

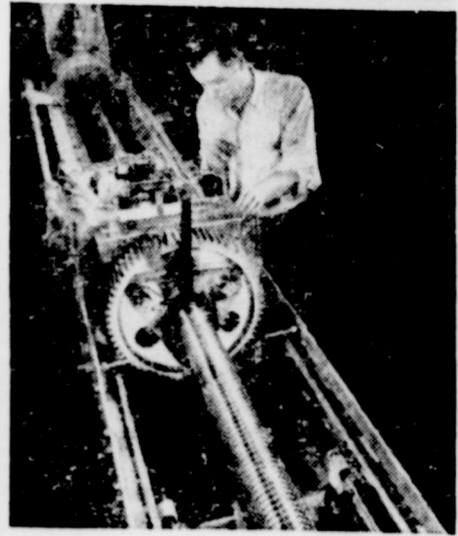
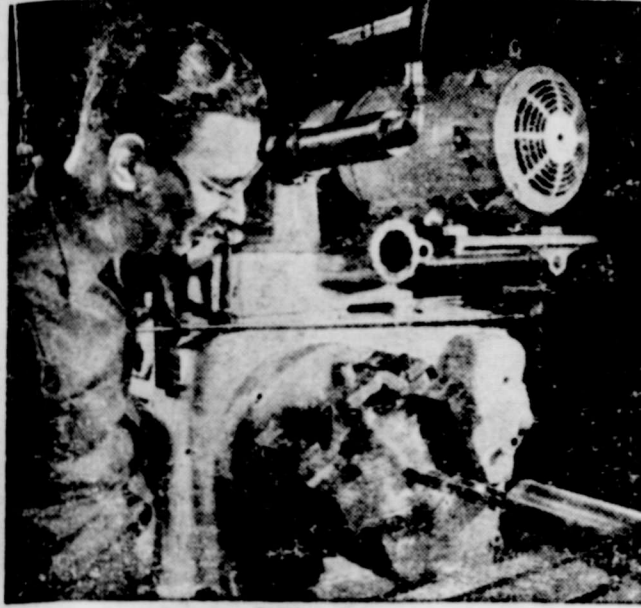
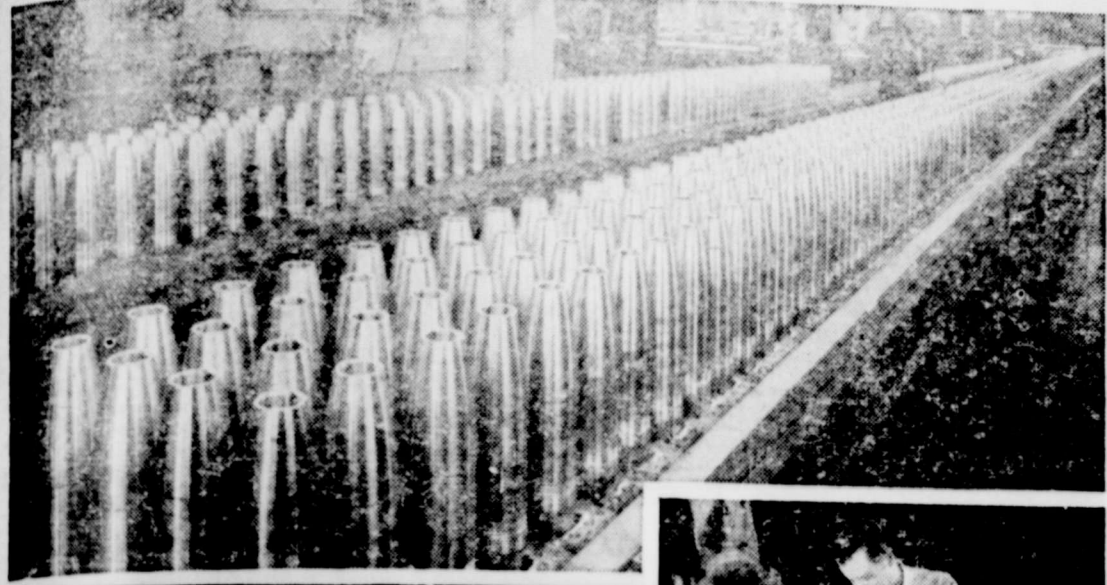

## School Bond Issue Gets 106-2 Approval Tuesday

### Barbee Dry Goods To Have Formal Opening Here On May 2 And 3

R. L. Barbee, manager and co-owner of the Barbee Dry Goods, announced this week that the formal opening of the business in Rankin will be held next weekend, May 2-3.

