Devils Maintain Third Place With 13-13 Tie At Grandfalls

Rankin stood by to see the Grandfalls Cowboys take a 6-0 lead at the half-time last Friday night when the Devils met on the "Pokes" home range. Then they came back furiously and desperately in the second half to rack up 13 points on their own and tie the game up.

The Devils were hit hard on their first play when an intended pass was intercepted and Grandfalls began their march for scores. The Rankin offense failed to gather any steam as the Cowboys continued to roll.

According to coach and players of the Rankin troop, it seemed that the Cowboys were sitting in on every huddle, knowing almost with precision where every play was going. Rankin's blocking faltered as did their "T" formation.

The Cowboys tallied in the first half on a 44-yard TD aerial from Jim McLaren to Raymond Ornelaz. McLaren missed the extra point, and Grandfalls had a 6-0 halftime lead.

They protected said lead with a 62 yard blast for a score through the center by Billy Collier. McLaren passed to Jack Higginbottom for the extra point.

At this point, the Devils got mad and hooked up their spread that had faltered on the first play of their attempted offense. Yocham took repeatedly through the right side of the line for gains and scored when he took a well spaced pass from Don Murphy to cover 25 yards. Jimmy then rammed the ball for the extra tally to close 13-7 behind the Cowboys at the third period end.

Joe Ellis slipped through the left side of the line in the final period, untouched for the final Rankin score. The TD came as a climax of a repeated drive by Yocham, Goodwin and Murphy with Yocham carrying the brunt of the attack through the right line. Three such tries had resulted in a heavy shift of defense by the Cowboys to that spot. When Jimmy Thigpen, center, concealed a flip to right half Joe Ellis, who went over untouched. The Cowboys still don't know who had the ball. Yocham's point run failed.

RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR
WHOM GOVERNOR SHIVERS AND TEXAS
DELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia,
the man the Texas Delegation
headed by Gov. Allan Shivers sup-
ported on all ballots at the national
Democratic convention in Chicago,
predicted last week that Adlai
Stevenson and John J. Sparkman

st majorities given a national
ticket in recent years.

Senator Russell, who is chair-
man of the senate armed services
committee and of the senate sub-
committee on agriculture, said:
"General Eisenhower's evident con-
fusion in his efforts to grapple
with vital political issues has
clearly demonstrated to the Amer-
ican people the grave danger of
placing our government in the
hands of a military man. . . . No
military career, however great, can
be a substitute for familiarity with
the operation of a government
which traditionally and by law is
dependent on civilian control. . . .

"As one who has admired Gen-
eral Eisenhower as a military
leader, I have been bewildered by
the endless contradictions of his
political pronouncements. It would
require a book to catalog them.

"Shortly after stating that he
did not understand the term 'Farm
Parity,' he assured the American
farmer of 100% parity for all the

