PARK BOND ON CALLED NOVEMBER 13

passed by the commis-
sioners of Upton County,
at a special session last
week for an election to
be held on November 13 "on the
issuance of \$70,000.
This vote will coin-
ciding with the same
proposed constitutional
amendment to the state constitu-
tion at an election order
to be held this week, the bonds, if
approved by the voters, will be
issued in not to exceed
bearing interest at a
rate not to exceed four percent.
Purpose of the bonds,
as stated in the notice of election,
is for the purpose of improving
the streets and sidewalks of the
city of Rankin by means of retiring the
outstanding bonds, which interest
will be for the benefit of the
city, and to provide a sufficient
amount to pay the interest and
principal of said bonds and to
pay said bonds.

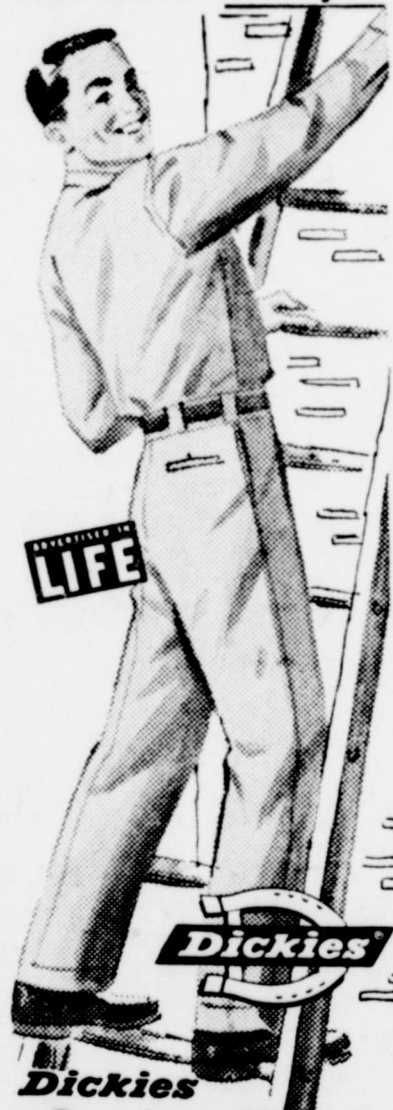

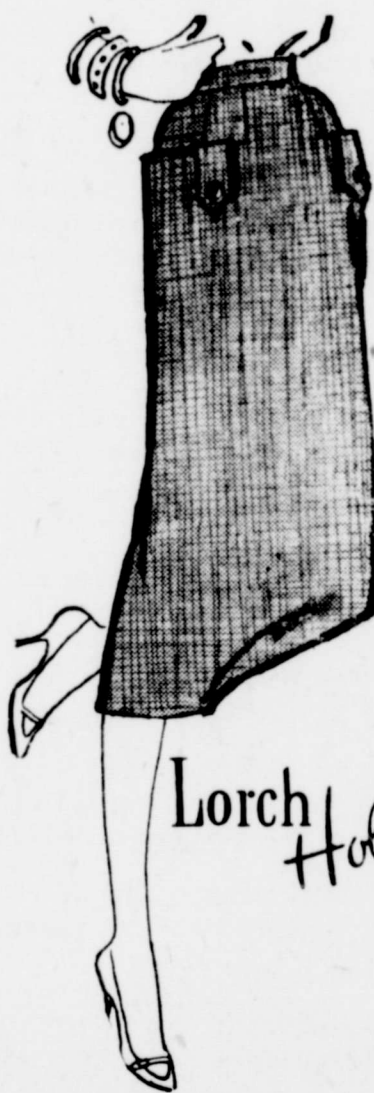

in accordance with the provisions
of Article 704, Revised Civil Statu-
tes of Texas, 1925, as amended. The
County Judge is authorized and
directed to have a copy of said
notice posted at the Courthouse
door and in each of the election
precincts in Upton County, Texas,
not less than fifteen (15) days
prior to the date fixed for holding
said election, and the said elec-
tion shall be held not less than
fifteen (15) days nor more than
thirty (30) days from the date of
this order. He shall also cause said
notice to be published on the same
day in each of two successive weeks
in a newspaper of general cir-
culation published within Upton
County, Texas, the date of the first
publication to be not less than
(14) days prior to the date set for
said election. Except as otherwise
provided in said Article 704, as
amended, the manner of holding
said election shall be governed by
the laws governing general elec-
tions.
