DAILY NEWS REPORTS MIX-UP

A number of daily newspapers reporting on the game got their facts and figures mixed up and credited all touchdowns to Chub Stephenson. Actually, Chub scored twice and kicked one extra point while Bill Lewis tallied twice.

All four scores were set up by runs by the entire backfield with some of the best downfield blocking and line play turned in thus far by the Devils.

KIRBY ASKS COOPERATION

In commenting on the newspaper reports, Coach Ted Kirby said that "Mamas who are getting all upset over these stories, are just tearing up our ball club. If they would stop and think, they would realize that no one connected with the Red Devils or the school would turn in a news report such as the one given on the Grandfalls-Rankin game. That report had to come from either sportswriters representing the daily newspapers or by someone from Grandfalls who was not familiar with our players."

Kirby pointed out that all the boys on the team understood that the news reports were inaccurate but that dissatisfaction among the fans would not do the team any good.

General Election Balloting Points To Record In Votes

Upton County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 6, and play their part in the general election, voting what is probably a record size ballot for Texas. Measuring over two feet in length and a foot wide, the king size ballot lists four columns of candidates and one write-in column.

Election judges are expected to earn their money this year with a candidate running on a write-in for governor and a local county drive for a write-in for County Attorney.

In addition to these, there will be eight proposed state constitutional amendments on which voters will mark their preferences.

AMENDMENT FOUR

In the amendment issues, Amendment 4, the so-called teacher retirement amendment, is expected to draw the largest amount of attention. It has the support of teacher organizations throughout the state and has received a considerable amount of favorable com-

ment from many sources.

Other amendments which are expected to draw a heavy vote will be numbers 2 and 5 with the first dealing with powers delegated to commissioners courts and the latter dealing with the controversial Veteran Land Board.

A few sample ballots are still available at the Rankin News for those who would like to study the amendments and the main ballot itself.

FOUR PARTIES LISTED

Four political parties, the Democratic, the Republican, the Constitution and the Independent parties are listed on the ballot with the first three having candidates running for the top national and state offices. No candidates are listed in the Independent party column. One race that is expected to be of interest is the 16th Congressional District contest between J. T. Rutherford, Democrat, and Chas. H. Gibson, Republican.

WRITE-INS ACTIVE

W. Lee O'Daniels, defeated for the Democratic nomination for governor, has been making a sustained drive for the position on a write-in campaign in which he has spent a considerable amount of money. Most observers feel that he has little chance of defeating the Democratic nominee, Price Daniel, but expect him to poll a substantial number of votes.

In the county write-in contest, political supporters of John A. Menefee are staging a drive on his behalf against Steve Preslar. In 1954 a similar situation saw 474 votes cast for Menefee and 822 for Preslar. Menefee carried two boxes in Rankin in that election.

POLLS OPEN AT 8:00

Polls for the general election will open at 8:00 a.m. and remain open until 7:00 p.m. with polling places being the same as in previous elections. Election judges for Rankin voting will be E. C. Higday, Box 1 at the Commissioners Court room in the courthouse; J. M. Tippet, Box 2 at the Phillips Gasoline Plant office; and Norman Elrod, Box 3 at the Rankin Park Building.

ABSENTEE VOTING SLOW

Only 50 absentee votes had been cast Tuesday morning, October 30, at the clerk's office. This figure is considerable behind previous absentee balloting that was carried on in Democratic primaries last summer but is believed to be due to the number of people out of the county during the summer season.

Before another issue of the News comes out, we will have all voted in the November 6 general election.

A number of interesting items will develop on this election such as whether or not Texas will go Republican again. W. Lee O'Daniel will get many votes for Governor—and we think he will get more than just a few—how the Republican running against J. T. Rutherford will come out and the results on the eight amendments.

Yes, and for Upton County, we even have what appears to be a rather strong write-in campaign for County Attorney. Voters should get their money's worth next Tuesday.

On the national level, we believe the Republicans will win by a much smaller margin than last time but we believe Texas will return to the Democratic column by a good margin—these predictions coming from one of the country's poorest political predictors.

On the constitutional amendments there are several which we would strongly urge everyone to vote for. Number 1 is a good and just amendment and should be approved.

Number 2 is a very sensible amendment and one which would be of considerable benefit to Upton County. We elect commissioners to run our county for us and they should have the authority of using the tax money for the various funds as they see the need. Actually, they are doing it now by calling an election every so often to reallocate the money into various funds. This is an unnecessary thing and the amendment would put an end to it.

Number 3 is an amendment that would allow the governing bodies of Texas University and A & M to play the stock market. If you favor such a project, vote for it—personally, we can think of a few things against such a measure and do not hold with the amendment.

Number 4 is a very important item. It would give our school teachers retirement benefits and certainly they are entitled to something more than a farewell dinner and a pat on the back after 30 or

more years of putting up with our kids and trying to teach them their three R's. By all means, vote for amendment 4.

Number 5 has to do with the Veteran's Land Board. If you believe that this has been of benefit to the veterans, then you will want to vote for the amendment. It is unlikely that there will be any more scandal attached to this board and the new set-up will probably work all right. Take your choice.

Number 6, as we understand it, is merely a correction of a law that already exists.

Number 7 is another amendment that makes good sense. A vote for it would be a reasonable thing.

Number 8 is a rather controversial item with some holding that a person's past record should not be held against them. However, since the judge or magistrate has an option of either permitting or denying bail to a person convicted of two previous felonies, it ought not work any handicap on anyone if passed.

Of the eight, we strongly urge a vote for numbers 2 and 4 above all others.

Rankin football fans apparently liked what they saw at Grandfalls last Friday night. We have heard

more favorable comment on all the boys from this game than any played thus far. They all looked good.

But the Red Devils won something more than the football game last week. After the game they had their supper in a cafe in Grandfalls and the owner commented to some of the Rankin fans that the Red Devils was the most orderly and courteous group they had ever had the pleasure of serving.

Compliments such as these are worth more than all the ball games played. And it was not the first such tribute paid to a group of Rankin school students. The band, the pep squad and the entire student body enjoy a fine reputation from Van Horn to Dallas and they are to be commended highly on it.

"A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches and fond favor rather than silver and gold," so said Solomon in the Book of Proverbs.

Congratulations are in order to the Rankin student body on their fine representation of their school and community on these out-of-town trips.

Record Growth Set By Lion District 2-T-2 For World
