Of counties having over 25 rigs running, only Upton, Andrews, Crane and Lea County, New Mexico reported increased activity. Most of the new rigs in Upton are in the northern areas of the county near the Midland County line and scattered throughout the Sprayberry Trend.

Even though Upton gained more rigs than any of the other 49 counties in the Basin it still remained in 7th place in total number of units; a position it held in the count ending May 25. However, should the trend set in the last count continue, Upton County can be expected to stand third or fourth in total number of rigs running in the Basin by July 1.

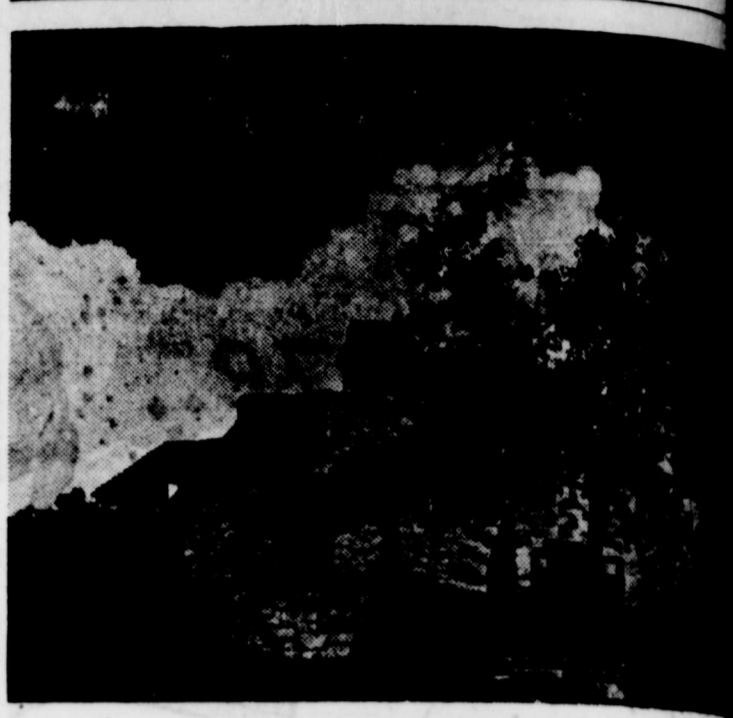
