## UPTON COUNTY 4TH

### PERMIAN DRILLING

The fact that over the Permian Basin oil drilling is down for the current period ending October 25, Upton County climbed into 4th place on the survey with 27 rigs as of that date. This compares with 27 on the survey ending

the October 25 count, however, at least three new locations were opened in the county. It is immediately known how this affects Upton's standing compared to the other 69 counties in West Texas and New Mexico comprising the Basin.

The area with 75 rigs in Lea County, New Mexico, is in 2nd place by Anderson County with 35 rigs and Upton County with 33 rigs.

In advance to fourth place, Upton County is at its highest point on the survey since 1951 at various times, there has been a larger number of operations

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$37,700 for improvements on farm-to-market roads in Upton County during 1958, R. L. Faltinson, District Engineer at Odessa, has announced. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

This amount is needed at the present time by the organization to pay current dues for the Permian Basin District membership and to help finance their building program.

Seal coat on F.M. 1788 from the Midland County Line South a distance of approximately 1.8 miles.

Seal coat on F.M. 870 from the Crane County Line Southeast to U.S. 67 at Rankin, a distance of approximately 29.6 miles.

## Light Vote Favors All 3 Amendments

Out of a qualified 1770 voters, only 200 turned out last Tuesday in Upton County to follow the statewide trend and approve the three constitutional amendments up for voting.

Lack of interest and unfavorable weather conditions were attributed to the small number of ballots.

Amendment 1 received 160 votes for and 40 against. Amendment 2 carried by 191 to 9, while amendment 3 had 179 for and 21 against. Four votes were cast in absentee out of the total 200 voting. Box 1 in Precinct 1 had 43 voters out while Box 2 in Precinct 2 had 29, and Box 3 in Precinct 2 had 11 votes cast.

**TIME NOW TO PLAN  
CHRISTMAS MAILING**

The next two weeks are ideal for  
planning and mailing of Christmas  
gift packages which must travel  
long distances and overseas, advises  
Postmaster Grace Roach. For by  
mailing early you can take advantage  
of less costly mailing services,  
and also spare yourself the extra  
chore and worry of rushing a pack-  
age on its way during those fever-  
ish weeks just before Christmas,  
when so many other things demand  
attention.

Actually, deadlines for parcel  
post mailing to overseas points are  
right around the corner. To reach  
servicemen and other recipients in  
the Near East or Africa, packages  
must be mailed by Nov. 1 to assure  
pre-Yule delivery. For Europe and  
Latin America the deadline's Nov.  
10. On weight limits, postal auth-  
orities note that parcels for over-  
seas servicemen are limited to 70  
pounds (and for a few "A.P.O."  
destinations the limit is 50 pounds.)

If you prefer to wait and use  
air mail to reach a serviceman a-  
broad, the weight cannot exceed  
two pounds and the deadline is  
December 10. Nor can the package  
size exceed 30 inches in length and  
girth combined.

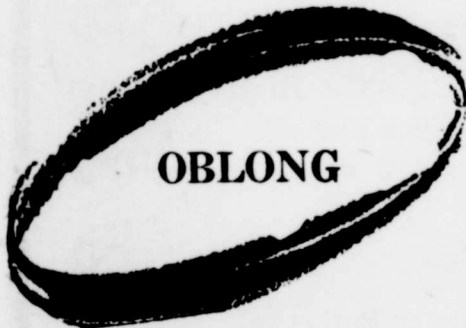

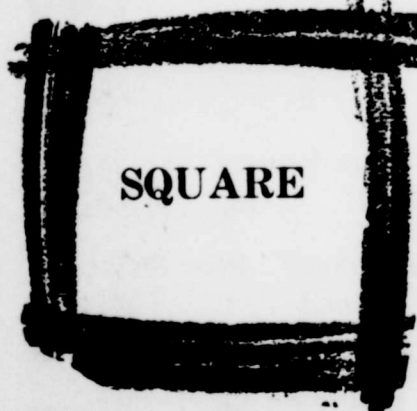

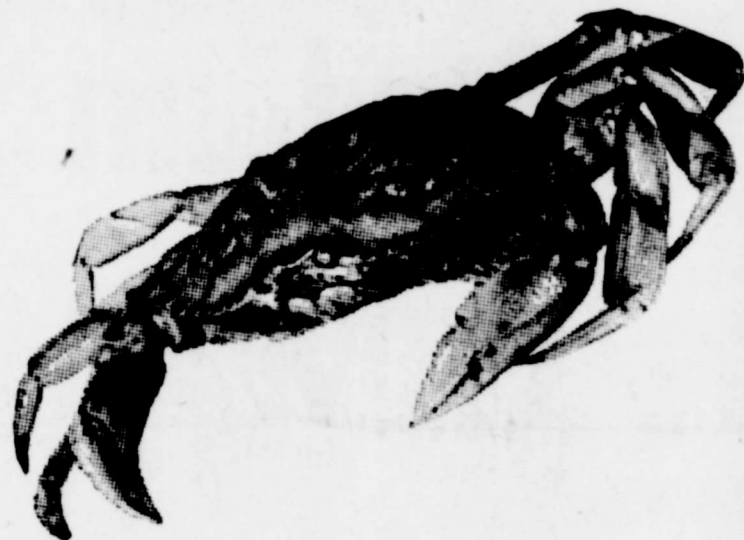
