## Rankin News Sponsoring Picture Publication

To gain the Rankin News will sponsor a picture publication. Woltz Studios to photograph and publish the pictures of children of the Rankin area. The program was started last year with considerable success. Children's photographs and the necessary equipment for specialized work, will be available on Friday, January 17, to take pictures. Publication of the pictures will be made in the Rankin News as soon afterwards as possible.

Children who took part in this program last year will remember that the pictures were taken free of charge. Parents were given the opportunity of making purchases of prints only if they so desired—no sales pitches were made to get them to buy.

Many of the children were featured in the News, whether they had purchased additional prints from the studio or not. The intent is to emphasize again that there is definitely no obligation or pressure put on anybody to purchase these pictures," J. B. Hunter, editor of the News, has stated.

"We have found that everyone in the community likes to see pictures of their children published in the News—especially the small fry. They are seldom in the paper since they do not attend to other activities, we find the best way is to just round them up and take their pictures," he said.

# Annual Upton 4-H Club Show Here Next Thursday

## UPTON 4-H CLUB IN ODESSA SHOW

This week the Upton County 4-H Club enters their first show competition of 1958 as they enter both the steer and lamb show in Odessa December 31-January 4. Known as the Sandhills Hereford Show, the event has grown into one of the largest livestock exhibitions in the state.

Entered this year will be more than 250 lambs and a similar number of fat steers. In past years the Upton County Club has taken numerous high honors, including grand champion in the lamb division. With the increased competition this year, the club is expected to encounter stiff opposition to its efforts for a repeat in this division.

This will be the first time the Upton Club has entered the steer showing in Odessa and is the second year for this type of work in the club. Last year, they exhibited a third-place winner in the Black Angus in the El Paso show. This year's crop of steers are said to be of better quality than the ones raised last season.

Next Thursday, January 9, area folks will get an opportunity to see some of the best lambs in West Texas as the Upton County 4-H Club stages their annual livestock show. Some 150 lambs, plus a group of 7 steers and a commercial ewe class will be exhibited.

Judging will get underway at 6:00 p.m. with Jim Gray, extension sheep specialist of A&M College, as judge. Competition in all classes is expected to be heavy as some of the best lambs in a number of years are said to be entered in the show.

Those who are interested in livestock will find some outstanding animals in the Upton County 4-H Club show. Each year for the past five or six years, entries in this event have gone on to win high honors in livestock shows throughout the state of Texas.

Grand champions, reserve champions and division winners have been exhibited by the club in Odessa, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, San Antonio, San Angelo, Denver, Colo., and other shows—all having first been shown locally.

# 1958 To Be "Political Year" In County, State And Nation

1958 is a political year.

In Upton County and in the State of Texas political office seekers will shortly begin to make the rounds of the precincts seeking votes for the various offices. Rumors prevail that Upton County may see some heated contests.

In the county, now operating under the 4-year-term program, half of the offices will be up for contest. These include the county judge, county and district clerk—under one office—county treasurer, commissioners 2 and 4, and all justices of the peace.

In addition, district judge benches will be voted on along with all of the state offices such as representative, governor, etc.

### PRESENT OFFICERS

Present office holders whose places will be up for voting in Upton County will include Bud Fisher, judge; Nancy Daugherty, district and county clerk; Elizabeth Rains,

county treasurer; Tommy Workman, Commissioner, Precinct 2; Joe Conger, Commissioner, Precinct 4; Omar Warren, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1; Curley Cowen, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, and the two McCamey Justices of the Peace.

District-wise, Judge Jim Langdon in the 112th District and Pat Patterson in the 83rd. In the 102nd State Representative District, Louis H. "Andy" Anderson presently holds the office.

### THE NATION SCENE

For offices to Congress, two positions will hold particular attention in the 16th Congressional District, presently held by J. T. "Slick" Rutherford and the Senate seat occupied by Ralph Yarborough, serving an unexpired term.

### STATE OFFICES

All state offices will be up for voting since they are not operated under the 4-year term. Particular

attention is expected to be focused on the governor's office where Price Daniel, now serving his first term, is expected to draw stiff competition.

### NONE ANNOUNCED

Thus far no candidates have announced their intentions as regarding any of the offices. However, in past years, the political picture has usually begun taking shape early in January.

It is said that a number of parties have expressed interest in the offices and a sizeable number of candidates could announce. Filing fees, which were expected to be considerable higher in 1956 due to the limited number of offices which were up for filling, did not run as much as expected with most of those making the race reporting expenditures of little more than in past years.

It is time to make new resolutions to correct the mistakes that you made in 1957 which you resolved in 1958 not to make. It is time to take a look into the crystal ball and see what is ahead—if you have the nerve. It is time to think of old acquaintances and how much they owe you and it is a time to start out with a clean slate.

As for making New Year's resolutions, it will likely be well to follow the advice of the chap who said that the best thing you can do is practice staying alive. And what with all the speed and hurry these days, that's not as simple as it may sound.

And it might be pointed out that there is one tendency that folks have today that is fast getting out of hand and that is hurrying. Every where it is hurry, rush and don't be late. Again—taking the comparison we heard someone make: "When grandpa missed the stage, he calmly sat down and waited a day or so for the next one. Let the modern man miss a revolution in a revolting door and he's sped for the rest of the day."

### WHAT'S IN 1958

What will 1958 bring. Maybe we

are better off not knowing but from this corner, 1958 looks about like any other of the past four or five years. We like the views of Porter Johnson when he predicted that the first part of '58 would likely be unsettled in business and that a slight recession was in store. By the latter part of the year, he thought things ought to be pretty good.

In 1958 there will be more and more pressure put on the small nations by the big boys in an effort to make them take sides in the cold war.

The Russians will continue their propaganda work with an increasing effort and will make wilder and more outlandish claims about their scientific ability. They will fire off more Sputniks and make other displays—mostly for propaganda. Uncle Sam will get his hat off his shoulder in this field and do a bit of space shooting himself—all of which, on both sides, will be of little advantage other than just saying that it was done.

To refer to the chap on the television show, we like his idea that "The United States probably won't be the first to get to the moon but we will be the first to loan them the money."

In 1958, the United States will likely have to make some serious decisions about their so-called allies—particularly France. We have stood around and held hands with a number of the foreign countries in Europe while, at the same time, they were putting the boot into the face of some of the smaller countries over which they have control.

In 1958, Ike will all but retire from active control of the President's office. This may seem a bit wild as predictions go but nevertheless, we'll stick with it. He will not likely step down as President—unless he has a permanently disabling stroke—but he will gradually shift decisions and responsibilities to Nixon and his advisers—all without any publicly stated policy.

### RANKIN IN 1958

And closer to home in 1958 could be a pretty good year. Most business firms around town report that '57 was not one of their best years and on the other hand, it was pretty fair."

In 1958, Rankin could make some very substantial improvements. There will likely be some business improvements and in the latter part of the year some new housing de-

Every club in town is out to beat them in the future and they are going to have to win if they are to continue those grand champions as El Paso, Fort Worth and Antonio. But they have done well in the past and all right. We'll see.

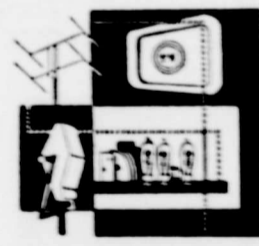
