## Rankin Lodges To Send Delegate To UN

Rankin Odd Fellow Lodge No. 947 and Rebekah Lodge No. 8 have joined efforts to select a boy or girl from Rankin or Texon to attend the United Nations Pilgrimage to New York in the summer of 1958.

A committee composed of R. L. Bell, J. O. Lee and J. W. Hearon from the IOOF and Mmes. Jack Abernath, D. O. McKelvy, S. O. Langford, Rankin, and Dorothy Howard, Texon, all 4 from the Rebekahs, met Tuesday night and made some plans in preparation of getting the project underway. The youth selected will join a nationwide pilgrimage tour to the UN Headquarters next summer. A place has been reserved for the delegate from the local lodges.

### REQUIREMENTS GIVEN

It has been announced that the tour is open to all children of Rankin schools and to children whose parents are members of the IOOF or Rebekah Lodges. Age limits are 16 to 18. Contestants must reach the age of 16 on or before March 1, 1958. 18-year-olds must have reached that age before July, 1958, and must have at least 1 more year of high school.

The delegate will be chosen for outstanding qualities to be announced at a later date by the committee. The youth selected will have 6 days in which to study and observe at the United Nations as world affairs are handled.

They will set in on council and committee meetings and will attend questions and answer periods. At the same time, the delegates will be treated to a tour of New York City and Manhattan as well as other interesting sites in that area.

## Boy Scout Fund Drive Opens In Rankin Tuesday, Oct. 8

The Concho Valley Council will open its finance campaign on October 8 for extending Scouting in this area with a 7:00 a.m. breakfast to be held at Highland Cafe, it was announced today by Sam Fitzhugh who is boy scout finance chairman of the Rankin drive.

Assisting Fitzhugh will be some 30 local men who will take part in the campaign. Last year, Rankin donated approximately \$600 to the Council fund drive. A goal of at least that amount has been set for this year.

Locally, scouting has made considerable progress over the past year, according to scouting officials. A new hut has been put into use and is still being improved, a full scale program is in effect and numerous other phases of the program are underway. Bill Cook is scout master.

Assisting in achieving the objectives of Scouting within the Concho Valley Council are over 2,000 adults giving volunteer service in the 212 units and on the local council level. To better serve youth, over 500 of these leaders took training last year in Scouting techniques and boy leadership.

## Red Devils Go To Ozona For Non-Conference Tilt

Making their third trip away from the home field, the Rankin Red Devils will go to Ozona this week to tackle the speedy Lions. Last week the Lions handed Iraan their first loss of the season with a 20-19 decision. In the season opener, the Iraan Braves, walloped the Devils 33-0.

Indications are that the Devils will be in for one of their fastest ball games of the year Friday night since the Lions, a relatively small team, is long on speed and are said to be fine blockers and tacklers. Their star backfield man is Bobby Sutton, 156 pound junior halfback who is considered by many to be a better all around ball player than Iraan's Lindy Lyles. Sutton is extremely fast and favors running to the outside and turning the ends.

In one of the few games this year in which the Red Devils outplayed their opponents, last Friday night's loss to Eldorado by a 7-6 score was a bitter dose for the Rankin team. Playing three quarters of the game with almost complete control of the ball, the Red Devils were stopped on three touchdowns drives by penalties.

Eldorado was never able to contain the Devils running attack but managed to hold on until the pen-

1958 is expected to be one of the more "interesting" political years both locally and state-wide. Throughout the nation, observers will be watching for any trends that may develop to indicate the political thinking of Joe Doe Public.

In Upton County, officials who will be "making the race" are the County Judge, County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Commissioners 2 and 4 and all Justices of the Peace. In addition to these, a number of district offices will also be up for election.

### THE TIN SOLDIER

He has finally done it. By sending bayonets into Little Rock last week, Eisenhower has proven his critics correct and has reverted to the role of tin soldier.

He has done lots more than that in this matter but basically, he has proved that once a soldier—always a soldier and no one must voice disapproval of his actions. It would almost be laughable except for one thing and that is the fact that little tin soldiers seem to have a way of becoming dictators for one act of force invariably call for more of the same sooner or later.

Whether you believe that the supreme court order on intergration was right or wrong has little to do with what is now facing us. This use of force was bound to come sooner or later and for one reason or another—considering the manner in which the federal government has taken over all but a handful of states rights and is rapidly moving in on individual rights.

With his grand display of force set to the cadence of marching paratroopers and rattling sabers, the little tin soldier has brought to a screeching halt the two-party system of politics in the southland and has handed the reigns of government to the Democratic party for the next two generations.

It must be admitted, however, that he is a man of peace and fellowship just like he has always said. He proved it by sending the paratroopers when he could have sent the Marines.

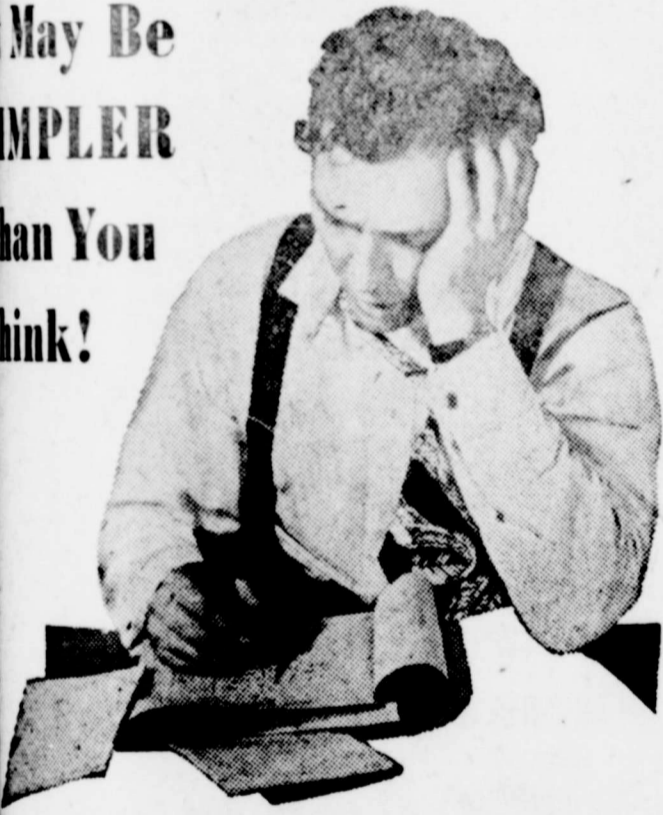

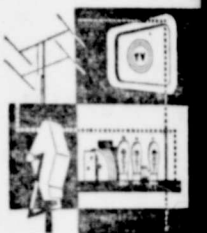
