Business Men Hold Discussion Fighter Credit Regulations

Meeting held last Monday sponsored by the Credit Bureau in Rankin, local merchants and business men held a lengthy session to discuss a number of matters to trade in the community.

houses in Rankin. It was proposed, and agreed upon by those present, that all accounts which are now being carried as delinquent would be reported to the Credit Bureau. It was also agreed to pass on to the Bureau, which, in turn will make the information available to all local merchants, other details pertaining to the buying and payment habits of customers.

GOOD CREDIT RATINGS

In the meeting, Merle Brown, operator of the Credit Bureau in Rankin, stressed the importance of a good credit rating to individuals as well as businesses and pointed out that delinquent accounts, which were reported to her would be entered on the records kept by that office.

"Everyone should make it a point to keep their credit rating in good condition," she stated, "since this information is passed on to anyone who requests it in connection with credit buying."

"Once a bad report goes into the records, there is little that can be done to take it off," she explained.

PROMOTIONS DISCUSSED

Several other items affecting local trade were discussed, among them, several types of promotions to encourage people to trade in Rankin and a promotion to stress the importance of a good credit rating. Further meetings have been planned for the group.

Courthouse Improvements Would Double Present Size

Proposed plans for renovating the present Upton County Courthouse would double the floor space of the building as it now stands, according to Fred Buford, architect.

Proposed preliminary drawings of the remodeling work that would be done should the \$410,000 bond issue be approved by Upton voters on April 2, give the following floor plans:

Ground floor: County Clerk's office would be enlarged to 1800 square feet plus additional storage and a mechanical room which would be housed in the present

basement. Commissioners' Court room would include 480 square feet; county judges office, 240 square feet; county attorney's office, 182 square feet; secretary for county judge and county attorney, 120 square feet; county law library and additional office space, 232 square feet.

Tax assessor-collector's office would be enlarged to 1130 square feet, as now compared with about a fourth of that amount; 240 sq. ft. for the sheriff's office. The county auditor and county treasurer office would be separated whereas they are now both in the same room. Space for the auditor would be 500 square feet and 400 for the treasurer. The first floor would also include an office for the

county welfare agent.

SECOND FLOOR

On the second floor of the building would be a 2100 square feet district courtroom, jury quarters for men and women with one 12-bed room and one 6-bed room, separate restrooms, bailiff's quarters and closets; judges chambers, lawyers' offices, home demonstration agent office, soil conservation agent office and county agent office.

JAIL ADDITIONS

Proposed additions to the county jail would see the first floor remodeled and enlarged and would include jail kitchen, garage for county automobiles and living quarters for the sheriff.

On the top floor would be jail quarters for women, girls, boys, men (felony) and men (misdemeanor). Each would be separate from the other.

In the present jail, there are no provisions for separating felony prisoners from misdemeanor, no quarters for women and none for juveniles. All prisoners are kept in the single cell block.

In addition to the separate quarters, additional safety features would be built into the jail, presently described by authorities as being unsafe for holding serious felony cases.

COSTS GIVEN

Estimates on the costs of the proposed improvements have been set at \$315,000 on the courthouse and \$75,000 on the jail. Estimates have put the worth of the courthouse, should it be improved, at above \$700,000.

Candidates Now School Board Race

Candidates have now filed for positions on the Rankin School board election to be voted on April 6.

Enter the race is Alvin Bushong, 40-years-old, for a full 3-year term. He has served in Rankin and Upton the past 14 years.

Others have two children who are a junior, Alvin Bushong, Jr., and a daughter in Junior High.

Opponents for the 3-year term are Walton Harral, Bruce Everett and D. F. Schnaubert. Harral, Everett presently hold positions on the board.

Other candidates in the election are Elrod, running for a second year remaining in the unexpired term of Joe Powell. Elrod was elected by the board to fill the term until such time as an election could be held.

Pettit Will Seek Re-Election To City Commission Seat

J. B. Pettit, Jr., incumbent in the coming city election April 2, has announced that he will seek re-election. Last week, E. C. Higday announced that he is a candidate for the post presently held by Pettit.

Now serving his third term on the commission, Pettit is a local ranchman and works part-time for the Rankin schools. In his last race for the seat on the commission in 1955, he defeated J. T. Bushong.

Other members of the City Council are Ray Boggs, councilman, and A. E. Ivy, Mayor. Neither is up for election this year.

Chuck Wagon Fire Doused Monday

A fire, originating in the kitchen at the Chuck Wagon, a cafe owned and operated by Pete Mamos, was brought under control Monday morning with the help of fire extinguishers and a garden hose.

Answering the call at about 10:00 a.m., the Rankin Volunteer Fire Department did not have to go into full action since most of the blaze was put out by Eddie Yocham and several bystanders from Yocham's 66 Service Station.

Believed to have originated in the hot plate, considerable damage was done by the fire in the kitchen area of the trailer-house type building while smoke damage resulted throughout. Mamos was out of the building at the time the fire started.

Rankin Schools Will Host Literary Contest March 22

March 22, Rankin will be the literary portion of the Interscholastic League Spring meeting, a full-day affair, scheduled beginning at 9:00 a.m. and running until 5:00 p.m.

W. O. Skiles, superintendent of schools, has been named chairman of the spring meeting. Jack Skiles, junior high principal, will be chairman of the events. Wink, Imperial, Grandfalls and Rankin schools entered in the contest.

