Red Devil Lounge Opened As Youth Center For Rankin

MIDLAND FIRM GETS PAVING CONTRACT

Successful bidder on street paving in Rankin and McCamey was Midland Paving Company with a low of \$15,407.40.

Opening of bids on topping of some 60,000 square feet of streets in Rankin and 40,000 square feet in McCamey, took place in the Commissioners Court last Monday with six firms entering bids. Bids ranged from over \$17,000 down to the above low.

Contracts between the bidder and the county call for work to begin Monday, August 5 in McCamey and around August 19 in Rankin.

At the present time there are approximately 86 blocks of paving, amounting to 7.4 miles, within the city limits of Rankin. Paving work to be completed here this year will bring the total to almost 10 miles of topped streets, a major portion of which have curb and gutter.

The 60,000 square yards of work to be done in Rankin is the same amount as was finished last year while the McCamey paving was cut from 60,000 to 40,000. However, in McCamey, the city has taken over the topping of an undetermined number of blocks.

With the completion of this year's phase of the paving program, Rankin is expected to have almost two-thirds of all streets paved.

Opened last week on Main Street in the building formerly occupied by the Elite Cafe, the center is called the Red Devil Lounge and is open to youngsters from the 7th grade in school through 20 years of age. The

use of the building has been donated, free of charge for one year, by Miss Maggie Taylor.

Completely remodeled by volunteer help, with new materials being furnished by local business concerns at a substantial discount, the center offers facilities for dancing, ping-pong, billiards and other forms of recreation. Soft drinks are available. One game, an electrically operated pool table was donated by Gertrude Hall.

MEMBERSHIP OPEN

Memberships in the center are open to all youths in the above mentioned age groups at 50 cents per six months. Members may bring guests at any time. All those who attend are subject to a set of house rules and also conduct rules violation of which will result in withdrawal of membership privileges.

OPEN 3 NITES

Under the guidance of the youth council of Upton County, the Red Devil Lounge will be open from 7:00 to 11:00 p.m. on Monday Thursday and Saturday nights through August. With the opening of school, a new schedule will be worked out in order not to conflict with school activities.

At the present time a large number of teenagers in Rankin are taking part in the center and many have donated their time and labor in decorating the building. Youth Council officials have expressed satisfaction with the manner in which the Lounge has been received and for the help they have received from various individuals in bringing about this program.

Tuesday nights, the center will be opened exclusively to the Latin-American children of the area. They will be governed by the same rules and regulations as others.

QUOTING JOINER

Once again, we're going to clip a bit from Ernest Joiner's column in the Ralls Banner. As we've said before, we can't always agree with this died-in-the-wool Democrat but we feel that he does have some good ideas:

"Couple of weeks ago a Ralls citizen was arrested for sale and possession for the purpose of sale, liquor. At the time the same informer 'put the finger on two colored residents of Ralls. Up to this time the white citizen has never been arrested, jailed, placed under bond, or tried in a court of law. While he ran free, the other offenders, for the same offence, rotted in county jail under \$1000 bonds. All three seem to be first offenders, as far as the records go. The white man signed a confession of guilt, and goes free, The other two say they're innocent, so they're thrown into jail and placed under heavy bond to see they stay there. Does this do outrage to your sense of

justice? It should. Do we have a 'double standard under the law' where a citizen charged with a specific crime is given preferential treatment over another charged with the same offense? We do in Crosby county.

Theoretically, the law is made for everybody—white, colored, pastel; rich, white collar, poor; male and female; powerful and obscure. Over the porticoes of a thousand court houses over this land is graven this motto, often alongside a statue of the Goddess of Justice, 'Equal Justice To All' or 'Equality Under The Law.' We are all familiar with the patriotic civic club speaker who never fails to proclaim America's greatness because (and here he should falter, but seldom does) 'we are a government of laws and not of men.' Yes, man is at his noblest while legislating the conduct of other people! And he remains dedicated to his legislative labors only so long as his friends and relatives do not become ensnarled in the legal bonfires he has built for other people. When the fire breaks out at

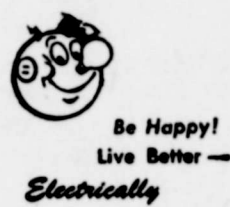
home, he still does not condemn the law he so ardently supported. He sneaks into the back door of the courthouse to 'fix' the rap. Not only does he flout his own law, but he brings pressure to bear on public officials to corrupt themselves, ignore the law, and make mockery of their oaths of office.

