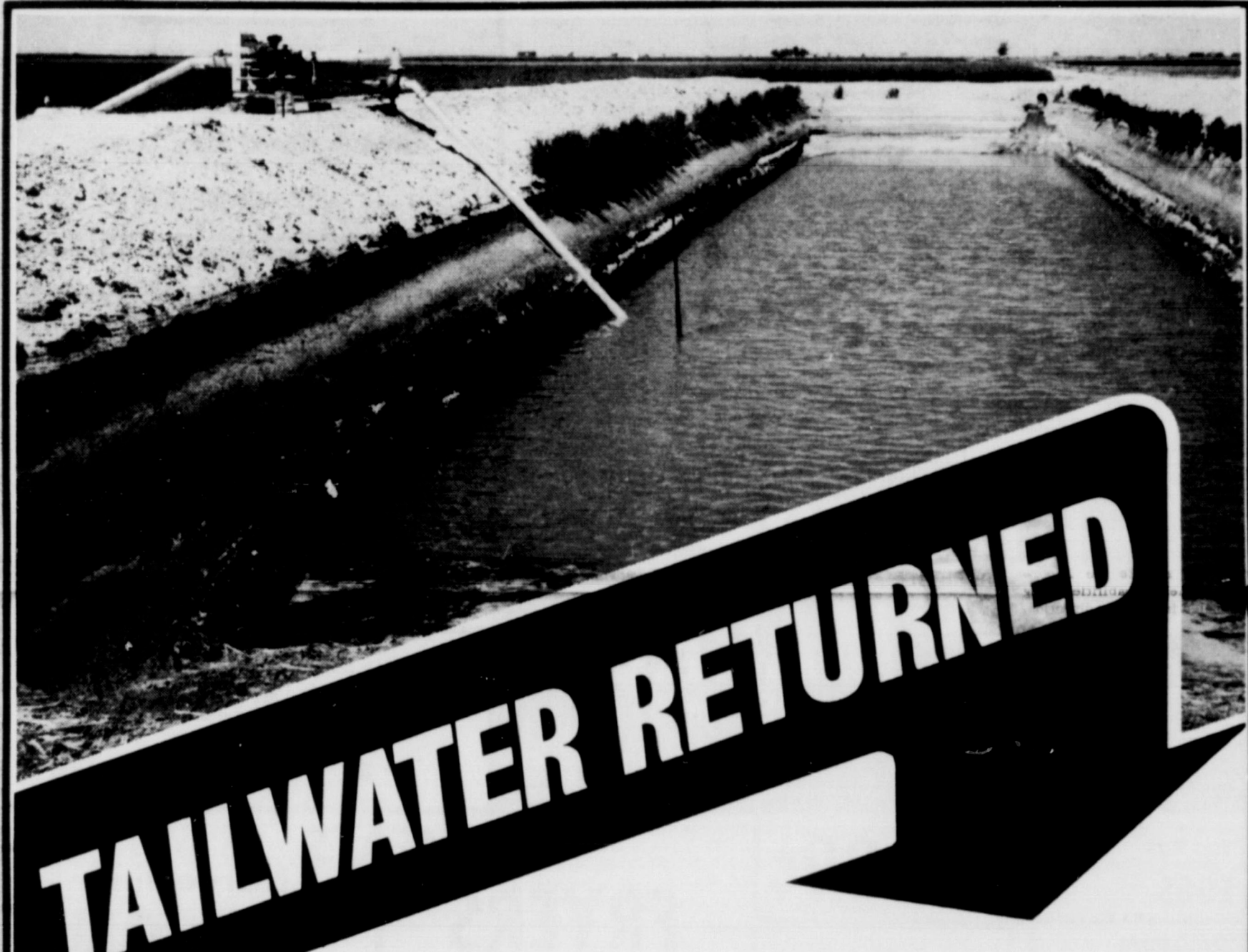
Sparrow populations can be greatly reduced by destroying nests and eggs at two-week intervals during the spring and summer. Fasten a hook on the end of a long pole to assist in destroying nests. Careful consideration should be given to elimination of nesting and roosting site as this may offer

the best permanent solution. Shooting can be hazardous and should be handled carefully. It can eliminate or greatly reduce infestations if applied with persistence.

Trapping is another sparrow control method that can be employed to reduce your sparrows. We suggest you build a trap about 4 feet square or larger and 6 inches deep. Cover one side with 3/4 inch mesh poultry netting. Make a small opening near a corner to remove the trapped birds through. Pre-bait for several days to attract the birds. Then place the trap over the bait with one edge raised and place an 18-inch stick under it.

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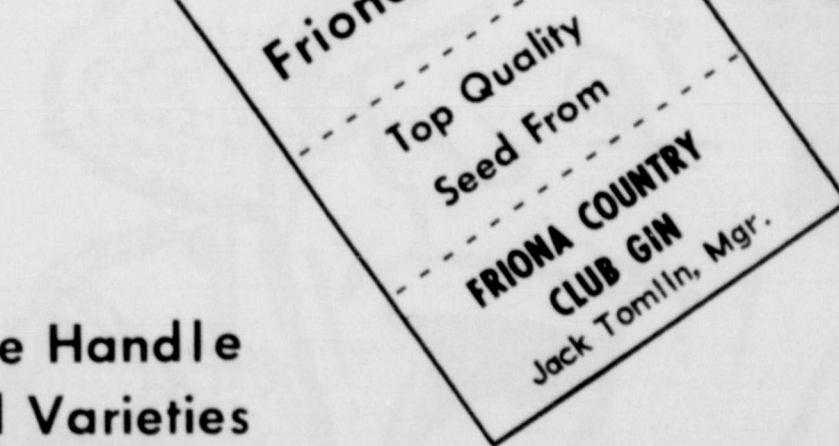
