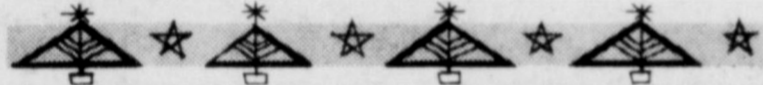

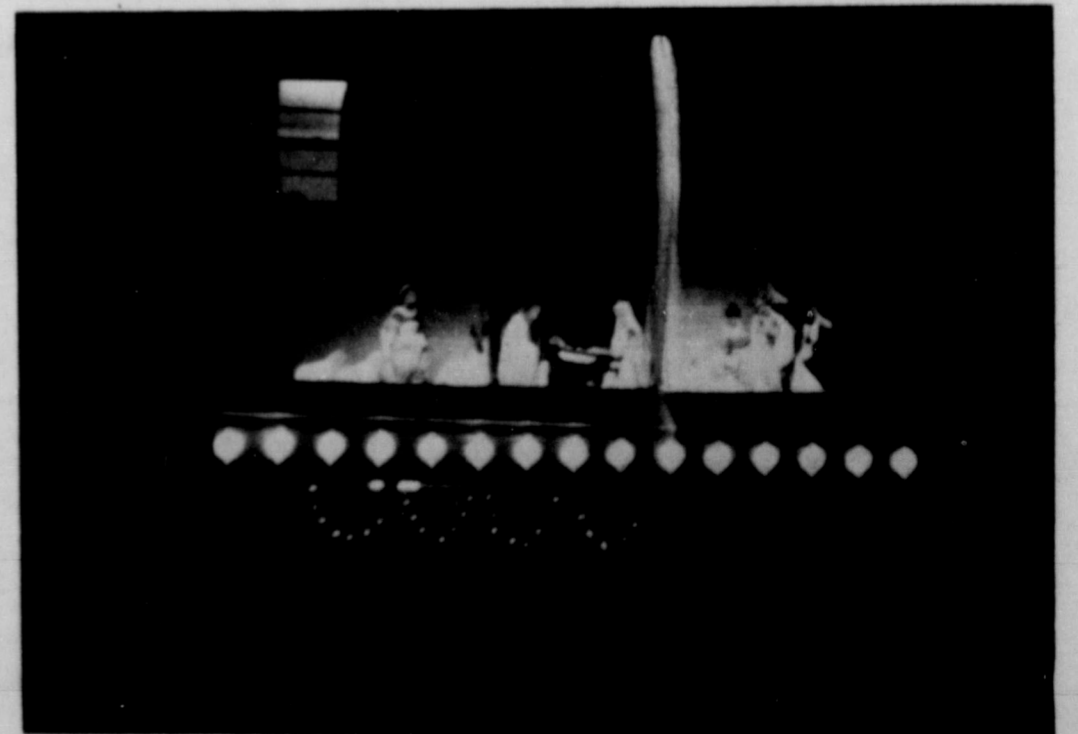

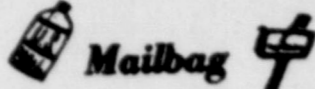

HOW CHRISTMAS CAME INTO BEING

Our Holiday Season with its joyous feeling mixed with religious observance intrigues many as to its beginning. Of course there are many legends and interpretations concerning the origin of Christmas, its name and why we celebrate it during December. Much time and study were given to establish a reasonable date and answers to give us the Christmas we now enjoy. The fourth century is as far as clerical researchers and lay scholars can go, into history, to pinpoint the observance of our traditional Christmas. However, the custom of a Christmas festival was already established dating back from previous eras.

The word Christmas began as "Christ's Mass" or from old English "Christes Masse" or the Mass of the Christ. And it was St. Cyril, bishop of Jerusalem, who strived to set up a universal day of observance from its regular spring celebration. The good bishop was granted permission by Pope Julius I to appoint leading theologians of the time to determine, as accurately as they could, the date of Christ's nativity. Having discovered many discrepancies and contradictions in astrological and astronomical calendars for the accurate celebration of Christ's Mass, the Church set the 25th of December for this joyous holiday.

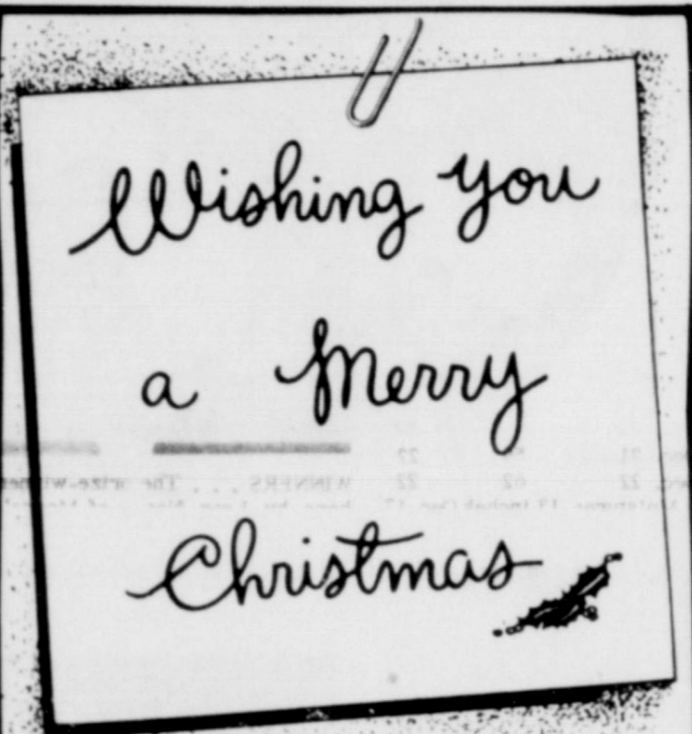
So, since the year of 352 A.D. to this present day, the Saviour's birth has been observed. But, to this day, in some foreign countries, the festival of Christmas still occurs on many different dates. Members of the Orthodox religion, such as the Russian, Greek and Ukrainian commemorate Christmas on the 6th of January. In most European countries, December 6th is the day chosen to mark the beginning of the long and happy season.

