

## Hospitals For McCamey-Rankin Get Approval

### RANKIN CENSUS 2,082

In the recent census taken by the American History Class and the Youth Council, under the direction of Coach Joe Scrivner, 2,082 was the total officially counted. Because there are some rooms and apartments being newly rent-

ed from time to time, Mr. Scrivner reports that it was impossible to get a complete record. Also, the hotels reported that 130 transient guests are in Rankin every night, but those, of course, could not be officially listed.

The Youth Council has permission from the District Highway Engineer, Mr. R. L. Faltinson, of Pecos to change the census figures on the highway markers to 2,082.

### State Approves Aid To McCamey In Widening Highway 67 Through City

At a meeting of the State Highway Commission in Austin on February 19, a minute was passed whereby the state will participate in the widening and paving of Highway 67 through the city limits of McCamey.

The distance in the city limits is 1.2 miles. In order to receive the state assistance from the state in widening and paving the additional width, it is necessary that curb and gutter be established along the route. The cost for curb and gutter is estimated at \$1.75 a front foot. The council directed City Secretary Tom Nevinger to contact property owners along the route and discuss the proposal with them individually.

The contents of the minute read as follows: "WHEREAS, in Upton County on U. S. Highway 67, the City of McCamey has requested assistance in widening of pavement including incidental items thereto from West City Limit to East City Limit, a distance of approximately 1.2 miles; and

"WHEREAS, an analysis of the requested work indicates that such widening will be of material benefit to the traveling public;

NOW, THEREFORE, the State Highway Engineer is directed to tender the following proposal to the City of McCamey:

Provided the City will:

1. Furnish all necessary right-of-way clear of obstructions and free of property damage and provide for the immediate construction of continuous curb and gutter, utility adjustments, storm sewers, etc., all as may be necessary for a complete project with the exception of pavement widening.
2. Assume responsibility for the construction of driveways and sidewalks should they be deemed necessary now or in the future.

3. Maintain that portion of the work which is its construction responsibility and enter into agreements according to standard forms of the Highway Department to indemnify the State during and after construction against any and all liability or damage growing out of such construction, to regulate traffic, to provide for parallel parking and to prevent encroachment on the right-of-way.

The Texas Highway Department will:

1. Provide for widening pavement and its support within these limits at an estimated cost of \$64,600.
2. Maintain that portion of the work which is its construction responsibility.

It is understood that the responsibility of the Texas Highway Department is confined to the pavement and its support, and all other features necessary now or in the future to provide an adequate travel facility shall be the responsibility of the city of McCamey.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this Order by the proper officials of the City of McCamey the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the development of plans and when the City has fulfilled its obligations under this Order and when plans are complete, the State Highway Engineer shall submit the work for finance consideration of the Highway Commission in the next available program.

This Minute shall become operative upon acceptance by the City of McCamey and if not accepted within 90 days hereof shall be automatically cancelled.

Upon receipt of a certified copy of a satisfactory Resolution passed by the City officials of the City of McCamey, this Minute will be operative.

### Car Licenses To Be Sold In McCamey Beginning Wednesday

A temporary office will be located in the Justice of Peace quarters, Precinct 3, beginning Wednesday, March 19, to sell car license, Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector H. E. "Gene" Eckols announced this week.

The office will serve the people in McCamey and the surrounding area.

Eckols reminded persons with vehicles having out-of-state registrations that they must have their license processed through the office at the courthouse in Rankin.

He urged car owners to purchase the tags as early as possible to avoid the last minute rush. The office in McCamey will remain in operation through March 31, the final day that license may be purchased without penalty.

