

## ROAD BOND ELECTION NOVEMBER 24

### Petitions Presented To Commissioners Monday

The Upton County Commissioners Court ordered an election to be held on Saturday, Nov. 24, to determine whether or not \$1,050,000 will be spent building roads leading into the several fast-growing oil fields in Upton County. The election was ordered at a meeting of the Commissioners Court Monday when they were presented with petitions carrying the names of 99 qualified poll tax payers and property owners of the county.

In order to vote in the election, a person must have a poll, or exemption, and have property rendered on the county tax rolls.

The roads laid out in the proposal would service the Wilshire-McElroy field in east-central Upton County, the Pegasus in the north-central sector of the county, and the extensive Sprayberry development in the eastern and northeastern parts of the county.

Also, a mile and a half of pavement would be extended to the Upton County line leading to the Pecos County farming area south of McCamey.

The text of the petition is as follows:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Upton County shall be issued in an amount not to exceed \$1,050,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three (3%) per cent per annum, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twelve (12) years from the date thereof for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Upton County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said county sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

Among the roads thus to be constructed are the following:

Route No. 1. McCamey-Bakersfield Road from South County line approximately 1 1/2 miles Northward;

Route No. 2. From U. S. Highway 67 about 5 miles East of McCamey Northward approximately 3 1/2 miles through the Wilshire Field and to the North County line, about 7 miles East of the Northwest corner;

Route No. 3. From the Rankin-Midland Highway about 21 miles North of Rankin Eastward approximately 6 1/2 miles to connect with Route No. 4;

Route No. 4. From the Eastward paved road in the Benedum Field Northward approximately 23 1/2 miles to the North County line about 5 miles West of the Northeast County Corner;

Route No. 5. From the present paved road near the Shell Pump Station 3.2 miles Eastward connecting with Route No. 4.

Money remaining after constructing or providing for construction of the roads above specified may, in the discretion of the Commissioners' Court, be used for the construction, maintenance and operation of other roads in the County.

Word was received in McCamey this week of the death of Cpl. Darden Ridgway, son of R. B. Ridgway of Kyle, Texas, who was killed in action June 26, 1951, in the Korean War Zone.

The Ridgway family lived in McCamey when Darden was a baby in 1930-31 and will be remembered by friends here.

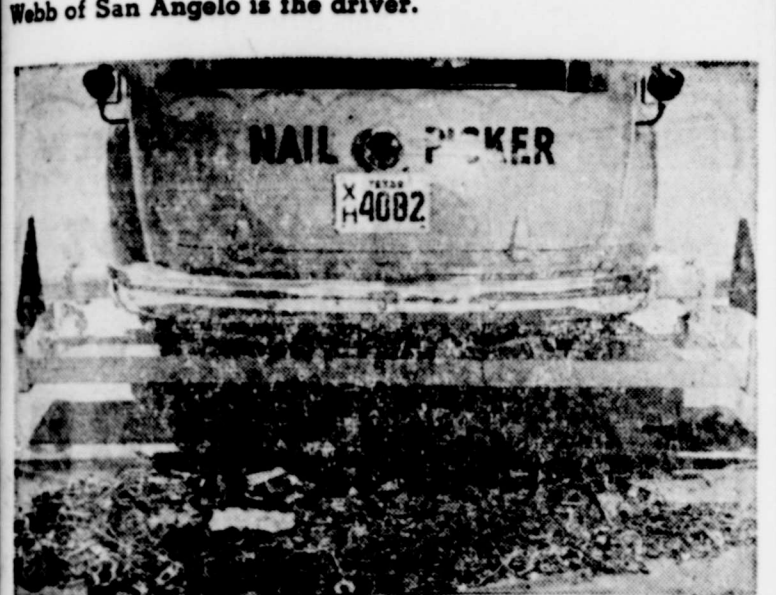

**UNMORALITY IN PUBLIC LIFE**

"There is no evil so readily understood or so quickly repudiated by the American electorate than unmorality in public office," writes David Lawrence in U. S. News and World Report. "It was a Democratic President - Grover Cleveland—who proclaimed that 'public office is a public trust'."

The recent disclosure of irregularities, influence-peddling and various unsavory practices in the Internal Revenue Bureau, the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, and other government departments have come as a profound shock to every thoughtful American. Like termites in a house, these evils gnaw away at the very foundations of the nation.

This is not just a matter of bribes and other clearly illegal acts. The law can deal with them. But there are certain borderline practices which are beyond the reach of law, and which lie within the realm of human conscience. In the recent investigations, men of great political power, who used that power to influence the policies of government bureaus, said that they violated no law. That may be true—but they did something as bad or worse—they violated every decent concept of decency, morality, and honor in government.

This is not a partisan matter. The old, degrading techniques of city-machine politics have been brought to Washington. The flies have found the sugar. The American people must make it unmistakably plain that, in the conduct of their government, they demand what David Lawrence calls "old-fashioned honesty, old-fashioned decency, and old-fashioned morality."

**THREAT IS REPULSED**

The chief officer of an oil company observed that a serious threat to the nation's future oil supply was repulsed when the U. S. Senate, by the overwhelming majority of 71 to 9, voted to retain the existing depletion allowance for oil producing properties. But, he warned, the depletion allowance is apt to come under attack again, by those who charge that it is a scheme by which the oil industry dodges taxes.