We don't ask that this man be tried in court. But if he isn't, we'd like for those two negroes to be turned loose. That way we can have our equal justice under the law, even if only in one case. If we're going to have a double set of laws, let's have one for Methodists and Jehovah's Witnesses; let's have another for those with large families and small families; another for

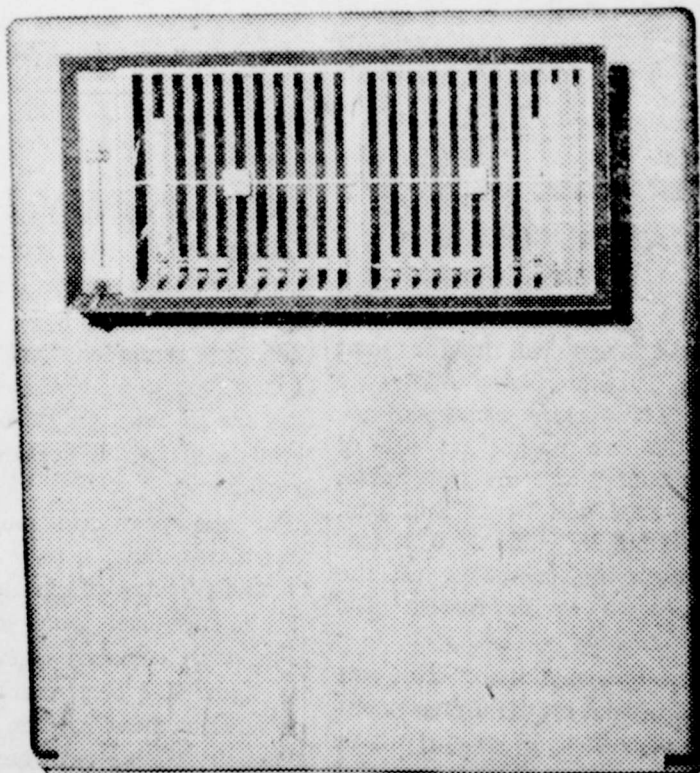

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NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 49-C proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to Article III, Section 49-c of Article III providing for the issuance and sale of bonds for the State of Texas to provide financial assistance to political subdivisions or bodies corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform the duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the issuance of the proposition therefor.

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas, the Texas Water Development Board, to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with other duties and restrictions that may be prescribed by law. The members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, shall authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized to be issued shall be called "Texas Water Development Bonds," shall be denominated in such form, denomination and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum. They may be issued in such amounts as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purposes set forth herein.

The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (with further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in the manner prescribed by law. The fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1952 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

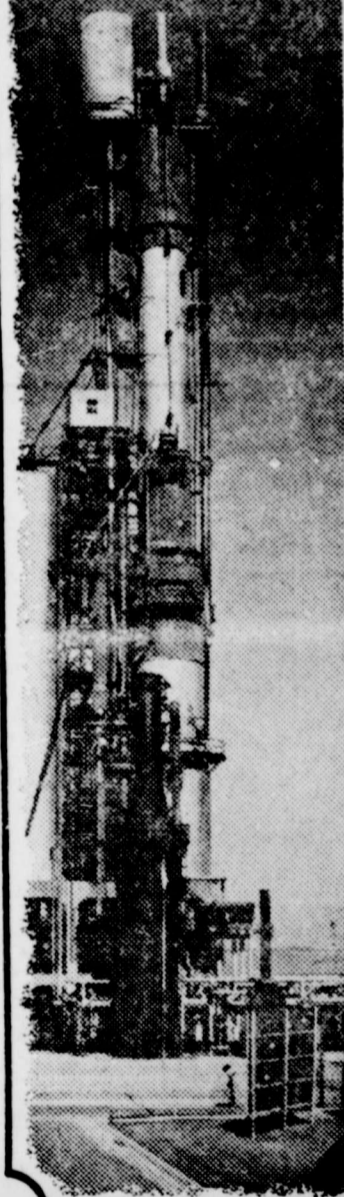

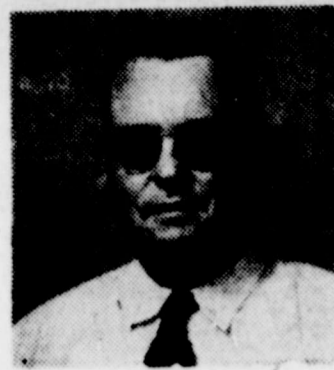
