30c Ad Valorem Levy To Be Decided Saturday

Small Turnout Seen As Little Interest Shown

Upton County property tax payers will go to the polls Saturday, May 12 to determine the fate of the proposed additional ad valorem tax of 30c in an election ordered by the Upton County commissioners court last month.

The purpose of the tax is for constructing and maintaining farm-to-market and lateral roads of the county.

The election was ordered after many citizens in McCamey and Rankin had approached the commissioners on calling the election asking for the additional tax levy, including the McCamey Chamber of Commerce.

Very little interest has been shown by the voters on the issue, and a small turnout is expected. There are some 700 qualified voters for the election. Voters in the election must be a county property tax-payer, in addition to holding a poll tax or exemption certificate.

Election places in Rankin are at the Courthouse and Rankin Park Building, while voters in McCamey will cast ballots at the McCamey Park Building, High School and C. W. Brown Pipe and Supply Co.

Voting hours will be from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The levy, if approved, will bring some \$90,000 a year into the county tills for the road program that is growing continuously with the expanding oilfields of the county.

Beginning with the year 1951, the 30c tax will not be levied by the state, but may be levied by the various counties, provided an election is held and voters vote to permit the commissioners court to make such levies.

4H Club Girls Hold Annual Dress Review

Rankin 4-H Club Girls held their annual dress review on Tuesday evening, May 8, at the elementary school auditorium as a part of the annual PTA program. Music was furnished by Mrs. Tom Workman and the agent acted as narrator.

In holding their dress review on this date, the girls not only showed some of the fruits of their year's work but celebrated an anniversary—the 37th anniversary of the Extension Service as we know it today. When President Woodrow Wilson signed the Smith Lever Act on May 8, 1914, it culminated more than ten years of pioneering in the demonstration method of teaching and training of leaders who were to carry on and expand this service to the people.

In 1903, Seaman A. Knapp, special agent of the US Dept. of Agriculture, was invited to Terrell, Texas, to discuss with the business men the serious condition in agriculture and business caused by the spread of the cotton boll weevil over Texas. The first demonstration on a privately owned farm was established that year near Terrell.

In 1906, Tyler appealed to Dr. Knapp for a man to give his entire time to their county and the first county agricultural agent was appointed. In 1910, the Extension Dept. was established at A&M College.

In 1911, the state legislature authorized county commissioners courts to appropriate money for cooperative demonstration work. By 1912, an agreement had been made between the US Dept. of Agriculture and A&M College establishing the work permanently in the cooperating counties. In this year also the first "lady agents" were appointed to organize girls' canning clubs. The first agent was employed in Millam County.

The next step was the passing of the Smith Lever Act which was 37 years old Tuesday. Extension service now has some 500 county extension agents in the state in addition to the headquarters staff of specialists and administrative personnel.

The work of this group, according to the law, is to "give instruction and practical demonstrations in agriculture and home economics to persons not attending or resident in college, and imparting to such persons information on said subjects through

MAY IS JURY SERVICE MONTH IN TEXAS

In olden times in the Orient, a person suspected of a crime was given rice to chew, then directed to spit it out. If the rice came out dry, this fact was considered positive proof that a crime had been committed. The theory was that fear of detection tends to inhibit the natural flow of the salivary glands.

Justice as we know it today is on a much sounder basis than the rice-chewing test. Our trial-by-jury system is the insurance we have against the fear of losing our lives or property without just reason.

The fact that we prefer a country with the advantage of free speech, free press, freedom of religion, and trial by jury has been evidenced again and again in the wars we have fought to preserve these rights.

We are willing to fight on the battlefield for our freedom and for our liberties, but our indifference, carelessness and laziness toward the use of our individual rights indicate that we are unwilling to live for them day by day. At least that is what one would think judging from the results of a survey just completed by the American Citizenship Committee for the State Bar of Texas. That survey revealed that 23 percent of the citizens summoned for jury service in Texas begged to be excused.

Did these persons actually feel that the parties involved were not entitled to a fair trial by an impartial jury? Or did they just fail to realize the responsibility that rests upon a citizen to accept jury service as a citizen's duty in helping to maintain law and order and fairness and justice? We are inclined to believe that the latter is true, and heartily endorse the campaign of the State Bar of Texas and the Texas Press Association in designating MAY as JURY SERVICE MONTH by asking every TEXAN to render willing jury service when called upon—that justice may be preserved.