Robinson Dies

Earnest Robinson, 56, an employee of Friona Wheat Growers, died Friday night in an Amarillo hospital following a three-vehicle accident south-east of Friona last Tuesday. Robinson's car crashed into the back of a cotton trailer being pulled by Roy Eugene Grace of Ashton. Another car slammed into the wreckage.

Robinson was treated at Farmer County Community Hospital and then transferred to Amarillo.

Funeral services were conducted in Borger Monday. Robinson is survived by his mother, Bonnie Robinson, and two sisters, Mrs. Georgia Cofer of Borger and Mrs. Louis Bourland of Burbank, Calif.

Head-On Collision Kills 1, Injures 6

Jimmie Ramos, 22, was killed Saturday night when the 1956 model car he was driving crashed almost head-on with a 1964 model station wagon carrying three Arizona residents enroute

to Indiana for the Christmas holidays.

Rev. William Branham, of Tucson, Ariz., driver of the station wagon, and his wife Meda remains in intensive care at Northwest Texas Hospital on Tuesday of this week after being transferred there from Farmer County Community Hospital late Saturday.

Light, Chieftains Given Plaudits

Coach Don Light and two members of his district championship football team, were honored by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal the past week as the newspaper announced its all-regional team.

Tackle Gene Weatherly and guard Bob Sims were named by the paper to its "All-South Plains" first team offense for class AA players, while Coach Light was cited as "Coach of the Year" in the classification.

It was the second time in three years for Coach Light to be so honored by the newspaper. In 1963, when he coached the team to an 8-2 record after its 0-10 mark of the previous year, he also was named for the area's top coaching performance.

The newspaper pointed out that Friona was picked no better than fourth in its district, yet came back to take the title

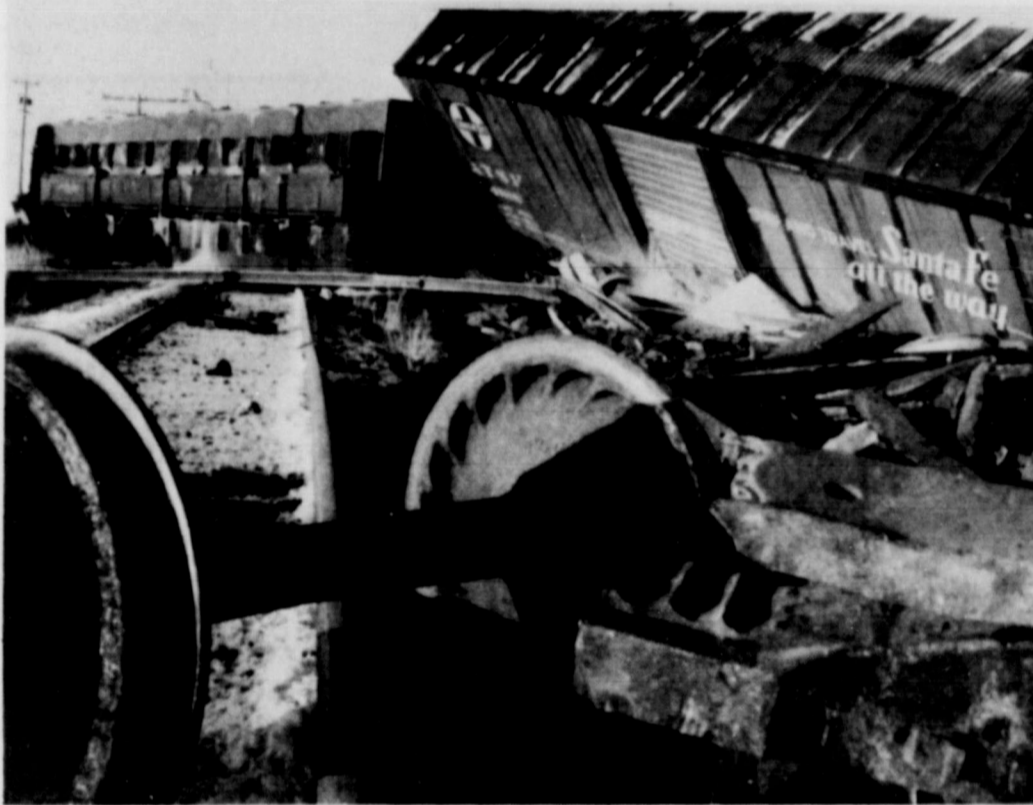
One of Ramos' passengers, Rodolfo Melendez, also was in the intensive care unit. Other passengers in the Ramos car were Raynaldo Melendez and Daniel Cocanegra.

