Public Relations Course Shows Good Attendance

With only one more evening of instruction remaining, classes at the special training course presently being conducted in Rankin by E. A. Willeford continued to draw a good attendance. Mr. Willeford is a retail training specialist from the University of Texas and is conducting this 4-day series of lectures in connection with the Credit Bureau of Rankin.

"Public Relations" is the title of the course for Rankin and has been well received by those who have attended. Held at the Park Building beginning at 7:30 in the evening, the invitation to attend the last meeting has been extended to all interested parties. A registration fee of \$2.00 is required.

With some 40 people on hand for the opening of the course last Monday night, Mr. Willeford expressed delight in seeing what he termed "an exceptional turnout for a town the size of Rankin."

Shak Cafe Will Open Saturday, 16th

Opening date for the Kuk Shak is Saturday, the 16th. Formerly the Mac's Drive-Inn, the building is scheduled for Saturday, the 16th.

Completely remodeled interior, the business firm will be operated by Mrs. Ruth Burns and will feature free coffee and do-nuts during the formal opening. Mrs. Burns has had considerable experience in cafe operation and is well known in Rankin. Her husband, Paul Burns, is employed by the Rankin Oil Well Cementing Co.

A considerable amount of new equipment has been installed in the building including new tables, chairs, a range and other items. At present, the service will consist of short orders, steaks, hamburgers, sandwiches and a breakfast menu to be put into operation around December 1st.

P-TA Reaches Record Number of Members

Membership in the Katherine Secrest P-TA of Rankin stood at 228 this week, according to president, Mrs. Wayne Sledge. This is believed to be an all-time record for number of members for the Rankin chapter and represents a little more than a 10 percent increase over last year. Mrs. Norman Elrod is chairman of the membership committee, the group which is largely responsible for signing of new members.

It was further revealed this week that two delegates, Mrs. Ross Wheeler and Mrs. Sledge, will attend the State Convention of P-TA groups in Galveston next week. Mrs. Sledge will act as delegate for the local association with Mrs. Wheeler as alternate.

Red Devils In Final Game For '57 Season Friday Nite

Rankin's Red Devil football team will make its last appearance of the current season Friday night in a home stand here with the District 5-B champion Wink Wildcats. The Cats took a guarantee on representing the district last week when they nudged the defending champion Van Horn Eagles 14-2.

This game will end one of the most confusing seasons of football in the history of Rankin schools. Due to the flu outbreak, over half of the "B" and Junior High games were cancelled, either by Rankin or their opponents. One non-conference high school contest, the Rankin-Marfa game, was set aside due to sickness.

Added to the cancellations were numerous injuries that have plagued all three squads this season with Quarterback Fred Aguilar suffering a broken collar bone last Monday in practice. At one time,

only 12 boys were able to report for practice from the thirty-odd varsity candidates.

At one time or another, almost every player, including Coach Leach, has been put out of action by the "flu bug." Despite these hardships, the team which entered the season with little hopes for a

successful season, took two wins over Class A competition in non-conference games but have yet to down a District 5-B opponent. Last week they dropped their second conference game to Grandfalls by a 37-7 marker.

FOUR SENIORS

Four seniors, Joe Hamilton, Bobby Bushong, James Farrow and Bobby Wheeler, will be making their last appearance for the Rankin Red Devils. These four boys represented the majority of the experience on the squad at the beginning of the season and have played an important part in every game thus far.

Wheeler, who was not able to enter football practice until about midway of the season, is presently on the injured list and may not see action Friday night.

Most fans expect Wink to have the upper hand in the contest since they have steadily improved since the opening of the season and have had little difficulty in winning their last several games. However, in some of their past games, the Red Devils have been able to get their game into shape and pull an upset.

Game time for the contest will be at 7:30.

Basketball Tourney Set For Dec. 13-14

Supt. Joe Scrivner announced this week that the annual Rankin Invitational Basketball Tournament will be held this year on December 13-14. This will be the second year of the event which was started in 1956 with the aim of building it into one of the best basketball tournaments in West Texas.

Last year a number of good teams were entered even though it was a new tournament. This year, it is expected to draw most of the better teams from this area.

