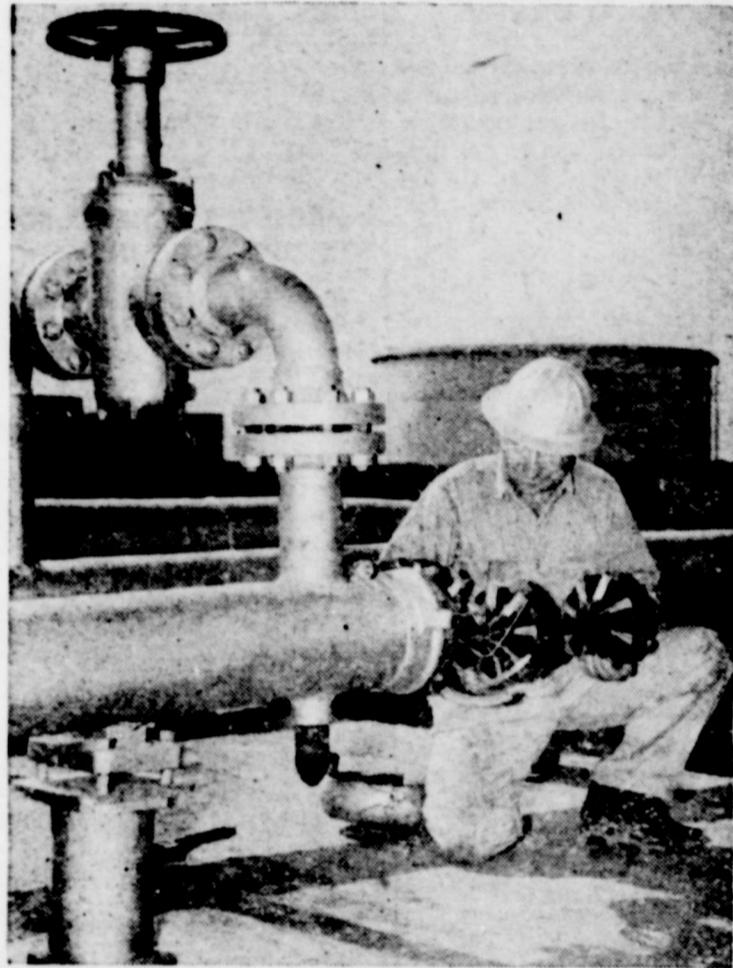

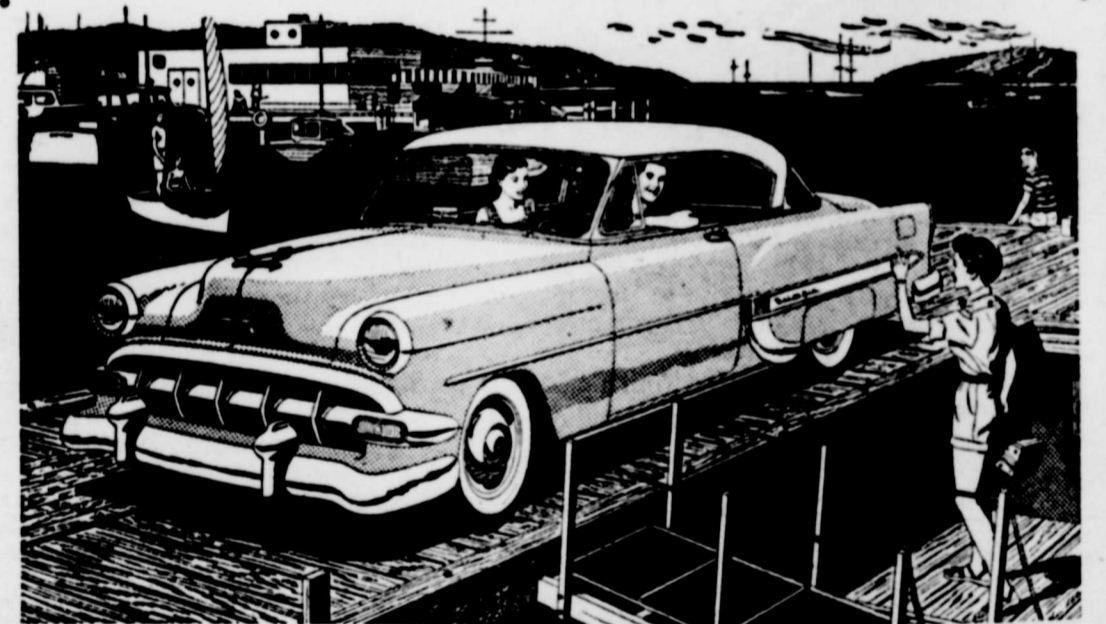

AMENDMENT SUMMARY

Authorizing the Legislature to fix the salaries of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, State Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and fixing compensation of members of the Legislature at \$25 per day for not more than 120 days of any session.

