FROM RUSHING

Council Discusses Request To Re-Imburse Line Costs

The Friona City Council discussed at length Monday night the possibility of re-paying Eric Rushing for a water line running from the city's water system to newly-annexed Western Addition.

The discussion came after Rushing requested repayment for the line, which he put in two years ago.

Council members felt, by and large, that Rushing should be re-imbursed according to the same type of program under which developers are reimbursed for their water and sewer costs as their property is developed.

In accordance, the council passed a motion to allow the city manager and mayor to enter into contract with Rushing to pay him 20 per cent of the cost of the line; the remaining 80 per cent to be paid back over the next five years, completely if the property is as much as 75 per cent developed.

In other business, the council tabled a motion for repainting the lower one-third of the North Water Tower, which had been bid at \$355 by Chicago Bridge and Iron Company.

Notation was made of a letter from Municipal Investment Corporation of Lubbock confirming the finance arrangements for paving Welch Acres,

newly-annexed addition to the northeast.

Acknowledgement was made of the resignation of Bill Sheehan as city attorney. Appointment of Richard Colliard as his replacement was made.

Discussion was had on the city's participation in costs of a water main extension from Etts Avenue under the school paying to part of Staley Addition Number 3. The participation was granted, provided that the developer participate in the sewer expense as well.

A letter was received from the State Highway Department relative to the relocation of the city limits sign farther west on U. S. Highway 60, since recent annexations. The letter stated that as property along both sides of the highway was not now within the city limits, the sign could not be re-located.

In his monthly summary of activities at the City Office, City Manager A. L. (Jake) Outland pointed out that there were two special council meetings during June. One was for the purpose of awarding a contract for water and sewer improvements, and the other was to pass Ordinance 377, declaring a necessity for paving certain streets within the city.

Six changes of ownership in city properties were reported

from the county clerk's office during the month.

Six building permits were issued. One was for a new residence, valued at \$13,500. Another was a new service station (Conoco) at \$5,000. Four permits were issued for additions or alterations valued at \$900, for a total for the month of \$19,400 in construction.

The water department showed that a total of 15,510,300 gallons of water were pumped during June, considerably less than the preceding month, and also less than the corresponding month a year ago, due to the fact that 5.47 inches of rainfall fell during the month, the most since June of 1963.

Four new water taps were made to bring the total number in active service to 1002. The 1000th service was installed on June 24 at the new high school football field.

H. V. Hancock, State Health Department representative, visited the department and installations during the month. He seemed well pleased with all functions of the water producing and distribution systems, and was complimentary of the new appearance of the west ground storage tank.

Five new sewer taps were made during June, to bring the

total number of active services to 934 at the end of the month.

Five fire calls were reported during the month by the Friona Volunteer Fire Department. Four of the calls were within the city limits for a total estimated loss of \$55 and one was outside, estimated at \$10 lost.

Regular drills were held June 3 and 17. Six firemen and their wives attended the state firemen's convention in Laredo June 8-10 and participated in competitive fire drills.

The police department reported 24 arrests during the month. Ten were for traffic violations, six for drunkenness, two for driving while intoxicated, two for theft, one for minor consumption and three for shoplifting.

Investigations included four for shoplifting, one break-in, one theft and two vehicle accidents.

The first use was made of the new tail-gate gravel spreader recently purchased by the city. Employees report that it works fine.

Additional stop signs were installed along Seventh Street and Grand Avenue, in anticipation of additional traffic around the new high school.

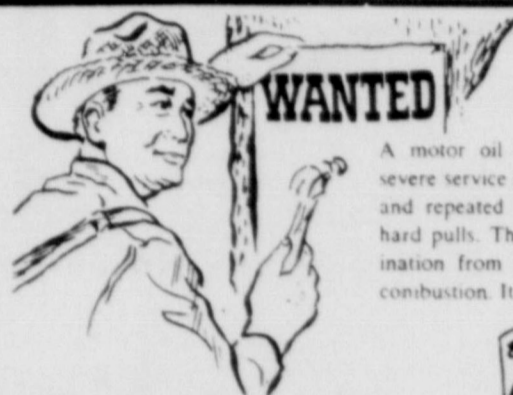

LEGAL NOTICE

RESOLUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF PARMER

RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING ESTIMATES OF THE COST OF IMPROVEMENTS, OF AMOUNTS TO BE ASSESSED FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN THE NATURE OF GRADING, LAYING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAVING PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS, AND AVENUES IN AND ALONG THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR HEARING OF THE OWNERS OF ABUTTING PROPERTY, AND OTHER PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID PROPERTY AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO PUBLISH NOTICE ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, WHEREAS, the governing

body of the City of Friona has heretofore ordered that portions of the streets, highways and avenues be improved by grading, installing concrete curb and gutter and paving with caliche base and triple asphalt surface together with incidentals and appurtenances, and arrangements therefore have been made and entered into by the City of Friona, Texas, with L. A. Furtell, Contractor, and, WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Friona has caused the City Engineer to prepare and file estimates of the cost of such improvements and estimates of the amounts per front foot to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof, and such estimates have been approved and examined;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, BY WHICH IS MEANT THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY, sometimes referred to as the City Council:

Section 1. That the estimates prepared by the City Engineers, Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Consulting Engineers, be and are hereby adopted.