A daughter, 14-year old Marie Branham, was another passenger in the Branham automobile.

The crash happened about six miles west of Friona at Parmerton Hill, at about 8:15 p.m. Saturday. Both cars were demolished, and it took more than two hours to clear the wreckage.

Units of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department were summoned to assist in removing the wreck victims from the vehicles.

Ramos was dead on arrival at the local hospital. Funeral services were held Tuesday, under the direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

Santa Fe Has Derailment Here

Thirteen cars of a 100-car Santa Fe freight train were derailed just east of the South Main crossing in Friona last Thursday morning, tying up the main Santa Fe line seven hours.

Rail cars were strewn up and down the track, some were on their sides. The main track was a twisted mess beneath the wreckage. Large crews of workmen moved into Friona to clear the wreckage. Part of the job was still continuing at press time this week.

No one was injured in the derailment. Most of the cars were loaded with zinc concentrate. The freight was east-bound and was derailed in the vicinity of Continental Grain and Friona Growers and Shippers.

The holidays usually spell disaster for most weight-watchers, because the abundance of good food makes it difficult to diet. Its easy to put on weight but mighty hard to take it off. Dieters can enjoy holiday meals and not go too far if they will watch the calories they consume.

For example, if a weight-watcher eats a high-calorie food, he must watch his consumption of other high-calorie foods. Second helpings should be avoided. Many traditional foods are not only delicious,

but also are low in calories. Refer to the following listings of holiday foods for a calorie guide. The calorie count will vary somewhat due to the difference in recipes.

APPETIZERS: Cranberry juice, 4-oz; glass-75; eggnog, 8-oz, glass-25; grapefruit juice 4 oz, glass-45; cream of mushroom soup, 3/4 cup-105; tomato juice, 4-oz, glass-25; cream of tomato soup, 3/4 cup-150.

SALADS AND DRESSINGS: Waldorf salad, 1/2 cup - 185; blue cheese dressing, 1 tablespoon-75; ripe olives, (3)-30;

cranberry sauce, 2 Tbsp. -70; french dressing, 1 Tbsp. 60; mayonnaise, 1 Tbsp. 90.

MAIN DISHES: Harvard beets, 1/2 cup-120; buttered broccoli, 1/2 cup - 40; giblet gravy, 1/2 cup-150; creamed onions, 1/2 cup-135; bread stuffing, 1/2 cup -200; chestnut or sausage stuffing, 1/2 cup-315; mushroom or rice stuffing, 1/2 cup-210; candied sweet potatoes, 1/2 cup-280; mashed sweet potatoes, 1/2 cup-150; turkey, white meat-4 oz.-195; dark meat-4 oz. 225.

DESSERTS: Apple pie, 1/8 of a 9-inch pie-475; cherry pie, 1/8 of a 9-in. pie-475; mincemeat pie, 1/8 of a 9-in. pie-675; pecan pie, 1/8 of a 9-in. pie-570; pumpkin pie, 1/8 of a 9-in. pie-335.

IDEAS FOR PRE-SCHOOLERS
If you have a pre-school youngster he might enjoy trying this idea; take left-over soap chips from a soap-carving class, or prepare your own soap chips. Mix the chips with warm paraffin and then add a few drops of food coloring.

From this mixture, your child can create his own kind of plastic marble. It's easy to handle, just as easy to mold as ordinary modeling clay, and about twice as much fun.

PLANTS IN THE PLANTS
Homemakers enjoy keeping a plant in the house to lend a bit of greenery and freshness to the surroundings. Many have found, however, that the plants attract unwelcome insects.

USDA entomologist suggest using an insecticide spray or dip rather than a dust for ridding plants of unwanted pests. They caution users of pesticides to use them carefully, as many are toxic. The user should read the label and heed any precautions. Plants should be sprayed outside, never around food or eating utensils. Spray and dip pesticides usually give better control of insects and are less likely to leave objectionable residues. When used outside, they are less likely to drift to nearby objects.

Some kinds of plants are difficult to wet. If a preparation doesn't readily spread over and wet a plant, the entomologists recommend adding 1/2 teaspoon of a mild household detergent (not soap) per gallon of spray or dip. The detergent gives the mixture more wetting power.

HOLIDAY IDEAS FOR BEVERAGES
This year, try to serve something for that open house affair during the holiday season here are some recipes

that I have compiled and will share with you.

HOT APPLE JUICE PUNCH
For a good hot drink. Add "red hots", to taste to apple juice and heat. Red hots also add color and is especially good at Christmas time. Apple cider may be used instead of apple juice.