"We will need the support of the people of Rankin in making this into the kind of tournament that it should be," Scrivner has said, "and we welcome any assistance that can be given."

"It is especially hoped that no conflicting activities will be scheduled on these dates," he said.

State Accrediting Team Here Nov. 20

A state accrediting team from the Texas Educational Agency is scheduled to make an inspection of Rankin schools next week.

A favorable report from this agency is essential for a school to continue to operate under state aid. Their inspection will cover all phases of schooling such as teachers' qualifications, classroom methods, buildings and space available, condition of facilities, safety practices and many others.

This will be the first visit to the local schools from the State agency in a number of years. It was requested by the local school administration and is expected to give Rankin added scholastical standing.

Methodist Set 11-Day Revival November 13-24

Lynn McAden, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Rankin, has announced that a Revival Meeting will open Wednesday evening, November 13 in that church. With services scheduled to run through

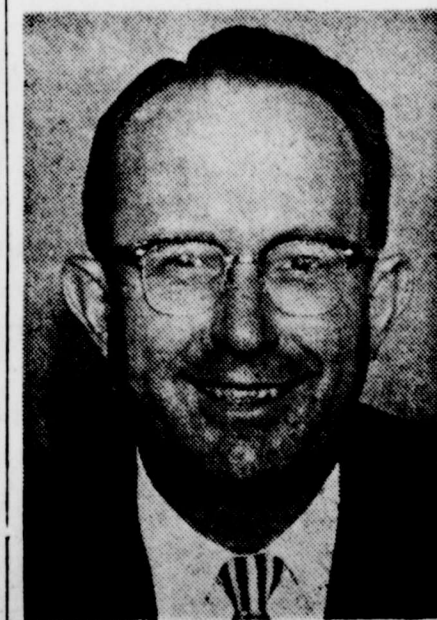
Sunday, November 24, the Reverend Quay Parmer of Fort Worth will do the preaching.

Rev. Parmer is an evangelist, devoting his full time to that phase of religious work. He will be accompanied to Rankin by his own song leader who will have charge of the singing during the meetings. fine exhibitions of skeet Saturday evening, spectators treated to a rare event when Herral, local rancher and near skeet shooter, bested the national Kramer to win

that particular shooting match.

TO GO THIS WEEK-END

Since the weather was unfavorable for a full two-day run, Dub Day has stated that the event will be staged again this week-end with shooting starting early Saturday morning and continuing all day and then taking up again Sunday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. Rules and contests will remain the same.

Some 40 fine, tender turkeys, averaging 10 pounds each, are on hand and will go to the lucky winners in the half-dozen or so events that are held.

"A lot of folks seem to misunder-

stand the turkey shoot," Day has said, "in that they think that a person has to be a crack shot to win."

"This is definitely not the case," he has pointed out. "We have a place for everyone—whether you're an expert or have never fired a shot and you can win a fine turkey and be helping the 4-H Club boys and girls at the same time."

A ROUGH SEASON

Rankin's Red Devils are near to completing what we believe is one of the most hard-luck seasons we've ever seen a team play.

To begin with, the squad was not blessed with any abundance of material, had little overall experience and was playing their first year under a new coach against competition that was, in most cases, over their heads.

That, at the beginning of the season, did not look like it was going to make much difference. The boys had plenty of fight to make up for their lack of experience and were coming along well under their new coach's plan of play. They won two and lost two and were looking better every game.

Then the roof fell in.

It started with the injury of Gerry Adams, whose broken leg put him out for the year, and was quickly followed by an outbreak of the flu plus various other knocks and bruises which at one time had the entire team down to 12 men, caused one game to have to be cancelled, resulted in even the coach having to go to the hospital and miss the opening conference game and has continued right on down the line.

We do not believe in making excuses for a poor season—nor do we believe that the Red Devils or their coaches want excuses. This is just a case of stating the facts. Whether or not the team would have done any better under different circumstances cannot be said.

The fact that they have done well as they have is quite an accomplishment.

This week, they wind up their play against the district-leading Wink Wildcats. If they win this game, they're going to definitely have to pull an upset—but such has been the case of every game they have won so far this year.