Section 2. NOTICE TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING UPON THE HEREBELOW MENTIONED PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND AVENUES AND TO ALL OTHERS AFFECTED:

The governing body of the City of Friona, Texas, has heretofore ordered that the following portions of streets, highways and avenues in and along the boundaries of the City of Friona, Texas, be improved by raising, grading and filling and installing concrete curbs and gutters and installation of sewers and drains where necessary on streets, highways and avenues hereinafter designated, and it is hereby found and determined that the amount per front foot in each unit proposed to be assessed for such improvements against the abutting property and the owners thereof on the portions of said streets, avenues and highways improved and the total costs of improvements on such portions of said streets, highways and avenues are the amounts set forth in the respective following paragraphs which cover the units therein designated, to wit:

Unit 1-65, 14th Street (Except Nelson Welch Property) from the East Property Line of Pierce Avenue to the West Property Line of Walnut Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$5.44; estimated total cost of improvements \$9,303.04.

Unit 2-65, 13th Street from the East Property Line of Virginia Avenue to the West Property Line of Maple Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$3.88; estimated total cost of improvements \$2,556.40.

Unit 3-65, 13th Street from the East Property Line of Jackson Avenue to the West Property Line of Virginia Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$3.88; estimated total cost of improvements \$2,556.40.

The arrangements for the making and construction of such improvements with pavement of

triple coarse asphalt surface treatment and a six (6") flexible base has been made and entered into by the City of Friona, Texas, and the rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts to be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof, have been filed with the City, and such rolls and statements showing other matters and things, have been approved and the City Council of the said City has fixed a time and place for hearing to the owners of property abutting upon said portions of streets, highways and avenues and to all others affected, at which hearing the amounts to be assessed against the respective parcels of abutting land and the owners thereof, for improvements in the units upon which the particular parcels of property abut, and the amount of benefits to the respective parcels of property by means of the improvements in the unit upon which the particular property abuts, the regularity of the proceedings with reference to such improvements, the apportionment of the cost of such improvements, and other matters and things will be determined, and after such hearing, assessments will, by ordinance, be made and levied and such hearing will be had and held by and before the City Council of Friona, Texas in the City Hall of the City of Friona, Texas, on the 9th day of August, 1965, at 8 o'clock P. M. The rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts of such assessments are on file in the office of the City Secretary and open to inspection of any interested parties at any time and of all said matters and things, all such owners of property, as well as any others in any wise affected or interested will take due notice.

By order of the City Council of the City of Friona, Texas, this 19th day of July, 1965.

No notice other than hereinbefore provided for shall be necessary but publication of such notice shall be due and sufficient notice to any and all other persons, firms, corporations, and other parties.

Section 3. That a hearing be given and held by and before the governing body of the City of Friona, Texas, to all persons owning or claiming any property abutting any part of portion of said streets, high-

ways and avenues described in Section 2 of this resolution, as well as owning and claiming any interest in such property. Such hearing shall be given and held on the 9th day of August, 1965, at 8 o'clock P. M. in the City Hall of Friona, Texas, and the City Secretary is hereby directed to give notice of the time and place of such hearing, and of other matters and facts in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Laws of the State of Texas and Article 1105(b), Texas Revised Civil Statutes, 1925 as amended. Such notice shall be by advertisement inserted at least three (3) times in a newspaper published in the City of Friona, Texas, the first publication shall be made at least ten (10) days before the said hearing. Said notice shall comply with and be in accordance with the terms and provisions of this resolution and said act as amended.

On motion of Alderman Reeve, seconded by Alderman Hicks, the foregoing resolution was passed on this 19th day of July, 1965, as shown by the following vote:

Highway Patrol Books 12 Accidents In June

The Highway Patrol investigated 12 rural traffic accidents in Parmer County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for eight injuries and an estimated property damage of \$8,569.

The rural traffic accident summary in Parmer County for the first six months of 1965 shows a total of 60 crashes resulting in two persons killed, 29 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$33,706.

"As of the first of this month, there had been a total of 1,040 fatal crashes in Texas taking lives of 1,261 persons," the Sergeant stated. This is approximately two per cent less than for the same period of 1964; however, if past trends continue, we will in all probability

exceed the all time record high of 3,006 persons killed in traffic crashes experienced in Texas last year.

"Texas was fortunate over the 4th of July weekend in that the predicted number of persons were not killed, but we cannot brag, as 25 persons were killed over the holiday while in the rest of the nation we experienced a great increase over last year, and set a new all time record for deaths over the 4th of July holiday just as we did during the previous Memorial Day holiday," Wells said. The veteran Patrol Supervisor concluded that with the vacation season well underway more vehicles will be traveling streets and highways, and he called on all motorists to become more thoughtful in regard to complying with traffic laws in an effort to reduce the rising trend of traffic crashes.

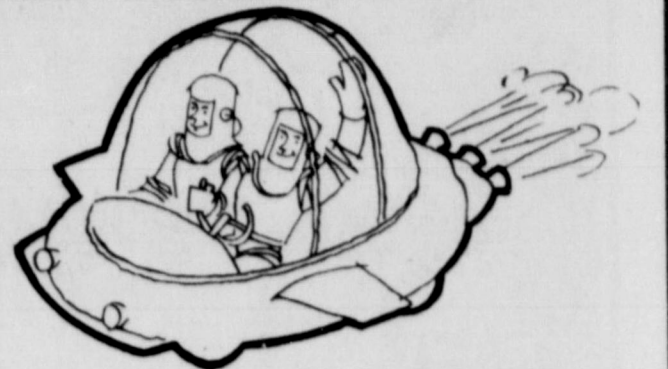