S. J. R. No. 5

Senate Joint Resolution No. 5, if adopted, would amend section 5, 21, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution, and Section 24 of Article III. It would also add a new Section 61 to Article III. This proposal would authorize the Legislature to fix the annual salaries of certain of the State's constitutional officials and it would set the pay of the members of the Legislature at \$25 for each day of a session up to 120 days.

Numerous amendments dealing with executive salaries have been submitted to the people. Only once has such an amendment been adopted, in 1936, when present salaries were fixed. Four previous proposals would have authorized the Legislature to set executive salaries. Proposals to increase pay of State Legislators have been presented to Texas voters thirteen times. Only one has been adopted, in 1930, when present provisions were approved.

The annual salaries covered by this proposed amendment are now fixed in the Constitution as follows: Governor, \$12,000; Attorney General \$10,000; State Treasurer, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Secretary of State, and Commissioner of the General Land Office, \$6,000. There is no limit in S.J.R. 5 on the annual salary rate for these officials which the Legislature might a-

dopt except that the salary could not be less than the amount now provided in the Constitution.

Twenty-six states pay their Governors more than does Texas. Twenty-one pay the same or less. These salaries range from \$4,500 to \$30,000 per annum. Twenty states pay their Attorney Generals more than Texas. Twenty-seven pay the same or less. Thirty-seven states pay their Secretaries of State more than Texas does, and thirty-six pay their State Treasurers more than Texas. Four other states pay their chief fiscal officers the same as Texas pays its Comptroller of Public Accounts, all others pay more. No other state has an office similar to our Commissioner of the General Land Office.

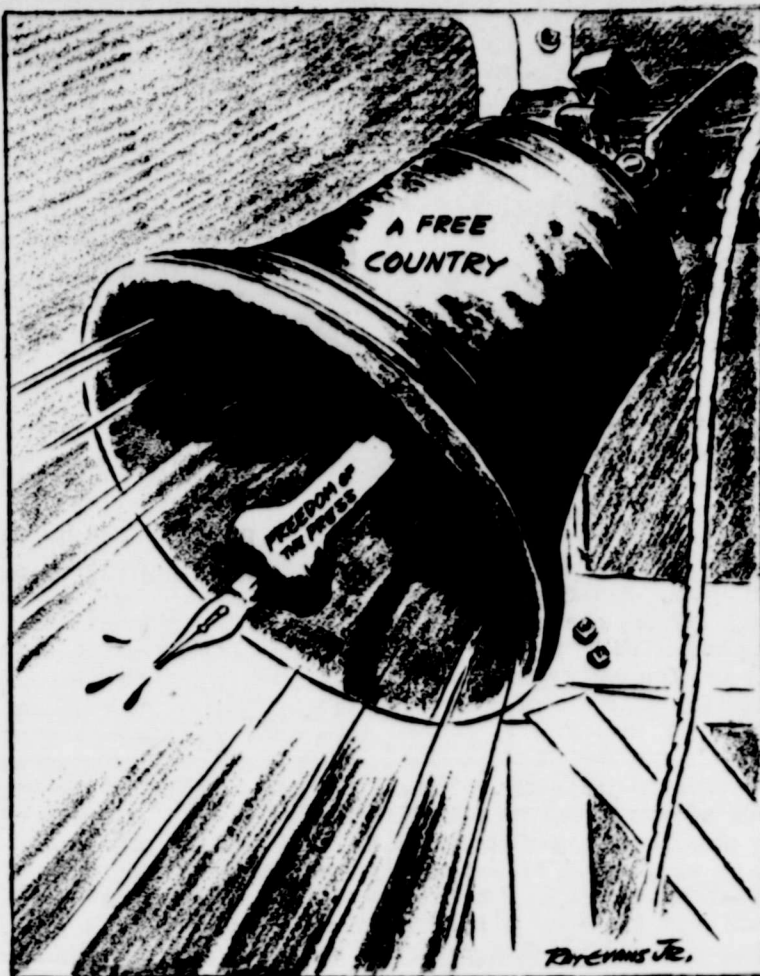
S.J.R. 5 would establish compensation of members of the Legislature at \$25 a day, not to exceed 120 days at any session; and nothing after the 120 days. This limit on the number of days would affect only the biennial regular sessions since special sessions are limited by the Constitution to thirty days. The proposal compares with present compensation of \$10 per day up to 120 days and \$5 per day thereafter.

