State Selective Service headquarduction and induction draft calls Friday calling for the examination of 2,580 men and the induction of 1,250 men in July.

This bears out a prediction of Brig. Gen. P. L. Wakefield, State Selective Service director, earlier this spring that draft calls would begin to rise in the summer and be heavier next fall.

The June call, announced about two weeks ago, was for only 384 men. The number of men receiving the pre-induction physical and mental examination in June will be

The July induction call for 1,-251 men in July is the Texas share of a national quota of 33,000. The induction call in July, 1951, was only 367.

The July call will be filled with men 20 years old and older. Gen. Wakefield said Texas has only about 300 examined and acceptable men 21 years old or older. The remainder of the quota will have to come from the 20 year old group. Local boards will not be able to induct any man below the oge of

20 with the exception of delinquents and volunteers. As of the end of April, Texas had inducted 38,658 men since the beginning of the conflict in Korea. More than 91,000 men were given pre-induction examinations during the same period.

### COMMUNIST MEDICINE

In a recent editorial, the Washington Post said, "In considering the various proposals before Congress to give government medicine to various segments of the population, we have to keep in mind where such laws lead . . . Our Federal planners are jumping the British stage and movement straight to Federally financed medicine, a la Russia."

The Post then described the experience of a doctor who worked in the Soviet Union for 17 years and is now in the United States. In the average Russian community, he said, patients have no choice of physician-a bureau controls all medical practice and people are assigned to a given clinic. The clinics are further divided into districts each of which has a doctor and a nurse who are supposed to serve 2.000 to 3,000 inhabitants. During his office hours, the doctor is able to give about five minutes to each patient, because of the crowd. On house calls he can spare about ten minutes. Hospitals are jammed. One result of this kind of political medical care is that the tuberculosis death rate in Russia is six times higher than in the U.S.

You can say that conditions would be entirely different here, even under the Administration's compulsory Federal health insurance scheme. But the fact is-and history has demonstrated it over and over again-that a little bit of socialism, a little bit of dictatorship, always leads to more and more. There is one thing the typical bureaucrat can't get enough of-and that is power over the people.

No major nation can enjoy health standards as high as the United States. In none is better or more comprehensive medical care available to the masses of the people. ## UNDULANT FEVER NOW IN SEASON

AUSTIN. - This is the season when an increase of undulant fever may be expected, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

An undulant rever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or severe shaking chills, sweats, and high fever. The patient loses in weight and becomes weak. If the illness is of a mild type, a person may find it hard to remain in bed, but if he tries to keep on with his work, he finds he has not sufficient energy.

Symptoms often continue for a number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunately undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temperatures may reach a higher mark each day than the day before for some time, and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent for some days and and come back again in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going lower. The patient's temperature chart will resemble smooth waves of undulations. The appearance of the temperature curve in typical cases has given this disease the name undulant fever.






