

Expect 70 Candidates For Chief Football Team

In the neighborhood of 70 candidates for the 1965 Chieftain football team are expected when workouts officially begin for the Friona High School youngsters Monday at 8 a.m.

It could be the most ever reporting for the FHS varsity. There were 49 candidates during the first week of practice for the 1963 season, and 52 prospects last year.

Included among the returnees

are 13 lettermen from last year's team that had an 8-2 season record and tied Floydada for the district championship. Included among the lettermen are six players who were starters either on offense or defense or both.

Lettermen returning are ends Jesse Shirley and Hugh Latham, tackle Ray Braxton and Gene Weatherly, guard Bob Sims, center Bing Bingham, quarter-

backs Travis Graves and Lonnie Ellis; halfbacks Larry Johnson, Joe Mabry, Tim Herring and Eldon Long, and fullback Tommy Shirley.

The starters were Sims and Braxton on both offense and defense; Bingham and Shirley on offense and Weatherly and Graves on defense.

In the "plus" column for this year's team is the veteran line, with six seniors who have seen

a lot of service heading up the list. Besides experience, the linemen feature size, especially at tackle, where 220-pound Gene Weatherly and 190-pound Ray Braxton will be hard to dislodge from a starting slot.

Coach Don Light, beginning his third year as head man for the Chiefs after two "intra-crack" seasons with identical 8-2 records, states that replacing last year's all-senior backfield will

be the big problem facing the coaches. However, there are seven returning lettermen among the candidates for the backfield jobs, so it won't be like starting from scratch.

Another problem which Coach Light says the team will concentrate upon in workouts will be putting together a good defensive secondary.

Among the young players moving up to the varsity from

last year's "B" team who are expected to help out the team are guards Billy Perkins and Mike Wooley, end Ray Murphree and halfback Bobby Jordan.

Braxton, who did practically all the team's punting and had a good average as a junior, will give the Chieftains confidence in this respect.

Workouts will be conducted twice daily until school starts. Players are reminded that they

must have taken their physicals before the first workout.

Coach Light said that a total of 72 players indicated last spring by questionnaires that they would be candidates for the Chieftain varsity, hence the expectation of around 70 players on Monday.

Freshman football players will not report until Friday, August 27, when their equipment will be issued. Another 30 or

more players are expected for the freshman team. Equipment will be issued at 1 p.m. on that date.

The freshmen will not begin working out until the first day of school, which is August 30.

The Chieftains are to scrimmage Sanford-Fritch again this year prior to their season opener. Farwell's Steers will be the opening game opponent for Friona on September 3.

The annual Greenbelt Bowl Hospitality Picnic will begin at 6 p.m. in the Fair Park complimentary to the players, their parents, queen nominees and their parents, coaches and trainers and their families.

The beauty pageant will begin promptly at 8:30 p.m. Friday at the Elks Lodge at which time the nominees will be formally introduced and will receive their trophies.

District Judge Charles Reynolds will be Master of Ceremonies. An informal party in the Lodge will follow the pageant in honor of the players,

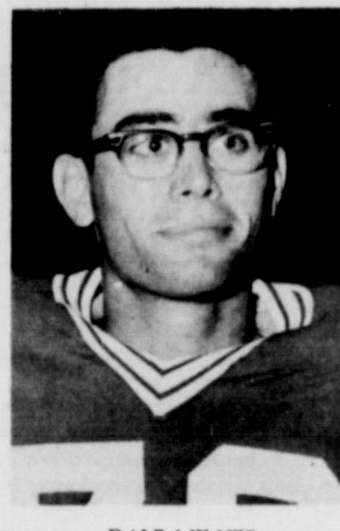
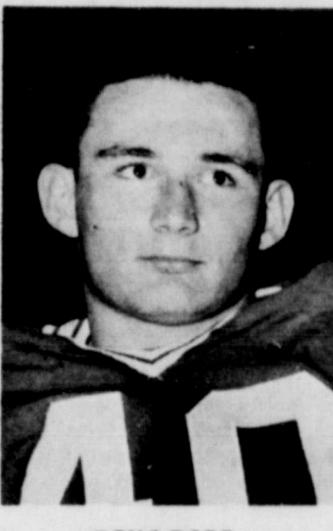
queen nominees and their parents.

Season Grid Tickets Go On Sale Monday

Season football tickets for the five home games to be played by the Friona High School Chieftains will go on sale Monday, August 16 at Bi-Wize Drug Store.

