

University Well Flows Wolfcamp Oil

A third Wolfcamp producer and a 5.8 mile northwest extension to that pay in the Block 4 multipay field of Upton County virtually has been assured with the flowing of 103 barrels of oil in 5 hours on a drill stem test of a well located 8 miles southeast of Rankin on the University land.

Slated to test the Ellenburger at 12,000 feet, the project flowed the Wolfcamp load from 9493_530 feet and was said to be making hole at the 9,650 feet level.

Other oil activity in the County over the week saw a heavy gas and distellite well brought in the Amak. er field about 12 miles northwest of Rankin and several more devel. opements in the area 20.30 miles line.



Santa Fe is now loading thousands of cars of grain and grain products on its lines

Santa Fe has been serving agriculture since 1874, when we sponsored the migration of the Mennonite farmers who established the Kansas wheat belt, and brought with them from Europe the ancestors of the better varieties of wheat grown in America today.
