In taking steps to combat the threat of a full-scale outbreak of the dread disease, the city commission, city health officer and county officials began making plans this week to begin a general round-up of all stray dogs and animals in the area. Notice has been given to owners of dogs that beginning Monday, February 11, all animals found running loose within the city will be picked up and disposed of.

Last summer, a similar program was initiated when rabies appeared to be on the rise in the area and up until recent weeks it appeared that the spread had been checked.

PUBLIC HEARING IN McCAMEY THURSDAY NIGHT—

COURT DELAYS ACTION PENDING PUBLIC MEET

GIRLS WIN DISTRICT BASKETBALL TITLE

With a 60-44 win over Barnhart last Monday night, the Rankin High School girls basketball team won the championship of District 94-B. Over the past years this has not been an unusual accomplishment for girls teams but this year's squad has perhaps one of the best records set for some time with their 17 won and 3 lost record for the year. They were undefeated in district.

A recap of the week's games give Rankin's "B" team girls a 43-28 win over Stanton last Thursday night for a 9 won and 3 lost season record. Pamela McKee was high with 17 points, followed by Carolyn Hill with 14.

Action on the proposed bond issue to improve the Upton County courthouse and jail facilities and build a sub-station in McCamey has been delayed by the Commissioners' Court, pending the outcome of a public hearing in McCamey.

Set for 7:30 p.m. tonight, Thursday, February 7, the hearing will be held in the county park building and is open to anyone who wishes to attend. This hearing came about through a request by the McCamey Chamber of Commerce that a public "airing" be given the proposed bond issue.

According to a report carried in the McCamey News last week, the Chamber of Commerce in that city does not favor the construction of the sub-station since it would de-

prive them of some \$60 per month revenue they now receive from the county for rent on quarters in the Chamber building. For the past several years, Upton County has rented office space for a deputy sheriff and other county officials from the McCamey Chamber of Commerce. Should the sub-station be built, the county would no longer have use for this space.

MAY SEEK COLISEUM

Although no definite program has been announced for the public hearing Thursday night, it is said that plans will be presented by Fred Buford, architect from Dallas who is handling the remodeling plans for the Commissioners' Court, showing coliseums that have been built in other towns in the \$200,000 price range.

Just what action will be taken on this matter has not been determined at this time but it is assumed that a petition to the court asking them to build the coliseum would be necessary should McCamey decide to ask for one.

PETITIONS READY

Petitions for the courthouse improvement election were still in circulation this week and are believed to have the required number of signatures necessary for calling of the election. As yet, no definite date has been set by the court for receiving these petitions but it is assumed that they will be presented at the next regular meeting.

FIREMEN GET COATS

Ten big, bright red firemen's coats arrived in Rankin this week and were issued to city volunteer firemen last Tuesday night at fire practice.

The new coats, costing almost \$20 each, were purchased by the city and are a much needed article for firemen since clothes are almost always ruined in fighting fires without protection such as the coats give. Hosemen and those who will be in close contact with the fires were issued the equipment.

BIDS TAKEN ON

BALL PARK LIGHTS

Upton County Commissioners' Court accepted the bid of Voss Co. of Snyder as low bidder on a contract to furnish lighting for the new little league ball parks.

Two other firms entered bids on this work.

UPTON POLL TAX PAYMENTS AT 1717

Poll tax payments for Upton County reached 1717 for the 1956 receipts with 252 exemptions, a total eligible voting strength of 1969.

This total failed by some 40 receipts to reach the all time high for an "off-year" of 2009 poll taxes and exemptions paid in 1954. Last year's total was 2530, highest figure ever reached.

*Denotes regular election years. Percentage of property owners who would be eligible to vote in bond elections involving the county have not been determined from the 1956 list as yet but is expected to be released by the Tax Collector's office within the next few weeks.

The last bond election held was the Park Bond issue involving little league baseball parks when 1352 votes were cast. In April of 1955, voters on a proposed county road improvement bond, voted 404 for and 306 against for a total of 710 ballots. A two-thirds majority was required to pass this issue. That represented voters from the 1954 poll tax list of 2009.

Should the courthouse improvement bond election be called on April 2, as is tentatively planned, only qualified property owners would be eligible to vote on the issue.

For the past few weeks it has been most noticeable that folks in Rankin are putting in a good bit of work on their yards and homes. pairs on the courthouse, then that might be the solution. On the other hand, there can be no denying that the courthouse and jail needs remodeling and it might be just as well to go ahead with that part of it and try to work out the McCamey issue later.

As for Rankin, we have a pretty

good stake in the Fort Worth coliseum, thanks to all the stuff the 4-H Club has won there down through the years.

Back in 1928-29, the fourth grade in Rankin schools was a rather large group of hard working students and attended school in the original building which was torn down some five years ago.

Most of those pictured do not live in Rankin now and several could not be identified. Identifications that could be made are given in their order from the left side of the row.

Front row, left to right, Mildred Carney, Mary Higday (fourth), Omaha Gene Roberts (fifth), Victor Johnson (eighth).

Second row: Lowe Dyson, Johnny Hurst, Bud Garner (fifth, deceased), Jess Cope (eighth), Frank Sartain (ninth), Ruby Childress (tenth).

Third row: Opal Elliott, L. Z. Johnson, L. Z. Brown, Kelly Bean, Charley Hale (sixth), Vernelle Powell (Mrs. Gordon Steele-eighth), Mrs. H. G. Secrest, teacher, deceased. This was the first year of operation of the New High School building—presently the junior high building. Mrs. Secrest died from pneumonia, contacted during the winter of the 1929-30 term.

1936 saw the graduation of the 4th grade class pictured above. Only 8 students remained to get their cap and gowns from the some 30 in the class in 1929. A number had moved away before that time and others were in earlier or later classes for one reason or another.

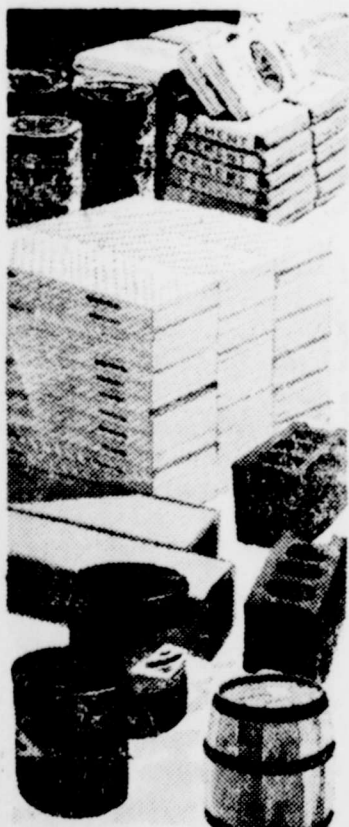

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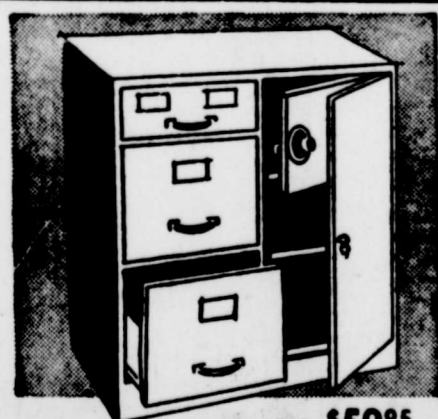