Price for the season tickets will be \$7.50 for five games. Since the reserved seat section will be in a new grandstand this year, seats will be sold on a "first come, first served" basis.

The new grandstand, to be used as Friona's "home" side, will contain 540 reserved seats in a block. All reserved seats will be between the two 42-yard lines.

There are 20 rows in the reserved section, and 27 seats to each row, so that seat number 14 on each row is directly on the "50-yard line." Aisle seats on each row will be seats number one and 27.

A good feature of the new grandstand will be an aisle to serve either side of the reserved section. In the old stands, one aisle divided the reserved seats.

Additional comfort features will be evident in the new stands, with more foot and knee room between rows.

ABILENE MAN

Second Accident At School Hurts Worker

Tragedy almost struck again at the construction site of the new Friona High School this week, and an Abilene man is hospitalized as the result of an accident.

Kenneth D. Latta, 24, is hospitalized with a broken shoulder bone and a concussion after falling 20 feet between two brick walls in the new auditorium Monday.

Latta was installing ductwork for the auditorium's heating and cooling system at the time of the accident. Late Tuesday a report from the hospital said he was "improving," after he had been termed in "serious" condition the previous day.

The technician had been working on a scaffold when he slipped and fell in a narrow place between two walls inside the new auditorium.

Miraculously, Latta was able to climb out by himself after a collapsible ladder was lowered to him. Getting him out

would have been a major task. After climbing out, the Abilene man thought he was all right, but apparently collapsed enroute to Parmer County Community Hospital. After treatment locally, he was rushed by Claborn ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

The accident came one month and one day after an Amarillo youth, David Austin, was electrocuted while working at the high school stadium site.

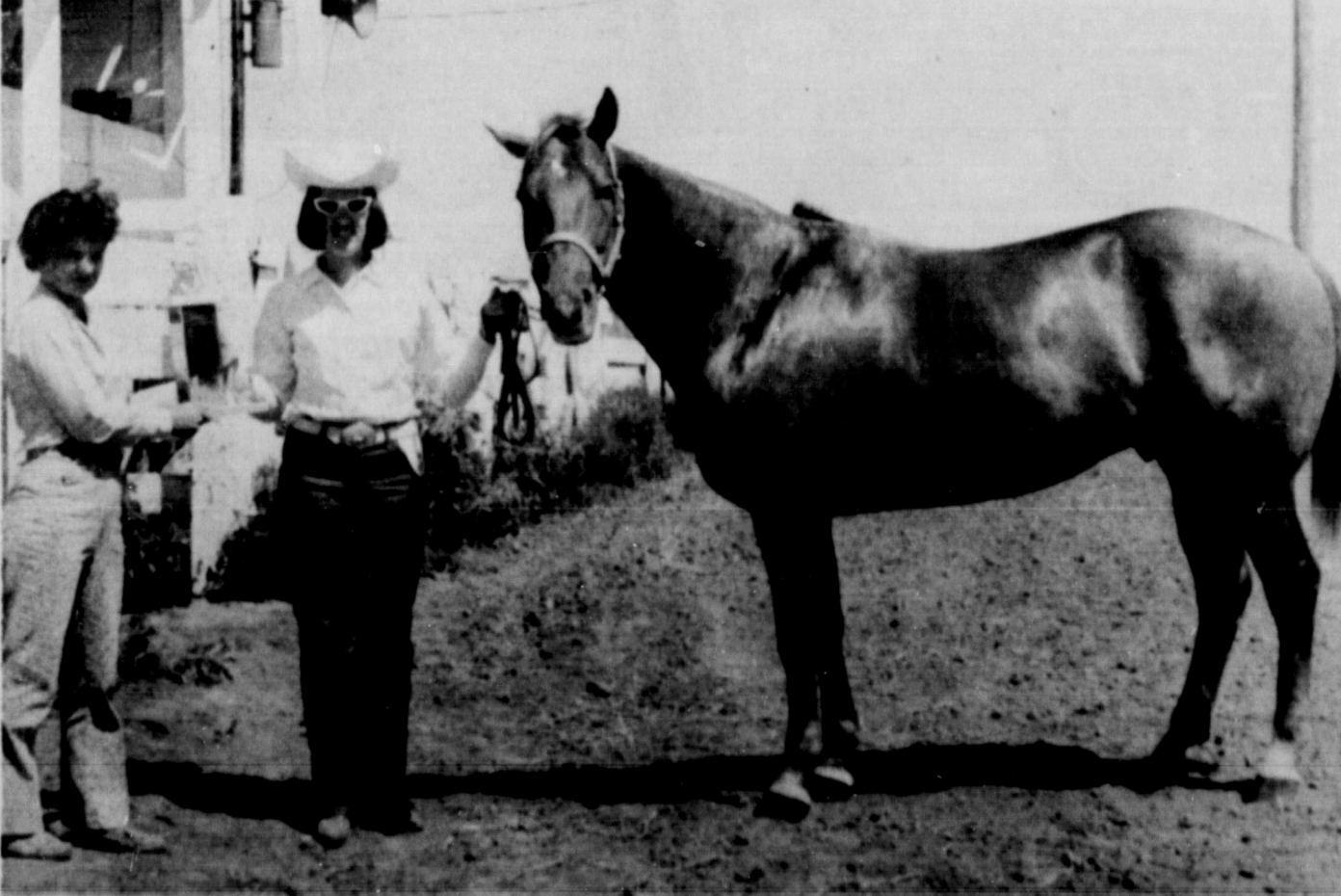
LCC has enrolled a total of 171 students this semester, compared to 130 a year ago.

