Meeting To Be Held On New Golf Group

A group of interested persons have called an open meeting for 7:30 sharp Thursday night, February 21, at the Rankin Park Building to discuss the formation of another golf organization in Rankin.

Tentative plans call for formation of a membership with dues at around \$2.00 per month to lease a tract of land now owned by Upton County and operate as a non-profit golfing organization. Dues would go toward maintenance of the golf course only.

As presently planned, the new group would be open to the general public and would operate the golf course with a 25c green free for school students and 75c for adults if they did not wish to pay the membership dues by the month.

Open to all interested persons, the meeting is being held to determine whether or not enough people are interested in this type of golf association to make its formation feasible.

1.4 Inches Of Rain Measured In Rankin

FOUR SCHOOL TRUSTEES

On Saturday, April 6, voters in Rankin Independent School District will ballot on the election of four school trustees. Those up for election will be Bruce McGill, Walton Harral, Floyd Everett and Norman Elrod. Elrod is presently serving the uncompleted term of Joe Powell. The candidate elected to this post will serve for only one year and then the seat will be up again for a regular three-year term.

In the city election, the council seat presently held by J. B. Pettit will be filled. Ray Boggs is the other councilman, who, along with Mayor Ivy, make up the city council.

Deadline for filing in both elections have been extended until 10 days before the election. Anyone wishing to file for the school board seats should contact Stanley Kozimor, business manager, at the high school. City secretary, Omar Warren will take the names of candidates for the city elections.

At the present time, all the above named men have indicated that they will seek re-election on the April City and School elections.

Lions Club Light Bulb Sale To Be Held Monday

Rankin Lions Club will stage their annual light bulb sale Monday evening, February 25. Members of the club will meet at West Texas Utilities offices at 4:30 p.m. and make a house-to-house sales drive.

Prices of the bulbs will be \$2.00 for a special pack consisting of four 100 watt bulbs, two 75 watt bulbs, two 60 watt bulbs and one 15 watt bulb. This will be their standard pack but special combinations of any size bulbs can be purchased.

Also, at the same time, the club will take special orders for bulbs by the case or tubes for fluorescent lighting purposes. These orders will be filled either the following day or as soon as supplies are available. It has been pointed out that

these are all first-class bulbs and will be sold for less than one would ordinarily pay for them. Proceeds will go into the Lions Community fund. In their last sales effort of this kind, they raised a gross of some \$400.

TWO TEAMS INVOLVED

To make the contest more interesting to members, the club has divided into two teams with Fred Welling heading one and Ed Stewart the other. They will divide the town into two parts with the group selling the least amount due to handle the cooking and serving of the pancakes at the Lions Pancake Supper in early March.
