### Stray Pooches To Be Jugged

In connection with a declared rabies emergency in Upton County proclaimed by County and City health officers, the Rankin City Commission this week has issued a notice that all dogs running loose on city streets, whether tagged or not, will be picked up and confined to the city dog pound.

Working with county officials, the city began construction of an enlarged and improved pound this week in preparation for the dog pick-up. It will be located in the county barn just west of the courthouse and is being constructed in such a manner that each dog will be kept in a separate enclosure. They will be fed and cared for the prescribed number of days to determine if they have rabies or not and then owners may get them back by paying their "board bill." Should a dog not be reclaimed within a reasonable length of time, it will be disposed of.

#### RABIED FOXES INCREASING

Severity of the rabies emergency has steadily increased over the past few weeks with more and more rabied foxes being killed within the towns of Rankin and McCamey and at least one dog in McCamey has been declared to be rabied. Some 30 people are taking the rabies shots in that town.

At least two children have been reported bitten in Rankin by dogs but it is believed that the animals were not rabied.

In commenting on the situation both Dr. J. D. Gossett, City Health Officer, and Mayor A. E. Ivy have pointed out that unless strong protective measures are taken, Rankin can expect a situation similar to that in McCamey before long.

"It's just a matter of time until one of the dogs running loose in Rankin will be bitten by a rabied fox and then the dog in turn will spread the disease before it can

### VOTERS FOLLOW STATE TREND CLOSE BALLOTING ON CANDIDATES

Upton County last week followed the state trend of close balloting in most offices and cast for what is probably a tight run-off total for Upton County last week.

In the gubernatorial race, Ralph Price Daniel evidently gained a lead in the July votes cast for O'Daniel and he polled 207 votes to 171 for A. A. Morgan.

In the attorney general contest, Price Daniel followed state trends with a lopsided 714 votes to 348 for Tom Wilson and Ramsey received 1066

votes for Lieutenant Governor. In the commissioner's race, only 12 votes separated the two contestants with H. Wheeler receiving 195 to 183 for W. O. Adams. Bill Moore won the constable post by 207 votes to 171 for A. A. Morgan.

## Filler by J. B.

For a good long while now we have been saying that most all newspaper editors were just a little on the "loose screw" side of things. Last week we did a very nice job of proving that point as those of you who read the fine print in the Rankin News probably have already found out.

After printing the ballots ourselves and publishing the constitutional amendments for four weeks we made the flat statement in the News last week that these amendments were to have been voted on Saturday.

Election Judge Higday was mighty close to tossing me out when it came my turn to vote. He informed me that just about everybody else was going to vote on them in

November and he thought he would just go along with the rest of 'em regardless of what we put in the paper. After looking foolish for a few minutes, stammering out some lame excuses and trying to mark our ballot with the wrong end of the pencil, we cast our vote for Cyclone Davis for governor and left there to slink back to the office where we meditated for considerable time on the strange habits of election judges who would not let a fellow vote on amendments in August just because they weren't supposed to be voted on 'till November.

A goodly amount of discussion on what to do about the rabies trouble has been passed back and forth the last few days and everyone seems to have some sort of plan. However, there is general agreement that a definite plan of action ought to be taken.

About one of the best that we have heard and one which seems to us would be the most logical is to get to the point of the trouble, namely the foxes. These animals are of no value to anyone since the rodent problem is not great in this country. They are heavy destroyers of quail and dove and other wild game. To eradicate a few of them would do no harm.

It has been suggested that the county, which pays a sizeable sum of money out for trappers every year, and the two cities of Rankin and McCamey get together and map out some way of killing out the foxes. It should be reasonably easy.

A ring of poison baits around the two towns would stop a large number of the animals from ever getting into town to start with and a little trapping along with the baits could make a definite dent in the fox population.

Another means to the end of a few foxes, but perhaps not as effective as the baits and traps,

would be an organized fox hunt to cover the immediate areas around towns. With a little brush beating and some fox calling, hunters should be able to bag quite a few of the pests.

Every so often the idea of building a lake in one of the canyons around Rankin comes to life. It's a good thought but one which, at first glance, seems a little impossible for a country as dry as this.

However, there has been some unofficial study on the matter by one engineer who says that it can be done. It is his opinion that there is a location within two miles of Rankin where a dam could be built that would empond enough water to form a lake over two miles long and averaging 30 feet in depth. It would empond enough water to last a town of 2,000 for two years. It is his further contention that such a lake in the Rankin area

would hold water the year around and could be considered "permanent."

We will grant that an undertaking of this sort would be a rather large task and would cost several hundred thousands of dollars but it would also, if properly handled, provide Rankin with some mighty nice recreation to say nothing of the amount of money it could possibly draw into the town.

We believe that some good thought to the matter would be worthwhile.

## Dove Season Opens Locally September 1

Dove season will open locally September 1 and will continue through October 17, according to the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Shooting hours will be from 12:00 noon until sunset with bag limit of 10 per day and no more than 10 in possession at any one time.

Means and methods allowed for taking the game have been listed as bow and arrow and shotguns of not larger than 10 gauge. Automatic or pump shotguns must be permanently plugged to capacity of 3 shells, including the shell in the chamber.

Local game officials have stated that prospects seem reasonably good in this area for hunters this season and that a good turn-out is expected.



ments will be made on sales of unshorn lambs regardless of whether the lambs are sold for slaughter, feeding or replacement. Then if the new owner sells the lambs with the wool on, the payment will be adjusted downward by the amount due on the weight of lambs when purchased. Likewise, if the new owner shears the lambs either in the feed lot or as a part of his replacement stock, his incentive payment on shorn wool will be adjusted downward by this same amount.

The method of figuring the rate of payment on lambs marketed with the wool on will be the same as for the 1955 marketing year. Lamb's wool, on the average, is coarser in grade and shorter in staple length than the U. S. shorn wool clip. Therefore, 80 percent of the difference between the national average price received by producers and the 62-cent incentive price is used figuring the rate of payments for unshorn lambs. The rate is figured on the basis of 5 pounds of wool per hundredweight of live lambs, but allowing for the adjustment in price, for easy figuring it is equivalent to 4 pounds per

hundredweight.

Thus, under the plan for the 1956 marketing year the original producer who sells an unshorn lamb weighing 70 pounds will get a lamb payment for 2.8 pounds of wool (70 lbs. liveweight x 4 lbs. per cwt.) Then the feeder who buys that lamb and brings him up to 100 pounds and sells him unshorn will get a lamb payment for 4 pounds of wool less the 2.8 pounds to be paid the original producer. Likewise, the breeder who buys the unshorn lambs at 70 pounds, puts them in his band or flock, and later shears them along with the others, will get a shorn wool payment for the full quantity of wool he shears and sells, less the 2.8 pounds of wool on the lambs purchased and for which the earlier owner is eligible for a lamb payment.

The adjustment in the payments to later owners will eliminate duplication in the total amounts paid. In effect, the original producer and later feeder or breeder-owner will share in the lamb payment according to the weight gained by the lambs while in their possession. Slaughterers, marketing agencies and dealers will no longer need to

provide the evidence of sale for slaughter which was required for payments under the 1955 marketing year. All the producer will need in support of his application will be the sales documents showing the pounds and net proceeds of shorn wool sold, the number and pounds of unshorn lambs sold and a record of the number and pounds of unshorn lambs purchased.
