Hostesses for the affair were Mesdames Ed Cole, W M Hill, Darby Anderson, E G Walker and Nancy Gary of Midland.

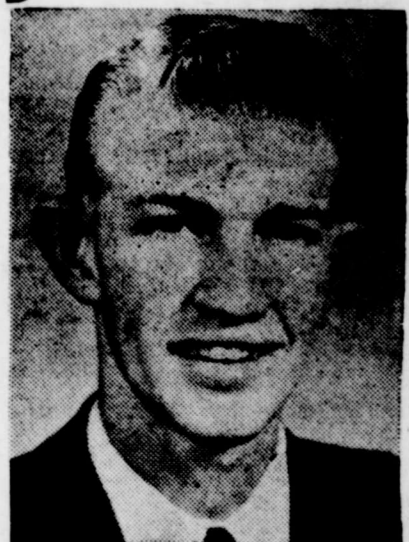

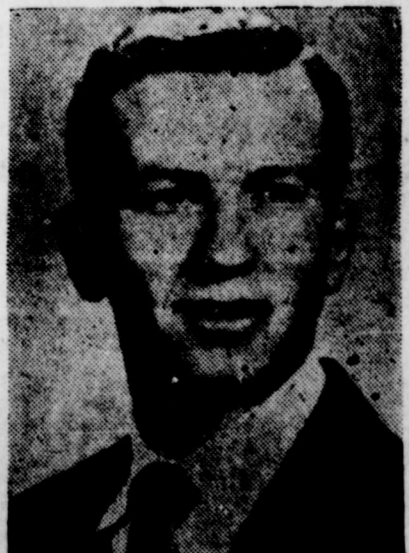
Attends Funeral Services

However, its hard to tell just where pleasure is connected with vacation what with all the work involved in getting ready, making the trip, spending a few hard earned shekles, driving back and trying to get over the afteraffects.

At any rate—this trip is necessary.

ONE LAST THOUGHT

As we said, we plan to move to the mountains for a week—away from telephones, hurricanes, world shattering events, bill collectors and election contests. It's going to be just between us and them thar rainbow trout.

One last thought should be mentioned in connection with the election contest. By now it's well understood that the two groups involved in the legal ends of the contest are trying to work out an agreement between themselves so that the contest will not have to be dragged through the courts. It is assumed that should such an agreement be reached, representatives from both sides will go before the commissioners court and try to get them to agree on the plan.

Since this so-called "comprmise" situation has come up, it is heard about town that the rights of the majority are being disregarded in that the election carried for \$410,000 and that that amount should be spent.

The defense of the election is now being made by a group of individuals—some 40 or more—not the entire number who voted for the bond issue.

Their rights as a majority went out the window the day the commissioners court refused to defend the election. On that day—by a three to two vote—the court said in effect, "We will not defend the majority against the protests of three men."