A. R. Barbee, his father, is the joint owner of the business. Most of the construction and finishing of the interior is completed, and stock being moved into the shelves this week. The building formerly housing the Ford Theatre has been completely renovated, with built-in fixtures about the walls, and islands and fixtures for display for greater shopping comfort and convenience.

Living quarters are under construction in the rear of the building. Mr. Barbee expressed gratitude for the warm reception given by Rankin citizens during the construction, and said he was looking forward to serving the people of the Rankin area in the best manner possible with the finest clothing wear and dry goods merchandise. Mr. Barbee is married and will be joined by his wife in the near future.

Voters turned out in record numbers last Tuesday and gave a near unanimous 106-2 approval in the proposed \$550,000 school bond election. The funds are to be used to erect a new high school.

It was the most votes ever cast in a school bond issue election in the Rankin Independent School District.

The bonds have been sold to the Central Investment Co. of Dallas on the following 11 year schedule: 1953-55, 1 3/4 per cent; 1956-59, 2 per cent; 1960-63, 2 1/4 per cent.

Plans and specifications for the new building are expected to be completed by the time of the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees on Wednesday, May 7.

Advertisement for bids for construction will probably be issued at that meeting also.

### J. V. Burleson Dies In San Angelo Last Tuesday Afternoon

J. V. Burleson, 75, retired Upton County ranchman, died at 4:15 p. m. Tuesday in a San Angelo hospital.

Funeral arrangements were by Porter Johnson Funeral Home of Rankin. The body was taken to Brooksmith where funeral services were held at 3:30 Wednesday, with burial in Winchell Cemetery, near Brooksmith.

Survivors include a son, W. H. of Rankin; a daughter, Mrs. E. W. Lee, of San Angelo; a brother, E. S. of Brownwood; a sister, Mrs. Mary Smith, of Coleman; seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

### Homestead Owners Must Render Property To Save State Tax

H. E. "Gene" Eckols, Upton County Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, reminded home owners this week that April 30 is the deadline to render homesteads in order to avoid paying the state tax on homes.

He especially reminded persons who have just recently built homes and who are having them financed, that they must render the homestead individually in order to avoid the tax.

Persons residing in McCamey and the surrounding area may render their homesteads with G. C. Pauley at his office across from the Security State Bank on Fifth Street; and those living in Rankin and that area may render their homesteads at the office of the Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector at the courthouse in Rankin. Wednesday, April 30, is the deadline.

### Quota For Red Cross Surpassed In Upton

Derwood Langston, County Red Cross chairman, announced this week that Upton County surpassed its quota in the recent Red Cross Drive.

The quota for the county was \$880, and later \$110 was added for tornado relief, bringing the total quota to \$990.

In the final return, the report showed that \$1,070.47 was contributed in Upton County. In Rankin the contributions amounted to \$442.22, and in McCamey \$648.25.

Rev. R. L. Shannon was called to Hereford last Monday to conduct the funeral of Mr. Oscar Hunt, who died suddenly from a heart attack. Rev. Shannon was Mr. Hunt's former pastor at Hereford. Mr. Hunt was a long time resident and ranch owner on the plains.

Shannon to conduct the funeral of Mr. Earl Mauldin, who was killed in a car accident at Jean, Texas, near Olney. Mr. Mauldin died in a hospital at Olney, Texas. Mr. Mauldin was a successful farmer at Meadow, and Rev. Shannon was his former pastor there. Burial was at Meadow on Wednesday of this week. Mr. Mauldin lost his wife two years ago, and his funeral came just three days short of two years since Mrs. Mauldin's funeral. Mr. Mauldin left two girls, one 16 and one nine years old.