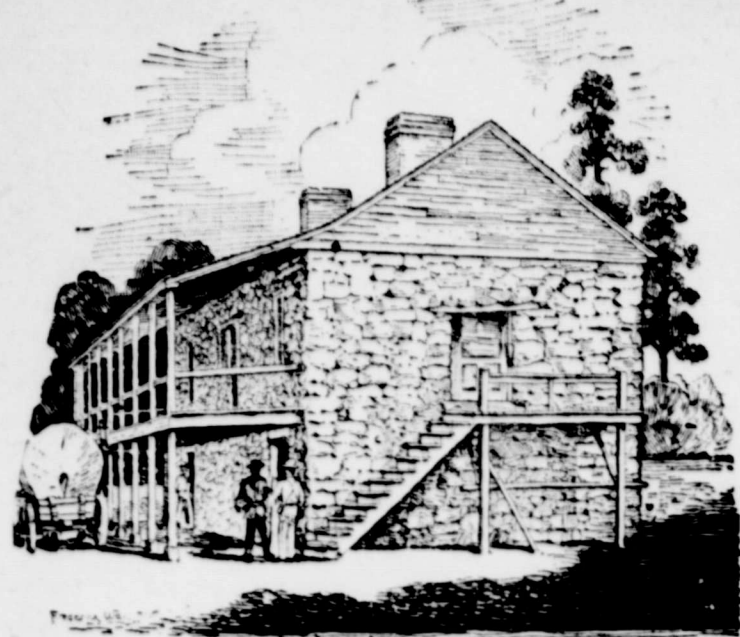

copy than the AP ever did. But—it is not only the foreign correspondent who suffers under censorship in the Soviet Union. There is a censor at every newspaper office and he's not interested in the literary content of the paper. He's more important than the editor, for he decides what the paper can and cannot say and the way it can, or cannot say it.

One of the many mysteries of Moscow is—when's the morning paper coming out?

Usually they hit the newsstands

about 6 o'clock in the morning, but twice a week, let us say, they'll emerge at 9:30 or 10:30. I have seen morning papers with circulations running into the millions come out as late as noon.

A man at one of the big papers shook his head over this one day when I asked him what was holding up the presses.

"The censor," he sighed. "He made them do the leading editorial over not once, but twice."

Does the Republican Party under President Eisenhower keep a censor at every American newspaper passing on what it can print?

Marine has heard the cry. "Get a sling shot!" The remark usually refers to one's ability to hit a target. However, one Marine took it seriously, got a sling shot and actually qualified on the regular 45 pistol course at the San Diego Recruit Training Center.

He is M/Sgt. Frank O. Freeman of Pensacola, Fla., now serving with the First Marine Aircraft Wing in Korea. He really doesn't need a sling shot since he is a distinguished rifle and pistol shooter, and has been firing in Marine Corps and civilian matches since 1947.

Last year he missed the Washington State High-Power Rifle Championship by three points. Despite many medals for rifle and pistol shooting Freeman claims his favorite weapon is a sling shot—and he is never without one. The one he uses in Korea today is made of ashwood with a 12 inch natural rubber sling. He has used it since 1949.

Freeman began using a sling when he was five years old. By the time he was of high school age he was shooting in local playground tournaments. The real thrill, says Freeman, is hunting—and getting that first rabbit. He made money while in high school by hunting small game.

