## PREPARE FOR HIGH COSTS IN GOVERNMENT," RUTHERFORD SAYS



J. T. RUTHERFORD speaks in Rankin

In his brief visit to Rankin last Tuesday, Congressman J. T. Rutherford spoke at a noon luncheon given in his honor at the Highland Cafe by Rankin Lions Club.

He covered a number of topics in his speech and pointed out that last year's 72 billion dollar Federal budget was more than twice as much as the highest figure reached during the peak of World War II. Rutherford said that he favored cuts in this year's budget and his voting record indicates that he voted for these cuts. He stated that he would also favor lowering Federal expenditures in the future, whenever possible.

At the same time, however, due to a number of circumstances, the Congressman is predicting that costs for operation of the government as reflected in the budget, will be even higher next year and the years ahead.

"Due to the Russian situation and the fact that they have successfully launched an earth satellite, we here in the United States are the laughing stock of the world," he said.

He pointed out that for years, we have said that the Russians were not capable of great things but that we have been proven wrong in fact and in the eyes of the world.

### TROUBLED TIMES

In backing up his opinion that higher federal expenditures were in the future, Rutherford pointed out that the United States keeps a world-wide armed force alert at all times to retaliate against anyone who would attack this country

## VOTERS TO POLLS TUESDAY, NOV. 5

Upton County voters will make their last trip to the polls for '57 when they cast ballots in the three amendment proposal election which will be held throughout the state next Tuesday, November 5.

Voting will be held in the usual polling places with Precinct 1, Box 1 in the Commissioners Court room in the courthouse, Box 2, Precinct 2, in the Park Building and Box 3, at the Phillips Pembroke Plant.

Amendments to be voted on have to do with water conservation, old age assistance and state employees retirement benefits. All are expected to carry since there has been no organized resistance against any of the three, either locally or on a state wide basis.

A very light vote is expected here in Upton County as indicated by the fact that up until noon on Wednesday, Oct. 30, only 1 vote had been cast in absentee balloting.

# Ghosts, Goblins Will Roam In Annual "Spookeroo"

Hallowe'en, full of spooks, goblins and little ones, will be appropriately observed tonight in Rankin.

Highlight of the activities for the night, which will include the usual trick-or-treat doings, will be the annual School Carnival sponsored by the Katherine Secrest P.T.A. of Rankin.

Beginning of the night's gaiety will start at 5:15 p.m. when a parade of youngsters, fully costumed in Hallowe'en attire, will assemble

at the elementary school grounds and march through town. They will be led by the Rankin Red Devil Band which, along with furnishing some appropriate music, will be dressed to fit the occasion. W. C. McDonald is parade chairman. Floats and costumes will be judged.

### PRIZES LISTED

Three sets of prizes will be given to participants of the parade itself with a \$3.00 award going to the best costume and a \$5.00 prize for the best float from each of the three school buildings: elementary, junior high, and high school. Any youngster who so wishes, whether he is a school student or not, may enter the parade.

## ELDORADO JOINS DISTRICT 5-B

Eldorado School District has entered District 5-B athletic competition to become the fifth member of a group originally composed of Rankin, Van Horn and Grandfalls. Wink was added in 1956 to make it a four-member district.

For the past several years, local fans have been anticipating the advancement of Rankin to Class A competition. Enrollment has been sufficiently large in the high school to meet Class A requirements from year to year but instead of admitting the local school to the higher classification, the State Executive Committee which controls placement of schools, has raised the enrollment requirements.

Reasons for this assignment as given by the state board are: (1) enrollment in the last four high school grades must average over 119 daily attendance for two years in a row, (2) schools must be geographically located in a district, (3) and schools are to be arranged in such a manner as to have four districts to a region, thus assuring an orderly regional championship play-off.

Assignment to districts is made on a two-year basis with the result that the above 5 teams will compete through 1960 in Region II District 5-B.

## GIRL SCOUTS TO SELL THE NUT SNACK PACK

Rankin Girl Scouts will begin sale of their "Nut Snack Pack" of salted mixed nuts and salted bleached Virginia peanuts Nov. 1.

This sale has become an annual affair and is quite popular with customers. Funds go into the Girl Scouting program in Rankin.

## CARNIVAL AT PARK BLDG.

Site of the carnival this year will be at the Rankin Park Building. Time for this phase of the planned events will be from 6:00 until 9:00 p.m. A number of games will be played and booths with the usual Hallowe'en attractions will be operated by the various classes and organizations of the school and P.T.A.

There is no charge for admittance to the carnival.

## CORONATION OF QUEEN

Closing activity for the night as far as the P.T.A. program is concerned, will be the coronation of the Hallowe'en Queen at the high school auditorium at 9:15 p.m. The queen is chosen each year through a contest whereby the class making the most money out of the carnival has their representative crowned to reign in high honors.