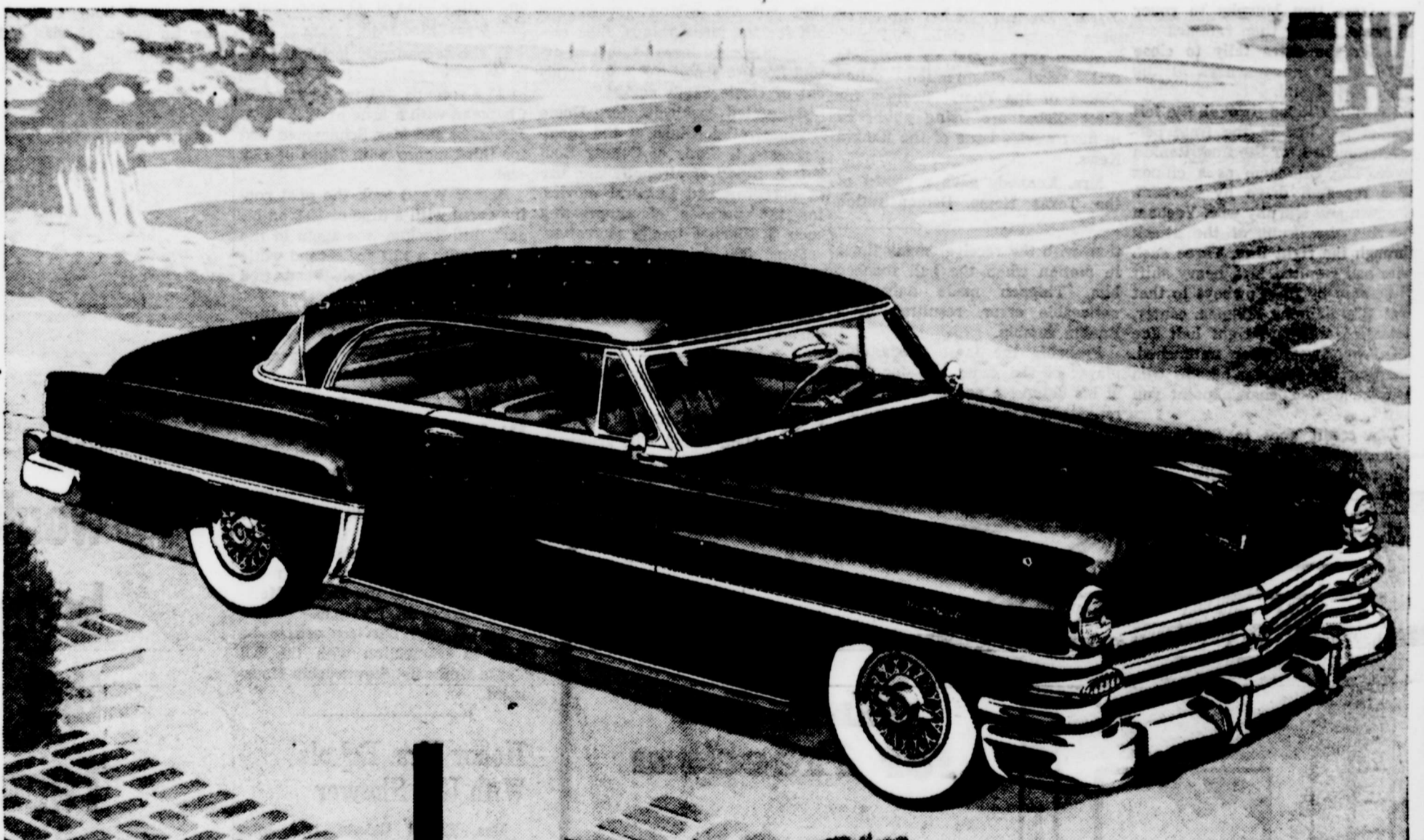

