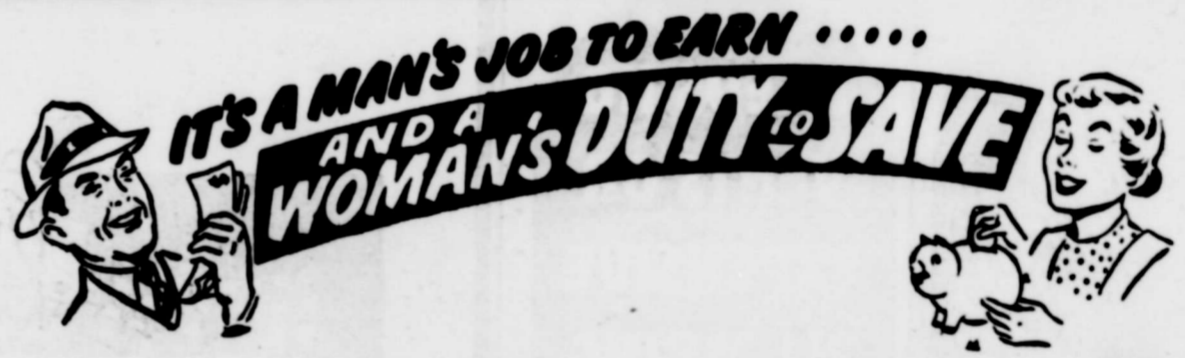

**H. D. CHATTER  
MEET THE POTATO**

Mr. Potato is on the plentiful food list this month, you know. That's one reason for including it on the shopping list.

Another reason is that leading nutritionists have exploded the old wives' tale that says potatoes make you fat. Actually, one medium-sized potato has about 100 calories—no more than a banana or an apple. Only about one-tenth of the potato is starch. The spud is important in the diet mainly because of its minerals and vitamins. Those include phosphorus and iron, Vitamin A, thiamin and riboflavin.

These good nutritional features about the potato add up to the reason our Texas Food Standard calls for a serving once a day.

Here are some good pointers on buying and storing potatoes. Look for potatoes that are clean and firm, have shallow eyes and no cuts, decay or green places. Keep them in cool, but not cold dark places if you're buying in quantity. Good quality potatoes should keep at least a couple of weeks in a bag or bin in the kitchen.

## PUBLIC SUPPORTS POSTAL RATE RAISES

According to a nationwide public opinion poll, approximately four out of five Americans think the post office department should be self-supporting.

This statement is based on the returns of a scientific nationwide opinion survey just completed by the Wengel Service Corporation of Princeton, New Jersey for the post office department.

In 200 cities and towns, as well as in rural areas in all 48 states and the District of Columbia, Wengel interviewers asked this question:— "Do you think the post office department ought to take in enough money from postage to pay all its costs, or is it all right if it doesn't take in enough to pay all its costs?"

The answers received divide as follows:  
 Ought to take in enough 78%  
 All right if it doesn't 14%  
 Other answers 2%  
 No opinion 6%

The opinion that the post office

department should take in enough money from postage to pay its way is held by all major segments of the population. The scientific survey included people of different ages and economic status in different geographical regions and sizes of communities in the same proportion that they occur in the population as a whole.

The public also rejected the principle of the post office department losing money on certain large users of the mail, casting a two to one vote in favor of making each class of mail pay its own way.

Their replies in response to this question were:

"In your opinion, are there any of these classes of mail where the postage rates ought to be less than the cost of handling the mail?"

None of them 67%  
 Yes 18%  
 No opinion 15%