PERCOLATOR PUNCH
2 1/2 cups Pineapple juice
1 3/4 cup water
2 cups cranberry juice
1 tablespoon whole cloves
1/2 tablespoon allspice
3 sticks cinnamon broken
1/2 cup teaspoon salt
1/2 cup brown sugar, lightly packed
Put pineapple juice, water and cranberry juice in bottom of 8 cup percolator. Put rest of ingredients in top. Perk for 10 minutes or until spices permeate. Serve hot in mugs or punch cups. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

HOLIDAY PUNCH
1 chilled can jellied cranberry sauce
2 1/4 cups cold water
1/2 cup fresh, frozen, or canned lemon juice
3/4 cup chilled orange juice
1 teas. almond extract
1 cup chilled ginger ale
With fork, crush cranberry sauce in can; turn into large bowl. Add water; beat until smooth. Stir in juices, extract, ginger ale and a few ice cubes. Pour into 6 tall glasses. If desired, garnish with mint and clove-studded lemon circles. Makes 6 servings.

SHERBET-TEA PUNCH
2 cups strong hot tea
1 cup granulated sugar
1 cup orange juice
1/2 cup fresh, frozen or canned lemon juice
1 pt. chilled ginger ale
1 pt. orange sherbet
Pour hot tea over sugar; stir until sugar dissolves; add juices. Chill. Then pour into punch bowl. Add ginger ale. Spoon on sherbet. Makes 16 punch-cup servings.

On The Farm In Parmer County

We wish everyone a Happy Holiday Season and want to remind you that income tax reporting time is just around the corner. We have a supply of the 1966 Farmers Tax Guides in our office and we will be glad to send you a guide if you will drop me a card at Farwell, Texas.

Your Income Tax Return, form 1040, for the calendar year 1965 must be filed on or before February 15, 1966, if you did not elect on or before January 17, 1966, to file a declaration of estimated income tax for 1965. If you filed the estimate, your income tax return need not be filed until on or before April 15, 1966. The tax due must be paid in full with the Form 1040 when it is filed. You must also file Schedule F with the 1040, and Schedule SE must be completed so that you receive proper social security credit for your self-employment income.

Income averaging can be helpful when income has been erratic. The current averaging provision was put in the code in 1964. Average income must be more than \$3,000 before it can be applied.

Under the provisions, the in-

come of the four preceding years is averaged and then multiplied by 133 1/3 percent. The product is then subtracted from this year's taxable income and the remainder is called the Averageable Income, provided it exceeds \$3,000.

This Averageable Income is taxed under a moderately complex formula, but the tax liability will be less than under ordinary treatment.

TREES AND SHRUBS FOR WINDBREAKS

Some 17 different trees and shrubs will be available to Texas Landowners early in 1966 from the Texas Forest Service, at a delivered cost of \$1.50 per hundred plus the 2% sales tax.

These trees and shrubs can be used for windbreaks, soil stabilization and Christmas tree plantings. All seedling orders are packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser, usually in April.

This is a real good buy if you need some windbreaks around your farmstead. Application blanks can be obtained thru the County Agent's office and at the ASCS office. Orders must be received by the Texas Forest Service before February 11, 1965.

ENZYME-TREATED MEATS

Many meat packers and restaurants use enzymes as meat tenderizing agents. These enzyme tenderizers have been approved for use by the Food and Drug Administration and in no way affect the wholesomeness of the meat. These enzymes are normally plant enzymes which tend to break down the elastin and collagen which cause meat to be tough. These enzymes are the agents which can be purchased in grocery stores and are tenderizers.

Small cuts of meats are normally treated by dipping them into an enzyme solution immediately before freezing and packaging. In this way the enzyme does not become active until the meat is defrosted. Some packets inject enzymes into the live animals before slaughter, or into the carcass after slaughter. The enzyme-tenderizing action begins when the meat is heated.

The Squaws surprised the unbeaten Springlake by taking the lead, and held it through three quarters before the tall Wolverettes finally used a big fourth quarter to pull out the win. Coach Mel William's squad had leads of 16-14, 29-21 and 36-33 after each of the first quarters.

The Squaws rebounded for a close 45-42 win over Canyon in their Friday game. Canyon had a 14-10 lead after a quarter, it was tied 20-20 at halftime and 33-33 going into the last quarter.

Friona's girls met an old rival, Muleshoe, in the consolation finals Saturday morning. They scored their third win of the season over the Mulettes, and 20th consecutive win over Muleshoe to capture the consolation trophy.

Usually it is thought of as "Jingle Bells," but early copies of the song show that the title was really meant to be "Jingle Bells" — with a comma added to make it a command to the

Both the melody and lyrics were written by James Pierpont, who was the son of a minister and who ran away to sea at the age of 14.

Pierpont wrote the song in the late 1850's, according to Encyclopedia Americana. He was then living in the Boston suburb of Medford where, at the time, the only piano in the entire village was located in the parlor of Simpson's Tavern. It was there Pierpont picked out the "Jingle, Bells" melody.