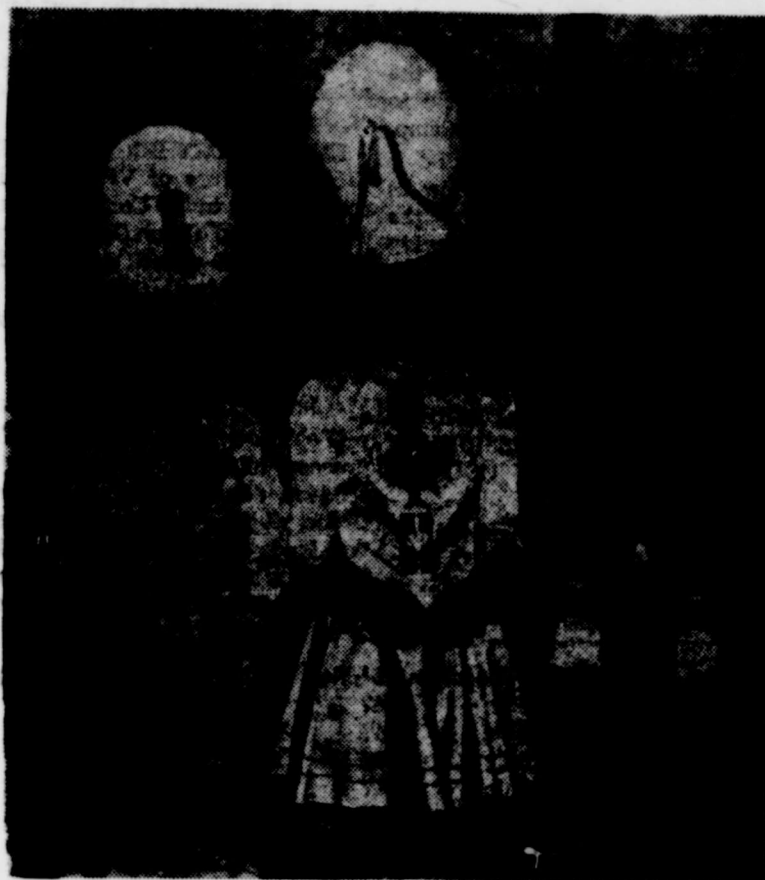
### Two New Businesses Open Here Recently

### Bond Issue Passed By Voters 327-211 Saturday

Upton County voters gave substantial approval to the \$300,000 hospital proposals at the polls last Saturday, with 327 votes cast for the proposition and 211 against.

Only one box voted against the proposal, that being box 1 in Rankin which voted 47 against and 44 for.

A heavier turnout of voters was made than was expected by most advance guesses" of observers. Most expected around 400 votes to be cast.

Only property taxpayers could vote in the election.

The returns from the election were canvassed and approved by the Upton County Commissioners Court Monday, and the body set Monday, March 24, as the day they would name an architect for the Rankin hospital to be built under the election proposition. The funds from the election will be divided equally between Rankin and McCamey for hospital purposes.

The proposition called for the purchase and improvement of the existing hospital facilities in McCamey, owned by Dr. James L. Cooper, and the court indicated in their discussions Monday that a licensed and bonded appraiser should be retained by the county to establish the price on the installation and equipment.

This action will probably be taken at an early meeting.

Several architects met with the Commissioners Monday, and several others have appeared before the group earlier this month. The body decided that it would be better to give the matter "due thought" before entering into contract.

### Letting On Wilshire Road Set For Today

Bids for constructing 29.4 miles of paved road leading north off Highway 67, about five miles east of McCamey, will be opened at a special meeting of the Upton County Commissioners Court this (Friday) morning at the court house in Rankin.

The road is a portion of the \$1,050,000 bond improvement approved by Upton County voters some two months ago.

The road leads north off Highway 67, goes through the heart of the ever-expanding Wilshire triple pay field, and on north to the county line at a point between the Pegasus and Sweetie Peck Field.

The bid-letting has been set for 10:30 this morning.

The construction on the project will be in two sections. The first will be about 12.6 miles leading north off Highway 67 to a point where the road will intersect the Crane-Rankin FM project. The construction leaves the FM road about five miles north and from their construction begins and continues for some 16.8 miles to the north Upton County line.

The construction on the east side of the county serving the expanding Spraberry Field was awarded last month to the Stafford Construction Co. of Lubbock and Amarillo.

The second fire occurred at the B. S. Taylor home on Tuesday morning about ten o'clock. The fire started from trash being burned by boys cleaning the yard. Several hundred dollars damage was done to the house and its contents by fire and water.

The Rankin Fire Department extinguished the fire but the high winds which were blowing on the occasion of both these fires made the task more difficult.

