Primary Courthouse Work Completed With County Crews

Commissioners Tommy of Precinct 2, and H. of Precinct 1, have asked owners in their respective counties to get their work done as soon as possible that work on streets and curbing.

Place Twelve Lambs In Sale Of Top Thirty-Six

4-H Club Gets Big Chunk Of El Paso Show Money

Although they have failed to take any champion honors in recent livestock shows, the Upton County 4-H Club has been able to place a large number of lambs in both the El Paso and San Antonio sales and as a result have pushed their total money for the current show season to near the \$7,500 mark. Last season, the club sold an estimated \$13,500 worth of club animals.

EL PASO SHOW

In the recent El Paso Livestock Show, the Upton 4-H Club was heavy winners in the sale portion with 12 lambs out of a total sale of 36. This group, plus prize money

won, brought nearly \$4,000 to club members.

Again failing to win either a champion or grand champion, the group had three firsts out of a possible nine, and three second and third place winners.

Taking first in light southdown was Ellis Helmers; James McDonald, first in medium crossbreeds and Virginia Herral, first in heavy crossbreeds. Virginia also had the fourth place lamb in this event and third in light Southdowns.

Other El Paso winners were: Bud Poage, 4th in heavy finewool and 2nd in heavy Southdown; Frank Boyd, second in light crossbreeds; Jerry McDonald, third in the same class.

James McDonald had, in addition to his first place lamb, 2nd place in light Southdown. Bobby McAden was fourth in the heavy Southdown class and Butch Moore was fourth.

A total of 560 lambs were entered in the El Paso show with the first four from nine classes making the sale.

SAN ANTONIO SHOW

In the San Antonio show held last week, the Upton club had 6 lambs in the top 20 out of over 800 entries with a 3rd place in the Southdown class being the highest position won and 10th place being the lowest.

Sale at this show is scheduled for the latter part of this week.

In addition to the winnings in the lamb show, three Upton club boys, Frank Boyd, Willie Boyd and Wayne Kennemer, won honors in the calf scramble held at the rodeo. This will give the boys certificates for livestock purchases ranging from the top award of \$40 down to the sixth through tenth prizes of \$10 each.

Willie won third place; Frank, sixth; and Wayne, seventh.

Next show will be in Houston on February 23rd.

SCHOOL BOARD CALLS ELECTION; MAKES MARCH 5 FILING DEADLINE

CITY ELECTION SET FOR APRIL 1

Rankin City Council has set the date of Tuesday, April 1, for the annual city elections. Voting will be held in the City Hall with Mrs. Henry Scarborough as election judge.

Seats to be filled this year include one city commissioner and the Mayor's post. Ray Boggs, now serving his third term, presently holds the commissioner seat while A. E. Ivy, serving his fourth "hitch" as Mayor fills that position.

Thus far, no candidates have filed for the office. Deadline for filing has been moved to ten days prior to the election or March 21. Anyone desiring to run for either of the offices should file their name with Omar Warren, city secretary, at the City Hall.

Benefit Bar-B-Que To Be Served By Lodges Saturday

Rankin Rebekahs and the IOOF Lodges will join in serving a family style bar-b-que Saturday night, February 15. Proceeds will go toward financing their program for sending a Rankin school student to visit the United Nations this summer.

In addition to the bar-b-que itself, there will be a demonstration by the Rankin Boy Scouts, a fashion show by the girls of the high school and an address by Joe Scrivner, superintendent of schools, on "American Youth."

Tickets are now on sale by lodge members at \$1.00 per person with serving to start at 7:00 p.m. at the Rankin Park Building. With the family style bar-b-que, those attending have free access to all they want to eat.

In their regular meeting last Wednesday night, Rankin Independent School District's board of trustees designated Saturday, April 5, as election day to fill two school trustee posts and March 5 as the deadline for filing as a candidate for either of these positions.

The deadline of 30 days prior to the election itself is in accordance with new state laws now governing the holding of school elections. Any eligible person who desires to seek election to the board should file their application with E. E. Bloodworth, business manager, before the March 5 deadline.

Voting in Rankin will be in the high school lobby. Boyd Cox will be election judge and he will select his assistants.

Positions up for election this year will include the seats presently held by Norman Elrod, serving a one-year unexpired term originally held by Joe Powell, and D. O. McEwen, who has been a member of the board for three terms, which also includes an unexpired term of two years.

A GOOD BARGAIN

Again it is almost street paving time and a lot of folks haven't had their curbing work put in. Some have said that they do not plan to have this work installed.

Somehow that seems like a shame, too since they are getting paving work done for them without any direct cost—something that is almost unheard of—and added to this is the matter of the value to their property. Uncurbed paved streets

are very little better than no paving at all as can be seen on the old streets like 8th and on Grand. Chug-holes have worked out just off the edge of the pavement, holes have developed in the paving itself and it looks like a mess.

