

## McCamey To Gulf Coast Pipeline Announced

### Downing Ousted As Iraan School Superintendent

In an interview with W. N. Wortham, acting president of the Sheffield Independent School Board of Education Wednesday morning following a twelve-hour session of the board on July 9, Mr. Downing made this announcement to the public:

"Mr. Downing is not with the Iraan-Sheffield School system any more, as of July 15."

When asked why Carlton B. Downing was no longer in the Iraan school system and for what grounds he was dismissed, Mr. Wortham's answer was, "No comment."

Mr. Wortham further stated, "Prior to July 15th the Iraan High School Principal was employed as superintendent of McCamey Schools, and the Iraan Elementary principal was employed as superintendent of Rochelle Schools, and Band Director Charles Vick was employed as band director of McCamey High School, and the girls physical education teacher had resigned to enter the employ of the Houston School system, and as far as known, all other members of the teaching staff will return for the 1951-52 school year."

In reference to the lengthy session held by the board of education Mr. Wortham stated, "Carson Montgomery and E. J. Giblin resigned from the Board. The Board voted to not accept their resignation, however, efforts made by the Board for them to continue as members, were not successful."

Mr. Wortham further stated, "In the event these men cannot be induced to remain on the Board, they will be replaced by appointees selected by the remaining Board members, which constitutes a majority quorum."

In reply to a query as to the filling of the Superintendent's vacancy, Mr. Wortham stated, "Efforts are being made by the Board of Education to employ a superintendent, the Board being assisted by superintendents of schools of nearby towns, and by members of the educational staff of Sul Ross College."

Mr. Wortham emphasized, "I am aware of the necessity of selecting a superintendent as soon as possible, but will not overlook the fact that careful selection to obtain the proper man for Iraan School System is to be considered uppermost."

Other sources disclosed that \$7,200 was paid to Mr. Downing for his unexpired contract for 1951-52.

Members of the Board of Education at the present time are, W. N. Wortham, R. E. Shipp, J. S. Paulley, R. W. Burnett, and H. A. Holmes. Seven men constitute a complete Board.

### Upton Officer Goes To Arizona For Forger

Deputy Sheriff Joe Bolin left early Sunday morning for Phoenix, Ariz., to return Tom Webb, alias Dolph Jack Levell, to Upton County to face charges of forgery.

Webb was indicted under the name of Lovell by the grand jury of the 112th District Court last month on a charge of giving a worthless check over \$50, but new charges were filed this week by the Upton County Sheriff's office for forgery against Webb. The charge will come before the grand jury of the 83rd District Court in September.

Webb was arrested in Phoenix last Friday.

### Mrs. Rodenberg Attends School For Mothers Of Deaf Children

Mrs. W. R. Rodenberg of Rankin attended the first summer sessions for mothers of deaf children which was held at the Texas School for the Deaf in Austin from June 6 to 16. Thirty-one mothers from various parts of Texas attended the school, in which Mrs. Rodenberg states "mothers of deaf children who feel there must be something they can do to help their children are taught what they can do as only specialists and experts can advise one."

She also says it is hoped to hold a session of the school each year and to publicize the project so mothers all over the state will know about it and can take advantage of its opportunities. Mrs. Rodenberg was much impressed by the instructions received by the mothers in regard to how to help their deaf children of pre-school age. She says there is much one can do, if you know what to do and how to do it. Mrs. Spencer Tracy was one of the principal lecturers at the school and did much to lift the morale of the participants.

This is a beginning venture, the initial and perhaps principal benefit of which is the sharing of the problems among the mothers so that each realizes that her situation is not unique. The ten-day session provided an opportunity for the mothers of pre-school deaf children to see specialists with whom many would never have an opportunity to counsel. It gave help on the basic problems presented by their children's deafness and helped their children get what their hearing friends gained principally by mimicry. The school was sponsored by the Texas School for the Deaf in cooperation with the State Department of Public Welfare, the State Health Department, the Hobb Foundation, the Texas Education Agency, and the University of Texas.

Mrs. Spencer Tracy shared with the mothers her experience as the mother of a pre-school deaf child. The son of Mrs. Tracy and the famed motion picture star who is now 26 years old, was discovered to be deaf when 10 months old. The mothers attended classes in the mornings of the ten day school and heard a special lecturer every afternoon. A staff of teachers from the Texas School for the Deaf provided the instructional opportunity and were assisted by special lecturers who spoke on various aspects of deafness and the treatment of deaf children.