At the Friday meeting, some 150 students from the 5 schools will compete in a variety of contests which will be held in the afternoon. Events include: declamation, poetry reading, extemporaneous speech, one-

act play, story-telling, picture memory contest, ready writing, spelling and plain writing, number sense, slide rule, typewriting and shorthand.

Students from all grades will enter, with Rankin having contestants in all phases of the competition.

WILL DEFEND TITLE

For Rankin, it will be a title defense all the way, having won the district Interscholastic League contest last year. In the literary division, they scored a large number of the points that gave them the over-all win.

Other events that will be covered in the meet will be the volleyball contest in Imperial on Wed-

nesday, March 20, track and field meet in Wink on March 30th, golf in Monahans on April 1-5, and tennis in Rankin on April 4.

FRIDAY PROGRAM

A number of events will be open to the public in the Friday meeting here with the one that is expected to draw the largest attendance being the one-act plays. These will be held in the high school auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. Admission will be 50c for adults and 25c for students.

Schools entering this part of the contest are Rankin, Grandfalls, Imperial, and Barnhart. The Sul Ross Speech Department will judge the one-act plays, as well as declamation and extemporaneous speaking.

In commenting on the game, Coach D. E. Jones said, "We were disappointed in losing but we feel we had a good season. We especially want to thank all the fans for their fine support and encouragement given the girls. It was this help that enabled us to go as far as we did."

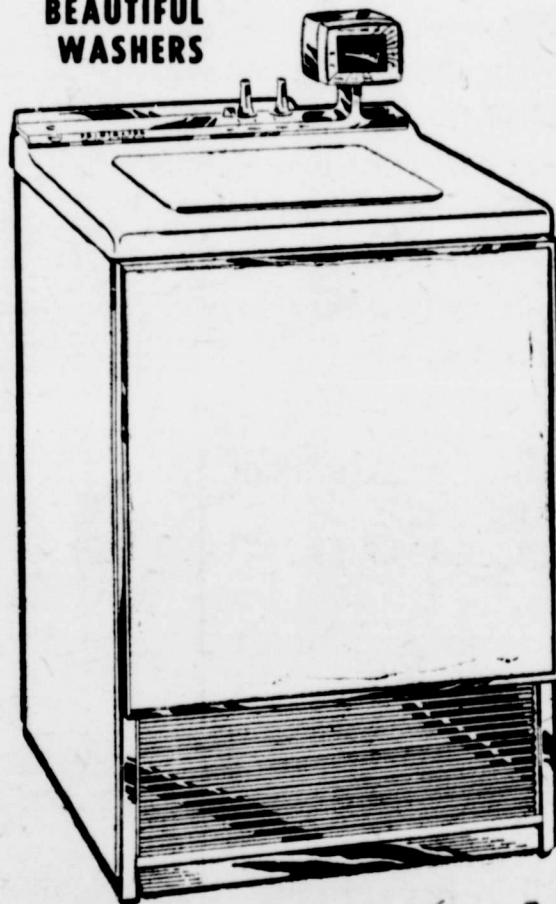

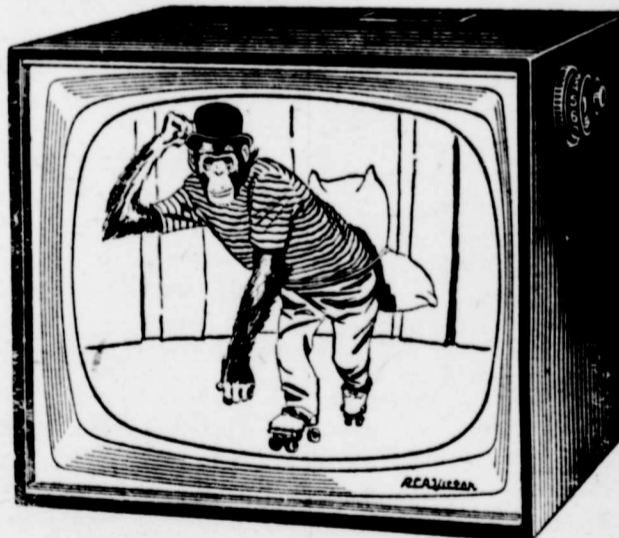

REMODELED COURTHOUSE WOULD HAVE EXTRA QUARTERS FOR WOMEN JURORS

Should the proposed Permanent Improvement bond issue be passed by Upton County voters on April 2, it would provide, among other things, adequate facilities for women jurors.

The present building, built some 30 years ago and long before women were admitted to jury service, has facilities for men only. In-

cluded in the remodeling plans would be modern and separate quarters for men and women who are called to jury service. They would provide over-night facilities, should it be required to hold a jury, rest rooms, baths and other necessities.

With the present jury quarters, no provisions are available for holding a mixed jury over night. Any such group that might be involved in such a situation would have to be divided, with outside quarters located for women.

Beginning some two years ago, an amendment to the State Constitution paved the way for women to serve on jury panels, grand juries and trial juries. Upton County has been calling the ladies for such service for some time and court officials have passed on many nice compliments on the manner and attitude with which women of the county have served.

The new improvements would provide them with adequate quarters while they were serving their county on jury duty.
