Rankin's championship girls high school basketball team will officially open the season here Friday night when they entertain the Sanderson squad in a pair of games. This will

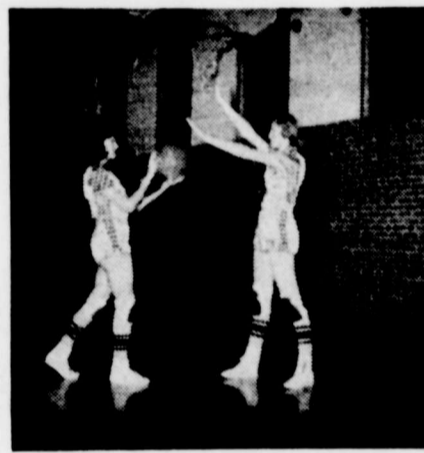
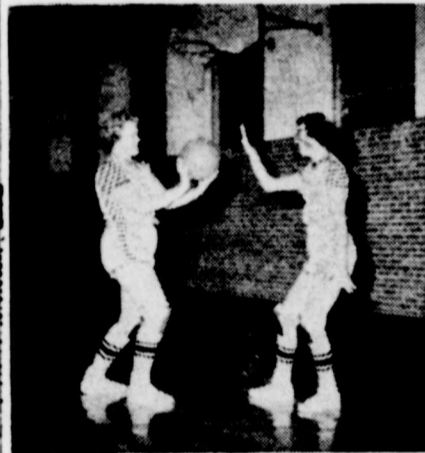
be the first appearance in '57 for the girls, many of whom were on the team that reached the state playoffs last year.

Upton County In 4th Place For Basin Drilling Activity

All-Time High Seen For Christmas Mail

Predicting that the Christmas mail this year will set an all-time record, even exceeding the record in 1956, Postmistress Grace Roach announced her 1957 "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign today.

With Christmas only a little more than a month away, the Postmistress reminds us, "It's later than you think!" Most folks have a tendency to wait until December rolls around before they give their Christmas mailing plans a thought.

The Postmistress further suggested that right now is the time to take the following steps: Check your Christmas card lists very carefully make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

She said, also, that it is a good idea to stock up on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. If you'd like to include your Christ-

SINCLAIR WELL

Near Rankin, considerable interest has developed in Sinclair Oil & Gas Company and Atlantic Refining Company for their new Ellenburger producer at a wildcat location 2 miles north of the Rankin Clearfork pool.

According to a special news release from Sinclair Oil & Gas Company in Tulsa to the Rankin News this week, the discovery is the No. 1 Ella Corbett Estate, NW NW 23, Block B-2, CG&SF survey. Sinclair, as the operator, and Atlantic own equal interest in the 160-acre tract.

The well flowed 192 barrels of 43-gravity oil through 1/2-inch choke in 24 hours from perforations at 10,502-510 feet in the Ellenburger. Gas-oil ratio was 2251-1. The well was drilled to total depth of 10,550 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set on bottom.

Sinclair holds leases on several hundred acres to the southeast of the discovery. Location is some 5 miles southwest of Rankin near the Langford headquarters.

Or at least that might well be the feeling of the Crane County Agent who last Saturday morning had the misfortune to meet—of all things—a big bull buffalo—head on.

Said agent was driving on the Crane-Rankin highway some seven miles west of Rankin Saturday night when a strange object rushed from the side of the road and

into his headlights. It definitely wasn't a flying saucer since no one ever finds anything solid to them—but this creature was solid—Jack. In fact, he was solid enough to demolish the pickup.

Result: one dead buffalo belonging to Tom Owens and one wrecked pick-up belonging to Crane County. The agent was not injured—physically, but he must be thinking that you just can't win when you have to go to the extent of having a wreck with a buffalo.

REACH, PARDNER

If you think that income taxes, inflation, etc. have been a little out of hand during recent years, we are predicting that "you ain't seen nothing yet."

Whereas just a few weeks ago there were drives underway on every hand to reduce the spending and encroachment of the Federal Government, the word now is to prepare for higher taxes and more loss of "certain things." As one cartoonist put it in last Sunday's newspapers: "Money, blood, sweat, tears . . . and more money."

Certainly, we believe that the situation is serious and that we need to look to our defense program . . . to an extent . . . but not an unlimited amount of spending in every direction . . . without regards to cost. Further, every opportunity that now comes along for the Federal Government to move in and take over will be put into effect . . . it would be unthinkable to object under the circumstances . . . so they will say.

Highest priority will likely go toward putting the Federal Government into the public school business. This has been one of the

prime objectives of the socialists for a long time and with the excuse of needing more "brains" in the family, they will wedge into every crack in an effort to take over public schooling. They just may be successful.

We say that the U. S. has just as many brilliant minds as anyone else . . . the Russians and their sputniks included. And far more than brilliant minds, we probably have as a majority of spiritually minded folk who believe that there is a power greater than even the cobalt bomb and the rocket fuels and that it is good and safe to put a little faith and trust in His direction along with your big stock of space weapons.