## TB X-RAY UNIT HERE ON APRIL 30-MAY 1

A Tuberculosis Mobile Unit from the State Department of Health will be brought to Rankin April 30 and May 1, 1952.

**HOW IS IT DONE?**  
With modern machines an X-ray finds out what is going on inside the chest—long before there is any other way to tell whether or not your lungs are healthy.

Having a chest X-ray is as simple and easy as having your picture taken. You don't even need to undress. Just take a long breath—hold it—it's done.

**WHAT DOES IT SHOW?**  
A chest X-ray allows the doctor to look inside your chest. It can show one of several things:

1. You are healthy. There are no abnormal shadows. There is no sign that tuberculosis germs have hurt your lungs.

2. You have fought a battle with tuberculosis and won. The scars are still there. Your doctor may ask you to have more X-rays and tests to make sure your lungs are healed.

3. Your body may be fighting a battle against tuberculosis now. If more X-rays and tests prove this and you need help in fighting the disease, the doctor will tell you to rest in bed. Probably he will ask you to go to a hospital for treatment. Follow the doctor's advice without delay.

4. Sometimes there are abnormal shadows which are not caused by tuberculosis. The doctor will ask you to have more X-rays and tests to find out what they mean.

**HAVE A CHEST X-RAY:**  
If you have never had a chest X-ray:

If you have not had a chest X-ray in two years;

If you have been in contact with someone with tuberculosis;

If you want to be sure that your lungs are all right.

**A CHEST X-RAY FOR EVERYBODY:**

Probably a half million people in this country have tuberculosis of the lungs. One of the ways to make sure you are not one of them is to have a chest X-ray. Checking your chest by X-ray is quicker and easier than checking the tires on your car. Both are important for your safety. Many people who have tuberculosis feel well. In its early stages, tuberculosis usually has no warning signs or symptoms. Often people do not know they have it. Can you tell if your car is all right by looking at the outside? Not always!

Early tuberculosis of the lungs found before there are symptoms can usually be cured easily and promptly. Check your chest regularly. Make sure that your lungs are healthy. This is a protection to you and to your family. It's

always better to be safe than sorry. Ask your tuberculosis association, your physician, or your health department for more information about tuberculosis.

## "MIGHTY COSTLY"

The News, of Sullivan, Ill., recently said editorially, "The cost of administering the Office of Price Administration program throughout the three-state area of Illinois-Wisconsin-Indiana for the last year was \$3,187,753. There are 709 persons employed in seven offices.

"There are 115 regional, district and distribution offices throughout the US and its territories, in addition to the national office in Washington. On Jan. 1, this year, it is estimated that there were 11,000 persons on the OPS payroll. Added to this expenditure of time and money is the time and money spent by business to make the reports that are required by OPS.

"All of this money is being spent to interfere with the normal workings of a free market. It is spent to substitute a controlled economy for the established supply-and-demand economy.

"Whether or not OPS is workable and is holding down prices is a highly controversial subject. But what is not controversial is that the OPS is expected to control free marketing which has, in the past, brought the greatest benefits to the American people. OPS in submitting its figures on the cost shows that this type of bureaucracy is mighty costly in administration. And the longer it is retained the more expensive it is bound to become."

That is a fair and moderate statement of the situation. OPS is a loose bolt in the finest machine for producing and distributing goods the world has ever known. It is an expensive instrument of economic destruction.

## TAKING OUR SHIRTS

Late in February a shirts-for-Congressmen campaign was started in California. The originator of the idea was a State Farm Bureau official, who told an audience, "To my Congressman, I say: 'You are taking everything but my shirt. You might as well have that, too.'" He then yanked off his shirt, and a number of others followed suit. The campaign was enlivened by a woman who sent her Congressman a giraffe, with a note suggesting a little more "figure control" by Congress.