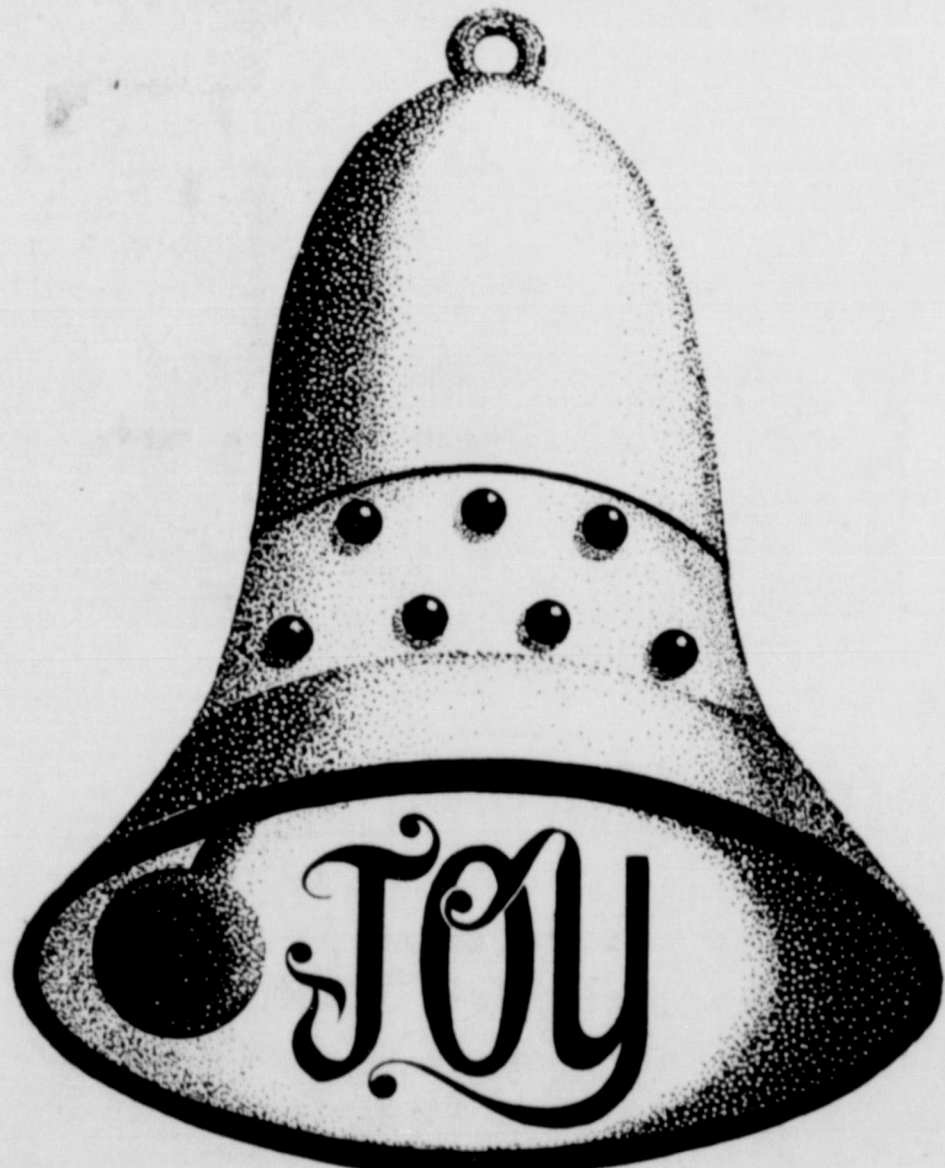

St. Francis Is Originator Of Christmas Carol

At this most joyous of seasons, have you ever wondered how our modern-day Christmas carol came about? None other than St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of animals, is credited with originating the Christmas carol as we know it.

It was he who first conducted a Christmas mass, singing the gospel and giving the main sermon in song. This new and wonderful way of saying the mass was kept alive till the time of Richard the Lion-hearted. Minstrels and folk-singers passed them on from generation to generation.

During the 15th Century, the singing of the Gospel broke away from the austere, sombre chants of the Church, going on to achieve greater magnificence and musical splendor.

In the 17th century, during the Puritan's time, the Christmas carol went into a decline because of the belief that celebrations should not be joyous. Not until the 19th century did the carol have a semblance of returning with all of its jovial popularity. And this was achieved only through illegal printing and singing of carols in private homes.

It was not until 1840 that the Christmas carol regained and maintained all of its popularity. For during this year the world's most famous Christmas carol was published, "Silent Night." Up to this present day all of its joys and hopes and reverence are still felt in all its simple beauty.

SANTA INSPIRES WRITINGS

That jolly old gentleman called Santa has become as much a part of Christmas as the beloved tree, and with good reason — he is celebrated in poems and other writings familiar to us all.

One of the most famous poems ever written concerns a Christmas Eve call by Santa, as described in "A Visit from St. Nicholas" by Dr. Clement Clark Moore. Since the penning of that delightful poem in 1822, it has been reproduced countless times and is a holiday tradition in itself.

Santa was also the inspiration for a very famous piece of journalism, the editorial, "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus," written by Frank P. Church of the New York Sun in 1897. It answered a now-famous letter to the editor, as posed by a little girl, Virginia O'Hanlon, who was disturbed by reports that Santa didn't really exist. Church not only answered Virginia's question, he penned a classic tribute to Santa Claus that is still reprinted every holiday as part of the Christmas tradition.

