Easier Way To Get Johnson Grass

There is an easier and cheaper method of getting Johnson grass out of the cotton field other than hoeing. It is known as spot oiling.

Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist, in response to many requests from over Texas for information on the equipment needed for doing the spot oiling job, has made available to the county agents plans for a gravity flow hand sprayer.

This type sprayer is recommended because it is cheap and a good application job can be done with it, says Elliott. They may be built in the farm shop or by a local tinner. Included on the plan is a complete listing of all the materials needed to do the construction job.

Elliott says that other types of light portable sprayers if already available may be used for applying the oils. In the case of pressure sprayers, only 10 to 12 pounds pressure is recommended, and a fan type nozzle should be used.

The cotton specialists say that many different type application rigs have been tried by research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station but the most thorough job of killing all the grass with the least damage to cotton plants was done by a man with a small tank of oil on his back and a trigger type assembly for getting the oil on the Johnson grass crowns.

Farmers interested in securing plans for the gravity sprayer are advised by Elliott to contact the local county agent.

Judge J. H. Carpenter, 87, was married last week to Mrs. Lee D. Parks, 88, of De Leon. They are making their home at Eagle Cove, 3 miles northwest of Denton Valley.

They didn't rush into marriage because they had known one another for 65 years before they even discussed the idea of matrimony.

Judge Carpenter's wife died in 1953. Mrs. Carpenter had been a widow for 50 years. She had lived in De Leon since 1903.

Both Judge Carpenter and his new wife have reared families. He has six children and Mrs. Carpenter had two children, one son living. Judge Carpenter and his wife both have extensive land interests in Scurry and Callahan counties.

The judge was born in Kentucky in 1863 and moved to Texas with his parents in 1880. He lived in McCulloch and Bosque counties until 1889 when he moved to Scurry county. He moved from there to Howard and Yoakum counties before coming to Callahan county in 1913. He has lived on the same place for 42 years. He was named sheriff of Yoakum county in 1911 and was a commissioner there, also. He also served as a director of the Production Credit Association in Coleman.

Election of 1956 Committeemen—Ballots for use in voting in the 1956 ASC Community Committee election were mailed to all persons on our mailing list on August 8, 1955.

Ballots are to be returned by mail or in person to the county office at Baird by August 17, 1955. Any eligible voter who failed to receive a ballot may obtain one by contacting this office.

The persons elected Chairman of the Community Committees will also serve as Delegates to the County Convention. Vice-Chairmen will serve as Alternate Delegates. The County Convention will be held on August 26, 1955, for the purpose of electing the County ASC Committee for 1956.

Every eligible voter is urged to cast a ballot in this election.

Winter Legumes Cover Crop Practice

We expect that a 1955 practice for seeding a winter legume cover crop in the fall of 1955 will be added to the list of approved practices for the county in the near future. Under this practice Federal cost share will be offered for seeding hairy vetch with a nurse crop of rye, oats, or barley and Dixie wonder peas. The rate of cost share will be approximately 50 percent of the average cost of seed and fertilizer.

The cover crop cannot be har-

vested for seed or hay. Grazing consistent with good management will be permitted.

Underplanting 1956 Wheat Allotments

The Secretary of Agriculture announced that if as much as 75 percent of the 1956 farm wheat acreage allotment is planted to wheat, the farm will be considered as having the full allotment planted in 1956 for the purpose of determining future wheat acreage allotments.

Wool Referendum

August 19, 1955 is the final date for casting a ballot in the wool referendum. The question to be decided by growers in the referendum is whether or not a part of the price support payment which may be due on wool, lambs and yearlings marketed during the 1955 marketing year will be deducted for use by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., in advertising and promoting the sale of wool and lambs.

Ballots were mailed to known eligible voters. If you are eligible to vote in this referendum and did not receive a ballot, please contact this office.

Marketing Quota Penalty Rates For Excess Cotton and Peanuts

Marketing quota penalty rates for 1955 have been estab-

lished as follows:

Cotton - 17.7c per pound
Peanuts-6.1c per pound

Marketing quota penalties will apply only to those farms on which it is determined that there is excess acreage.

Increase in Amount That May Be Earned Under 1955 ACP

The maximum amount of Federal cost share that may be earned by an individual partnership, etc., for carrying out approved practices on farms and ranches in the county has been increased from \$700.00 to \$1000.00.

This increase in the amount that an individual may earn in the county does not in any way change the \$1500.00 limit on payments which a person may earn

under the 1955 ACP on all farms and ranches in which he has an interest in all counties and states.
