## Brown, Wolf and Grigsby File New Suite To Restrain Sale of Extra Bonds

# Election Contest Withdrawn; \$225,000 In Bonds Are Sold

Last Saturday, Sept. 14, the Upton County Commissioners completed the sale of \$225,000 worth of Jail and Courthouse improvement bonds. This was the agreed-upon amount as a result of the settlement of the contested April 2 election.

Agreement for withdrawal of the original election contest filed by

C. W. Brown, William Wolf and Leroy Grigsby, McCamey businessmen, came about last week when a motion for dismissal of the suit, filed by John A. Menefee, attorney representing Upton County, was approved and signed by District Judge H. C. Starley, who was replacing Jim C. Langdon for the trial.

To secure the agreement between

the parties opposing the sale of the bonds and the court, minutes were entered in the record of the commissioners court which stated that the \$225,000 would be all the bonds that would be sold from the \$410,000 approved by the voters in the April 2 election.

### SUIT FILED

Additional security against the sale of more bonds was taken by Brown, Wolf and Grigsby when they filed a new suit against the county asking the district court to prevent the county from selling more than \$225,000 of the \$410,000.

In part, their new suit contended that the additional money was not needed to make the improvements

and that to sell the extra bonds would be a burden to taxpayers. "The issuance of any additional bonds or any bonds in addition amount is not necessary or proper, even though voted . . ." was the main substance of their new suit.

### FIFTEEN YEAR BONDS

In selling the \$225,000 worth of bonds, the court set them up in such a manner that the final series will be redeemed in 1972—covering a 15 year period. Broken into three groups, they were sold at interest rates of 3 3/4% on the first \$30,000; 4% interest on the next \$50,000; and 4 1/2% on the final \$45,000.

An option was included in the sale whereby all outstanding bonds could be called in at the end of a 10-year period; or after October 15, 1967, should the county find it desirable to do so.

### CANCEL REMAINDER

In an order which in effect cancelled the remainder of the bonds, the court stated in Paragraph 14 as appearing on the minutes pertaining to the bond sale:

"It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed by this court that this \$225,000 of Bonds authorized by this order will be sufficient to erect the improvements and enlargements to the County Courthouse and Jail, which are required for County purposes, and that the remaining amount of bonds voted at the said election of August 2, 1957, shall never be issued."

**HAW!**

It is with no little pride that we point to the pick we made last week in calling for a Red Devil victory over Stanton to the tune of 12 points. The boys fooled us and ran over that one extra marker—all this in the face of dire predictions by daily and weekly sportswriters that Rankin would take another thump.

Thank you, Red Devils. Truthfully—we were just guessing.

Now to get down to the business at hand—this week's game with Sanderson. No doubt, all the big guns on the sports writing field will now swing to the Devils' side and say that they'll whip Sanderson.

More than likely they will but it

could be a much closer game than a lot of fans are expecting. We'll take the Devils by only 6 points this time.

Back to last week's game, fans were very well pleased with the fine aggressive spirit displayed by the Red Devils. Even though Stanton rolled up a great deal more yardage than did the Rankin squad, the score was the difference and it came about by the efforts of a team that wanted to win and was willing to put up a fight.

Should the Red Devils continue their improvement and should just a few more of the boys get the attitude of wanting to mix it up that is displayed by most of the team—there's no telling just what this bunch of lads could do. At any rate — it'll be mighty interesting long toward the end of the season.

**END OF A FARCE**

Last Saturday the Commissioners Court sold \$225,000 worth of permanent improvement bonds. That is all that will likely ever be sold from the \$410,000 approved by voters last summer.

Thus ended—at least one phase—of what has been a colossal farce. It all started when petitions were first circulated calling for the election and continued right on down until the votes were counted. During that time, not one active move against the issue was made. Some folks said they did not favor it but they made no organized resistance.

In a public meeting in McCamey to discuss the proposed plans—only about 16 people were present—four or five of which were just plain voting citizens. Nothing more than yakking came out of this meeting.

Then the votes were counted and that's when the light dawned and the fun began. All of a sudden, it was entirely all wrong that \$410,000 was proposed to be spent on im-

provements in the county. It was too much money—the plans were all wrong—the architect was nuts—the voters didn't realize what they were doing.

And the net result was the throwing out of a legally held election and substituting in its place the desires of a group who had voted against it to start with.

If that's not a joke to end all jokes—we've never heard of one. In the future it would be much simpler and far less expensive to just call a few of the "politicoes" of the county together and ask them what can be done.

Now \$225,000 will be spent on remodeling the courthouse, the jail and building a sub-station. This amount—about half of what was approved by the voters—is in keeping with the past similar expenditures in Upton County which have been a dab here and a dab there and very little to show for any of it.