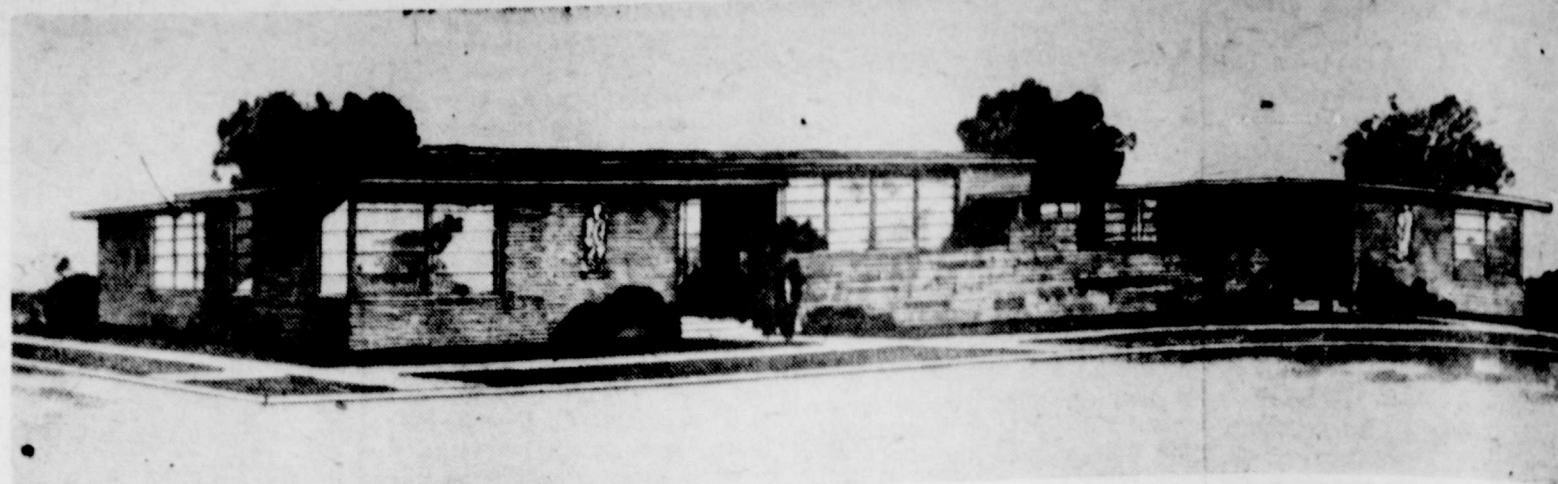
"We used to hunt bull frogs with a sling and lead pellets," he says. "Then we would sell the legs to local restaurants and use the money to buy more lead."

He has found that dogwood is the best sling shot material, because it has a steel-like hardness when seasoned.

thrill came last year near Del Mar, Calif., when he flushed a covey of quail. One broke away and circled alone. Freeman pulled the rubber, let go a slug, and killed the quail on the fly. That was his first flying target, though he had killed running blue grouse and pheasant.

"Most people don't realize it," Freeman explains, "but a properly used sling shot can be a deadly weapon. With a 200 grain slug and a 35 pound pull a rabbit can be killed at 30 yards. I've reached 250 yards without difficulty."

Freeman's experience at the San Diego range began when he noticed a young recruit having trouble firing a .45 caliber pistol. Freeman said he thought he could qualify with a sling shot, and did. He used expended 45 caliber slugs and during the rapid fire held four slugs in his right hand. He qualified with a score of 260—not had shooting with or without a sling shot.

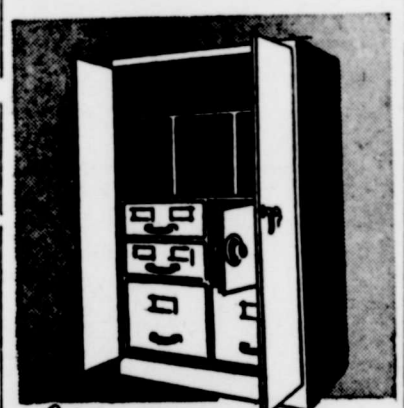

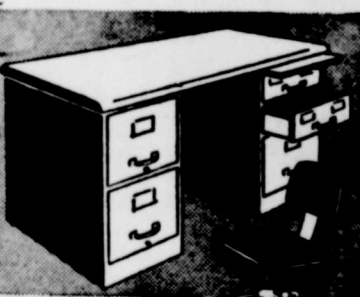

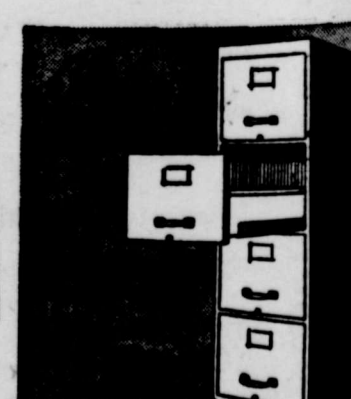