Streets which will be paved this year without curb and gutter will look exactly the same in a very short time. Surely it's worth \$60 to \$70 to the average homeowner to have a curbing in front of their property.

WHAT'S A JUVENILE—

Nowadays, along with the rockets and the cold war, the main headlines and topics of discussion are composed of the so-called "Juvenile" problem. Many, many hours of speech, reams and reams of written words and opinion upon opinion are given as to what is the matter with youth and what ought to be done about it. Upton County is taking a look at their "Juvenile" problem—with no less than a grand jury committee appointed to investigate.

We say hogwash. We've said it before and we say it again: Kids are no better or worse than they were a generation, two generations, three generations or longer ago. They just live in a different time and because of that, some of us who are older see them as being different from what we used to be. That they are.

And we do not deny that there are those kids who give trouble—both in school and out. But ask any school official—any

one connected with law enforcement. Ask them which of the kids give the trouble—and it's usually the same ones at that—and they will tell you every time that it is the kids whose parents will let him hide behind their coat tails rather than stand on his own two feet.

Naturally parents are expected to stand up for their kids—when standing up for them means trying to better them but there is a great difference in a parent trying to help his child who has gotten into trouble than there is of a parent trying to get the child out of trouble without punishment or blame.

But then again—what's all the yakking about? There has always been those who would break the law as adults and adults are little more than kids who have picked up a few years experience. If parents are determined to rear their kids in a manner that will tend to give them the idea that they can do no wrong and escape punishment, then it follows that those kids will someday grow up and will carry along with them the same idea.

This offers no answer to the problem but perhaps puts some light on just where the problem is located—At home.

The best thing that parents can spend on their children is time, not money.

WHAT TO DO —

Last week President Eisenhower

made a most interesting statement—one which leaves you wondering whether you ought to laugh or cry. He said that income taxes ought to be lowered if a further drop in business develops.

Now that brings up some food for thought. If lowering income tax would stop a depression once it is started, what effect would lowering the tax before a depression have? That seems a little like a doctor telling the patient that he is going to get sick but that he will not give him any medicine until he does.

Ike's reasoning for holding off on the income tax cut was that it would tend to add to inflation. Is it possible to have inflation and depression at the same time if a depression is caused by people not having enough money or can a person be sick and feel fine at the same time?

And, if continued high income taxes are necessary for the good of the country, is the huge foreign aid give-away carried on to deliberately drain money out of the United States?

Perhaps we should all remember that it is a political year and that charges, promises and counter-charges are being made by both political parties at the expense of the public with only one thought in mind and that is getting some party member out and another party member in. Maybe such statements as that are not supposed to make sense.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Granger of Rankin.

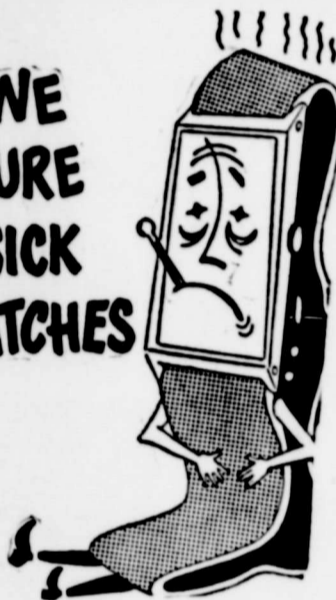

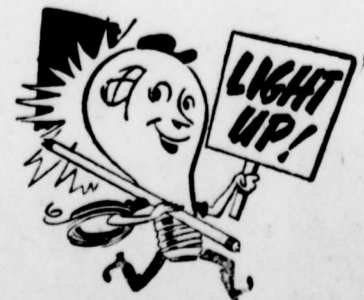

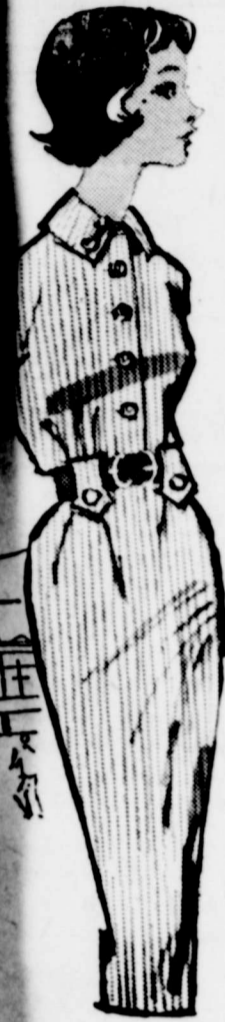