It isn't likely this campaign will go far—after the tax collector gets through with the average citizen he has to make his shirts do double duty and he can't afford to throw one away. But it is a significant sidelight on the most menacing domestic problem the country faces. Last March, we paid the biggest tax bill in our history. Banks and other agencies reported that borrowings to pay taxes were extraordinarily large—and they were made by people who needed a hundred or so, no less than from high-income taxpayers who found themselves short by thousands. Even so, this tax bill wasn't as large as the Administration wanted.

Taxes now take some 30 per cent of the entire national income. That simply means we work almost four months of the year to pay the cost of government. Is it any wonder that taxes are undermining incentive, discouraging the investment of capital, and making it next to impossible for a man to accumulate substantial savings? Taxes are taking our shirts—and taking the heart out of the country.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

Tombstone, Ariz., Epitaph: "Breadwinners of Tombstone who filed returns for the biggest Federal tax grab in history, probably don't know the half of it. The most extravagant Federal bureaucracy in history is costing you money in far more ways than are shown on income tax forms. Here are the open and hidden Federal levies on average families of this community: About \$331 comes out of an annual income of \$1,500, 952 out of a \$3,500 income, and about \$5,087 out of a \$12,500 income."

Jerome, Idaho, North Side News: "Proponents of the Hell's Canyon dam project should examine and explain fully the reason why Congress must continue to appropriate funds for the Tennessee Valley Authority while it is continually cited as a Utopian accomplishment for the benefit of the people. Last week, Congress slashed \$14,737,000 in committee from the budget appropriation for TVA and another \$14,000,000 on the floor of the House where the huge experiment in government ownership and operation was tagged under the appropriate name of 'socialistic'."

Anaheim, Calif., Bulletin: "The House Appropriations Committee slashed an average of 10 per cent from the seven billion dollars requested for a dozen Federal agencies for the next fiscal year. For some departments the cuts ran as high as 33 per cent. More of this sort of thing might well 'obviate the need for deficit spending or more taxes,' as one law maker expressed it."

Oskaloosa, Iowa, Daily Herald: "Somewhere there is a point at which earnings can be knocked down to the point where they are inadequate to pay the taxes. Which is to ask, what happens to the milker when the cow goes dry?"

## Navy Seeks College Men For Flight Training Immediately

Single men between 18 and 27, who have completed at least two years of college are needed immediately to apply for the Navy's Flight Training program, it was announced today by Capt. H. R. Nieman, Jr., USN, commanding officer of the US Naval Air Station at Dallas.

After having been closed for nearly a year, the Naval Aviation Cadet program is again "wide open." Capt. Nieman's command in Dallas is charged with the responsibility of enlisting Naval Aviation Cadets—or "NavCads," as they are termed—from Texas.

Nieman said that a continuing need exists to interest college students, particularly graduating seniors, in Naval Aviation. For those who expect to have Selective Service obligations to fulfill, Navy flight training offers an alternative to ordinary enlisted service.

Pre-flight and basic training is conducted at the "Anapolis of the Air," Pensacola, Fla. Advanced training is carried out at Corpus Christi, Texas. NavCads who successfully complete the 18-month period of training are designated Naval Aviators, and commissioned Ensigns, US Naval Reserve, or 2nd Lieutenants, US Marine Corps Reserve.

NavCads are paid \$105 per month plus food, quarters and uniforms. Pay and allowances upon commissioning amounts to \$355.75 per month without dependents, or \$430.75 with dependents.

Men desiring further information on the program should write: NAVCAD, US Naval Air Station, Dallas, Texas.

Transportation costs are paid for applicants who wish to take the qualifying physical and mental examinations.

## Local Draft Board Has Two Delinquents Listed In Report

AUSTIN, April 21.—The number of draft delinquents in Texas decreased during the first quarter of 1952, Brig. Gen. P. L. Wakefield, State Selective Service Director, said today.

Delinquents of Local Board No. 121 serving Upton, Crane and Reagan Counties are Charles Eddie Spicer of McCamey and Tolbert White Phillips of Big Lake.