The character of Santa was also the source for a popular motion picture of many years ago, "The Miracle on 34th Street." This screenplay was recently adapted to the stage and was a great success on Broadway as the musical, "Here's Love."

Then, too, Christmas cards have become Santa's "calling cards" to a very marked degree. To the card-designer St. Nick assumes many personalities — jovial, humorous, fatherly, mischievous — to enliven the homes all over the world. On the Christmas card Santa becomes highly decorative, indeed, in all his many guises.

And we mustn't forget the thousands of letters written by tiny tots, lovingly telling Santa of their special hopes and dreams — if Santa does exist, these surely must be his favorite Christmas literature of all!

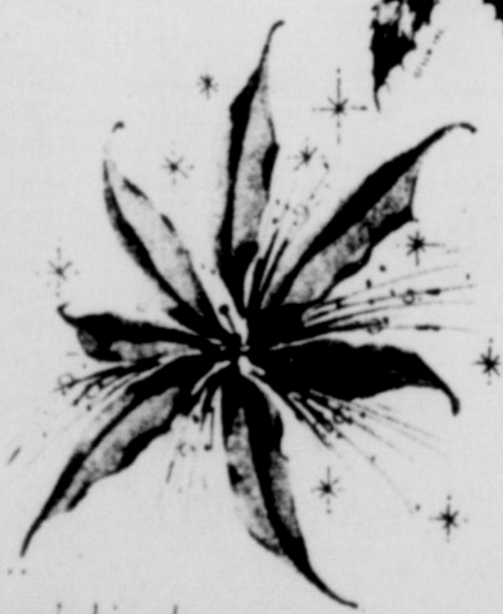

It's Christmas, time to welcome visitors, spread the festive board, gather the family together for everything good from food to fellowship.

Most of all, it's Christmas, time to say a prayer, count many blessings, rejoice. It's Christmas, time to celebrate anew the very first Christmas of all, the Birthday of Christ.

It's Christmas, and throughout this community the sights and sounds of a joyful, festive season appear. All through the town, twinkling lights, fragrant flowers and greens and a myriad other decorations show to every beholder the glad spirit of Christmas. Bells ring out and voices sing out, proclaiming the wonderful news.

Christmas is here. And because Christmas is here, steps are lighter, smiles are brighter, hearts are merrier.

On the way to Christmas, there may have been hours when everything seemed just too hectic — too many plans to make, too much to do, too little time. Most Memorable

No two Christmases are ever alike — but this one, surely, must be the most memorable of all. Each year it seems so, and each year it's true. Every Christmas is more delightful than the last, if only because it is enriched by one more memory of Christmas past.

Memories and traditions mount up to make the Christmas customs of today. Most such customs began so long ago that their exact and accurate origin is hidden in the mists of time, and several theories may be put forward to explain why and how each custom developed.

Happily, the wealth of legend and lore woven about Christmas is pleasing rather than confusing. Especially at this season, a touch of the magical and mystical is more to be welcomed than a deluge of precise factual detail, and one of the special charms of Christmas surroundings is the hint of mystery surrounding them.

Why a Tree?

Why a tree at Christmas? One early legend says that all the trees burst into bloom on the night Christ was born.

Folk tales of ancient times tell of a huge tree in a forest, lighted with many candles, some of which were straight and some bent. At the top was an infant with a halo.

The tree was meant to represent humanity, the candles, people good and bad; and the infant, the Baby Jesus.

Another explanation links today's Christmas tree to ancient feasts of the winter equinox, when trees were adorned with trinkets.

St. Boniface, an English missionary to Germany, is said to have told converts that the fir should be their holy tree, replacing the oak, sacred in Druid tree worship, and thus beginning the custom of a decorated fir.

Many are the legends, but one thing is certain. Nowadays Christmas wouldn't be Christmas without the tree.

For Decoration

Candles, apples, colored papers — these were among the early tree ornaments.

Later, individual countries developed their own tree-decorating ideas. Straw windmills and birdcages appeared on Lithuanian trees, while the Poles devised ornaments from

"If you ice it, take half a Pound of Double-refin'd Sugar sifted, then put some of the Sugar, and beat it up with the White of an Egg, and beat it with a Whisk, and a little Orange flower-water, but do not over-wet it, then throw in all Sugar by Degrees, then beat it all near an Hour; the Cake will take so long a baking; then draw it, and waft it over with a Brush, and put it in again for half a quarter of an Hour."

A 19th century recipe for plum pudding suggests that just before serving, the holiday hostess turn it out of the bowl and put on top of it a few squares of cut sugar. Then she should pour on a little brandy, set it afire and proudly present it to her guests.

The author of this same Victorian recipe cautiously urges that "only a little be given to the young people, as it might affect them."

Today, plum pudding, from Mother's modern kitchen or the neighborhood bakery, still retains its position among the traditional Christmastime treats.

Tree decorations contributed by Scandinavian countries were as various as fish nets and miniature flags.

The modern array of tree ornaments is vast and imaginative, but even so many families like to add their own personal, "old-fashioned" touch to the tree, with decorations such as paper chains and strings of popcorn or cranberries.