We believe that this is one place where we're ahead of Russia and where we're going to stay ahead as long as there is trouble in the world. If they should ever catch up with us in the spiritual realm . . . there would be no more trouble and ten-

sions. Maybe what we really need is a little more confidence in an old fashioned idea that has been kicking around in this country for a good many years that "Right makes might." All we need do is be sure we're right.

And what of the chances of the Rankin teams . . . boys and girls.

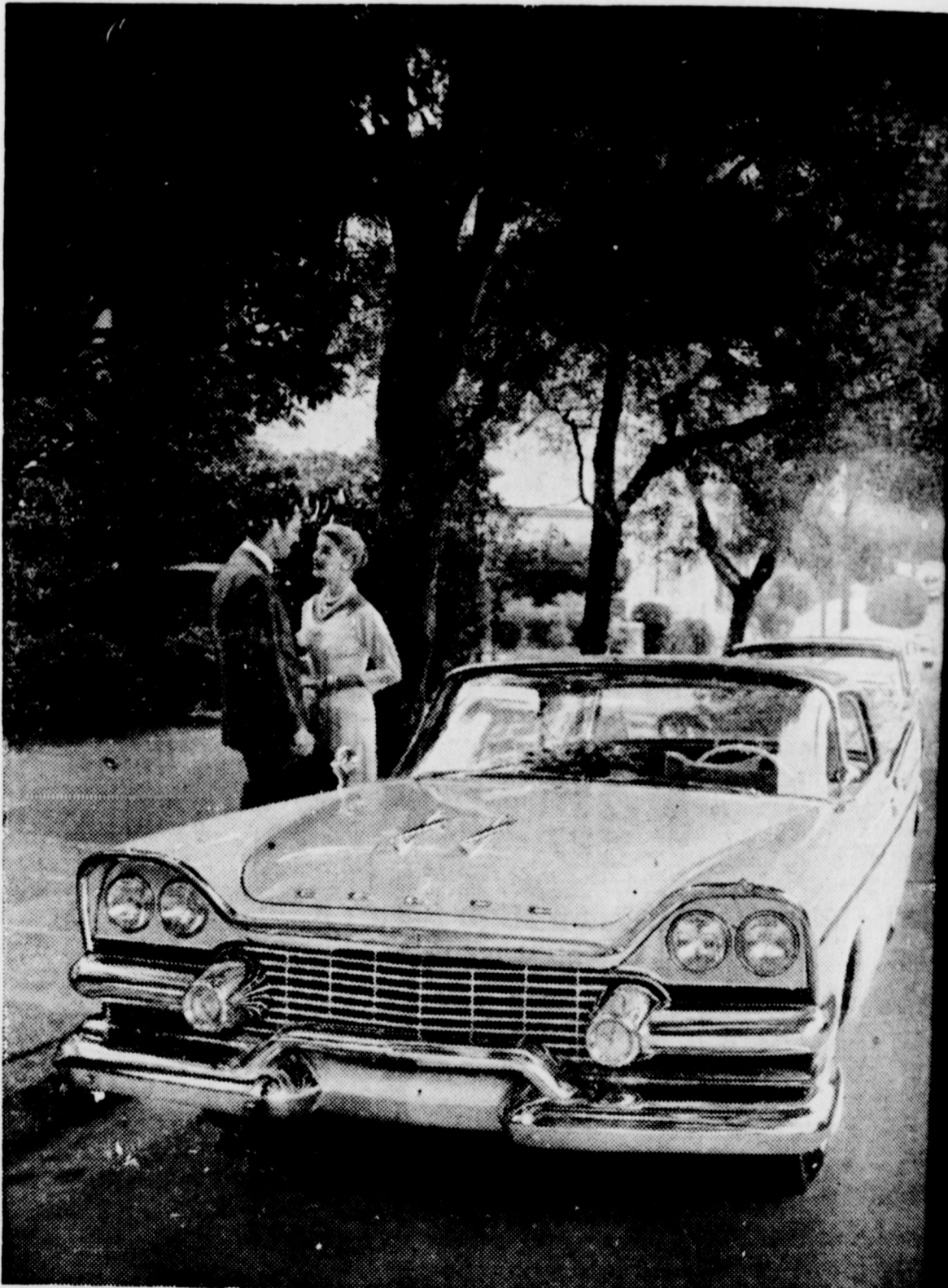
For the boys, it is all a big question mark. Whether or not the lads who will be out trying to uphold the high traditions of basketball as it has been in the past for Rankin squads is something that only

Miss Harral is a senior elementary education major at Tarleton State. She graduated from Rankin High School in 1955.

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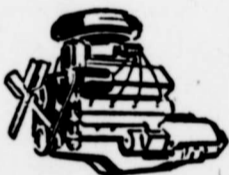