Actually, the depletion allowance—which was first approved by Congress in 1918—is essential if we are to have an oil industry capable of meeting our needs. It takes very large sums of money to locate oil—only about 20 per cent of wildcat wells prove valuable, and the rest are dry. And, once a well is found and developed, its value goes steadily down as the oil is removed. New wells must constantly be drilled both to make up for increasing demands, and to replace wells which are exhausted. So, the depletion allowance amounts to a necessary incentive for the risky business of oil exploration.

What would happen if the allowance were eliminated or, as has been suggested, sharply cut? The immediate result would be the virtual end of expansion within the industry. The next step would be oil shortages—with stalled automobiles, cold homes, and retarded operations throughout the whole industrial structure. The Senate's 71 to 9 vote was simply a recognition of this fact on the part of the lawmakers. The oil industry has done an extraordinary job in serving the nation in peace and war. It could not have done it without the depletion allowance.

**MUST WE LEARN THE HARD WAY?**

Thomas Paine and George Washington were well informed on the effect of the natural laws of supply and demand on the flow of commodities. In a letter on the efforts of those in government to force price control, Paine said: "They may force the price down upon the stock in hand, but after that the market will be empty. I will give you an example. In Philadelphia, we undertook, among other regulations of this kind, to regulate the price of salt; the consequence was that no salt was brought to market, and the price rose to 36 shillings per bushel. The price before the war was only one shilling and sixpence per bushel; and we regulated the price of flour till there was none on the market, and the people were glad to procure it at any price."

In the same letter he added, "The people of Paris may say they will not give more than a certain price for provisions, but as they cannot compel the country people to bring provisions to market, the consequence will be directly contrary to their expectations, and they will find dearth and famine instead of plenty and cheapness."

We are in no greater predicament today than the country was during the Revolution when it found no comfort in the regulation of prices.

Government spokesmen seem determined to pursue the fallacy of trying to regiment prices and dictate to the producer and distributor what their reward will be.

Contrasting 1776 with 1951, the Barnstable Patriot of Hyannis, Mass., says: "If the present attempt to fool the people while the value of our currency is destroyed is not soon abandoned, Congress will learn the hard way of the truth of Paine's and Washington's judgment of price controls."

**GRASS ROOTS OPINION**

Reading, Mich., Hustler: "Lincoln's deathless words, 'this government of the people, by the people, and for the people' expressed exactly the intent of the founders of this republic. That intent assumed the existence of an alert legislation-conscious citizenry, passing necessary restrictive measures through duly elected representatives. Thus was the greatest degree of personal freedom to be maintained that was consistent with an orderly society."

Gouverneur, N. Y., Tribune-Press: "We have embarked on a campaign to save the rest of the world from bankruptcy, social injustice and Communism, but we cannot hope to pursue it successfully, unless the government generally is prepared to reduce its costs to the point that we can afford to make the extraordinary contributions the times now demand of us."

Newberry, S. C., Observer: "Statistics bear out the fact that we Americans have boosted our total annual income considerably from the year 1929. In fact, the actual figures show that in 1929, the total annual income was about \$87 billion, and it has run up the national gross debt from less increase was grossed by wage earners of this nation. But back of it all is the fact that the government has been doing some increasing on its own account. Factually, it has increased appropriations from \$4.7 billion to more than \$52.8 billion, but last year a total of \$239 billion, or a 175 per cent than \$17 billion to more than \$257 billion."

Greenville, Texas, Evening Star: "On the average, only ten per cent of the nation's forest fires are started by lightning and other natural causes. Most of them are caused by burning cigarettes. The rest are started by smoldering camp fires."

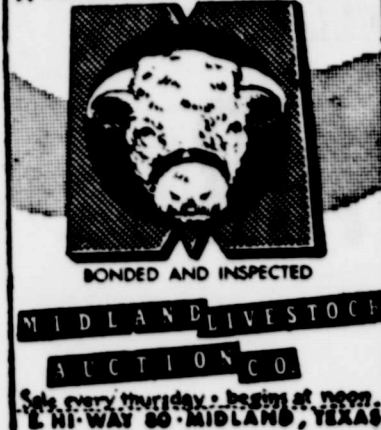

**Texas Voluntary Parole System Is Satisfactory And Economical**

AUSTIN. — Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd stated in a report to 10m workman, Rankin, chairman of the Upton County Voluntary Parole Board, that the Texas Voluntary Parole System is functioning economically and satisfactorily.  
 Shepperd reported that when he assumed the duties of Secretary of State in February, 1950, there were 600 parolees unaccounted for in Texas. He commended the Texas Voluntary Parole Board members for their cooperation and assistance in enabling the Department to reduce the number of missing parolees to 60.  
 The Texas Voluntary Parole positive and constructive program designed to aid the parolee in becoming worthwhile citizens of the community. Parolees, he reported, are released from prison on recommendation by the Board of Pardons and Parolees to the Governor for the granting of clemency. After clemency has been granted, a parolee is under the supervision of Parole Board members until expiration of his sentence.  
 The Parole System, Shepperd reported, has proved to be a sound program as a method of progressive public protection. The Annual Report of the Texas Board of Pardons and Parolees shows that in 1949 there were 11.6% parole violators. This figure was reduced to 3.8% in 1950.  
 Shepperd also praised the work of the members of the Voluntary Parole Board and cited several cases where through their efforts delinquents have been restored from the prison system to daily pursuits of everyday life.  
 Other members of the Upton County Voluntary Parole Board are C. G. Forester, McCamey.