Citizens Seek Addition To Local Paving Project

Citizens interested in paving a block of 15th Street east of Highway 214 met with the Friona City Council Monday night at its regular meeting.

Property owners Teddy Tucker, John Fred White and Dalton Caffey voiced their consent to pay their pro-rata shares of the paving, although they stated they were not ready at this time to come within the city limits.

The council gave their approval for paving the "long block," providing the citizens meet the escrow requirement, and left it optional for Carl McCaslin Lumber Company to pave the northern side of the street adjacent to lots which it owns.

The escrow deposit will have to be made within 10 days in order for the paving to be included in the current paving project.

In other business, the council approved a request from Dan Ehrbridge for reimbursement of \$462.84 for the development of 170 feet (two homes) in Staley

Addition number 3.

The council approved the establishment of an annual maintenance contract in the amount of \$281 with the Burroughs Machine Corp. for its posting-billing machine. It confirmed the expenditure of \$268.18 in overtime pay for members of the police department to compensate for approximately 136 hours of overtime after patrolman W. A. Hatfield quit his position.

The city's budget for the fiscal year 1966, was given a preliminary approval. The budget will include provisions for an approximate 10 per cent raise for city employees, including the establishment of social security for the first time. Total amount of the proposed budget is \$294,924.

In his monthly summary of activities, City Manager A. L. (Jake) Outland reported that a payment of \$5,979.81 was made July 28 to L. A. Purcell, for the seal coating of 48 city blocks this summer.

Only one building permit was

issued during the month, for an alteration to a residence, in the amount of \$100. There were 12 changes in ownership of city properties as reported by the county clerk's office during July.

Water department records showed that a total of 29,895,800 gallons of water were pumped during July, an average of 964,316 gallons per day. This approaches the regular heavy summer usage of water, in spite of 3.65 inches of rain which fell on six different dates during the month.

The operation of Friona Growers and Shippers caused heavy usage during the latter part of the month.

The first two water services were made in Western Addition during July, to bring the total number of active services to 1,004 at the end of the month.

One new sewer tap was installed, bringing the total active taps to 935 at the end of July.

Four fire calls were made during the month. Three were

outside the city limits for a total estimated loss of \$1500. There was no loss in connection with the fire inside the city limits.

The Police Department reported 25 arrests during the month. Fifteen were for traffic violations, six for drunkenness, three for investigation and one for driving while intoxicated. Three thefts were reported, three acts of vandalism and two cases of breaking and entering.

The sanitation department reported that collection of trash during the month was greatly hampered by the wet weather.

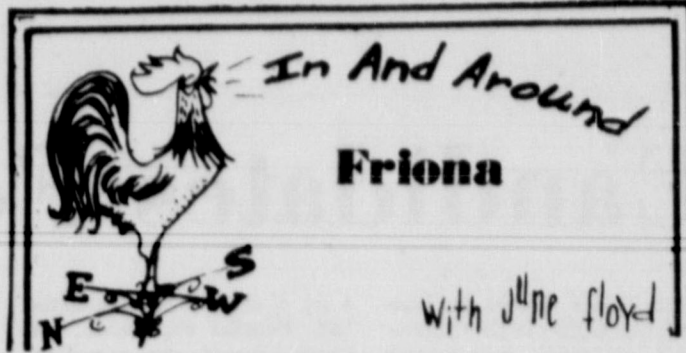

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First Panels Installed At Canyon's "Theatre"

The design of the Pioneer Amphitheatre in the Palo Duro Canyon State Park carries into six-foot granite panels on the theatre promade wall as its principal ornament. These panels, mounted on granite blocks, will reveal the history of the panhandle shown through a series of names, listed by county and carrying the occupation of the person named, his date of settlement in the panhandle and his brand if he has or had one. These names have been suggested by the donors to the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation and each person who gives \$500 has the privilege of naming one. Some families show how several generations have remained in the same location. Some have listed several ancestors. Some have chosen historical figures who won their place in history here and asked the committee to see that the persons described in certain books were included.