A delinquent is defined in Selective Service regulations as "a person required to be registered under the Selective Service Law who fails or neglects to perform any duty required of him under provisions of the Selective Service Law." Only a local board can declare a man delinquent.

Delinquents are subject to certain rights under the law, also to prosecution, penalty upon conviction ranging up to five years in prison and up to \$10,000 fine.

## MIDLAND LIVESTOCK MARKET

The market was strong and active on all classes of cattle at Midland Livestock Auction Co. sale Thursday. Butcher cattle were up \$1.00 to \$2.00 a hundred from the week before. Four hundred and thirty head were consigned.

Fat calves and yearlings were bid from \$30 to \$34.50, mediums \$27 to \$30, commons and culls \$20 to \$27. Fat cows drew \$21 to \$24, mediums \$19 to 21, canners and cutters \$15 to \$19. Fat bulls auctioned for \$23 to \$25.50 and light bulls for \$20 to \$23.

Stocker steer calves, no good or choice kinds offered, cleared at \$30 to \$34 and medium grade heifer calves for \$29 to \$32. Hereford cow and calf pairs sold for \$200 to \$275 and mixed breed pairs for \$175 to \$260. Mixed breed steer yearlings brought \$24 to \$27.50 and mixed heifer yearlings \$22 to \$26. Fifty-six hogs ranged up to \$17 cwt.

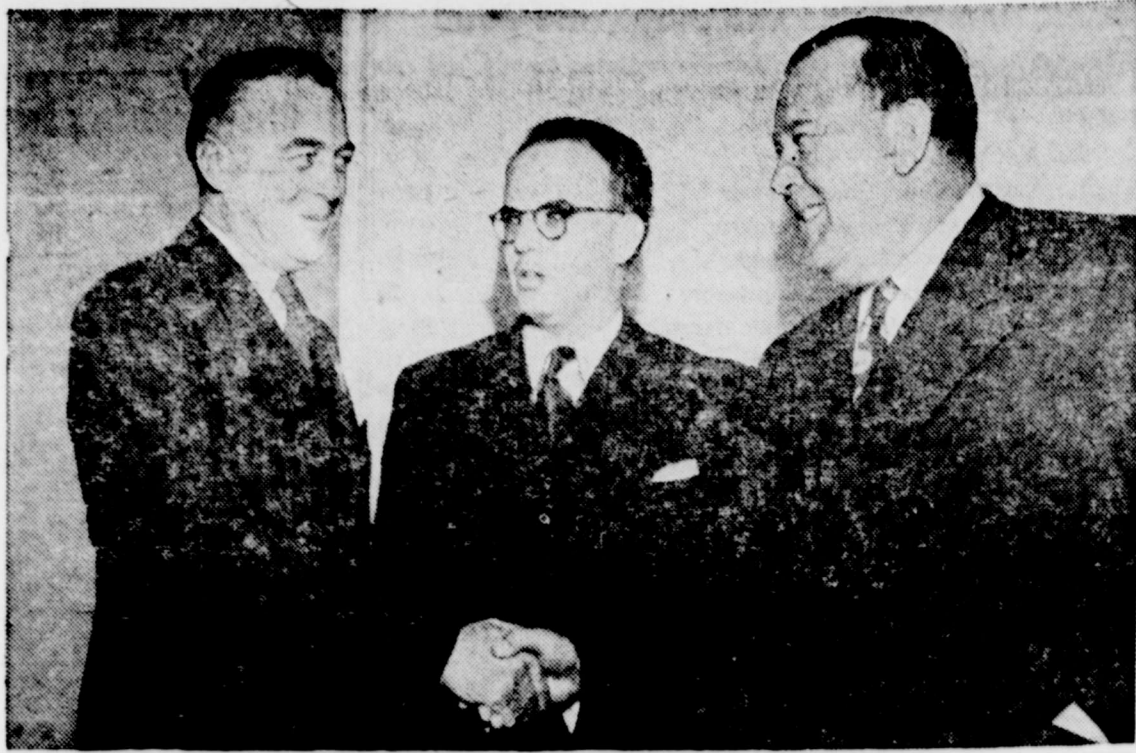

**Precinct Conventions Are Important To All Voters This Year**

As a public service, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has prepared a series of two articles that emphasize the importance of individual participation in party precinct conventions in a presidential election year. This is the first article.—Editor's Note).