Lighting Candles

Martin Luther, the Reformation leader, is credited by some legend collectors with decorating the first lighted Christmas tree. He lit candles and placed them on the boughs of an evergreen — a custom that would be frowned on today, when fire safety is the rule in Christmas decorating.

Ideas Vary On Customs Of Yule

Some people enjoy a White Christmas, while some people go swimming or picnicking on December 25. Some people say it's traditional to serve turkey at the holiday feast, while some people favor a Christmas goose, and still others contend that carp or fried eel is the very thing for a tasty Yuletide dish.

Around the world, Christmas customs vary, but on one point nearly all are agreed. It's a season to celebrate.

In the United States and Canada, the "melting pot" origins of the population re-

sult in a medley of Christmas traditions from all over Americans and Canadians from Central Europe still prepare their traditional Yuletide foods with carp, while those from Italy might hanker for some Christmas capotoni, made with fried eels.

Especially during a severe winter, residents of the Northern U.S. and Canada would be glad to change places, or at least change weather, with those Australians, South Americans and others who enjoy summer activities at Christmas.

On the other hand, North Americans have made their own contributions to Christmas around the world. For instance, there's Santa, white-bearded and red-suited, who is now replacing St. Nicholas and other Yule gift givers in many countries.

TALLEST TREE

Tallest Christmas tree? In the U.S. the title probably goes to the Indianapolis, Ind., "tree" — the Soldiers and Sailors Monument. At Christmas, the 246-foot structure is decorated with electric candles and stars.

pine tree, surrounded by toys. Franklin Pierce introduced the modern Christmas tree to the White House in 1856.

Benjamin Harrison, in 1889, told reporters he planned an "old-fashioned Christmas" including a Christmas tree, for his family, and urged others to join him in observing the custom.

Conservation-minded Theodore Roosevelt once refused to allow a Christmas tree in the White House. His son, Archie, smuggled one in, however, and the President finally relented.

First lighting of the National Community Christmas Tree at the White House was observed in 1923, when Calvin Coolidge was President.

