### ACTIVITY INCREASING

Some three years ago a strong showing was indicated on a Texas Company well approximately nine miles southeast in this area. There was little further activity until less than a year ago when drilling on stepouts from this well were resumed. Since that time, some oil has been found in every well drilled in that vicinity with four producers now in operation and a strong show developed last week in one now being drilled on University land.

### NEW ROAD OPENED

Since early in the summer, Upton County has been in the process of opening a new road into this field. Preliminary work has been completed and some traffic has already been over the road. Should development in the present drilling area continue, it is believed that Crockett County will probably be interested in tying into this new road and thus opening a shorter route to the Ozona area. The road joins Highway 67 some three miles east of Rankin.

This is another project that has long been under discussion in Rankin with the feeling by a majority of people that it would be most beneficial to Rankin should the route ever be opened all the way to Ozona.

Commissioner Tommy Workman, in whose precinct the new road is located, has expressed the opinion that, should the road be opened, the State would likely take it over and apply asphalt paving.

### VISIBLE INDICATIONS

Visible indications of the amount of activity in the area to the south east can be observed from Rankin by the amount of dust rising at almost any given hour from the hills to the south as trucks, cars, drilling rigs and doodle-buggers travel the old Noelke road south of town.

### WALL SERVICES HELD IN DUBLIN MONDAY

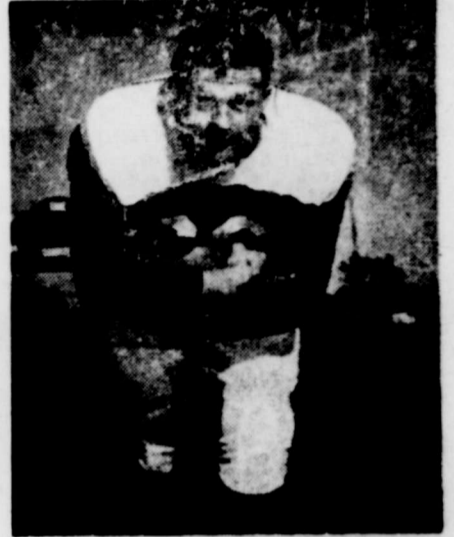
Funeral services for R. L. Wall were held Monday, November 19, at 3:00 p.m. at the First Methodist Church in Dublin, Texas.

Patrons Christmas**

Postal patrons this coming Christmas season can speed the processing and assure quicker delivery of their Christmas parcels and cards by availing themselves of various postal information pamphlets, Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced today.

The services mentioned by the Postmaster General include:

1. This year, for the first time, sealed parcels may be mailed at the third or fourth-class postage rates without labels, notations, en-

dorsements, or hieroglyphics of any kind authorizing the opening of the parcels for postal inspection. Packages sealed with modern sealing materials or even with just plain Christmas seals should carry better in the mail than unsealed ones. Strong cord should also be used.

2. Combination Mail, which was used for the first time during last Christmas season, and which permits a mailer to enclose a letter or message inside a gift parcel and pay the appropriate postage on it plus the postage for the package itself.

3. Certified Mail, also used for the first time in the 1955 season,

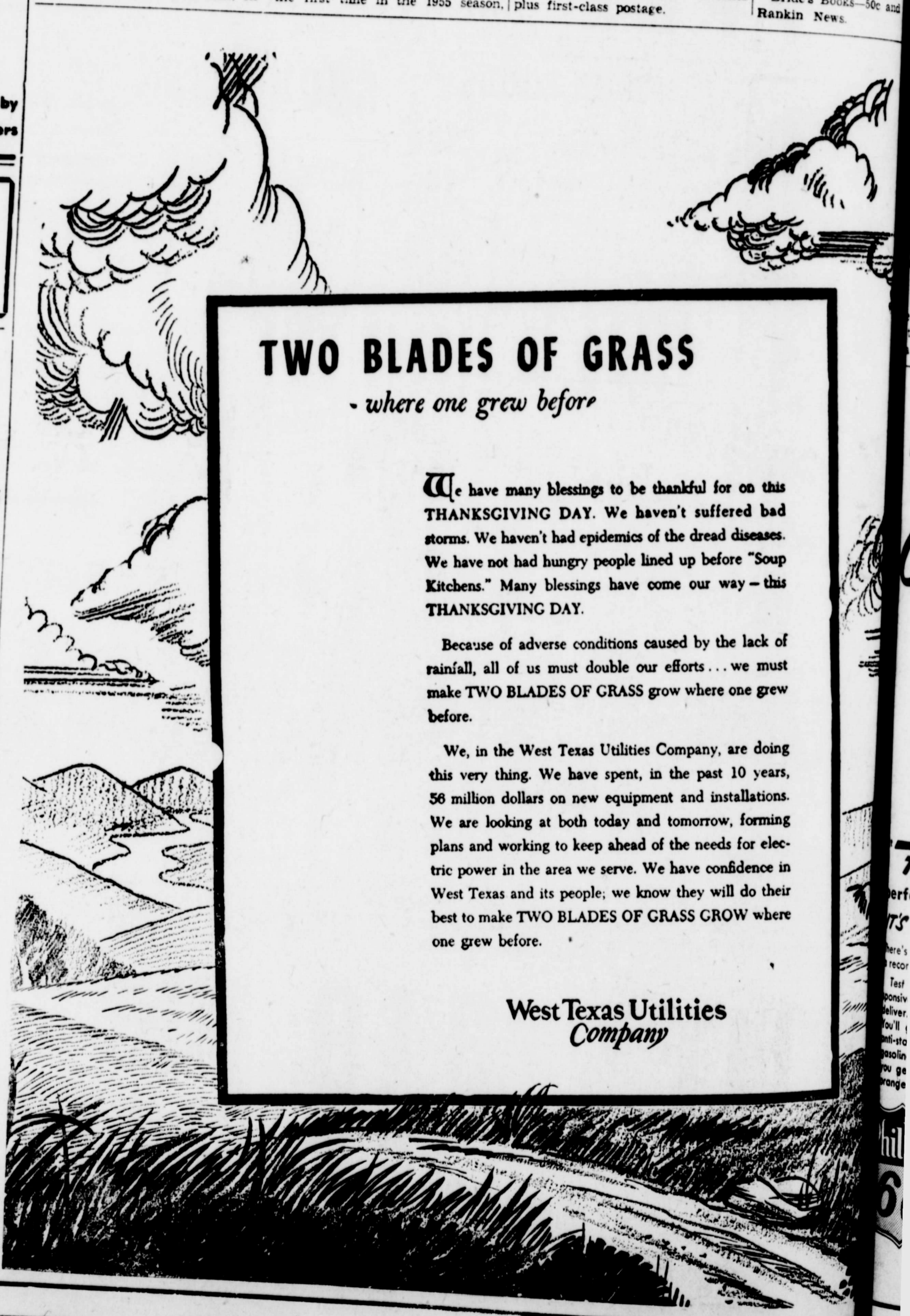
