# City Commission Enacts New Peddling Ordinances

## LITTLE LEAGUE PLAYER AUCTION THURSDAY NITE

Managers of the Rankin Little League Baseball Association will meet at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday night, April 25, in the Rankin Park Building for their annual player auction.

In this auction, each manager is given a number of points, plus any carry-over from the previous season, with which to "buy" players from the eligible boys for his team. It is reported that a number of good ball players will be up for bidding and that managers will be in strong competition at the auction.

This year, the Rankin Little League will operate with four teams instead of the five which participated last year. Defending champions will be the Dodger team with Cleddie Vickers, manager. The Dodgers had a 15½ won and 4½ lost record last season.

At the present time, over 100 boys have signed up for league play this summer. Workouts are scheduled to be held Wednesday and Thursday, April 24, 25. From this group, 60 players will be chosen for regular league play with the remainder being divided into farm clubs which will play one game a week.

Plans are also underway for Pony League and Teenage League baseball this summer.

largements, etc. The ordinance provides that a bond of \$500 must be posted by the person doing the selling with the Mayor of the City of Rankin and that a license of \$10.00 per year must be paid to the city.

Failure to comply with this order will result in the guilty parties being subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

The second ordinance controls peddlers and defines them as persons who go from door-to-door offering merchandise for sale. A license is also required for this group ranging from \$2.50 if by foot up to \$15.00 per year for use of vehicles. Fines of \$5 to \$100 are provided for offenders.

Under this category, the ordinance points out that persons who produce the products they are selling are not subject to the requirements. This would include home-grown vegetables, poultry and poultry products, meats, animals, etc.

## CALL CITY HALL

All of the above people covered by the two ordinances must have complied with the regulations set forth before they will be allowed to do business in Rankin. They will be given a license covering their particular phase of business and may be required by the homeowner to display such license. If they do not have one and the property owner wishes, he may call the city hall and report the offender. The peddler will then be apprehended and if found to be in violation of the ordinances, fined or compelled to cease doing business in Rankin.

## Hard To Shake Loose

Postmaster General Summerfield, one

tion would simply be an inducement to  
building contractors and labor to  
their costs at the expense of the public."

Loyal Frisbie, Bartow, Florida:  
"States can do the job themselves, if  
will. Federal aid inevitably means  
control."

Reach \$23,579  
For Upton County**

Texas ranks twentieth in nation in percentage of Savings Bonds quota attained. Sales during March amounted to \$13,095,441.

During the first quarter of 1957 Texas had achieved 23.4% of its 1957 bond quota. Total sales for the first three months of this year were \$45,160,721. Sales in Upton County amounted to \$23,579 during the first quarter which was 17.6% of the 1957 quota of \$133,584, according to Dunn Lowery, Chairman of Upton County.

"The month of May, 1957 has been designated Minute Man Month in Texas and across the nation. During May special emphasis will be made to remind all citizens that for their own future security and the future security of the United States everyone should invest regularly in U. S. 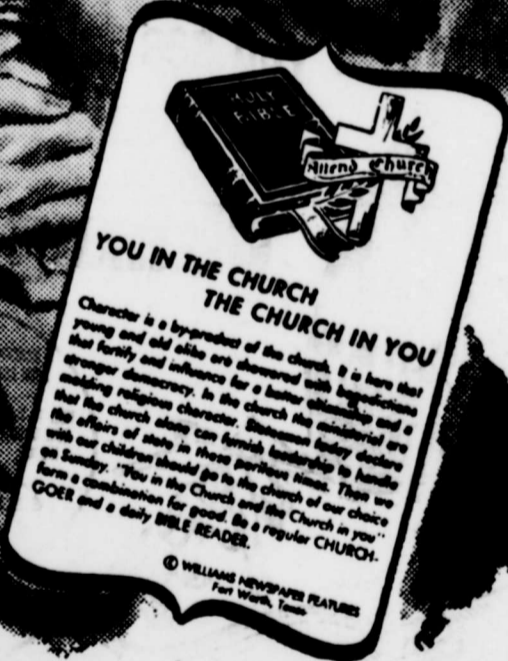