Each name is engraved on the stone which is Texas granite. It comes from the heart of Texas from the Texas Granite Corp of Granite Mountain, Marble Falls, Texas.

The three central panels of this wall have been finished and are being put in place on Thursday, August 12, by employees of the Wallace Monument Company of Clarendon, Texas, where the work is being done. These three have the more general information, and work will start on the county histories after the first three are in place.

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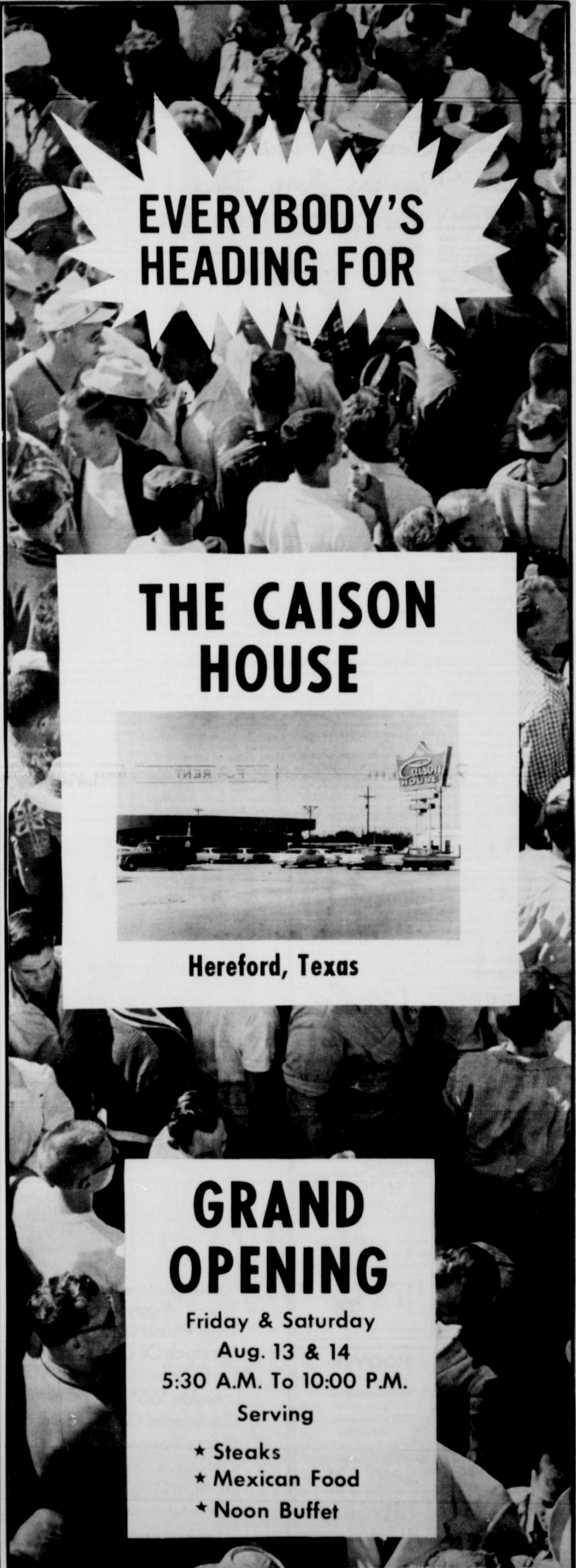