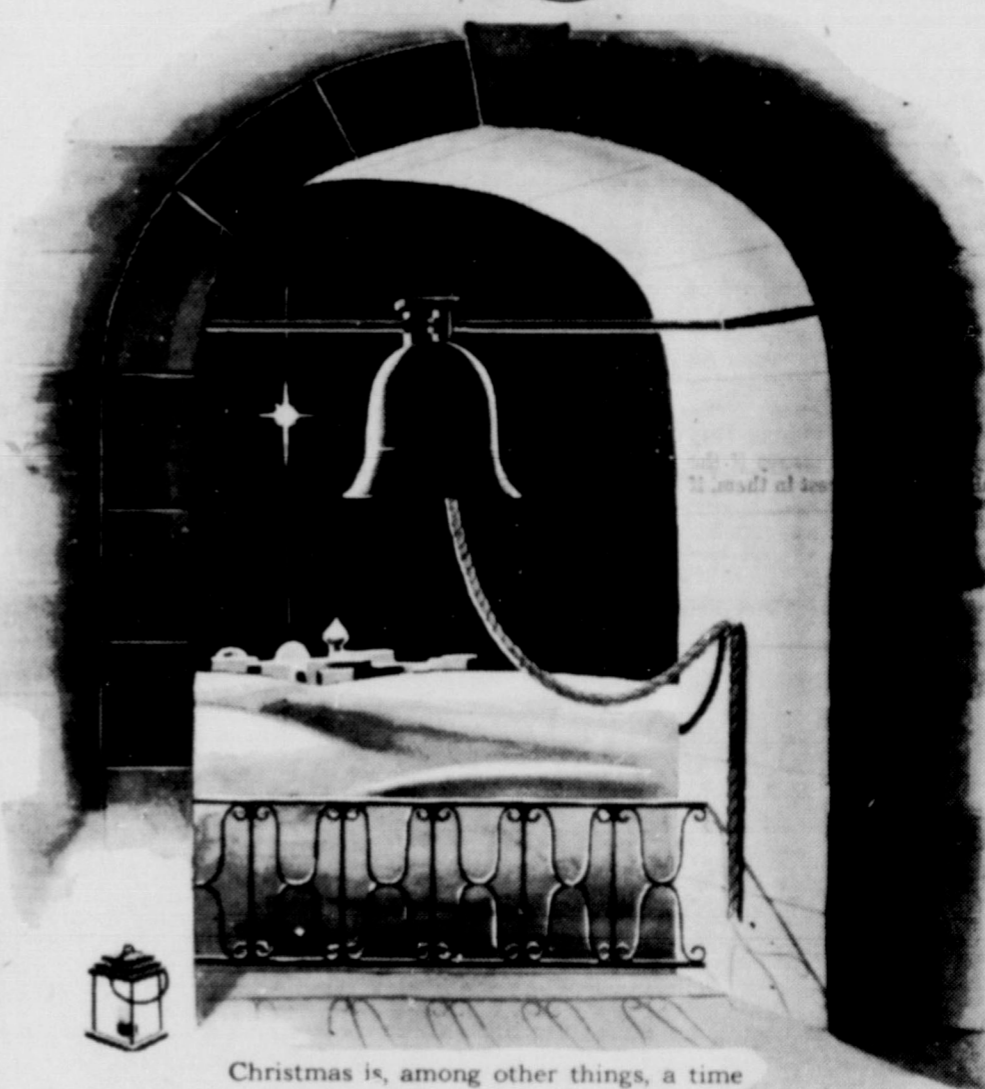

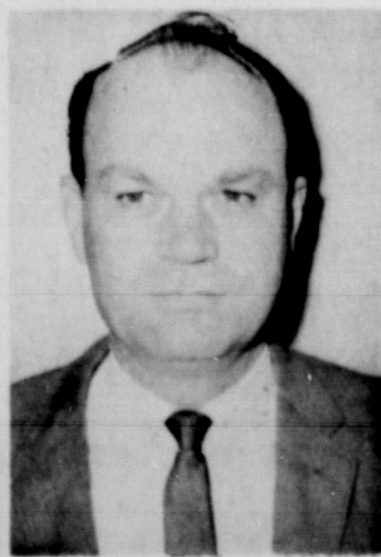

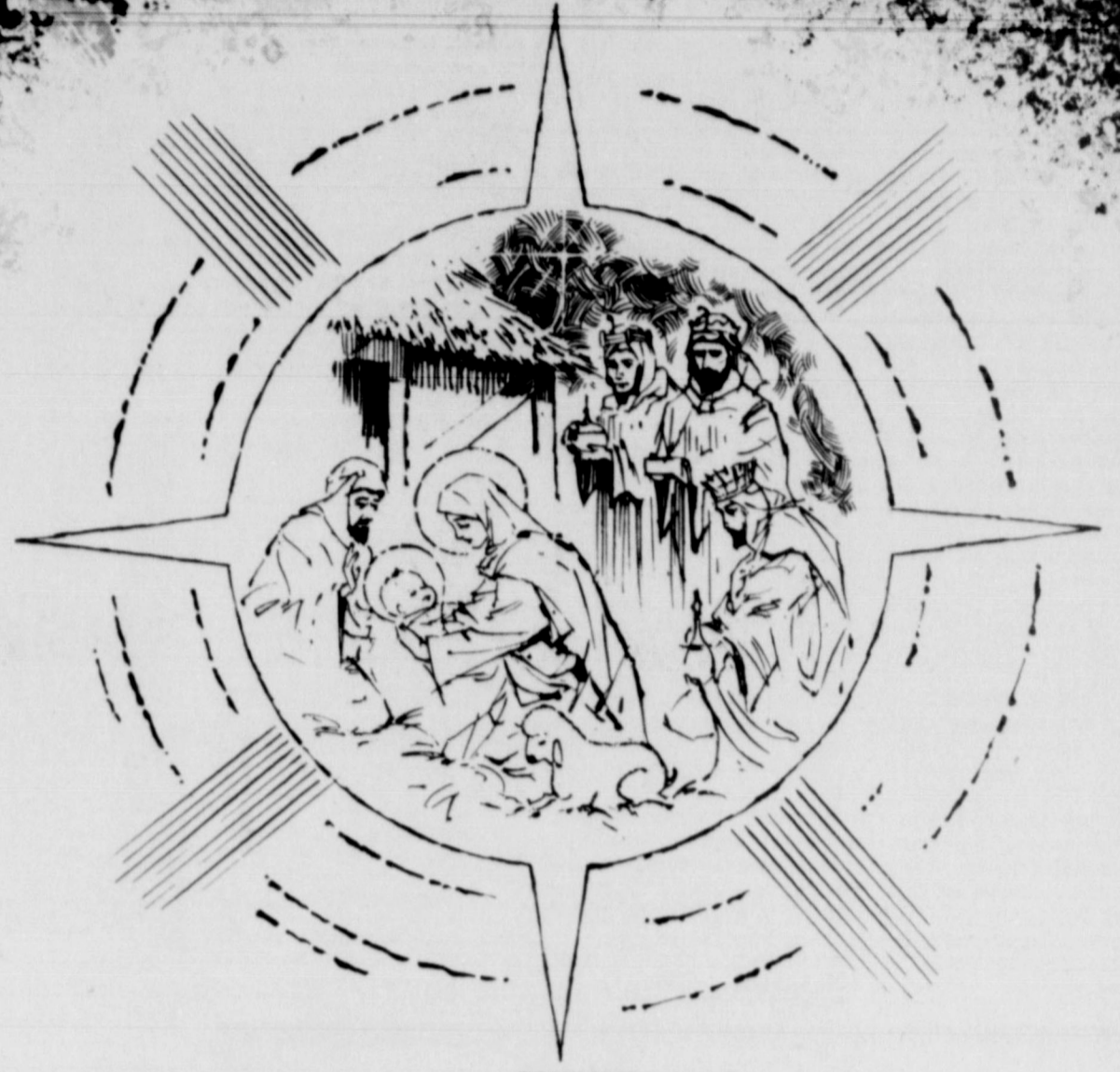