## SPOOKS TO BE OUT

Following the coronation, a large number of "spooks" are expected to be out on the town. These will be the usual trick-or-treat kids and will include all sizes from toddlers to some mighty big "youngsters."

Drivers of automobiles are asked to be very careful at this time and to look for "goblins" to appear from almost any place as they dart about their business of "haunting the town."

With the visit to Rankin last Tuesday of J. T. "Slick" Rutherford, Congressman for the 16th District, there should be noted in passing that this was actually quite something. True, it is not the first time that "Slick" has visited in Rankin and we're sure it'll not be the last.

Nothing of much importance came about from this visit but nevertheless, it ought to be remembered that he was here and that you and I could go right up and have our say to him in person if we so desired. The point is—how many congressmen, state or otherwise, do you see in Rankin? How many do you know who have made regular visits to the "homefolks"?

They're few and far between.

True, Rutherford was making a political swing through the territory, but he was here.

Nowadays, some office holders, from city councilmen, schoolboards, and on up to the very President of the U.S. seem to feel—after a while that as ministers are called of God to preach the Gospel, so are they called to their high and noble office to direct the ways of the "common herd" and that, for their actions and their thoughts, they must answer only to their own consciences.

Write a letter or make a suggestion and you're just a crank—out of step with everyone else since your's was the only complaint. Yet, one wonders if it would not be possible—just one time—for that single voice of dissention to be right and everyone else be wrong?

Office holders say that only a handful are against their program since only a handful raise a cry. They never take into consideration that fact that only 1 out of 100 will ever take the time and trouble to dispute an issue or write a letter of disagreement—even though the entire other 99 might hold the same views.

"Slick" Rutherford is one of those rare exceptions to the rule, and although we don't agree with all his views nor his past record, we must give him credit for being a representative who is not afraid to face the people and who is

willing to hear even that one person who disagrees.

"And did he take his ill-luck like a man?"

"Yes, he blamed it all on his wife."

The political speaker ranted on. "I want reform . . . I want land reform . . . I want housing reform . . . I want educational reform . . . I want . . ."

And from a tired-looking man

in the audience came: "Chloroform."

# Is A Football Player...?

the innocence of them, officials penalize them, students cheer them, kid brother idolize them, coaches criticize them, girls adore them, alumni tolerate them. A football player is Courage in cleats. Hope in a helmet, Pride in pads, and the best of young manhood in moleskins.

WHEN your team is behind, a football player is incompetent, careless, indecisive, lazy, uncoordinated and stupid. Just when your team threatens to turn the tide of battle, he misses a block, fumbles the ball, drops a pass, jumps off-side, falls down, runs the wrong way or completely forgets his assignment.

A FOOTBALL player is a composite—he eats like A&M, sleeps like Notre Dame (but, more often than not, plays like New Home High. To an opponent publicity man, he has the speed of a gazelle, the strength of an ox, the size of an elephant, the cunningness of a fox, the agility of an adagio dancer, the quickness of a cat, and the ability of Red Grange, Glen Davis, Bronko Nagurski and Jim Thorpe—combined.

TO HIS own coach he has, for press purposes, the stability of a mush, the fleetness of a snail, the mentality of a mule, is held together by adhesive tape, bailing wire, sponge rubber and has about as much chance of playing on Friday as would his own grandfather.

TO AN ALUMNUS a football player is someone who will never kick as well, run as far, block as viciously, tackle as hard, fight as fiercely, give as little ground, score as many points, or generate nearly the same amount of spirit as did those particular players of his own yesteryear.

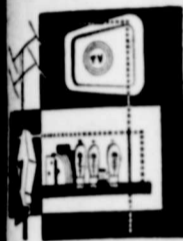
A FOOTBALL player likes game films, trips away from home, practice sessions without pads, hot showers, long runs, whirlpool baths, recovered fumbles, points after touchdowns, and the quiet satisfaction which comes from being part of a perfectly executed play. He is not much for wind spirits, sitting on the bench, rainy days, after-game compliments, ankle-wraps, scouting reports, or calisthenics.

A FOOTBALL player is a wonderful creature—you can criticize him, but you can't discourage him. You can defeat his team, but you can't make him quit. You can get him out of the game, but you can't get him out of football. Might as well admit it—be you alumnus, coach or fan—he is your personal representative on the field, your symbol of fair and hard play. He may not be an all-American, but he is an example of the American way. He is judged, not for his race, not for his religion, not for his social standing, not for his finances, but by the democratic yardstick of how well he blocks, tackles and sacrifices individual glory for the overall success of his team.

HE IS A HARD working, untiring, determined kid doing the very best he can for his school or college. And when you come out of a stadium, grousing and feeling upset that your team has lost, he can make you feel almighty ashamed with just two sincerely spoken words — "We tried."