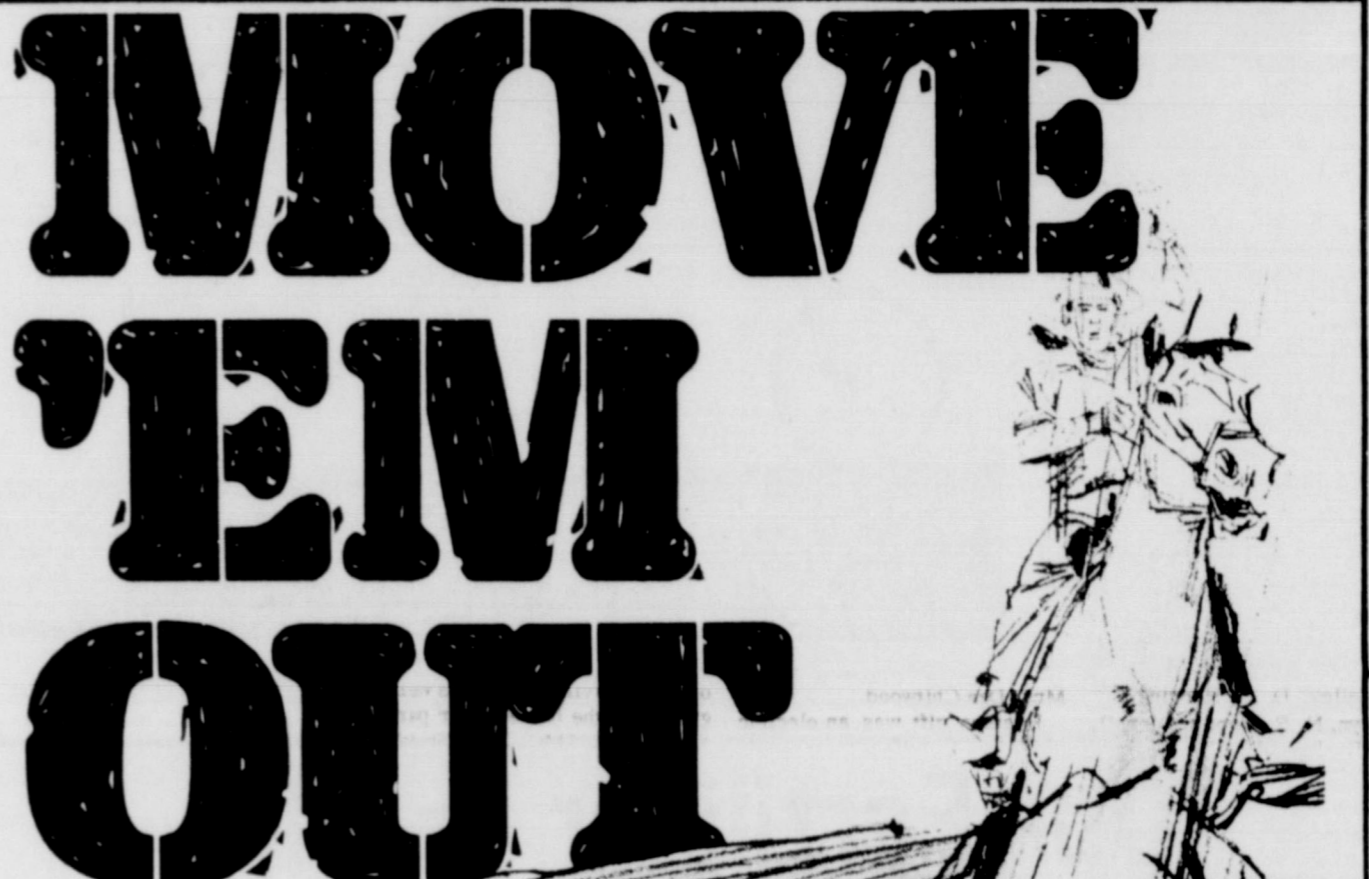

On The Farm In Palmer County

COTTON IRRIGATION

It is time to start planning on cutting off cotton irrigation water.

A cut-off date of August 20 is recommended for this area. Based on research results, application of irrigation water after August 20 has several bad effects. One of these is lowering of quality -- that results in a decrease in net returns per acre. In some years total yield per acre may be increased with late irrigation. However, the resultant lowering of cotton quality usually means decreased net returns, plus added cost of the late irrigation.

Late watering increases boll set which normally haven't matured by frost. This is likely to be a case where the highest yield does not necessarily make the most net profit. Over the years, we believe farmers will be ahead to settle for the crop they can make by cutting off water August 20 and get more dollars per bale on possibly a little less cotton.

SORGHUM MIDGE

So far this season Palmer County has had very few midges. However, if your sorghum has not headed out yet, we recommend you keep a close watch on it. You should check for midges as soon as heads start to emerge. The adult midge is an orange-colored fly about 1/12 inch long. Adults are more noticeable in the early morning crawling over spikes of developing grain heads.