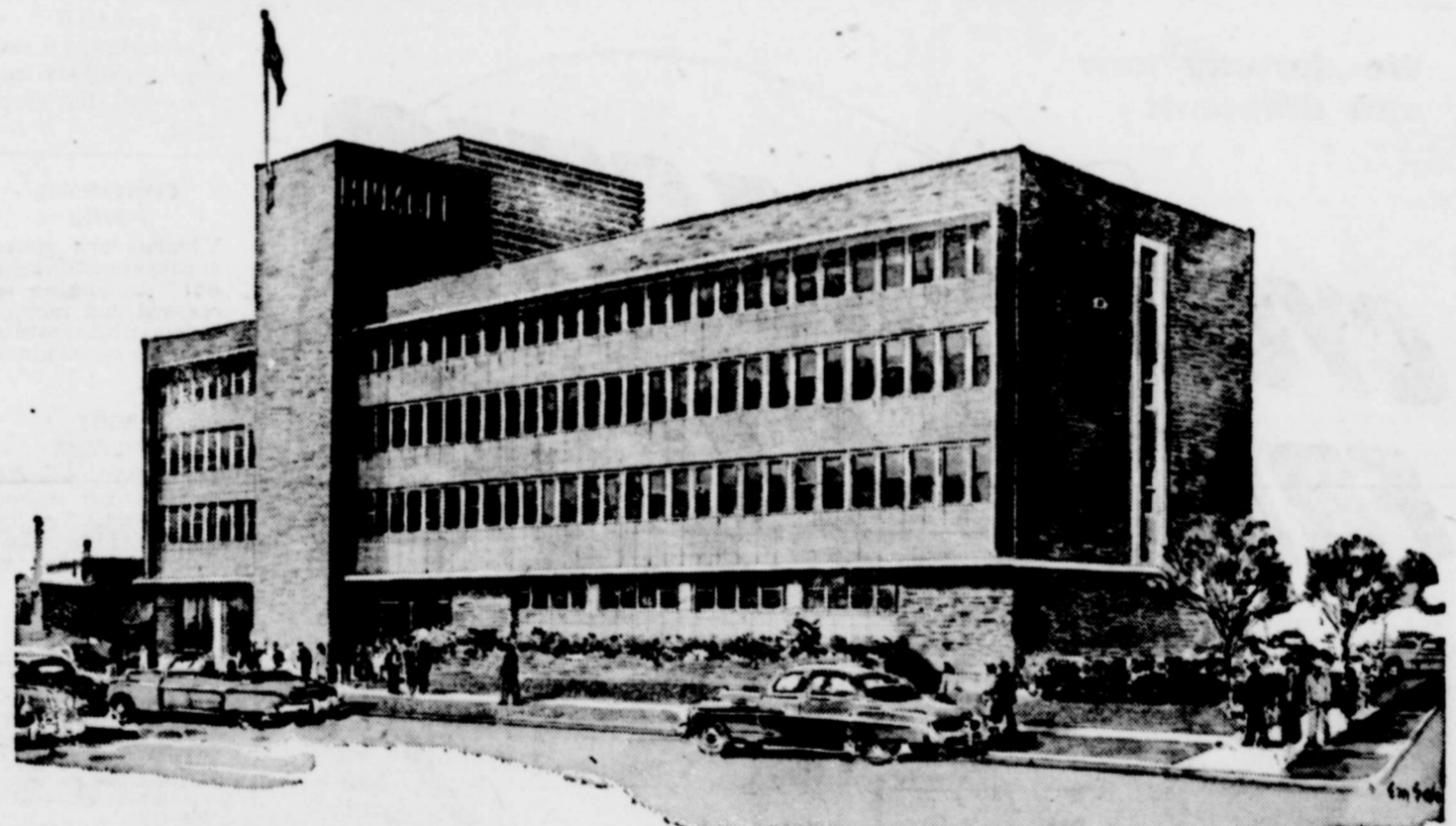

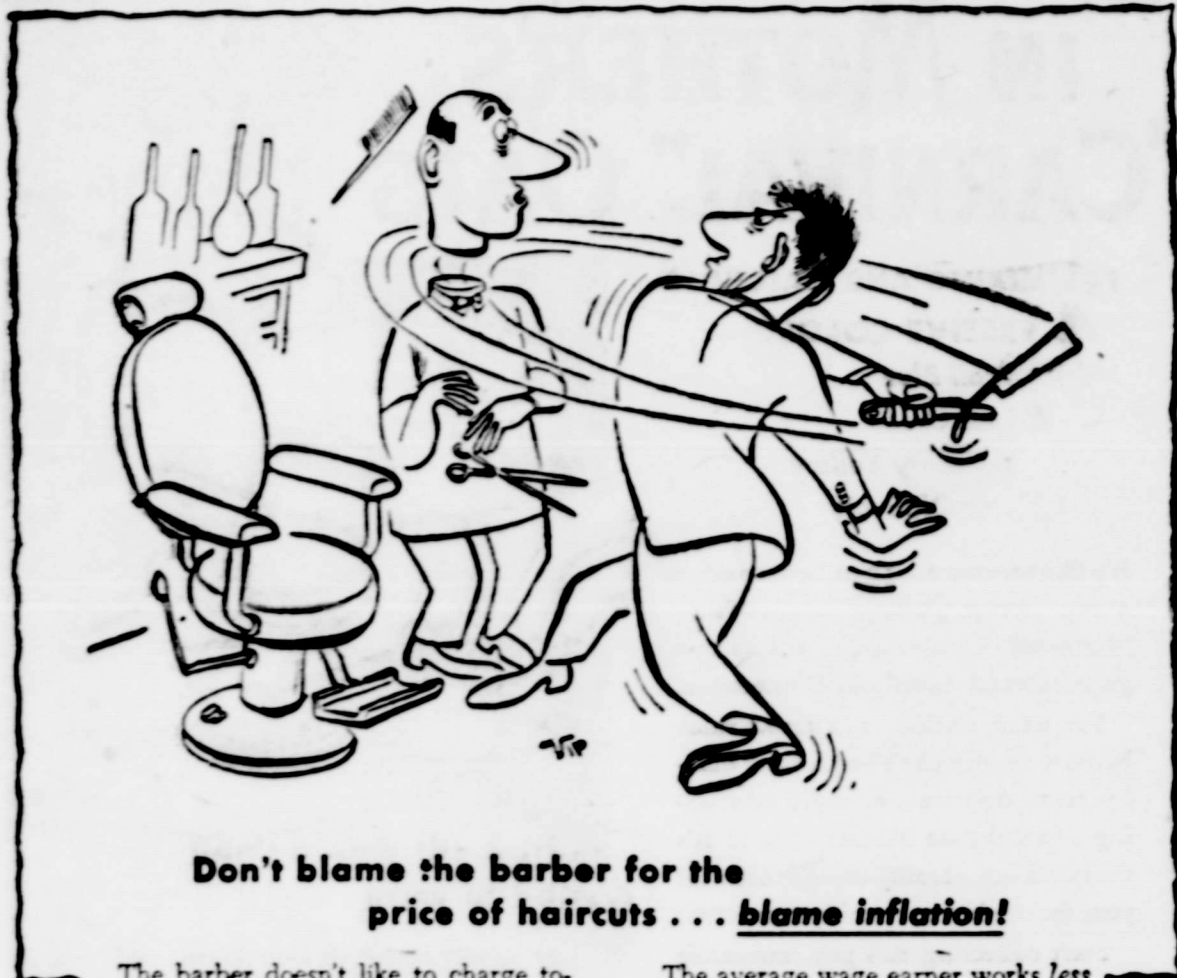

A wildcat has been staked seven miles south of Rankin in southern Upton County. The project is Don Auld No. 1 Ella M. Corbett, an 8,600 foot rotary project. Location

is 660 ft. from S&W lines of sec. 11-B2-GC&SF. Drillsite is slightly more than a mile east of Keane No. 1 Taylor, abandoned Oct. 16, 1950, at 2,685 ft., and 4 1/2 miles NE of production in Crockett field. Anderson-Pritchard No. 1 Windham, WC Upton wildcat, was preparing to perforate from 10,110-160

ft. opposite the Strawn after plugging back from 13,152 ft. When drilling through this section, a drillstem test recovered 500 ft. of free oil and 30 ft. of mud in two hours from 10,112-139 ft. A two hour test from 10,134-170 ft. recovered 330 ft. of pipeline oil, with gas surfacing in 22 minutes and a strong blow throughout the rest of the test.