Anyone who has taken the time—or who will yet take the time—to go to the courthouse, look it over—inspect the jail and it's disgraceful condition—will see where this is

just good money thrown after bad. That jail is such a mess that even the cockroaches that infest it are ashamed to be seen in day light.

Much of the equipment came from the old Upland jail. Plumbing throughout the thing is of the 1920 variety and is shot full of holes. Underneath the building is a forest of broken and rusted pipes, many of which run sewer water onto the ground.

Windows leak, doors won't shut (cell doors, that is), holes are in the floor, one rusty nozzle is the only bath in the jail and it drains out on the floor. Sanitary service companies have refused to even service the thing since they guarantee that they will clear a building of vermin. On this one—they give up.

But—for all practical purposes, the time to do anything is passed. The pig has been stuck and once again it'll be a patchwork job.

FIRST MEETING SATURDAY**

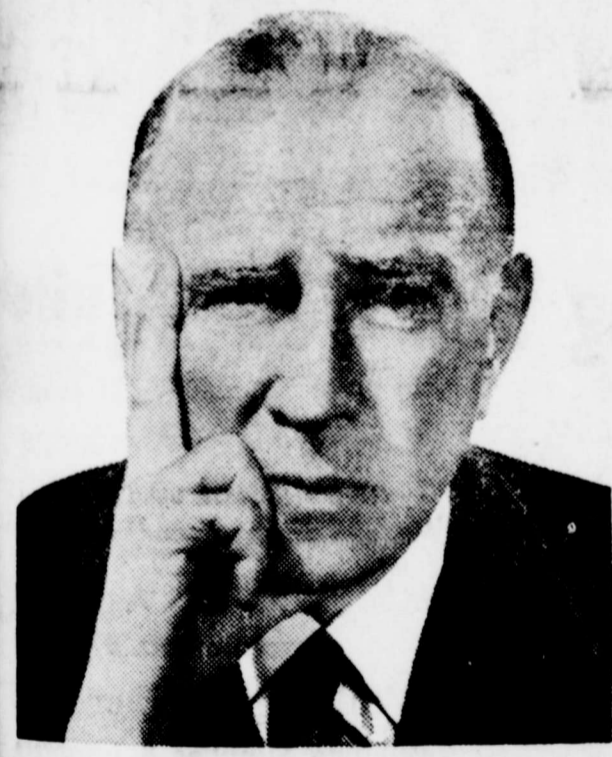

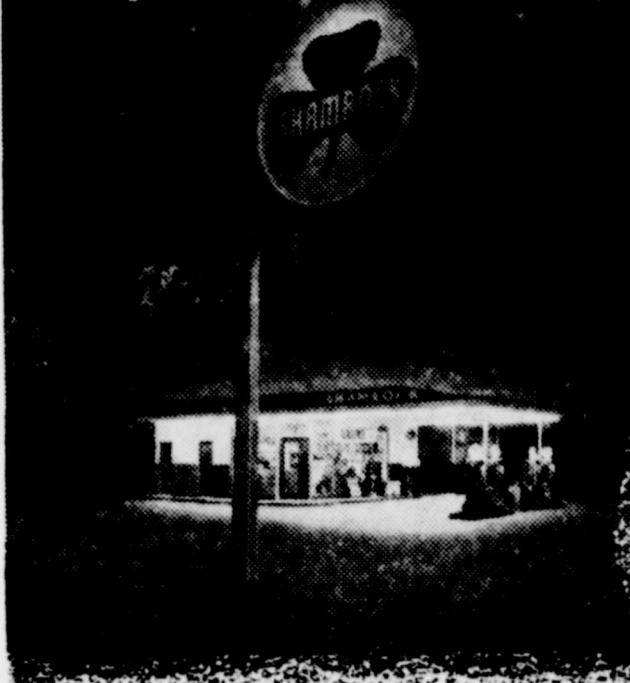

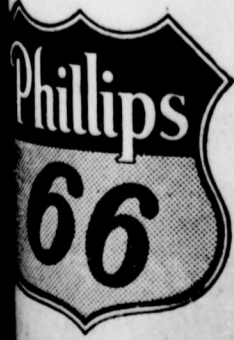

**335 School Bus Accidents In 1956-57**

Three state agencies joined today in urging the continuation of a state-wide program to acquaint the public with the Texas law requiring all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children.

"Superintendents and news editors performed an outstanding public service in this safety campaign last year," said J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. "Yet 7 lives were lost during the school year in collisions involving school buses. There is a continuing need for a program of safety education."

There were two more fatalities during 1956-57 than were reported to the Department of Public Safety in 1955-56. The total number of accidents reported declined, however, from 379 to 335. (During the past year the Highway Department erected signs on all major roads warning motorists of the safety measure.) The law says in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver of any vehicle shall stop immediately before passing. After coming to a stop the driver of the vehicle can proceed with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour.