Insecticides recommended are: Sevin, Toxaphene, Emdin, Ethion, Parathion, Trithion, and Diazinon. Insecticides must be applied soon after head emergence. A second application, 3 to 5 days after the first spraying is good insurance during prolonged periods of adult activity.

ABNORMAL TREE GROWTHS

Galls or abnormal growths are often found on ornamentals and shade trees.

Certain species of insects and mites cause the distinctive deformity which develops on the leaves, twigs or stems of the plant. Immature stages of pests can often be found within developing galls.

Mites, midges, plant lice, Cynipids (tiny wasps) and jumping plant lice are some of the more important gall-forming insects. Control of the abnormality cannot be accomplished after it has formed since it contains and protects the pest from insecticidal contact.

Applications of DDT plus malathion, beginning with the new growth and continuing at weekly intervals until the leaves are fully developed will help prevent formation of galls.

FREEZING IRISH POTATOES

There have been numerous requests for directions for freezing Irish Potatoes.

Preparation for freezing new potatoes: Select potatoes the size of walnuts. Scrub well in cold water to remove skins, or wash

and scrape. Preheat in boiling water five to eight minutes, depending on size.

COOLING: cool in cold running water five to eight minutes. Pack: pack dry with water in air-tight containers.

Preparation of French Fried Potatoes for Freezing: Use mature potatoes suitable for French frying. -- Wash, peel and cut in sticks, 1/4" square. -- pre-heat sticks in boiling water for two minutes. -- Cooling: Cool in cold running water three minutes. -- pack dry, without water.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Section 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law; and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not

receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by an officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Section 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Section 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax on property of the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period:

- Arlington State College at Arlington
- Texas Technological College at Lubbock
- North Texas State University at Denton
- Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont
- Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville
- Texas Woman's University at Denton
- Texas Southern University at Houston
- Midwestern University at Wichita Falls
- University of Houston at Houston
- Pan American College at Edinburg
- East Texas State College at Commerce
- Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville
- Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos
- West Texas State University at Canyon

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sal Ross State College at Alpine
Angelo State College at San Angelo.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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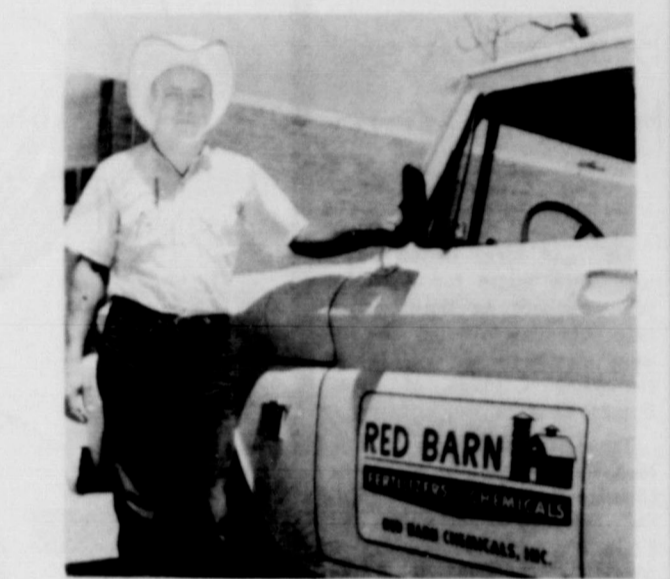

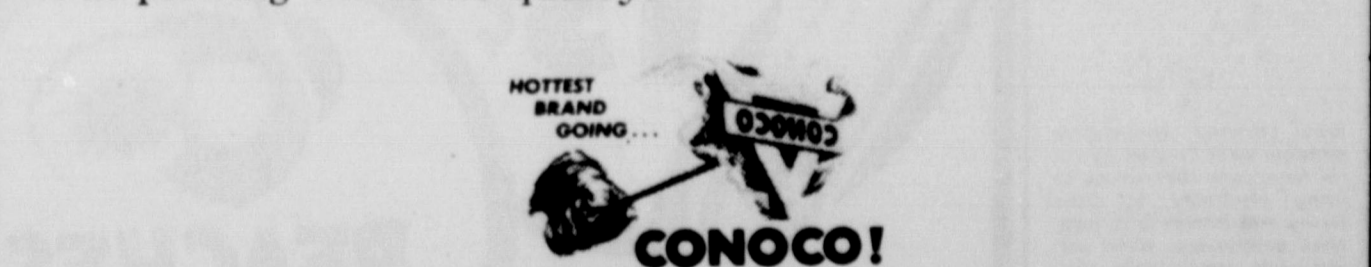