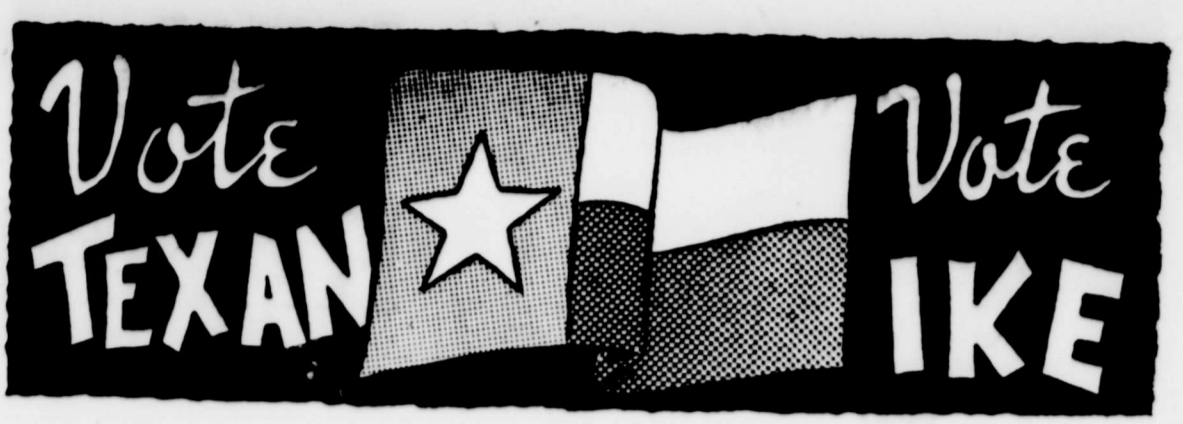

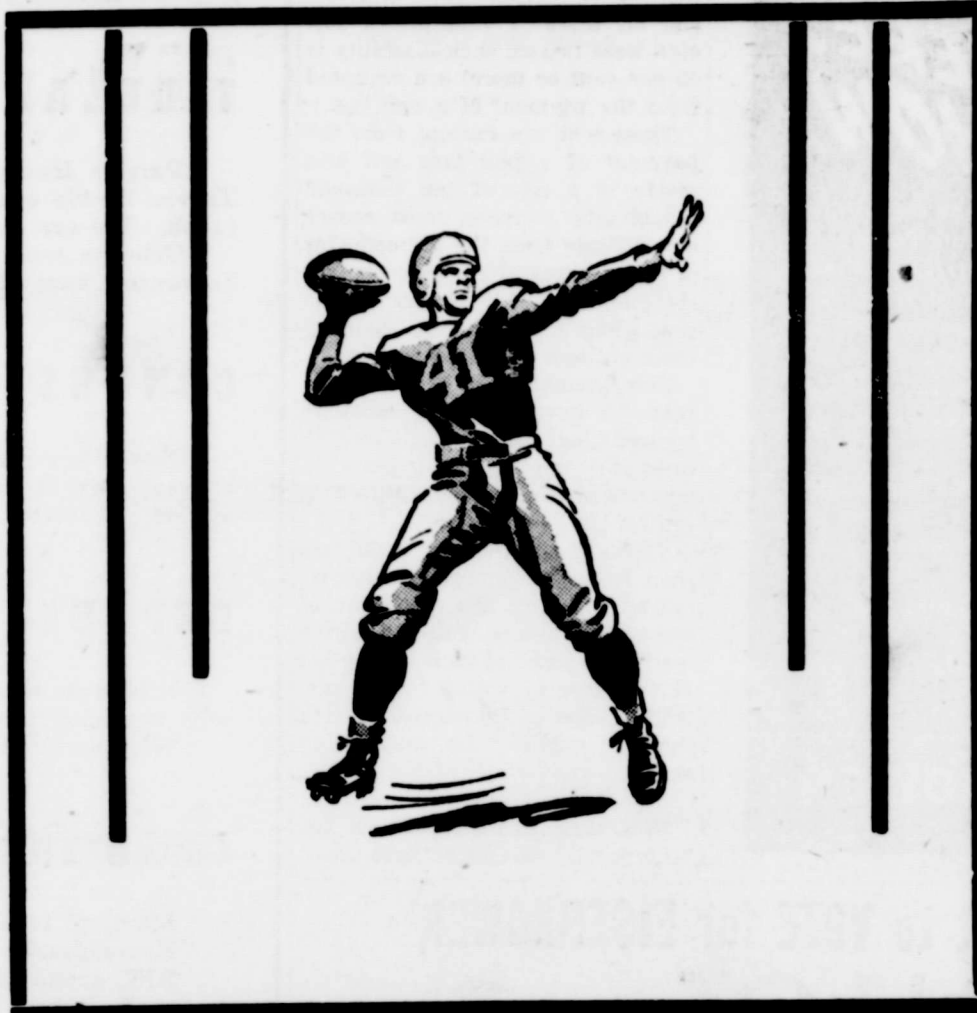