In the past a very small portion of Texas voters have had any direct influence—with their individual votes—upon the election of the President and Vice President of the U. S.

They have voted in primary elections, and a few of them in general elections. But they voted for Presidential Electors—not the candidates themselves.

These candidates — the party nominees—had been selected three or four months before the general election itself.

And, even then, they had not been selected by ballots of individual voters, cast in an election. Their nominations originated "way back there in May at party precinct conventions.

Here is how it works: The precinct convention names delegates to the party's county convention.

The county convention selects delegates to the state convention.

The state convention selects delegates to the national convention. The national convention nominates the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of the party.

It is, therefore, necessary that the individual voter take part in the precinct convention to most effectively make his own vote count in election of the President and Vice President.

Because such a relatively few voters usually attend precinct conventions, the vast majority have had little moral right to complain about any administration's policies.

Here are some questions and answers to point up fundamental facts about the Presidential Precinct Convention:

- Q. When will it be held?  
A. Saturday, May 3.
- Q. At what hour?  
A. The law requires that it be held between 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. Outside the largest cities, it usually is opened at 2 p. m. The county chairman of the party is required by law to file a list of times and places with the county clerk at least ten days before the convention day. This list must be posted on the court house bulletin board.
- Q. Who can take part in the Precinct Convention?  
A. All qualified voters who live within the voting precinct.
- Q. Must each person show proof of his right to vote in the Precinct Convention?  
A. Yes. He must bring with him to the convention, his poll tax receipt or his Exemption Certificate.

**Foreign Aid Costs More Than Residential Building In 25 Years**

ABILENE—Foreign aid outlays by the United States which totaled \$89,252,000,000 in the last 12 years, are equal to the total value of all residential building construction in this country for the last 25 years.

This comparison was brought out today in a statistical analysis of foreign aid programs prepared by the Washington research office of the Council of State Chambers of Commerce for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and 32 other State and regional Chambers of Commerce.

The study also revealed that the \$48,300,000,000 of foreign aid funds provided in the seven postwar years alone exceeds the total net value of all property, plant and equipment owned by all American manufacturing corporations combined.

The study cited the fact that more than 700,000,000 people in six countries, after accepting \$2,962,000,000 in aid since the war, have turned on the United States "menacingly as enemies."

Although the analysis took no position on the matter of future foreign aid it sounded this note of caution, "Disturbing reactions to our aid programs even among friendly nations may well justify a re-examination of them in the light of experience."

**Program Of Work Upton THDA Clubs**

Home Demonstration Clubs in Upton County will celebrate their ninth birthday May 10, and Reagan County Clubs their seventh birthday Aug. 16 of this year. Three agents have served Upton County in that time, Mrs. Nettie Belle Messick, 1943-45, Miss Dorothy Snelling, 1945-47, and Miss Myrna Holman beginning in 1947. Miss Snelling and Miss Holman also served Reagan County.

During this time, demonstrations and other work has been conducted on the cereal, vegetable, poultry, meat and fruit phases of the foods and nutrition program; living room, bed room, kitchen and work simplification phases of the home management program; all phases of the clothing program from consumer to garment construction, climaxed during the past fall with a tailoring program; and special programs on family life, organization, recreation, and the many other subjects of interest to the women and girls of the counties.

At the present time, the Upton County clubs are completing a three year clothing program and the second year of the vegetable phase of the foods demonstration. Reagan County clubs are completing three years of clothing and their second year of the poultry phase of the foods demonstration. Demonstrations will be selected by the women and a program of work made out for the coming year during the summer and fall. In addition to these scheduled major demonstrations, the clubs plan programs on many subjects of interest to their particular group. Some are interested in craft work for special activities and others have civic and community programs.