Of the three who refused to defend the majority rights was one

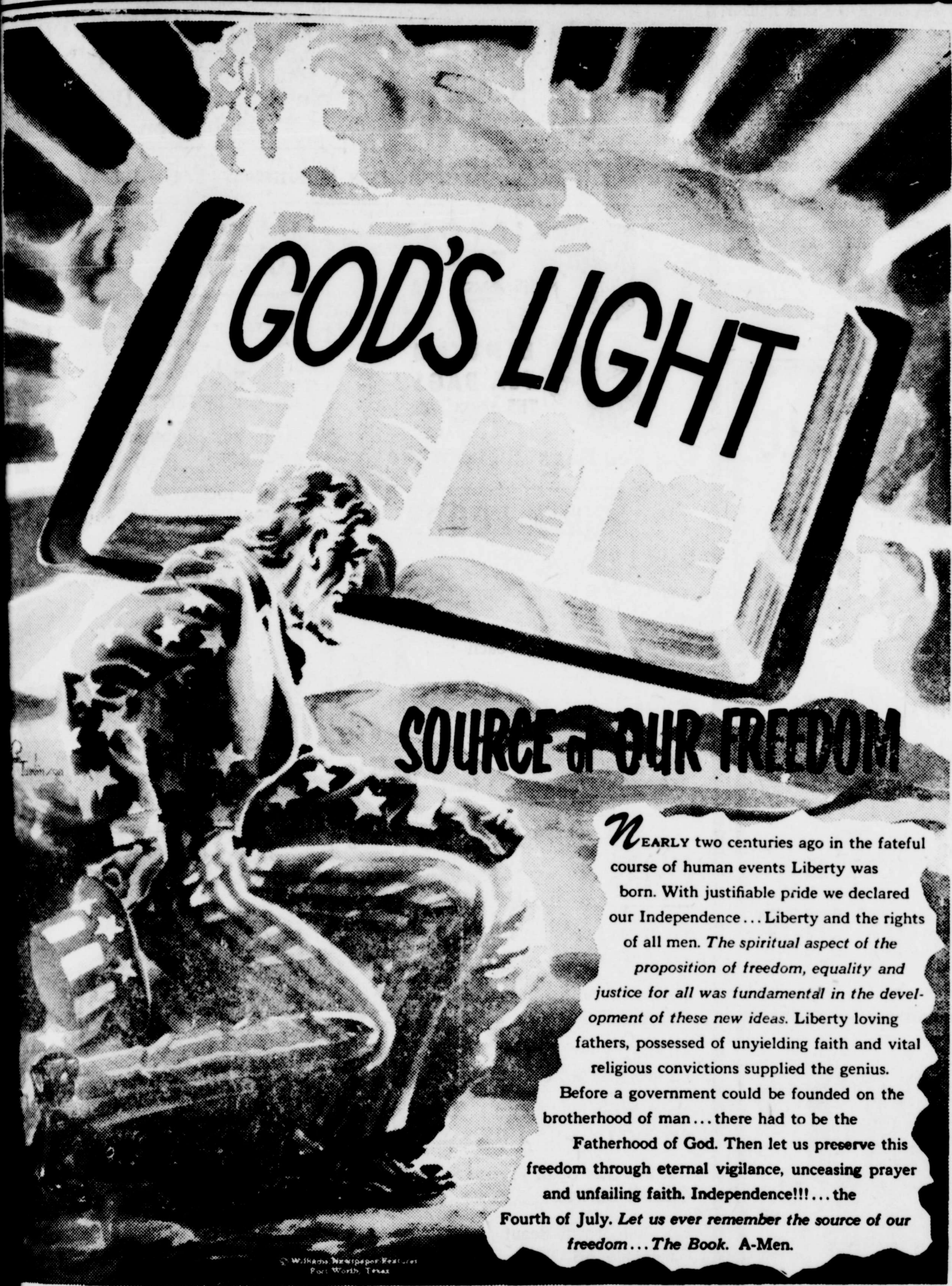

**FORT STOCKTON JUNIOR
CC GROUP CONSIDERING
TRY FOR NEW LAW**

(Editors Note: The following is an article taken from the Iraan News issue of June 27 and pertains to their county forming problem.

According to the Fort Stockton Pioneer of last week, the Fort Stockton Jaycees are toying with the idea of sponsoring a state constitutional amendment that would

change the method by which new counties come into being.

At a recent Monday luncheon meeting, district attorney Connell Ashley explained to the group that the law as now written says that a new county may be created by a two-thirds affirmative vote by the legislature. When a part of one county is merely transferred to another county, it must receive a two-thirds approval from the legislature and affirmative votes by the people of the counties affected.

The Jaycee proposal would make necessary for the county or counties to approve the creation of a new county from a part of their territory.

The Pioneer stated that "The proposal was aimed at an Iraan group that agitated for the forma-

tion of a county to be known as Permian earlier this year."

The Pioneer also mentioned that Ashley and county attorney Shelby Blaydes have asked for an opinion on the meaning of the law from state attorney general Will Wilson.

No mention was made as to whether or not the Jaycees had asked Rep. Louis Anderson for an opinion. This seemed a very important step by the small band of "agitators" from Iraan

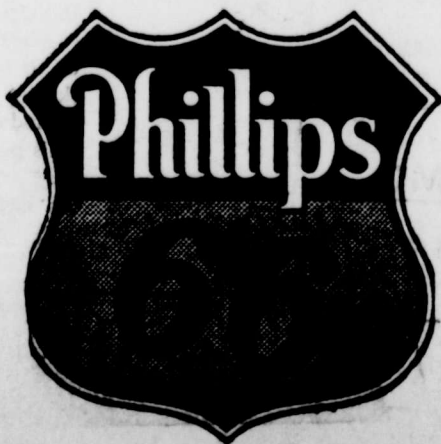

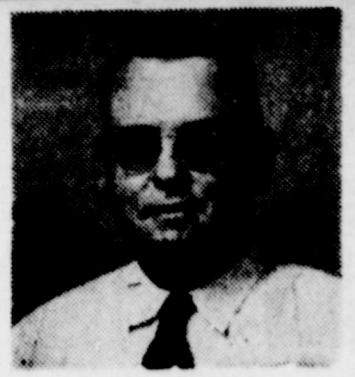