GOOD SHOOTERS

Rankin must be unusually blessed with some fine marksmen and women.

Each year out at the turkey shoots, Rankin gunners have little trouble with outside competition even though some of the visi-

tors have fine reputations as skeet shooters. This year, for example, the Tri-State Champion, Rod Kramer of Odessa, visited the 4-H Club shoot Saturday evening and spent a good deal of time "showing 'em how it was done."

He put on a fine exhibition of shooting all right but never did manage to beat Walton Harral who is more or less a country boy in the skeet shooting competition in that he never shoots any skeet except at the one or two turkey shoots held here each year.

And along with Walton are several other—almost all of whom have beaten Harral at one time or another. They would include the "Bullseye Kid" Bruce McGill, Al Owens, Frank Boyd, Jr., Emmitt McGill, J. B. Pettit, Dub Day and

a few more. For the women's end of the business, Peggy Freddy is probably given up to be the top skeet shooter—in fact, she, too, last year won 1 shoot-off over Harral.

In any case, it's likely just as well that there is little chicken stealing or watermelon snatching in Rankin for with folks around who can shoot as well as most of the local gentry, it would be mighty hard on the seat of a pilfer's britches.

And it should be pointed out in connection with the turkey shoot that you don't have to be an expert to win. They have a place for everyone as witnessed by the fact that D. O. McEwen and the editor have both won turkeys this year. Come on out and join in the

fun. You'll be helping the 4-H kids, too.

After giving it a great deal of thought, we've come to the conclusion that history is wrong in saying that Napoleon was nuts. If pictures we've seen were correct, he's the only person we know who has been smart enough to comb his hair like it wants to grow—right straight down.

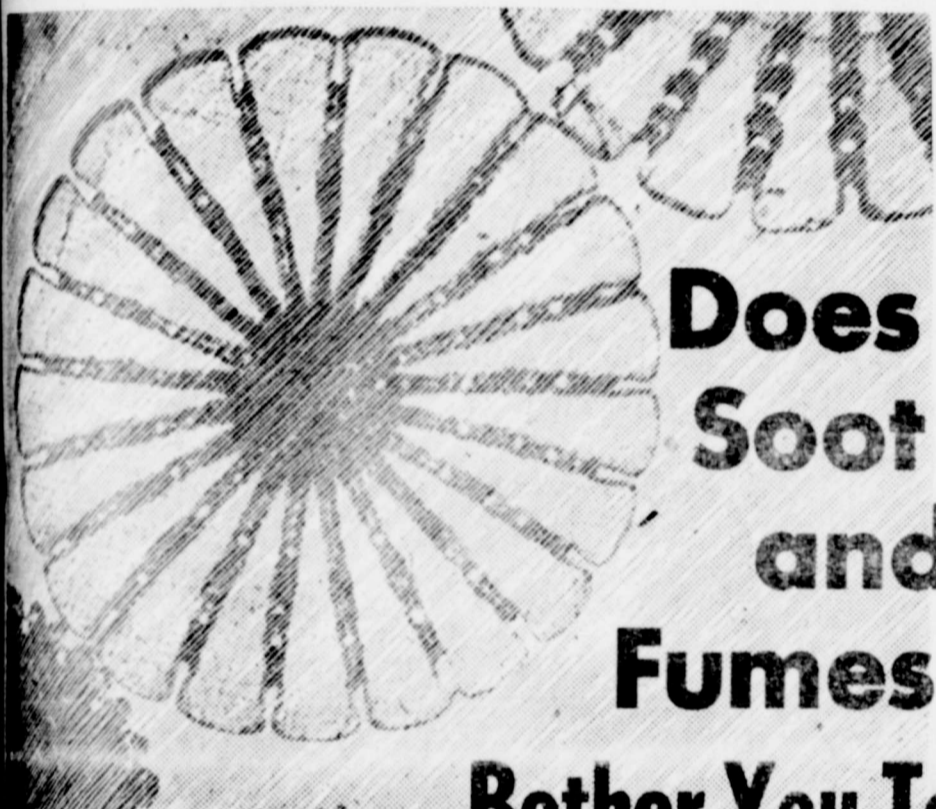
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