As this was the first summer school, many mothers did not know about it. Mrs. Rodenberg accidentally learned of it from a clipping sent to her by a friend and it is hoped many more mothers can take advantage of the school next summer.

### Official Potential Is Reported In Upton

Official daily potential of 696 barrels of 41.4 gravity oil has been reported for Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-H McElroy, Pennsylvania discovery in NW Upton County.

The potential was based on a 6-hour flow of 173.88 barrels thru a one-half inch choke and open hole from 9,109 to 9,250 ft., plugged back depth.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,610-1. The pay was acidized with 2,000 gallons.

Location is 1, 980 ft. from east and north lines of section 169, blk. E, CCSD&RGNG survey. It is six miles NW of the Wilshire-Pennsylvania-Ellenburger field and two miles east of the NE side of the Shallow McElroy field.

### Six Major Companies On 32 Million Project

Plans were announced in Houston Wednesday for building a 24-inch, 477-mile pipe line from McCamey to the Houston ship channel area. It will cost more than \$35,000,000. It will have an initial capacity of 209,000 barrels of oil daily, and an ultimate capacity of 315,000 barrels daily.

It will be a multiple ownership project with six companies participating. Shell Pipe Line Corp. will design, build and operate the line. Other participants are to be Sinclair Pipe Line Co.; Pan American Pipe Line Co.; Phillips Pipe Line Co.; Nantucket Pipe Line Co., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Eastern States Petroleum Corp., Inc., and Tidewater Pipe Line Co., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Crown Central Pet. Corp.

The new facilities will be called Rancho Line. It will run from McCamey by way of Eldorado, LaGrange and Genoa, to Pasadena, Harrisburg and Deer Park.

Plans call for receipt of oil from

owners' connecting lines at connecting points. At Genoa, the Rancho Line will connect to a line terminating at Texas City, and between Harrisburg and Deer Park it will connect with the refineries of Eastern States, Sinclair, Crown Central and Shell, and with Phillips' Terminal, all on the Houston ship channel.

Three pump stations will be built initially near McCamey, Eldorado and LaGrange, but eventually this number will be increased to eight, making it possible to increase the line's capacity to 315,000 barrels daily.

Completion of the line and facilities is scheduled late in 1952. Work will start as quickly as the green light is given by the Production Administration for Defense, it was stated.

The line will serve an area in the West Texas Permian Basin fields, which produces more oil than there are facilities for moving it to market.

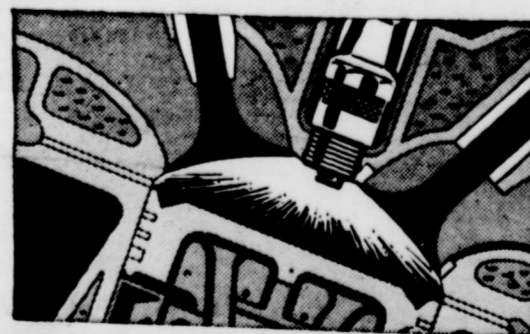

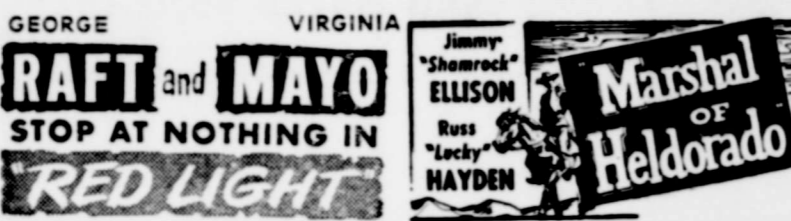

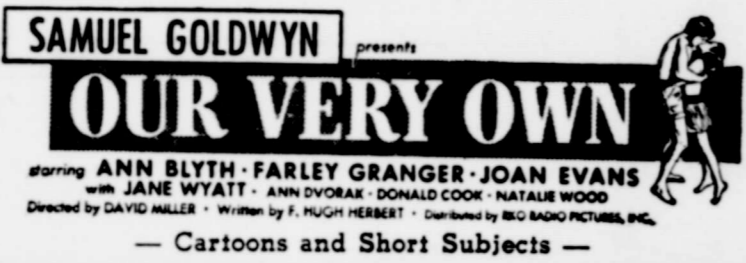