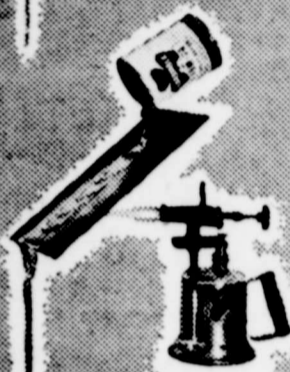

and Russia in particular. He stated further that indications are that the present trouble between Turkey and Syria stem from the fact that the Communists have over 400 submarines ready for sea duty but that they must have control of the Dardanelles in order to free them from the Black Sea. He believes that it is Russia's plan to have a nation friendly to them gain control of the important outlets, thus enabling the Red fleet of submarines to escape their present confines.

"Hitler almost controlled the

world with only 150 submarines during World War II. If the Russians could get 400 of their modern "sea monsters" into the waters of the free world, they could, in fact, control the world," said the Congressman.

**FEDERAL CONTROL**

Other topics covered by Rutherford included the recent Natural Gas bill passed by Congress and vetoed by the President, and the defeat of the federal aid program for schools.

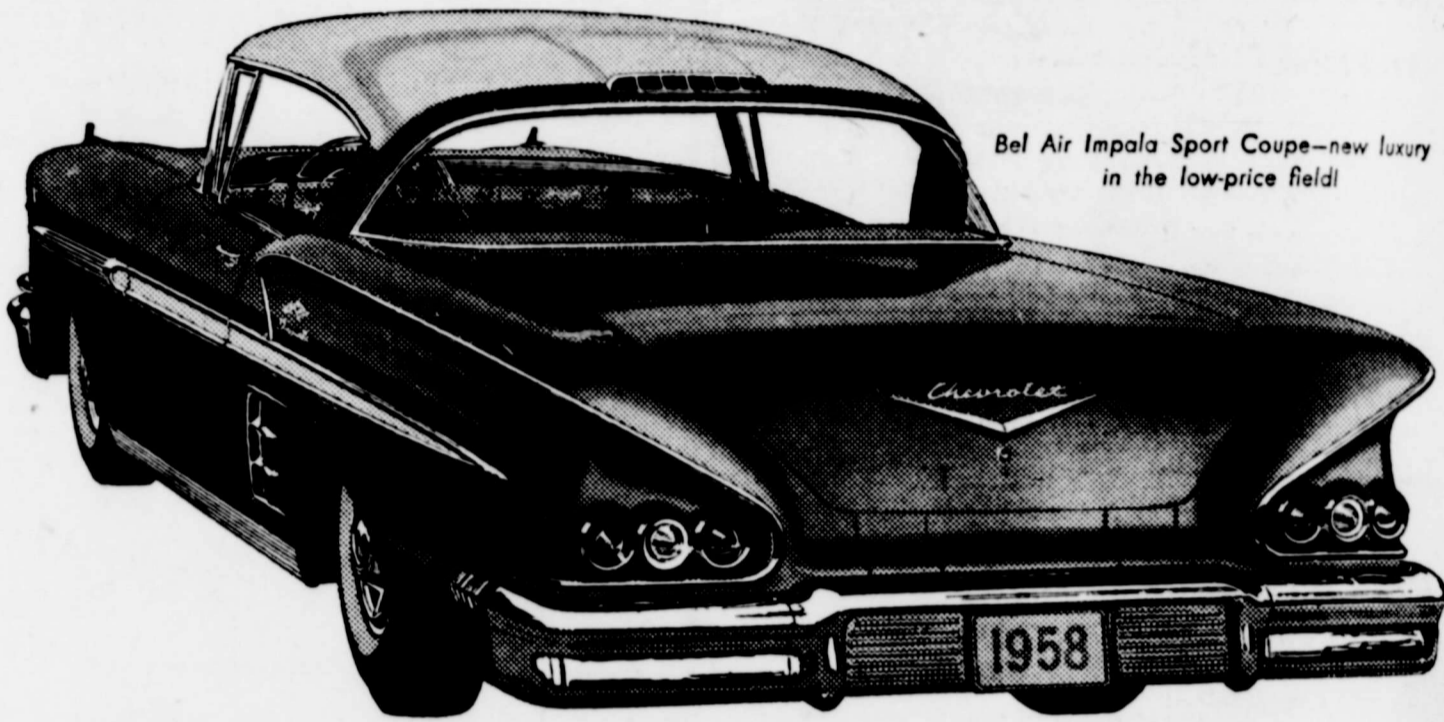
"You cannot have federal aid without federal control and we

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have too much of that already stated.

In closing his speech, Rutherford asked that the people of the district contact him with their problems and their wishes on governmental affairs. He said a welcome to voters to his Washington office.

"I am your representative on the board of directors for the business in the world: the States government. Let me hear from you," he concluded.
